

Phi Beta Kappa Elections Announced; Jack Goellner, Dorothy Jeanne Smith

Dorothy Jeanne Smith and Jack Gordon Goellner were named to Phi Beta Kappa by the executive committee of the Allegheny Chapter, composed of Allegheny faculty members. The announcement was made by Dr. Richard L. Brown, president of the local chapter, at the 1951 Homecoming Convocation on Friday, October 26, in Montgomery Gymnasium.

To be eligible for election at the beginning of the senior year, a student must have at least a 90 average and no failures in any course. "D.J." is an English major, and is a member of the Allegheny Sinfonietta. She has written for the **Literary Magazine** and is on the editorial board of that publication.

Jack has written for the **Literary Magazine**, is a former member of the editorial board of **The Campus**, and is now student employee of the Publicity Department.

Mr. Raymond P. Shafer, Crawford County District Attorney, was the speaker. In discussing the topic, "Why Homecoming?", Mr. Shafer gave his interpretation of the meaning of Homecoming, and urged students to encourage rather than criticize school activities and to contribute more of themselves to the educational program of Allegheny.

Gustave Rylander, Alumni Secretary, made the opening remarks at the convocation.

Penn History Head Speaks Thursday

Dr. Roy Franklin Nichols, head of the history department at the University of Pennsylvania, will be the Sturtevant lecturer next Thursday night, November 8. The lecture, entitled "Wider Horizons for Historians", will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the Chapel. There will be no admission charge.

Dr. Nichols' appearance is in conjunction with Phi Beta Kappa as a part of its series of lectures, of which the Sturtevant lecture is an integral part. This annual event is sponsored by a former Alleghenian. Mr. Paul Sturtevant, for the purpose of bringing to the Allegheny campus lecturers on political and governmental subjects.

Dr. Nichols obtained his bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees at Rutgers University, and his Ph.D. at Columbia University. He has also received a Doctor of Letters at Franklin and Marshall College, and Master of Arts at Cambridge University, where he was visiting professor for the year 1948-49.

Since 1930, Dr. Nichols has been professor of history at the University of Pennsylvania, and is the author of several history Books.

Draft Exam Slated For December 13th

The Dean's Office has issued a reminder to all men students of the Selective Service Qualifying Examinations to be given on December 13, 1951, and on April 24, 1952. The test is optional, but Selective Service officials have warned that it is in the best interests of the student to take the tests.

Applications may be secured at the local selective service board. In order to take the test on December 13, the student must have his application postmarked no later than midnight, November 5.

Senior students planning to go to graduate school are also urged to take the test, since they can still obtain deferments on condition that they are admitted to the graduate school, have the necessary scholastic average, and receive adequate scores on the test.

Strong UN Will Stall Next War - Anderson

World War III is not upon us, nor will it come if the United Nations can maintain its present strength. This view of current world affairs was sounded by Dr. Dewey Anderson, director of the Public Affairs Institute, in an address given in the Meadville High School Auditorium Monday evening.

There are three ways to bring peace, Dr. Anderson stated: an effective UN; the effective control of arms; and the disestablishment of all areas of want, from which areas wars emanate.

Migration Planned For Westminster

Saturday, November 16, has been designated as Migration Day by AUC. An annual event, Allegheny students will travel enmasse this year to Westminster College in New Wilmington, Pa.

Classes, shortened so that lunch can be served at 11:30 a.m., are scheduled as follows: 8:00-8:40; 8:50-9:30; 9:40-10:20; and 10:30-11:10. A pep rally will be held in Brook's Circle at 12:15 and buses will leave from the driveway for Westminster at 12:30.

Round trip bus tickets, costing \$1.25, will be sold on Monday and Tuesday, November 5 and 6, in the College Union, Cochran Hall, while game tickets, at \$1 each, may be purchased all week long at the Athletic Office in Montgomery Gymnasium.

"We hope that as many students as possible will participate in Migration Day", said Steve Graffam, student chairman of the event. "The success of the program depends on student cooperation", he added.

On Tuesday evening, October 30, the sixteen additions to the club were entertained in the Pine Room by the old members.

Point Four Important

Dr. Anderson listed a number of concrete ways in which peace might be obtained. He first pointed to the Asiatic world where the "sick spots" can be cured by our aiding the people there to release their "primitive shackles". Point four he found to be the most successful argument in our favor in Asia.

In Europe, hope for peace has been engendered by the Marshall Plan, he said, Although the plan has not trickled down to the masses it has placed European states on a firm foundation, stated Dr. Anderson, based on a stabilized currency.

