A few years ago I spent considerable time in Johnson City going over your plant with your brother, Harry Johnson. You, at that time, were in the South, so I did not have an opportunity to meet you. I want very much to have a talk with you or some representative at your plants in regard to your experiences with women operatives, their earning capacity, particularly their ambition and ability to get on.
