There is no further expense account. That was settled.

I appreciate your suggesting that the directors may think that the work is of more value to the Company than the sum upon which we agreed. I am not at all sure that it will be, though of course I should be flattered if they thought so. I am quite satisfied as it stands. What I like most is your saying that you yourself are pleased with the job.

Of course, whatever other suggestions there are I will take up as soon as you make them to me. It would be as well perhaps to leave them until my trip. I shall be in Boston the evening of the 27th or the morning of the 28th and will stay with the Safety People until Friday afternoon. The Hotel Bellevue, I believe, is the headquarters.

Unless something comes up that is quite unexpected, I would like to go to Framingham on Friday afternoon and get in a few days of observation around your place of which we talked.

Now, my dear Mr. Dennison, you and Mrs. Dennison must not feel that you have to put me up. Surely there is a hotel or lodging house where I can find a resting place. I am a very adaptable person, you know. All I want is to brouse around among your people as freely as practical, not getting in anybody's way but getting what I want as naturally and informally as possible.

If I am obliged to change my plans for any reason, I will let you know.
