3. What, if anything, does Judge Gary remember of his grandmother, Lucy Ferrin Gary? *2 aw in rec -*

4. Are there illustrations, photographs, etc., of the homestead and school at Pomfret? *you a rec'd*

5. Is there an early portrait of Erastus Gary in existence? -

6. Would it not be well to get together now the documents covering "Pittsburgh Plus"?

7. Have you found any Gary letters of the first few years in Illinois?

I cannot give up the hope that there is something in existence from Erastus telling how he got to Illinois and describing his first experiences. It would be wonderful if you could unearth it.
