Navy and Marines Examine Reserves

**Military Comprehensives
For V-1 and Marine Reserves
To Be Held April 20, in Brooks**

Screening tests to qualify Navy V-1 and Marine Corps Reservists for participation in the College Training Program, scheduled to begin July 1, will be held April 20, on this campus, the Navy indicated through college authorities.

All men enlisted in Class V-1, U.S. Navy Reserve, who will have completed four or more semesters by July 1, 1943, will be required to take the test. This same test will be given to freshmen and sophomores in the Marine Corps Reserve, Class 111-d, with the exception of a few parts which may be omitted by choice.

Pre-medical and pre-dental students may apply for an excuse from taking the test, but are encouraged not to, in order that they may qualify for other duty if not selected for medical or dental training under the College Training Program.

The written test of the qualifying examination will be given on Tuesday, April 20, in Brooks hall dining room. There will be both a morning and an afternoon session, with the exact times to be announced later.

Students will be excused from classes to attend these sessions. Office of Dean of Men stressed the necessity for all Navy and Marine reservists falling in these categories to be present for the examinations.

While those of the Marine Reserve may be excused from certain parts of the test, the Navy declared, "Any Marine Reservists desiring as a matter of interest to take those parts of the test not required, may do so with the understanding that the scores on those parts will not in any way militate against them, but might be of value as the basis for estimate of aptitude for certain courses of study."

Men of the Marine Reserve who are now juniors and seniors are not required to take the test.

Cwen Tapping Set for Tuesday Evening in Ravine

The annual tapping ceremony of Cwens, honorary sophomore women's fraternity, will be held Tuesday, April 6, at 7:00 p.m. in the upper ravine. All freshman women are requested to be present.

man), Nancy Sutton, Dean Laila Skinner, Dean Horace T. Lavelly, Harry Conroy, Carrie Emerson and Donald Mogg. Conroy and Emerson represent the organizations which they now head, the Allegheny Undergraduate Council and the Associated Women Students, which bodies will be permanently seated on the new committee.

All old subcommittees will continue as in the past, with the same chairmen and members, but under the direct administration of the new joint committee. Additional subcommittees will be added when, and if, the need arises.

Chairman Hexter presented the new W.A.C. as "the clearing house for all campus war activities, set up to combine and facilitate war activities of the students and faculty."

The W.A.C. was formed late last October, springing from a Town Meeting discussion on "What can Allegheny do to help win the war?" From the high interest of the audience and the many ideas advanced at the meeting, the A.U.C. acted to form the W.A.C. with George Hill as chairman.

Approximately 200 students turned out for the first meeting to hear the new set-up explained and to sign up for the various committees.

Since then its accomplishments have been numerous. First came the bond drive, undertaken in conjunction with the city; students signed up for blood bank donations; war stamps were put on sale on the campus, and the scholarship fund created; Red Cross projects were started, together with other activities.

Three New Profs Added to Faculty As Business Improves

Several additions will be made to the college faculty in the near future. These new teachers will be engaged, for the most part in instructing members of the Army unit stationed on this campus.

Arriving April 10 will be Doctor J. F. Bartunak as assistant professor in physics. At present teaching at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at Troy, New York, Doctor Bartunak graduated from the University of Nebraska and received his Ph.D. degree at the University of Michigan. He pursued graduate research work at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Bartunak will teach both the Army unit and regular college students.

Dr. Charles S. Gilbert will be added to the faculty as assistant professor of geography. He has been professor of geography and history at Mansfield State Teachers' College, Mansfield, Pennsylvania, for the past twenty years. A graduate of Nebraska Wesleyan college, he received his master's degree at the University of Alabama and his Ph.D. at Webster University, Atlanta, Georgia.

Clarence McKissick will assist in the instruction of physics to the Army students and will assume charge of their laboratory work. Mr. McKissick has taught physics in a secondary school for the past ten years.

Blood Bank To Be At Y.M.C.A.

The date for the appearance of the mobile Red Cross blood bank here has been changed to Monday, May 3, Dr. Albert Ogilvie stated. Due to the use of the school buildings by the Army, the unit will be set up in the Meadville Y.M.C.A. building instead of on campus.

Anyone under 21 desiring release blanks, which must be signed by parent or guardian, may obtain them from Dr. Ogilvie at his office in Alden hall, or from the War Activities Committee.

Papa misuses the Mennonite tradition, suppressing in the name of religion the simple pleasures and recreations of every-day life to which Mama, an authentic Mennonite, has no objection. Emma, the daughter, is in love with a surveyor who wants to marry her. The son, Jake, has a knack for mechanics, and wants to simplify farm life by the installation of machinery. Mama, though resigned to accepting Papa's word as divinely sanctioned law, desires the friendly association with neighbors which is a part of even the most orthodox Mennonite life. Papa opposes them, and keeps them in strict isolation.

The sly rebellion of the family, the sudden absence of Papa, and an entanglement with the state police serve to make an evening of hearty fun.
