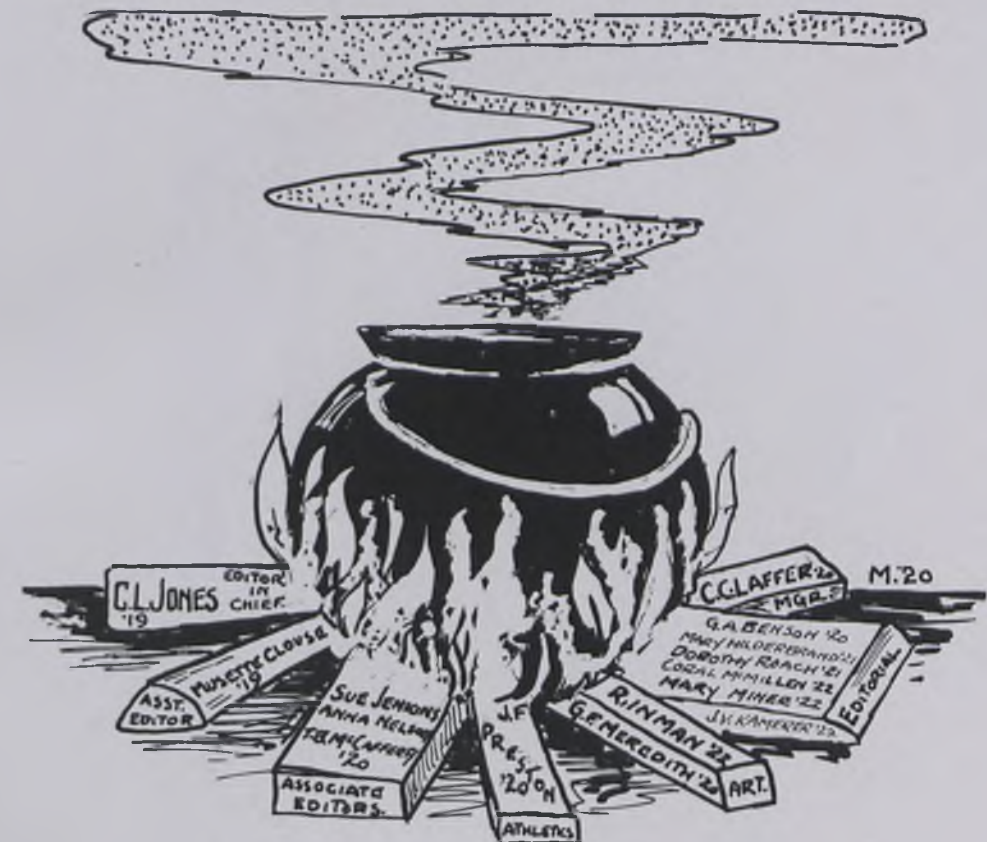
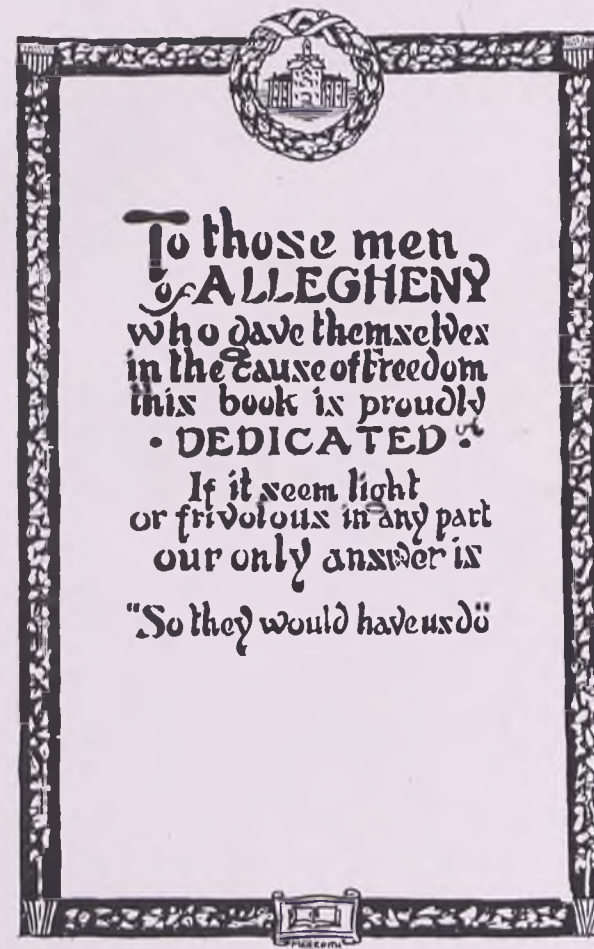