Russian Poverty

"There are cracks in the Kremlin Wall," he declared, "which do not portend a major revolution behind the curtain." However, he added that they are signs of weakness which will prevent the Soviet from starting a world war. Among these weaknesses Dr. Anderson listed the abject poverty of Russia; the failure of Russian industry to meet our standards; the many purges in the Party; the continual reorganizations of the Party; and the building of nations, making them tools for the Soviet.

The United States has done a tremendous job in a defensive manner, Dr. Anderson said, but we have failed to develop a positive program of peace. He observed that there was a possibility that Russia will present a peace program to the UN General Assembly in Paris, and that

This Is Our Obligation

What purpose does the editorial page of a college newspaper serve? In the last two weeks **The Campus** has been criticized for its attitude concerning editorials, particularly those of a worldly nature.

In our opinion the purpose of an editorial, be it of local or worldly nature is to provide a space in which to bring to the attention of the student body those points which we feel are of significance to the life of the student, the college, or the world, and which cannot possibly be presented as news stories. Because they represent the views of the editorial board as being of an important nature, they are presented to the college with the hope that the student body will allow our thoughts to be mixed with theirs, and thus, if they are so inclined, to create the proper action, knowledge, or dissent.

We are increasingly aware of the world in which we live. We are of the belief that Americans as representatives of one of the two leading nations of the world, must be, if our particular theory of government is to succeed, in full knowledge of the activities of its own nation, and of all nations whose relationships concern our attempt to develop a more

perfect democracy and a more peaceful world.

We think that as the future intelligensia (and don't laugh at the term, because whether we want to be or not, we are endowed with a greater amount of schooling than most citizens and have an obligation to repay society) we have a right to discuss topics of more than local interest in our columns. We feel that by our four years of pre-natal training in writing and thinking, we shall be better able to execute our obligations to the nation when we leave this ivory womb.

Secondly we have attempted, by sometimes printing editorials of an extreme viewpoint, to inoculate a stirring on a campus which we feel is dead to its obligations. When we have asked for letters, we have done so because we know full well that there are many students on this campus who do have opinions on matters which we discuss, but who have not expressed them because in the past there has never been any attempt to create an atmosphere conducive to the exchange of views. We firmly believe that the market place of ideas must be open and filled if a strong democracy is to grow.

Chinese Toys

Last week on two occasions firecrackers were shot off in Reis Library during the evening. Library officials do not know who the offenders were, nor have they conducted an investigation into the affair as yet. But they have expressed the intention to close the library during the evening if the explosions continue.

It is rather disillusioning to the library staff and to the mature student that there are individuals on campus who have no better outlet for excess energy than to disrupt study hours with Chinese toys. It is further disillusioning to think that the joys of a very few might lead to inconvenience for many more.

Traditionally, the Library is and ought to be the one place on campus where students may seriously study in quiet. There certainly is a time and a place for fireworks and bombastic enthusiasm in college. But that place is not the library. Eventually, most students do get around to hitting the books. When they do, they expect the sanctity of the library to remain intact.

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McFarland Tells Board Of Trustees Of Progress In Eastern Division Campaign

John R. McFarland, Jr., college executive secretary and director of the Allegheny Development Program, reported on the east coast campaign to the Board of Trustees at their annual Home-coming meeting held Saturday morning. Approximately \$40,000 has been pledged since the Buhl Foundation of Pittsburgh offered a \$270,000 grant provided Allegheny could match the amount, he said, adding that \$835,000 had been pledged before the announcement of the grant.

Campaigns have started in New York City and Boston, and the Philadelphia and Washington drives will get under way soon, according to Mr. McFarland. Saturday's meeting was the first of two special sessions on the development campaign. The other will be held in December.

At their meeting, also held Saturday morning, the Allegheny Alumni Association Board approved the formation of an alumni council to act for the association. A committee was appointed to draft a new association constitution, and the proposal will be considered further at the annual spring meeting. Robert L. Kirkpatrick of Pittsburgh is president of the Alumni Board.

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Wooster Here Saturday For Gator's Final Home Game

Allegheny Out To Revenge '50 Upset; Scots Show Impressive Ohio Record

Homecoming has come and gone, and the almost-but-not-quite Gators are still searching for their first win. This week it's the Scots of Wooster that will be giving Daddio his headaches in the Gator's final home game of the season.

The Ohio breed of Scotsmen are not as tough a clan as the Tartans that Allegheny ran into two weeks ago, but they still boast an enviable record of four wins in six starts. After trouncing their first three opponents, Hiram, Ohio Northern and Kenyon, they dropped two in a row to Dennison and Muskingum, two strong Ohio independents. Last week, they bounced back to nip Akron, 7-6, on a sloppy field.

