Please thank Miss Wolfe for sending the information which I asked her for. The changes will have to be made in proof because I sent the manuscript to the Macmillan Company last week. I was delayed in sending it in by the serious illness of Professor Becker, our consulting editor, as a result of which we lost about a month of time.

I am informed by the Macmillan Company that, because of the priority of a number of other manuscripts, the book will not be scheduled for publication until the fall. Professor Fox and I have no objection to such a delay because a nonfiction work seldom has a good market in the summer time. You may feel differently, however. In case you desire earlier publication, I suggest that you call the matter to the attention of some of your good friends in the Macmillan office.
