You know her as the author of those captivating Emmy Lou stories. I am sending you this just as a reminder that the Delineator ought to get early into this fight for temperance. Perhaps fight is not the word - education for temperance - seems to me better, education which has no taint of the old fanaticism, which has back of it this insistence on the highest in man, the thing by which he saves himself as Mrs. Martin says.

You may already have arranged for something. I do not know what you ought to have, but if you have not made any engagements possibly Mrs. Martin would be the best person to do it with a fresh pen. Do think about it.
