

Age of the Jury in Armstrong Case.

Judge Walker says that not a man on the jury was under thirty-five years of age, and that nearly all of them were old, gray-haired men; but his recollection upon this point is evidently at fault. William A. Douglas, a witness in the case, and a reliable authority, says he thinks the average age of the jury would not exceed twenty-three years; John Husted says the same; and John T. Brady, a juror, telegraphs from California: "I think Logan was selected the foreman because the oldest. I was twenty-three and think the youngest!" Col. Dilworth says he thinks ~~the~~ age was not taken into consideration in the selection of the jury; but most of those familiar with the case recall that ^{nearly all} ~~most~~ of the jurors were young men, and ~~that~~ comment upon the fact as an evidence of Lincoln's shrewdness.
