Dear Mr. Yard:

I send you this note to confirm the understanding between your firm and ourselves as to the transfer of Miss Tarbell's books.

With the understanding that Miss Tarbell is satisfied, we agree to turn over to you the plates and stock of the five volumes now issued by us. You are to pay us for the plates half the original cost, which was \$3854.39, so that this item will amount to \$1927.20. The stock you are to pay for at cost. I am enclosing a definite memorandum of the sheet and bound stock of each volume, with the prices; I shall also enclose any circular matter and catalogue entries which may assist you in making up your announcements.

The understanding is that we are to turn over all this material to you by the first of July (provided we are notified by Miss Tarbell's lawyer that this is satisfactory to her) and that you are to have the privilege of paying in twelve monthly notes, with interest at 6%, the first of these to be dated July 15th, 1909, the second August 15th, 1909, etc.

It is, of course, understood that the title to the property does not pass until the complete payment is made.
