Dear Mrs. Burton: a fair little, which  
Miss. Giles said you wanted from me, but  
Miss Giles asked me to  
write you my decision about the article  
on the Chrysler Institute of Engineering.  
I should like to do it because it is a  
theme in which I have been long interested  
and because the notes Miss Giles left with  
me seem to show that the Chrysler concern  
has developed shop education a little  
further than any concern in which I am  
familiar. There are two or three ~~hitches~~ *with*  
however. In the first place I cannot do  
the article at once I fear - other engage-  
ments interfering. All I could do is to  
say I will begin to think about it at once  
but will have to put off the doing of it  
for some time. Second, I should want to  
make it an article on the idea with  
illustrations, not only what Chrysler has  
done but what some others have done and  
tried to do. From my present knowledge  
I should say that I would want to put  
Chrysler at the top, give them the most  
space. It would mean, of course, that they  
would give me the opportunity to go into  
the factory, see the plant in operation  
and talk with students and workmen, as well  
as to the directors and engineers in charge.  
From my point of view this form of treatment  
would really be better for Chrysler than to  
make an article entirely devoted to their  
Institute.

What do you say?

I see that Mr. T. B. Ross  
suggests that I talk with him in case that  
I do the article. That of course I shall

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be glad to do.

The editorial on Work as  
I See It, if that is a fair title, which  
Miss Giles said you wanted from me, I  
will do as soon as I get get around to it.  
Miss Giles thought you were not in a hurry.
