### Our Town To Be Staged By Playshop

Our Town by Thornton Wilder, which comes to the stage of the Playshop on February 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22, could be the story of any small American town at the turn of the century. The name of the town is Grovers Corners.

The audience becomes acquainted with Grovers Corners and the people who live there through the eyes of the stage manager. There is the love story of Emily and George and the troubles of their families. First the audience sees a day in our town, and then the marriage of the two young people and how it comes about and finally the result of their lives. The play covers a period of 13 years from 1901 to 1914. It is a warm, moving story, with sincere characters and situations with all the tears and laughter of plain ordinary people living good useful lives.

### Poet, Paul Engle, Spoke to Students About His Writings

"Poetry is found in every experience and through intensity of feelings and expression." So said Paul Engle, author of six volumes of poetry and one novel. Mr. Engle, who spoke at the Playshop on Wednesday, February 5, said that the purpose of poetry is "perpetual illumination and intensification of your life." Mr. Engle is head of the creative writing department of the University of Iowa. After his talk on "Poetry in Modern Life" in which he read some of his own poetry including *Anonymous*, he retired to the Craig room of the library where students interested in poetry had a chance to talk to him.

### Dr. Wm. Barnes Dedicates New Organ And Gives Recital

"Building organs is really my avocation," said William H. Barnes, organist and organ architect, who dedicated the new organ in Ford Memorial chapel on Monday evening at 8:30. He explained that although by profession he is a printer, his hobby has practically become a full-time job. Dr. Barnes now travels extensively over the country from his home in Evanston, Ill., designing organs and giving recitals. In Evanston he is organist for the Baptist church. He built his first organ in his father's home at the age of 15.

### \$50 In Prizes Are Offered In Speaking Contest

The annual Wakefield oration contest, which is open to all upper-class students will be held on March 13. Those people who desire to enter the contest should contact Duff Hopper, '49, or Renee Binder, '48, by February 18. The final draft of each oration must be completed by March 6. The prizes offered are \$25, 15, and \$10, as in the past. The orations may contain no more than 2,000 words of which no more than 200 words may be quoted.

Allegheny is sponsoring the statewide contest which is to be held on the campus on March 28. So far eleven colleges and universities including Penn State and Temple, have indicated their interest in participating. First place winners in the Wakefield contest will participate in the state contest.

The state winners will go to Northwestern university to take part in the national finals on April 24 and 25.

### Class Rings To Be On Sale In Grill Tomorrow

Class rings will be sold in the Grill tomorrow. The price will be \$18 plus tax for women's rings and \$21 plus tax for men's rings. They are set with an onyx stone unless a colored stone is preferred which would be an additional \$4. An installment plan is being arranged by which the student may put \$5 down and pay the remainder within six months. The rings are designed in such a way that Greek letters may be added on either side of the setting if so desired.

The committee's aim in selling the rings tomorrow is to discover whether or not they are sufficiently in demand to warrant their sale in the book store at all times.

The class of '48 felt that in as much as so many of the old Allegheny traditions had been banned within the past few years that the time had come for Allegheny to find new traditions. This brought about the idea of school rings. They felt that the ring would serve as a link between the school and the student after graduation. Tomorrow the strength of the new "tradition" will be put to a test.

### Johnson Claims Allegheny Sojourn Active and Enjoyable

Commencing with the first issue of the *Campus* in this second semester of the college year, the *Campus* is instituting a new series of articles in which the publication will try to bring to the students some close-ups of the prominent figures on campus.

Having the honor to be the first person interviewed is David Freeman Johnson, '47. Hailing from the progressive city of Meadville, Dave matriculated at Allegheny in September, 1943, after graduating from Meadville high school the previous June.

Terminating his stay at Allegheny Dave intends to continue his education and attain his Master's Degree in chemistry at Howard university in Washington, D. C. Being elected president of the Allegheny Undergraduate Council was the highlight of what Dave calls "an active and enjoyable campus life."

A major in chemistry, Dave eventually became president of the Chemii club. An active member of the German club, band, and Speakers Bureau, leaves a bundle of experiences about which he may reminisce in years to come. Aside from these activities, Dave found time to play varsity basketball and soccer, winning the latter a "Block A". His popularity in his class is evident without a doubt as he was elected vice-president and president in his sophomore and junior years respectively.

Summing up his career at Allegheny, Dave remarks, "My four years of college life have given me first hand experience in inter-racial relations which I find very good."

### Debaters To Meet Kent State Saturday

Allegheny women debaters won twelve of the sixteen debates in which they participated during the first semester and for the third consecutive year they placed first in the Ohio Women's Invitational Debate tournament.

The men did no decision debating but participated in six intercollegiate engagements with Penn State, Dickenson, Temple, and Shippensburg. They also participated in one radio debate.

Second semester promises to be a busy one for the Allegheny feudists. Their first scheduled debate is at Kent State, February 15. Delegates from nineteen colleges and universities of Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Indiana will take part. On February 27 they will travel to Greensburg to Meet St. Vincent. The third event will be the Ohio State Men's Tournament at Capital university, February 28 and March 1. Bucknell will debate here sometime in March. Ohio Wesleyan will meet the Alleghenians here March 25 and 26. The topic for debate is: "Resolved that labor should be given a direct share in the management of industry."