The Ohioans will be filling the air with footballs, thrown by their freshman quarterback, Jim Ewers. Rounding out the backfield are half-backs Jim Siskowic and Jerry Behringer, and fullback Bill Martin. All three are capable leather luggers, but Behringer is the one to watch. Weighing only 150 lbs., he is a good breakaway runner and a hard line charger rolled into one prize package. In the Akron game, he climaxed a touchdown drive by carrying the ball on four straight plunges off tackle.

The line is big and brawny, averaging 186 lbs. on offense, and 190 on defense. Defensive standout is tackle Jerry Dodez, who tips the scales at 220. They held Akron in their own territory last week until the closing minutes of the game.

Allegheny Leads in Series, 2-1

Wooster has met Allegheny on three previous occasions, with the Scots gaining their first win from the Gators last year, 20-13. What made the defeat tough to take was the fact that this was Wooster's only win of the season, after they had lost to Oberlin, 58-2, and Mount Union 73-13. Now the situation is reversed, and a Gator win would be in the interests of reverse justice.

Gator Lineup. Intact

The Gator lineup will in all likelihood be composed of the same familiar faces that have only a tie to show for five games. Daddio has no rabbits to pull out at this juncture, but is hoping that his charges will eventually display the form expected of them all season. This will be their last chance to cop one before the home folks, and probably for the season. As the season gets older, the opponents get tougher. Westminster and Dickinson, the last two teams the Gators meet this year, may be too rugged for the Hilltoppers to handle. The Wooster lineup below is the offensive starting team.

Allegheny's soccer team continued on their undefeated ways during the past week by defeating Grove City 4-1 in a home game played Friday at College Field and following it up with a victory at Westminster on Tuesday which ended with the final score reading 1-0. The Gators' unblemished record will be put to a severe trail tomorrow when the booters of Slippery Rock State Teachers' College, one of the strongest teams in this section, invade College Field for what is expected to be a keenly contested game.

Eckstrom Leads Scoring

The Grove City game saw Al Eckstrom leading the scoring with two goals, followed by wings Dane Hannum and George Culberson with one each. The opponents lone tally came in the third quarter when they managed to force a shot through Allegheny's defense for the score. This single score is indicative of the good team work and excellent spirit which the Gators have proven themselves to possess in both their offensive and defensive game.

See-Saw Battle

The away game, played at Westminster, consisted of a see-saw battle as neither team was able to work the ball through the defending fullbacks for a good shot at the goal. Allegheny's lone score came in the second period when Westminster's goalie was pulled out of position only to have George Culberson float a high, easy one over his head into the net. This was the end of the scoring for the afternoon. The Allegheny booters were forced to tighten their defense even more as the Westminster eleven exerted all efforts to at least tie the score before the time ran out and did in such a fashion that the fourth quarter saw Allegheny dominating play in their opponent's territory.

