Referring to your letter of May 15th, we enclose the following material relating to annual meetings of stockholders not yet submitted to you:

Statement as to Wages, Hours and Other Conditions of Labor Among Employes, submitted at annual meeting of Stockholders, April 20, 1914.

Proceedings at Annual Meeting of Stockholders, held April 19, 1915.

Resolutions offered by Mr. J. C. Sibley, of Franklin, Pa., and unanimously adopted at annual meeting of Stockholders, April 18, 1921.

The Proceedings at the annual meeting in 1912 are included in the black covered binder containing material on the Twelve-hour Day.

The Proceedings at the annual meeting in 1914 I believe were handed to you on one of your visits at the office. This contains, on page 16, Mr. Maitland's prayer, which is probably the one referred to in the third paragraph of your letter.

The remarks for 1920 are included in Volume V of Judge Gary's addresses, which was sent to you since receipt of your letter.

The remarks of stockholders for 1921 were not published, aside from the resolutions mentioned above.

From this you will note that the only published remarks of Judge Gary and stockholders, in addition to those sent, are for 1912, 1914 and 1915. If you find that you do not have the 1912 and 1914 reports, we shall be glad to send them.