With Miss Susan Phelps and Mr. H. V. Cordier coaching the affirmative group and Mildred Ann Ditty and Mr. Glenn Timmons the negative group, the Allegheny debaters promise a fine bulwark against any aggressors.

Last year the A.W.S. gave \$150 to "Save the Children" Fund which is operated from New York. This money went to the support of a school in Belgium which has 56 pupils. This year the A.W.S. received letters requesting either money or clothing, and it was decided that the latter would be sent.

### Rabbi Berkowitz Will Give Chapel Talk February 19

Dr. Sidney M. Berkowitz, newly elected Rabbi of Rodef Shalom Congregation, Youngstown, Ohio, will discuss "Christianity and Judaism—What They Have in Common", at 11:00 a.m., Wednesday, February 19, in the Allegheny college chapel.

Dr. Berkowitz was born in Terre Haute, Indiana, where he received his early education. He is a graduate of the Hebrew Union college, Cincinnati, Ohio, and after his ordination was given an instructorship at the college for a year. He then was awarded the Mrs. Henry Morgenthau Fellowship which entitled him to study at Oxford and Cambridge. After finishing his work in London, he received his Ph.D. in the field of Semitics.

Shortly after his return to the States, war broke out, and he enlisted as Chaplain. He served at Lowery Field, Denver, Colorado, and then was assigned to the Pacific Theatre for about four years, and earned the rank of Major. He was in Hawaii, Saipan, Okinawa. He has traveled extensively. Following his discharge from service, he returned to his former pulpit in Mobile, Alabama. In the spring of 1946, he received a call from Congregation Rodef Shalom in Youngstown, Ohio, and assumed his duties with that congregation in August, 1946.

### Reading About Civil War Days Is Dr. R. J. Byers' Hobby

"More has been written about the Civil War than any other", Dr. Robert J. Byers told the appreciative audience at the Craig Room reading hour, Sunday.

In discussing some of the books he has read in his fascinating hobby of reading about the Civil War, Dr. Byers said, "The Civil War is a much more romantic war than the wars today. It is much easier to visualize the battles than in modern warfare."

Dr. Byers drew his material from the books, *Experiment in Rebellion*, *Lincoln's War Cabinet*, *The Story of the Confederacy*, and *The Story of Johnny Reb*.

The Craig Room reading hours were started the year after the Craig Room was opened, and, with the exception of the war years, about a half dozen programs have been presented each year.

"Reading for recreation" is the theme of the series of nine to be presented this year.

Sunday, February 16, at 3:00, Mr. John E. Cavelti will speak on "Mark Twain, American."

### H. M. S. Pinafore Will Be Presented

Gilbert and Sullivan's much-loved opera, "H.M.S. Pinafore" or "The Lass That Loved a Sailor", will be presented at the music listening hour on Sunday at 7:00 p.m. in the Oratory. The recordings were made by the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company of London, original producers of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas.

For the third year Allegheny students and faculty will work together to present the All-College Carnival, highlight of the school year, on Saturday, March 8. The Student Affairs Committee is sponsoring the festival. Charles Elliott, '47, is general chairman.

As in past years the carnival will be held in the evening in Montgomery gymnasium. This year the event may be expanded to several other buildings. Each organization may sponsor either an entertainment or a food concession.

The first attempt at this project centered around a circus theme. Last year's carnival was a Mexican fiesta. The theme for this year's event may be a Mardi Gras but this has not been definitely decided.

## Swimmers Top Grovers And Teachers

Swinging auspiciously into the opening third of a promising season, the Gator tankmen completely outclassed Grove City, 58-8, in Montgomery pool on January 14 and broke three official records to top Edinboro State Teachers, 42-24, in a meet not previously scheduled, at Edinboro on January 16.

Performing before a highly enthusiastic capacity audience, Coach Hanson's mermen easily defeated the Grove City men by capturing first place in every event, two of which fell to sprinster Virgil Sayre, who also clinched the 400-yard free style relay with the dependable support of Waldo Baker, Ken Smith, and Leroy Paul. Number two spots were likewise monopolized by the home team with the exception of the 140-yard back stroke which was won by Jack Marshall with Hill of Grove City finishing second.

Marshall, Davis and Newton teamed to win the 300-yard medley relay. Varsity Captain Ken Smith swam his usual capable race to win the 220-yard free style, while Davis and Root took exceptionally decisive victories in the 200-yard breast stroke and the 440-yard free style respectively.

Edinboro took a 5-0 lead in the first race, bettering by 2.2 seconds their pool record for the 300-yard medley race. However, the second event saw Smith and Root glean 8 points to set up a Gator lead which was augmented by Sayre's record-making performance in the 60-yard free style and maintained from that point on to be threatened only once.

This occurred when, following an Edinboro victory in the 140-yard backstroke, Schlendwein of the Red Raiders broke the Edinboro varsity record for the 200-yard breast stroke in 2:47.7. With the score at 27-23, Allegheny's powerful Jim Root entered the water. When he emerged from the pool, he had clinched the meet for the Gators, simultaneously smashing an Edinboro varsity record for the 440-yard free style by 14.5 seconds.

The Gator 400-yd. Free Style Relay team went on to establish a new Edinboro pool record of 4:07.5 for that event to let Allegheny win handily by an 18 point lead.