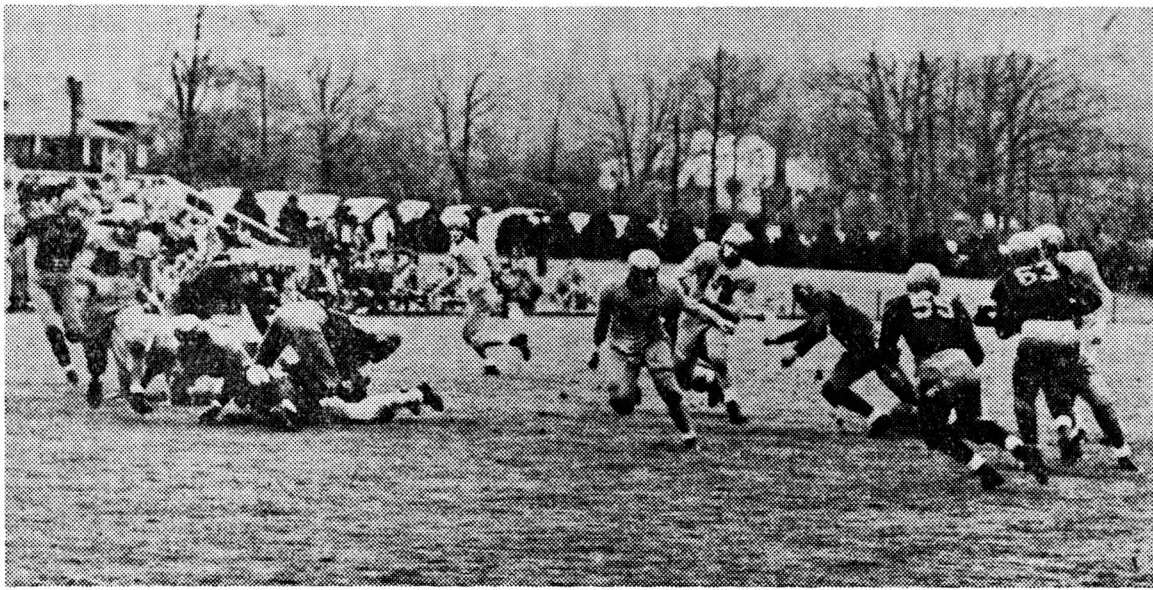
Slippery Rock Tomorrow

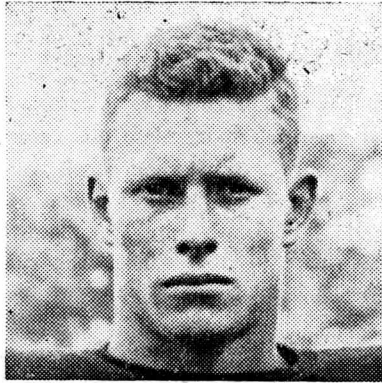

Monk Meyers, by far the finest performer on the field, scored two of them, the first of which was a sparkling 49 yard gallop on a pitch from Fritz Reed. Davey McMahon also gave Allegheny cause to elate; McMahon, running like a deer, shiftily evaded the outstretched arms of Grove City tacklers and brought the home team a wealth of yardage.

Looked Like Sure Win

Three unsuccessful extra point attempts did not disturb spectators. The game was "in the bag". The Grovers had been exerting all the skill of a retired school marm. How would they possibly overcome an 18-0 deficit? So thought the hordes of students who retreated to their warm, dry rooms, leaving behind them the old grads and faculty members obviously less cocky or less vulnerable to the prevailing weather conditions.

Grovers Fight Back

With seven minutes remaining in the first half Grove City awoke from the dead. She very adroitly proceeded to make up the difference in score and eventually destroy her opponent. A series of penalties

Varied Career Marks Air Force Commander

Returning from summer vacation this fall we found our alma mater with a new addition—the department of Air Science and Tactics of the Reserve Officers' Corps. Plans made by the college last year had materialized and the long expected and desired addition had taken place.

The man responsible for the operation of the Air ROTC program at Allegheny is Lieut. Colonel George F. Brodie, USAF, who heads the Air Force detachment here. A native of Richmond, Va., he comes to our college with considerable experience in his field and also an interesting war record.

Col. Brodie joined the Air Force after graduation from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1940. Completing his own training in 1941, he was assigned to the Western Flying Command with the task of training pilots and bombardiers in New Mexico and Arizona. While there he met Mrs. Brodie who was attending the University of New Mexico at that time, and they were married in 1942.

During the European campaign Col. Brodie served as group operations officer with the 15th Air Force in Italy, conducting bombing missions against German industry and troop concentrations in Northern Italy, Austria and Germany itself. He participated in bombing missions to Munich, Wiener Neustadt, and also Linz and Salzburg.

After his return to the United States Col. Brodie was assigned to the Philippines, where he served as Inspector General at Clark Field from 1948 to 1950. This particular assignment ended, by coincidence, a month before the outbreak of the Korean conflict.

Back in the United States, Col. Brodie travelled with an Aviation Cadet Selection Team selecting aviation cadets for this particular training program of the Air Force. This assignment gave him a chance to become well acquainted with a large number of colleges and universities here.

After being associated with the Air ROTC at the University of Pittsburgh, Col. Brodie was given the task of organizing two new units — at Allegheny and Grove City College. He was here a number of times in May and June of

this year and welcomed the chance of heading the Allegheny detachment. It is his permanent assignment now, and, barring an all-out war, Col. Brodie expects to be here a minimum of four years.

Commenting on Allegheny, Col. Brodie says that he has been greatly impressed by the friendly and cooperative atmosphere existing at this college and in Meadville. He finds the men taking Air ROTC courses above average and states that both drill and classroom work has been progressing better than expected. In his estimation undergraduate interest is considerable and the effort satisfactory.

It is certain that most of us will have contact with Col. Brodie and his department at some time during our college careers. Undoubtedly he will take part in social and academic activities on campus and we will have the privilege of getting acquainted with this very friendly and pleasant officer. Our college can feel honored in having a man of Col. Brodie's caliber as a member of its faculty and we can be sure that the interest in the Air AOTC program shown by both administration and students will make his task a pleasant one.
