My dear Miss Tarbell:-

I have received your recent letter and thank you for the same.

I have received a letter from my brother George in Virginia, whom you know, and it occurs to me that he might be of some value to the Speakers' Committee by speaking in Virginia three or four times. He is well known throughout the State in a professional way and also somewhat of a church man, being a director in the Union Theological Seminary of Richmond, Virginia. He and Carter Glass are good friends.

He does not know I am writing this letter. If this suggestion is of any use to Senator Tydings, especially in view of the religious question which is being so closely emphasized in Virginia at the present time, I will be glad. I am inclosing to you a letter I received from George this morning, which you can destroy after making such use of it as you see fit.
