Dear Mr. Sites:

I have not thanked you for your kindness in sending me the finely bound edition of the documents in the Steel suit. They are much easier to handle in this shape than in the paper covers, as well as presenting a very handsome appearance on the shelf, which of course always helps the work.

I have your note of August first in which you tell me that Mr. Percival Roberts, Jr. will probably not return from Canada until the end of September, and suggest that I take other names.

I rather think it would be better to put off further interviewing until September as I shall be out of town much of the time myself during August. I go away today for two weeks. On my return I will telephone you and we can talk over the matter of other interviews both with Judge Gary and others.

You will be interested, I think, to know that since I saw you I had a talk with Mr. William Loeb. I particularly wanted to find out from him whether the Roosevelt papers were all available for examination. He tells me that they were all turned over to the Congressional Library, and he thinks that I will have no difficulty in going through them there.

I was interested to have him say that in his judgment Judge Gary has been the leader in bringing a great change in recent years in the methods of Big Business.