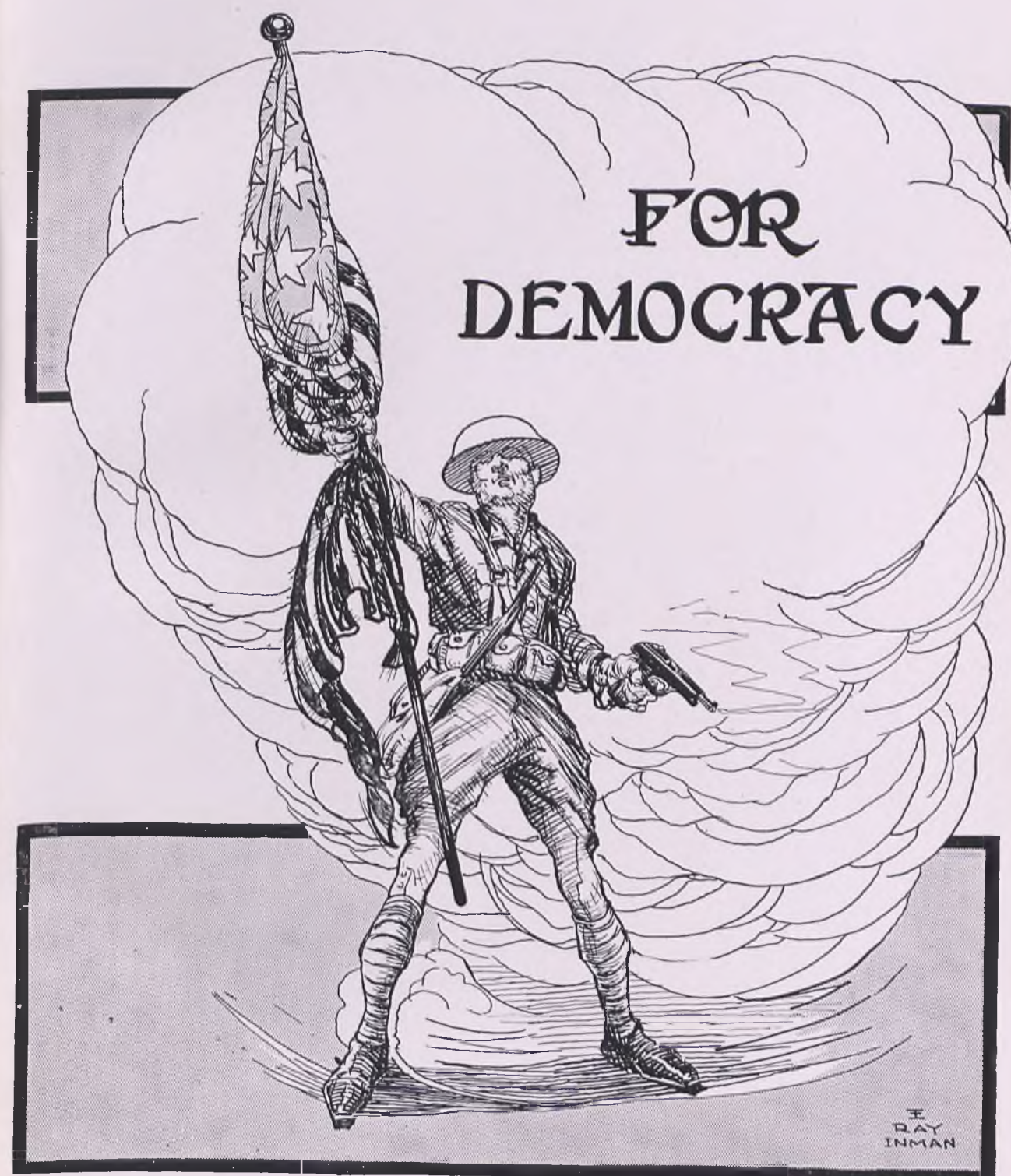

LIEUT. FRANK O. AMON, '13.

Frank O. Amon attended Allegheny from 1908 to 1913, receiving the degree of Master of Arts in 1913. He received the degree of Doctor of Science in June, 1915, and from September of that year until January, 1917, he was Assistant Professor of Chemistry at the Margaret Morrison School, Carnegie Institute, entering the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research as research chemist on the latter date. He entered the army in October, 1917, and was soon placed in charge of gas defense instruction at Camp McClellan, Anniston, Ala., with the rank of First Lieutenant. He arrived in France on July 2, 1918, and died of pneumonia, at Souilly, ten miles southwest of Verdun, on October 12, 1918. He was serving in important work in

gas defense and contracted his illness on duty in the trenches, at an observation post in the front lines, on the night before the last and biggest American drive. Just before his death he had been notified of a recommendation for a Captaincy.



LIEUT. FLOYD ARNOLD, '15.

After attending Penn State for a year, Arnold came to Allegheny in the fall of 1912. He graduated with the famous centennial class of 1915 and then returning the next year he received his Master's Degree in June, 1916. During his college career he played a stellar game at left half-back on the Allegheny foot ball team for four years. Class basket ball and the college band were additional honors which he won. He was a member of the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity.

After leaving Allegheny he spent a very successful year as athletic coach of the New Brighton High School before enlisting in the army.

After graduating from the Second Officer's Training Camp at Fort Niagara he was immediately ordered to overseas duty, being assigned to the First Division of the Regular Army as a Second Lieutenant. He was engaged in the heaviest fighting of our part of the war from January, 1918, to October when he was severely wounded by shrapnel. When about recovered from his wounds he contracted pneumonia and after two days illness died in Paris November 18, 1918.

WELLS M'DERMOTT CLOTHIER, '19.

Wells McDermott Clothier, only son of Mr. and Mrs. William George Clothier, was born at Little Falls, N. Y., on the 31st day of July, 1897.

A graduate of Painesville, Ohio, High School, he came to Allegheny in the fall of 1915. In the athletic world of the college he became deeply respected and widely known. His membership in Alpha Chi Sigma is testimony of the esteem in which his co-workers in chemistry held him. He was also a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity.

With Prather, Sheffer, and Sigendall he answered the call of duty; and death found him in the steady pursuance of his chosen service on the 18th of May, 1918, when the Oakdale Plant of Aetna Chemical Company was destroyed by explosion.

Memorial services were held in Painesville, Ohio, on Saturday, the 23rd of June.

"Cody" was one of those rare friends who seem to grow on you. Conscientious to a degree that challenged us to invoice ourselves "Cody" played a big though silent part in our college life.



CAPT. FRED CONOVER, '04.

Fred Conover, '04, was born at Wheatland, Pa., Feb. 8, 1882. He attended the public school at Warren, Ohio; entered Allegheny College in 1900; and graduated with the Class of 1904, in the Engineering Department under the late Professor W. T. Dutton. He was employed with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and later as Chief engineer for the Culbertson Construction Company, of Cleveland.

After war was declared, he made application in the Department of Engineers, and was accepted and commissioned as Captain in the Engineer Section Officers' Reserve Corps, Sept. 19, 1917. He was called into active service December 28, 1917, and reported at Camp Lee, Va., January 5, 1918. He died of pneumonia in the Base Hospital, February 8, 1918, one month and three days later. The mortal remains of Captain Fred Conover were shipped to Meadville, where a full military funeral attended the ceremony of his interment in the tomb in Greendale Cemetery. Captain Conover was married December 18, 1911, to Miss Frances Curry, of Meadville, Pa., who with their two children, Jane, aged five, and Robert, aged three, survive him.

ELMER T. CONRATH, '19.

Elmer T. Conrath, ex-'19, of Indiana, Pa., entered Allegheny in September, 1915, with the present Senior Class, but discontinued his college course at the end of his Freshman year.

Previous to his enlistment in United States service he was employed in a munitions factory at Dayton, Ohio. On December 9th he answered the call of patriotism and volunteered at Blairsville, Pa., entering Receiving Company No. 1 of the Quartermaster's Department. From Blairsville he was sent to Columbus Barracks and later to Camp Joseph E. Johnston, Florida, where he was assigned to Machinist Company No. 1. Tuesday, January 22, 1918, he was sent

to the Base Hospital and died at half past eleven the following night of spinal meningitis.

