I do hope that you are feeling
ever so much better by this time.
You have been sorely missed at
the Club.

The report of the Library activ-
ities for 1936 was ready at the Annual
Meeting; but it was not read because
of a misunderstanding. It is now
in Miss Martin's hands for typing
(she very generously offered to do
this for me) and I am going to
send you a copy. We had 104
accessions during 1936, and spent
\$1.04!

Not knowing when we can
have that little chat which you
suggested some time ago, I wonder
if I may enlist your help in this way?

The organization in which I
had the position of Case Supervisor (1935-6)
(The Family Adjustment Society of
Queens) did not succeed in raising

enough money to keep me, - so while I kept on working through October full time as a volunteer, and still give some time because the need is great, - I have not earned any salary since September 30th last. The job was an ideal one for me, - social work with families and preventive guidance work with girls. I loved it.

I am registered with all the best agencies in New York - for social work or teaching, and many, many good friends are doing all they can to help me secure a suitable job.

By what seems almost a miracle, an old debt which I had believed hopeless, contracted in 1929 - was repaid to me, and by this means I have been able to live during these months.

As the result of a not very important radio contest, I was invited to broadcast over W. J. Z. on January 1st. I enjoyed the experience, and have been informed that my voice is well suited to radio work. I should love to get into the field.

Could you suggest any way in which I might make contacts with directors of programs or personnel directors? Letters to them, even with enclosures of stamped, addressed envelopes, have thus far yielded nothing.
