Dear Miss Chandler:

Among the items turned over to me by Miss Ruseell is an extract from a letter to Joseph Tumulty under date of October 6, 1925.

In this letter is the following which I want to use:

"Whether the United States will join the League of Nations or the International Court, that is these man-made institutions, is a question which the people, acting through ^{as not over-} no wise Senate, may decide, but whether the United States will sit in the court of great economic movements throughout the world is not a question which the Senate, or even all of our people combined can decide. We are there, and being there, inescapably there, we must meet our problems and responsibilities with wisdom, courage and conscience."

I am doubtful about the phrase, "acting through no wise Senate." May it not be that the quotation says, "acting through our wise Senate?"

I will be obliged if you will verify it for me.