He was the first Allegheny man to die in the Service, and his name goes down in history as the first upon the college roll of the World War.



LIEUT. RALPH E. GRAHAM, '19.

Ralph Edmundsen Graham was born January 20, 1897, at Pittsburgh, Pa., where his home was up to the time of his death. A graduate of the Pittsburgh Schools, and the Central High School of Pittsburgh, he entered Carnegie Technical School in the fall of 1914. After one year at that institution he came to Allegheny, matriculating in the fall of 1915. Always popular at Allegheny, he is best remembered as the college cheer leader. In February of his senior year he received a long waited-for call to Princeton Ground School of the Air Service, Aeronautics. At the completion of his course there he spent some time in Camp Dick, and was finally assigned to Carruthers Field, Fort Worth, Texas, where he was commissioned Second Lieutenant, and temporarily retained as instructor in stunt flying. On October 14,

1918, a tail-spin with a student in control of the machine proved fatal. He was a member of the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity.

LIEUT. EVANS MCKAY, '13.

Evans McKay entered Allegheny in the fall of 1909 and completed his college course in 1913. He had a number of hours work done on his Masters degree when he became principal of Meadville High School. This position he held until his country called him to her service. Lieutenant McKay left Meadville June 22, 1917, for the Mexican border where his company, Company B, 16th Infantry, N. G. P., had preceded him on June 18th. He was left at home to do recruiting for the intervening time. He had served in the National Guard for seven years and had risen through the ranks to the position of First Lieutenant. He died of pleural pneumonia in the United States Hospital at Hot Springs, Arkansas, January 19, 1917. His body was brought to Meadville where he was given a military funeral January 23rd. Before his death he had passed the examination for a commission in the Regular Army of the United States.



GRANT S. NORTON, '19.

Grant S. Norton entered Allegheny from Sherman, New York, in September, 1915, as a member of the present Senior class. Expecting his call from the draft board he did not return to school in the fall of 1917. Corporal Norton left his home for Camp Devens as a draftee on February 27, 1918. He remained at that camp until he was sent to Camp Upton for embarkation with Company B, 308th Infantry of the 77th Division. With this division he was on the Marne salient near Vesle until at least August 17th. In the battle of the Argonne Forest he was with Major Whittlesey's famous Lost Battalion who were cut off from communication with the rest of the American forces in the night of October 2nd. The battalion remained isolated until October 8th, refusing to surrender and resisting the enemy

for five days without cessation. Grant was killed on the 7th by an exploding shell which strangely killed also his close friend from his home town, who had been with him through his entire term of service. There is no record of his burial available. He was a member of the Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity.

DON K. PRATHER, '20.

Don K. Prather, '20, had always lived in Meadville and went through High School here. He entered Allegheny during the fall of 1916 and became a popular member of the class of 1920. During the summer following his Freshman year he worked at The Aetna Chemical Company, at Oakdale, near Pittsburgh. The next fall he returned to college where he continued his studies with good results.

The following vacation, although he could have secured a better position he went back to work with The Aetna Chemical Company. This company was making munitions for the government and Prather was anxious to do his "bit". Then the explosion came on May 22, 1918, in which he lost his life. This calamity threw a gloom over the whole town of Meadville, for there were several other young men

of that city who were killed at the same time.

Don Prather as well as being a good student had made a start in college foot ball and was one of the most popular men in Delta Tau Delta, his fraternity.



PAUL K. SCHEFFER, '20.

During the summer following his Freshman year he worked at the Aetna Chemical Company with Don Prather. Returning to college with Prather for his Sophomore year, he continued his studies creditably. An excellent bass voice assured him a place on the Glee Club where he sang in the quartette and solo parts.

The Rev. Mr. Scheffer came to Meadville from Lehigh county ten years ago to be pastor of the Lutheran church. Paul, his son, went through High School. After graduating he entered Allegheny where he soon became a popular student. He elected work in the Arts Department where he acquitted himself well.

When Paul Scheffer finished his Sophomore year of college the United States was at war. Anxious to do his part, he returned to Oakdale to work in the munition plant. In the disastrous explosion there he lost his life, as did a number of other Meadville young men. He was a member of the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity.

WILLIAM SHELDON SIGENDALL, '21.

William Sheldon Sigendall, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. George Sherman Sigendall, was born at Springboro, Pa., on the 13th day of June, 1897.

He attended the grammar schools of Springboro and Meadville and was graduated from the Meadville High School. Entering Allegheny in the fall of 1917 he took an active interest in all college work, and became a member of the college Glee Club. He was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity.

Being in the Science Department of the college and majoring in Chemistry it was natural that he should seek summer work along chemical lines. Coupled with this was a desire to spend his time where he was most needed. And so the first few weeks of summer found him engaged in the making of explosives for the government at the plant of the Aetna Chemical Company in Oakdale, Pa. There while in the performance of conscientious duty he met his death on the 18th of May, 1918.

Memorial services were held in Meadville on the 30th of June.

His was the happy, cheerful life, the quiet life. Steadfastness, constancy, unswerving loyalty to friends and to ideals were developed to an unusual degree in this life. The college only had "Bill" for one year, but in that year she learned to love him for his own worth and the imprint of his character shall remain with us forever.



ELLERY JUSTIN STETSON, '11.

Born February 16, 1887, at Cambridge Springs, Pa. Killed in action, October 11, 1918, at the battle of the Argonne Forest, France. Ellery J. Stetson belonged to the class of 1911 at Allegheny College and was a member of the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity. After attending this institution for two years he went to Western Reserve University at Cleveland, Ohio, to take up the study of law. He graduated from Reserve in 1913 and took up the practice of law in his own home town, where he practiced until the fall of 1917, when he enlisted in the service of his country. He was a Lieutenant's Agent of Communication in the Headquarters Company of the 320th Infantry, 80th Division.

