From Dijon we went to Beaune, an hour to the south - another old town - there is at B. A. hospital (the French say Hotel Dieu - hotel of God) which was built in the 15th century and which rests almost intact. I've never seen anything more beautiful for its completeness and for its artistic perfection in details. Down to the door hinges, the knocker, the kitchen utensils, it is perfect.

28T The kitchen is indeed a marvel for efficiency - there is a machine for turning a roast on a spit before a grate which dates from 1450 - a great complicated affair turned by a little man of carved wood painted gaily. The Plaque behind the grate fire is decorated with the arms of France.

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
