

Mrs. Waldo Lincoln tells me that in 1848, when Lincoln spoke in Worcester, he was entertained by Governor Levi Lincoln in the house in which she and Mr. Waldo Lincoln have lived until recently. This house is now occupied by their daughter, being so large that they did not care to "rattle around" in it, as she said.

It is a stateleyt and beautiful "mansion" of the period. A narrow veranda with huge white pillars running up two stories. She took me in. There was a wide hall with two rooms on each side. The dining room was the second room on the left. The two rooms have since been thrown into one and a spacious dining room added to the rear.

Mrs. Lincoln says that it is a tradition in the family that Lincoln said that he neverbefore had been at so fine a dinner - which one can well believe. Nothing so fine could have happened in Springfield and nothing better in Washington then. At that time he did not know that he came from the same Lincoln line as Levi.
