This suggestion seemed to me particularly hopeful because in one of Mrs. Lincoln's letters she speaks of a Mr. George D. Prenties, and Mrs. Andrews tells me in her letter that Faul Shipman was an associate on the Louisville Courier Journal.

I should appreciate very much any information that you can give me, dear Mr Drane; and I do hope that I am not adding burdens to a busy man.