Mr. Stetson was well liked by all who knew him. He was a loyal Alleghenian, a genial

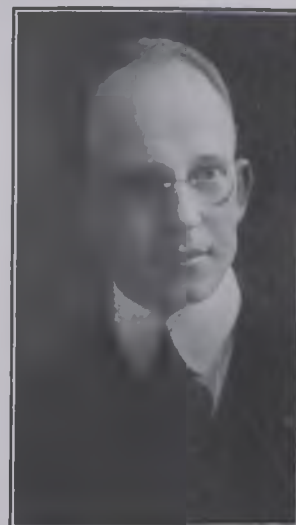

friend, and an efficient worker. Probably the best idea of his character may be derived from a clipping from a letter of a home-town boy in the same regiment, to his mother, in which he said: "Give Mrs. Stetson my sympathy. I know how terse these military communications are. I have talked with a number of men in Ellery's company and they said he surely had lots of nerve. He was wonderfully well thought of and it cannot be made too strong. He was always ready to go when called and had been through many hair-raising experiences. When his Lieutenant had something for him to do, he would say: 'Well, I guess I might as well be going.' The same shell that got him wounded his Lieutenant who was near."

He was buried where he fell in the Argonne Forest. A communication from the Bureau of Graves says he is buried in the Cemetery Commune of Brioules in the Meuse, northwest of Verdun.

BRINTON F. TROSH.



Brinton F. Trosh was born June 25, 1887, in Pittsburgh. After graduating from the Oil City High School he attended Allegheny and later graduated from the Boston School of Oratory. For two years previous to his entering the service, he was private secretary to Raymond Cross, president of the United Natural Gas Company. On May 29th, he left Oil City, with 194 selectives and was later assigned to Base Hospital No. 57. The unit sailed for France the later part of July. He speedily received his warrant of Sergeant after entering the service. In December the news of his death from lobar pneumonia was received by his mother.

"Brint" Trosh was one of the best known and best liked young men in college. Democratic in bearing, he made friends with all whom he met in all walks of life. Talented to an unusual degree and genial and happy in

disposition he was a favorite in both social and business life. With a natural histrionic talent which was further developed through study, the young man was foremost in promotion of amateur theatricals and an entertainment directed by Brinton Trosh was an assured success before presented. Sergeant Trosh was a consistent member of Trinity Methodist Episcopal Church and of the Masonic fraternity. He was a member of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity.

In presenting this, Allegheny's Service List, to you, we offer no apology for incompleteness or incorrectness. All that our individual effort can do to make it complete has been done, and it is still very far from being a complete and authentic list. It is to be hoped that you who read it will do your share to leave to Allegheny an accurate record of her sons who fought or served in the great war, by sending in to the Registrar of the college any information you can to make it more complete.

Although many of the men who are included in the list have been discharged, and some have returned to college, the address given in every case is the last known military address. This is done both because of the impossibility of keeping any accurate track of discharging, and because of the light the military addresses may throw on the military record of the men. The Allegheny Unit of the Students' Army Training Corps will be found under a separate heading.

S. A. T. C. at Allegheny

When October 1st, 1918, rolled around, Allegheny opened her doors to over three hundred men, not as the educational institution of ordinary years, but as a link in the great military system of the United States, a unit of the Student's Army Training Corps with its purpose the training of officer material. Previous preparations by the officers assigned to the Allegheny post made possible the adequate handling of the unusual number of men who reported during the first few days, and although the army equipment had not yet arrived, quarters were found for all in Cochran Hall and the fraternity houses which had been leased by the government as barracks. The nine Allegheny men who had been in training at the Plattsburgh S. A. T. C. camp during the summer were of great assistance in the organization of the post. On October 10th, inductions began, and several days later the men, with few exceptions, were regularly enlisted in the army of the United States.

Headquarters were established in the center room on the second floor of the gymnasium, with the trophy room as first sergeant's office and orderly room. At this time two companies were formed, A and B, in command of Lieutenants McKeon and McMillan respectively. Lieutenant J. Cermak was Post Commander, Lieutenant J. H. Brewer, Adjutant, and Lieutenant Pretz, Small Arms Instructor. Shortly after inductions ceased, the Plattsburgh men were promoted as acting-sergeants.

The lower floor of Cochran Hall was utilized as mess hall for the post, and pine tables and benches filled both the large and small dining rooms, while the needed kitchen facilities were added for the preparation of the large mess. A post exchange was established in the lobby, and furnished all the delicacies respective pocketbooks could buy.

The daily routine schedule was as follows: First Call, 6:00; Reveille, 6:10; Assembly, 6:15; Policing Barracks, 6:15 to 6:45; Mess, 6:45; Drill, 7:30 to 9:30; Chapel, 9:40 to 9:50; Classes, 10:00 to 12:00; Mess, 12:00; Classes, 1:00 to 4:00; Recreation or fatigue work, 4:00 to 5:00; Retreat, 5:15; Mess, 5:30; Recreation, 6:00 to 7:30; Supervised Study, 7:30 to 9:30; Call to Quarters, 9:45; Taps, 10:00.

A large level field opposite the car barn on North Main Street was used by both the companies as drill field a large portion of the time, and all battalion drill was executed there. Hikes included most of the

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surrounding country, and North Park Avenue was also used for drill purposes.

The Y. M. C. A. unit at Allegheny was under the charge of Dr. Elliott, Secretary, and F. H. Hammon, Assistant. A reading and writing room was maintained in Cochran Hall, and many "sings," and movie shows in Ford Memorial Chapel were conducted under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., serving to make more enjoyable the recreation period after evening mess.

The influenza epidemic was rather severe at the Allegheny post, but due to the strict post quarantine, and the isolation of all cases, there were no deaths and the disease was kept well within control.

The Allegheny unit boasted an excellent military band which was under the command of Lieutenant Fretz, and C. S. Spangler, acting Drum-Major.

When the Fourth Liberty Loan arrived, the post answered to the tune of \$19,000, every man subscribing; and the United War Work Fund carried away \$1,926, a fine showing.

On December 11, 1918, two days before the last men were discharged, the final battalion parade was held on Montgomery Field. The Allegheny troops were reviewed by President Crawford, and several visiting officers. The fine showing was a direct tribute to the type of men comprising the unit and the fiber of the officers in charge of the post. December 13, the last men were discharged and Allegheny's activities in the military field ceased.

Resume of the Football Season of 1918

When we consider the obstacles that confronted Coach Gilbert, due to the war conditions, we must give him great credit for the team he produced and the record they made.

With only five letter men back in school, handicapped for time to practice on account of the Student Army Training Corps Unit, and later by the wave of Spanish Influenza, the hopes of a normal football schedule and a winning team seemed well nigh hopeless and impossible. Despite all these adversities, Coach Gilbert moulded together, with the old men as a nucleus, a winning combination which made the 1918 season a creditable one for the Gold and Blue.

