Dear Miss Feller,

The Committee on Women's Work of which I am chairman has <sup>not</sup> taken up the <sup>of occupational training</sup> problem in a detailed way. We have concluded investigations of women in the millinery trade and women in the book binding trade in New York City and are now at work on the artificial flower trade. The working staff consists of Miss Van Kleek, Miss Barrows, Miss Odenkranz and a stenographer, who are devoting all their time to it. We have an office at 31 Union Square (Room 1605). If you have time, I would suggest that you telephone Miss Van Kleek there (4264 Stuyvesant) and arrange to have her tell you just what information we have in regard to occupational opportunities for women. Miss Van Kleek and Miss Barrows are preparing brief articles in regard to the work already done in the millinery and book binding trade for publication in the volume on "Women in Industry" which is to be brought out this spring by the New York Academy of Political Science. It is barely possible that one or both of them may have outlines of these articles ready and that these will answer your questions. I need hardly add that our Committee will be very glad to assist and co-operate with you in any work you may decide to undertake
