And thank you for sending me the sketch of Steff's new book. The personal experiences with Steff in the Los Angeles group sounds familiar. He was always completely absorbed with little researches. He sometimes seemed to me to care very little about what was going on in social, fundamental laboratory work. There is a big gap between the golden rule and its application by those who profess to believe in it, was his eternal theme. But I used to think that Steff missed a good deal of the consolation that comes from seeing first at hand sound creative things wiped out in some little corner of an industry, a town, a settlement, or in somebody's private life.

However, I am inclined to think that he is the greatest advocate of the golden rule as had in our day.