Difficulty was met with in arranging for games. Ordinarily the games are arranged for the season before, but on account of the uncertainty of being in school while the war lasted, no games were scheduled. However, with considerable painstaking effort, Manager Pierson patched up a schedule, but even this schedule was not followed because of several cancellations during the influenza epidemic.

The Hiram Game at Meadville, Nov. 3, 1918 Cancelled.

The game with Hiram College was scheduled to be played during the widespread epidemic of Spanish Influenza. Hiram, like Allegheny, was under military control; on account of the prevalent contagion, the Hiram team was not permitted to come to Meadville, necessitating the cancelling of the game.

The Westminster Game at Meadville, Nov. 9, 1918 Allegheny 7—Westminster 0.

The opening game of the 1918 season on Montgomery Field brought Westminster College as the attraction. The New Wilmington team furnished a spirited and exciting conflict, both sides being evenly matched. The Blue and Gold had a comparatively green team and on account of the military schedule had very little time for practice. Many new faces were seen on the team. The newly developed backfield, with Capt. Kerr and ex-Captain Baldwin as a nucleus, and the line men, worked smoothly and in unison. Their showing was all that could be asked. Baldwin succeeded in breaking away for a touch-down; the only one of the game. The resulting goal gave Allegheny a well earned 7 to 0 victory.

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The Grove City Game at Meadville, Nov. 16, 1919

Allegheny 36—Grove City 0.

Allegheny inflicted a terrible lacing upon their old time rivals and adversaries, operating on them to the extent of thirty-six points while keeping them scoreless. It was the worst defeat administered to Grove City for several years. From the time Grove City kicked off till the final whistle, it was Allegheny's game; at no time did Grove City threaten the Gold and Blue line. The team scored at will, tore the Red and White to shreds, skirted the ends, made numerous long runs in the open and broken fields, and outclassed them in all departments. The newly developed team made a wonderful showing, no little of the credit for which is due to the coach, Carl A. Gilbert, '15, a former captain of the Gold and Blue. The whole second team was substituted the third quarter and outclassed the Grove City varsity.

The Geneva Game at Beaver Falls, Nov. 23, 1918

Allegheny 9—Geneva 10.

Allegheny suffered the only defeat of the season at the hands of Geneva, losing to the Covenanters by a one point margin, 10 to 9. Allegheny had the game well in hand until the last few minutes when Geneva succeeded in scoring a field goal. The game was hotly contested throughout and the Gold and Blue, although on the short end of the score, put up a wonderful fight against their heavier opponents. The Geneva victory was well earned for they had an exceptionally good team. Earlier in the season they defeated Washington and Jefferson College, surprising the Red and Black by scoring a three to nothing victory over them.

1919 Football Prospects

Allegheny bids fair to enjoy a successful season next fall. With the return of the old letter men from the service, including our coach, Prof. C. E. Hammett, and the removal of the S. A. T. C., every forecast and indication points towards a championship team.

The team will lose but one man through graduation, ex-Captain Baldwin, the sensational halfback who has been the high scoring man on the team for the last three years; his place at halfback will be a big gap to fill. The competition for places next fall should be keen and interesting with the men from this year's squad, the old men who re-enter Allegheny, together with the possibilities of the incoming Freshman class, all out fighting for a regular berth on the Gold and Blue. It may be that some of the letter men will find themselves warming the bench at times during the coming season. With this close competition, Allegheny should have one of the strongest teams in the history of the school.

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Resume of the 1919 Basketball Season

The basket ball schedule for 1919 has run to completion, and again Allegheny finds herself enjoying the reputation and distinction of being one of the foremost exponents of this winter indoor sport in this section. Allegheny has long been recognized and widely known for the championship teams which have represented this institution, and as each succeeding year finds the caliber of the team of championship class, the sport lover finds it difficult to reconcile himself to the actual fact. Knowing the size of Allegheny and the fact that no financial inducement is offered to attract athletes to this institution, it has long been a matter of study to the sport lover how Allegheny maintains its basket ball reputation. We are not going to try to explain this problem: the fact remains; Allegheny has an enviable reputation in the basket ball world and the season just ended has strengthened its claim and title to this deserving and just honor.

A survey of the season just closed reveals the fact that we were forced to lower our colors on three occasions, but that happens to the best of teams. However, every loss was sustained on foreign floors, where there is an admitted advantage to the home team. Then, on the other hand, our victories were scored over some of the strongest teams available, teams which have almost equal prestige in the basket ball world: Geneva, West Virginia, Great Lakes, Colgate, Carnegie Tech. Every victory was clean cut and save in possibly one or two cases, the margin of the score was decisive, while the games lost were hotely contested and the victor determined only in the last few minutes of play. Thirteen games were played during the year, ten of which resulted in victories, a percentage of .769, eclipsing the record of the two past seasons, even though the opponents were of equal if not stronger caliber.

There was much conjecture as to the probable outcome of the season prior to the opening game. Three men remained from the previous year as a nucleus: Captain Volk, with three years of varsity playing to his credit; Kerr, who played opposite Volk at forward, who had served two years on the Gold and Blue, having, as in the case of Volk, made the varsity his Freshman year. Meredith, at center, was the third of this trio about whom the team was to be formed. Coach Gilbert naturally looked to the second string men of last year and to the Freshman class. The honor of filling the shoes of former Captain Bianchi and Lane fell to the Freshman and Sophomore classes. Baldwin, '21, and Kofford, '22, fitted in best and were elected to complete the quintet. Parker, '22, who broke into the lineup later in the season; Preston, '20; Russell, '21, and Parent, '22, complete the personnel of the 1919 basket ball squad.

The team to start with was handicapped by not having the services of Prof. Hammett, who has done so much to improve athletics at Allegheny, and who has been basket ball mentor for the past few years, meeting with phenomenal success. Coach Gilbert, however, assumed charge of the team, following closely Prof. Hammett's methods and style. Coach Gilbert was compelled to leave after the first few games on account of illness and so turned the work over

to Mr. Keogan, the physical instructor. Eight victories in a row were won while Coach Keogan was mentor.

ALLEGHENY, 61; Hiram, 5.

The basket ball season for 1919 opened rather auspiciously on the local floor with Hiram as the attraction. Allegheny outclassed the Ohioans in every department of the game, defeating them by the one-sided score of 61 to 5. The quality of the team was of unknown caliber and the seeming ease with which they disposed of Hiram and the splendid clock-like precision with which the plays were worked forecasted a rather successful season. Volk, Kerr, and Meredith between them scored twenty baskets, indicating that Coach Gilbert, who took charge of the team during Prof. Hammett's absence in France, had developed a powerful offensive as well as a close guarding team. Kofford and Baldwin were the new faces on the team, filling the vacancies caused through the graduation of Capt. Bianchi and "Shady" Lane.

