Unfortunately, the note made at the time, corresponding to those notes I sent you, was mislaid some years ago, and I cannot verify the fact,--but I most undoubtedly and unquestionably heard Senator Sumner express just that opinion. It may have been at a later date, and I may have the times and places mixed. Senator Sumner may <sup>also</sup> have been in Washington that morning and in ~~New York~~ <sup>New York</sup> in the afternoon, before the public announcement of the capture had been made, and both myself and Pierce and Hale be correct.
