William the Conqueror showed why the League's of Nations always fail. When William found that the four great Earls were keeping the Kingdom in a turmoil by their jealousies, he broke up their earldoms into the modern counties or shires. He showed by this that there may be harm in bigness.

Mr. Gary has returned from his visit to Mussolini and has sung his swan song of failure to solve the labor problem and steady business. He has asked us to turn to Religion. We are facing an era of hard times ahead because of the failure of our business and religious leaders to solve the problems that our world is facing today.

Mr. Rockefeller can not lift society with its bootstraps. His philanthropy amounts to nothing because whatever he gives he has to get from the people. The Steel Trust must have customers outside of itself-it is not a complete self supporting institution. When the people get out of work and buying slows down the Trust has to say off more help. It thus adds to the trouble.

You have power in your pen. You have shown your independence. Why not join in a movement for co-operative authorship that will naturally be better than any one author could do alone?