ALLEGHENY, 25; PITT, 33.

For the second time in nine years a defeat was scored by Pitt on the Allegheny records. They turned the trick, winning 30 to 25, after forty minutes of fast basket ball playing. Allegheny had lost the larger part of the almost perfect team work and accurate passing which had characterized the Hiram game yet they gave Pitt a hard tussle for the game. Two weeks had elapsed before the Pitt game following their first contest, one of these being examination week in which little opportunity was had for practice.

ALLEGHENY, 34; CARNEGIE TECH, 22.

Allegheny's record with Carnegie Tech has yet to be stained with defeat. Never in the history of the two schools have the Plaid representatives been able to score a victory. Tech is usually met the night following the Pitt contest. Unfortunately for Tech they are made the goat regardless; if we take Pitt's scalp we always treat Tech likewise because we want to be impartial and not show undue favoritism; if we lose to Pitt we invade the Tartans with blood in our eyes looking for vengeance. And so it was the case this year for Tech had to pay the penalty by suffering a 34 to 22 defeat on their home floor.

ALLEGHENY, 35; WEST VIRGINIA, 43.

Allegheny made its first visit in ten years to Morgantown for an Intercollegiate contest with West Virginia University. The resuming of relations from the Allegheny standpoint was hardly what you might call auspicious, for Allegheny suffered her second defeat of the trip at the hands of the Mountaineers. The game was won only in the last few minutes of the game; Allegheny fighting an up-hill battle throughout, came within four points of tying, only to weaken and enable West Virginia to score a 43 to 35 victory. Volk and Kofford were again responsible for the bulk of the Allegheny scoring—Volk ran up his rec-

ord total for baskets for the year, caging eight, while Kofford's foul shooting was of equally high order.

ALLEGHENY, 32; GROVE CITY, 23.

Grove City College again yielded to the superior ability of Allegheny's basket ball team when they went down to defeat by a 32-23 score, on the local floor. The game was practically devoid of basket ball science and tactics, reverting more or less to the gridiron sport; tripping, holding, running with the ball, and body checking being the most noticeable features of the entire game. At times the losers showed some of their clever passing and smooth team work, but only in rare instances. Kerr showed some of his last year's form in this game, caging six baskets from the field. Kofford continued his consistent foul-shooting, missing but one of his tries.

ALLEGHENY, 28; GENEVA, 23.

Allegheny played perhaps its best game of the year, with the possible exception of the West Virginia game, when they defeated the champions of last year, Geneva, in a well played game by the score of 28 to 23. The outstanding feature of the game was the scarcity of Geneva field goals. One lone basket only did Geneva score; certainly this is a sufficient indication of the caliber of a team when they can hold a championship claimant to a solitary basket on their home floor. The game was always in doubt, due to the excessive calling of fouls. No less than thirty-two times was Allegheny called on technicalities, while only eighteen fouls were called on Geneva. Despite the odds, Allegheny's accurate shooting decided the contest, for against the lone Geneva basket, Allegheny scored eight times.

ALLEGHENY, 30; WEST VIRGINIA, 29.

Allegheny was at the height of its form when it played the return game with West Virginia on the Meadville floor, winning in the last ten seconds of play, 30 to 29. Allegheny won the game in a manner similar to the victory of 1918 when Kerr threw a field goal from in under his basket just before the whistle blew; the only difference this year was that Volk instead of Kerr came to the rescue at the eleventh hour. An odd feature of the fray was the closeness of the score during the whole forty-five minutes—an extra five minute period was necessary to decide the winner. At the end of the first half the score was 15 all; at the end of the second period the score was 24-24; during the five minute extra period they tied at 27-27, and then finally the one-point margin, 30-29, at the final whistle. A more exciting or a more interesting game could never be had.

ALLEGHENY, 34; GREAT LAKES, 29.

There was no more outstanding victory during the season than the defeat of the Great Lakes team on the local floor. Advance press notices gave the

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service men undisputed championship of the West by virtue of victories over the most prominent college teams of that section. Notwithstanding, our quintet were more than prepared for them, winning out by a 34 to 29 margin. It was a battle between individual stars and a well organized and smooth working combination of players. The Great Lakes aggregation was composed largely of former Conference and other Western college stars. Allegheny suffered a severe blow in losing the services of Meredith. He suffered a dislocation of the knee early in the game but refused to retire from the game until late in the second period.

ALLEGHENY, 35; COLGATE, 26.

Allegheny won its fifth victory in as many starts when Colgate was given the short end of a 35 to 26 score. Like the Great Lakes team, Colgate reached Meadville with an advance reputation, having scored victories over the teams of the New York State League, in which Colgate was holding down first place. The game started out like a runaway for Allegheny who led at half time by ten points; but the second half had scarcely gotten well under way until Colgate cut down the lead to within four points of tying. Allegheny was fortunate in having always a reserve store to call upon when in danger; Kofford was the one who came forward and in answer to the distress signal put the locals out of danger with his accurate shooting, scoring three times, in addition to seventeen fouls.

ALLEGHENY, 39; WESTMINSTER, 26.

Allegheny played its third game within a week, which like the two preceding, resulted in a victory; Westminster being defeated 39 to 26. Allegheny, scoring victories over teams which had been conceded superior, Great Lakes and Colgate, was looked upon to score an easy victory over Westminster which had met with several reverses thus far in the season. The United Presbyterians, however, threw a scare into the Allegheny camp, disputing and fighting for leadership in every minute of play. Kerr was directly responsible for the victory, coming into his own with seven baskets at opportune times.

ALLEGHENY, 29; GENEVA, 27.

Allegheny continued its winning streak, defeating Geneva's crack team 29-27 in one of the most interesting games of the year on the local floor. Allegheny, contrary to the usual style, was forced to resort to the defensive style of play because the opposing center could get the tip-off. Despite this handicap, Allegheny in several short spurts showed its superiority in floor work, bewildering her opponents in an intricate net-work of short passes which Geneva was at a loss to prevent. With Allegheny leading throughout, nevertheless the advantage was far from being comfortable, with Geneva as the opposition. Kofford was again the big point winner, leading in field goals, with four, and also ten fouls out of fourteen chances. It was the last home game for Captain Volk, who with this season, completes his fourth year as a member of the Blue and Gold five.

