Yesterday I talked with my taxi man. "We are so glad to get a fare these days." "How is it," I ask. "Still busy?"

"No," he said, "people are walking these days - not riding. Too many taxis for present demand. We are one of those surpluses they talk about.

"Guess it is our own fault. I pick up more foreigners that can hardly talk the English language than I do Americans. They have got money and why? Because they have sense about handling money that we haven't. I talk with these friends of mine. They came over here immigrants. They work and out of every dollar they make they save twenty-five cents. We don't do that. I never did that. None of us taxi men do it. We make the dollar, we spend it and a little more. We have been living ^{on} our hopes in this land. It is time we got down to hard pan, learn something from these foreigners. Never again for me. I save twenty five out of every dollar. after this."