ALLEGHENY, 31; GROVE CITY, 19.

Allegheny won her eighth straight game when Grove City was defeated for the second time this year, on the Grove City floor by a 31 to 19 score. Although the game was loosely played throughout, there was no doubt as to who would be returned victor at the end of the contest. The style of play was much similar to the first game with Grove City, which was played in the local gymnasium, being deficient in all those finer qualities which tend to make scientific playing the outstanding feature of a basket ball game. The guarding of the team was of high class order; not a single basket was made by the Grove City forwards.

ALLEGHENY, 30; W. & J., 36.

The championship aspiration of the Gold and Blue suffered a death blow when they went down before W. & J. at Washington, 36-30. W. & J. started off with a rush, two fouls and a long shot by Garbish giving them the lead. Allegheny relied on Kofford to even matters up from the foul line, with five fouls in a row. The play was exceptionally fast, both sides resorting to much dribbling with little success at breaking through the opposing defense. Allegheny was going strong. Parker got away from his man, dribbled the length of the floor, for the first Allegheny basket—three additional fouls and a basket by Kofford doubled the score on W. & J. An Allegheny victory and the championship loomed high at this early stage. W. & J. though, had the staying qualities, the beef, 'N Everything, and in a short time evened up the score. 'Fat' Henry was the "Big Works" for W. & J. Twice he worked the ball down the floor and scored. "Fat" weighed about 240—"Snivvy" a hundred pounds less. Volk, who had been held scoreless the first period, placed Allegheny in the lead with a goal shortly after play resumed. This was the last time Allegheny was leading for a minute later Byerly scored and W. & J. was never headed thereafter. Allegheny was unable to stem the tide and allowed W. & J. to amass a commanding lead and victory.

Track Season

The Allegheny track team at the present writing have had but one opportunity for displaying their abilities in track activities, namely, the Inter-Class meet held on Montgomery Field May 3. It is to be regretted that the dual meet with Washington and Jefferson College, scheduled for the following Saturday, May 10, had to be cancelled on account of rain. W. and J. had some very excellent material and would have made the local representatives put forth their very best efforts in order to win. At the spring athletic carnival held under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, the W. and J. mile relay team took first place in the college relay race in very fast time.

The Inter-Class meet, however, brought out some very good material. Inasmuch as track activities have been dispensed with in the past three years on account of the war the bulk of the material came from the Freshman Class, as the final score of the meet testifies; the class of 1922 scored 78 points while her nearest competitor, the Sophomores, were second with 23 points. The Freshmen placed in every event showing a well balanced team. Out of a possible thirteen firsts the yearlings scored nine, in addition they secured nine seconds and seven thirds. The quarter-mile run was a tie between Chapin, '22, and Russell, '21.

One college record was broken in the meet when Welty, '21, threw the hammer a distance of 114 feet 9 inches, beating the long standing record of 114 feet 8 inches held by A. B. Hines, '10.

The whole team should prove to be a well balanced combination for they have some exceptional material in every event. Croasmun, McCreary and Dye can run the dashes in fast time; Croasmun has been timed close to ten seconds flat in the century dash. McCreary too can run a strong two twenty. Coach Keogan hopes to develop Chapin, '22' into another Frank Shea in the quarter mile. Chapin has an ideal build for a quarter miler and with conscientious training should run the 440 in about 50 seconds. Bender, Bittner and Captain Hall are the best bets in the hurdles; Deichmann in the mile and Faulkner, in the two mile.

In the field events Welty and McGowan stand out foremost in the weight events. Welty broke the college record in the hammer throw, and should improve with additional practice; in the shot put and discus throw Welty and McGowan are the most proficient.

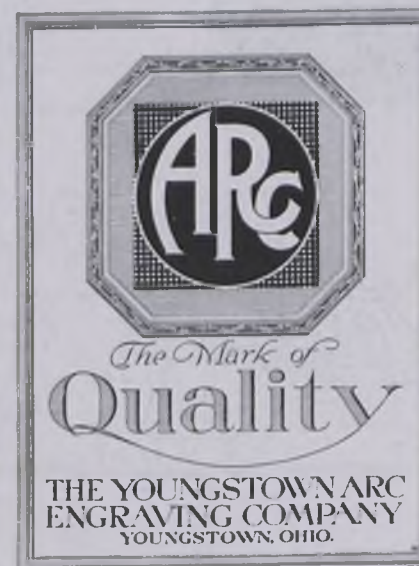

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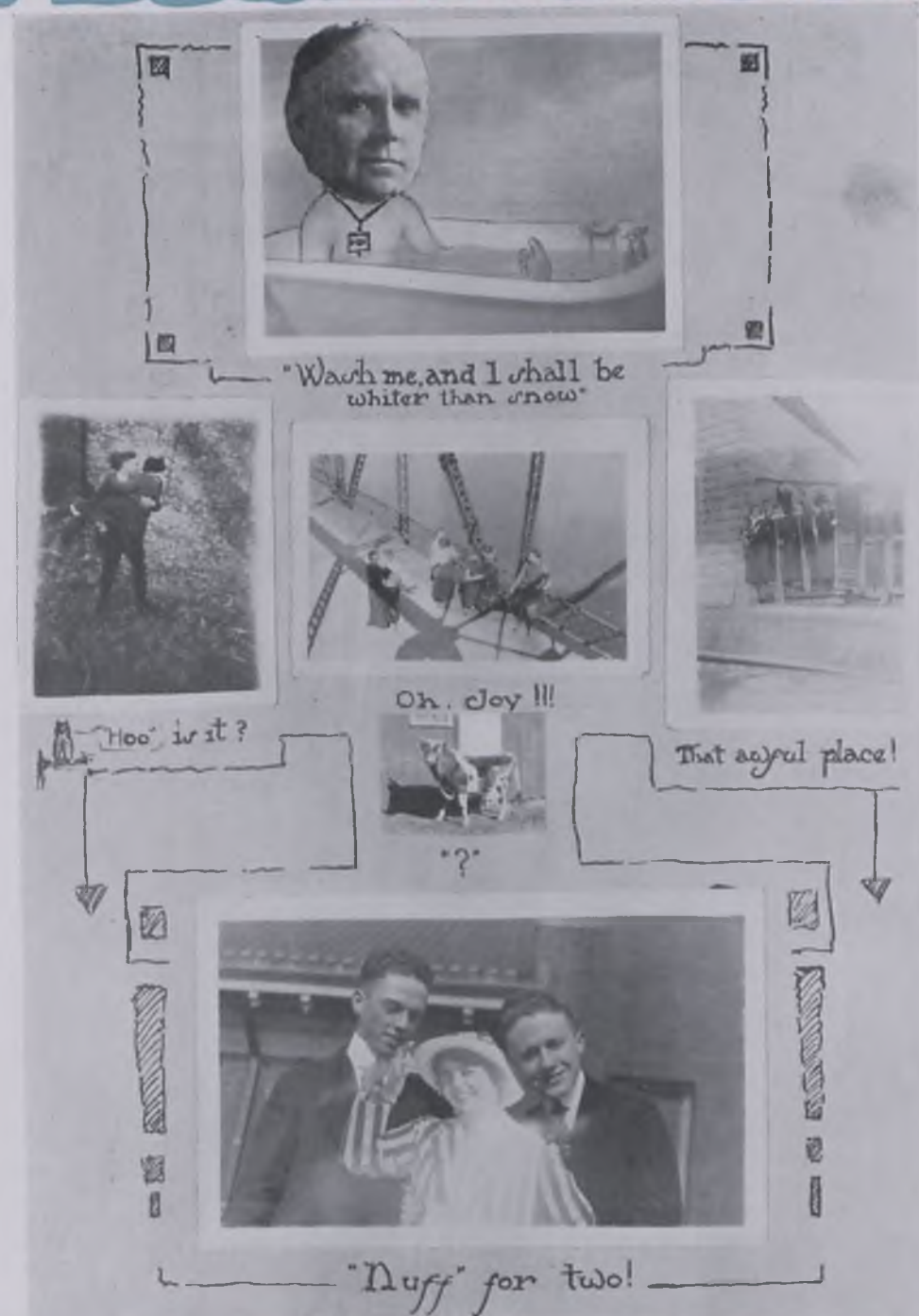
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Shades of John Bunny

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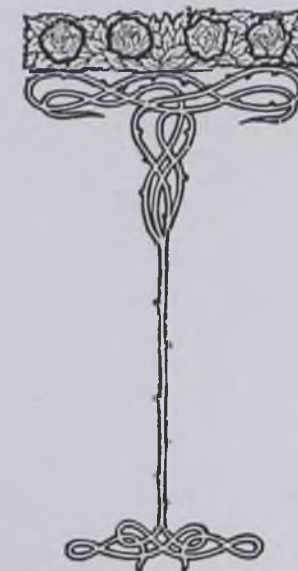

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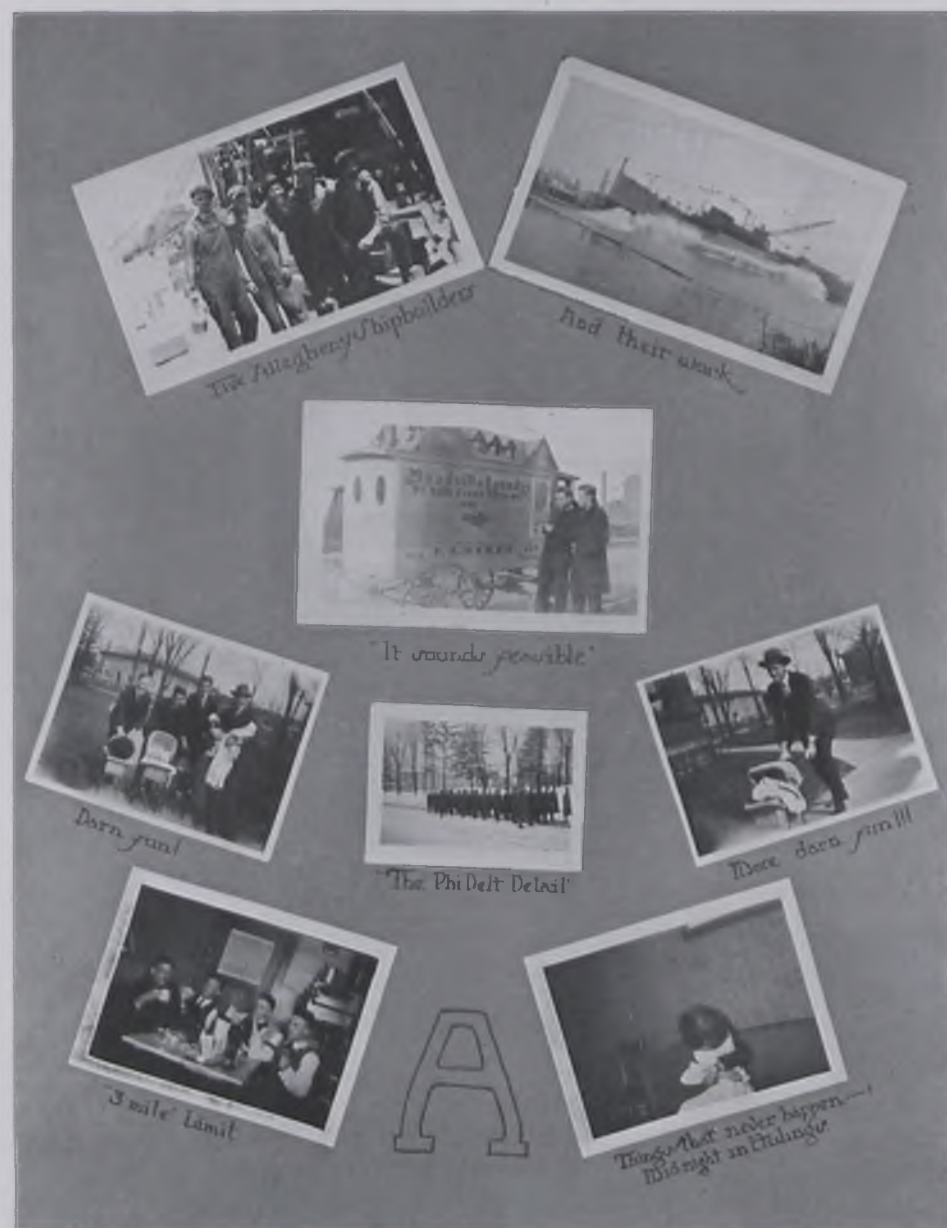
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Did You See This?
