THE SECOND GAME.

Allegheny Loses to Westminster 11-0.

Allegheny lost her second game of the season on Saturday last to Westminster by the score 11-0. It was a close and exciting game throughout and contained none of the usual unattractive features such as roughness, accidents, protests, and delays. No one was hurt on either side and except for a few bruises the men came out of the game in as good shape as when they entered.

That Allegheny lost is due solely to her weakness in defense and fumbling, for in offensive work Allegheny was never held for downs and gained ground without trouble. Once the ball was on Westminster's 10-yard line, when a fumble gave them the ball and it was soon punted out of danger. At another time a fumble of a punt enabled Westminster to secure the ball a few yards from their own goal, and it was soon carried over for a touchdown. On the other hand Westminster was held repeatedly for downs, and on several occasions they were forced to punt out of danger.

Westminster kicked off to Allegheny on her twenty-five yard line, where Pentz caught the ball and made a long run up the field, but as he stepped out of bounds on the 40-yard line it was brought back to that place and the scrimmage started. Frazier and Taylor on four tackle cross bucks gained fifteen yards, and then Wolstoncroft and Frazier plunged straight through the line for four yards apiece. Gleason tried the end for four and Wolstoncroft and Frazier again gained the required five yards. Rist ran his end for five and Douglass went through tackle for eight. Frazier added ten on a cross-tackle buck. Taylor, Frazier, Rist and Gleason each added small gains bringing the ball to Westminster's 20-yard line. A touchdown seemed certain and Rist was sent around the end seven yards. On the tackle the ball was knocked from his hands and Westminster fell on it just as the touchdown seemed certain.

Allegheny had no trouble gaining this ground; every play had resulted in the required gain and several times more than five yards had been made. But Allegheny's defense proved as weak as her opponent, for they, too, found little difficulty in gaining their required ground. Westminster's long end runs which proved so effective last year, were easily stopped and line plunges invariably resulted in a loss. Almost the only ground-gainer that could be relied upon was a short end run that hit at the tackle and turned out from the line. Edmundson, Cumming, Kuhn, Donaldson and Chambers were sent through the line time and again on this play and the ball was brought to Allegheny's 20-yard line. Here Allegheny took a firm stand and the ball was secured on downs.

On the second down, Frazier fumbled and the ball was Westminster's again. But a few yards were gained when Gleason fell on a fumble and Allegheny regained possession of the ball.

On an attempted end run Gleason

was tackled for a loss and on the next scrimmage Frazier punted out of danger. There were but a few minutes left to play, and Westminster attempted a "delayed pass," but Rist was watching for the trick and tackled Westminster for a loss of five yards. The ball was now punted to Allegheny's 20-yard line, from which place it was advanced twenty yards on tackle bucks and a short end run. Time was called with the ball in Allegheny's possession on the 40-yard line.

During the intermission both of the teams felt confident as each had shown up in fine form, and both sides claimed the game.

Frazier kicked to the 30-yard line, and by a splendid run Donaldson gained the center of the field before he was downed. On the first play a triple pass was made and the ball was sent around the end. Rist was unable to stop them and the ball was taken to the 30-yard line. It was the only end run of the game. The ball was now advanced by small gains through the line end and on the short end runs for a touchdown. Witherspoon made the first touchdown after five minutes of play and Edmundson failed for goal. Score 5-0.

Frazier kicked to the 25-yard line and but five yards were made before the man was downed. On the third scrimmage Frazier broke through the line and carried Edmundson back for a loss of seven yards. It was a great play and forced Westminster to punt. The punt was a long high one and the Westminster ends were down the field and under the ball as soon as Pentz. Pentz dropped the ball and Witherspoon fell on it.

Again Westminster started up the field with her usual gains of from three to five yards. The ball was advanced twenty-six yards before Douglass tackled back of the line for a loss of four yards and Allegheny took the ball. Frazier gained ten, Wolstoncroft and Gleason five each and the distance was almost regained. Gleason was again sent around the end but as the pass was poor he fumbled and Westminster regained possession of the ball.

By a series of short end rushes and tackle bucks the ball was slowly carried down the field. Allegheny made a strong defense but were unable to stop them and Donaldson was finally sent across the goal line for the last touchdown of the game. Edmunds kicked goal. Score 11-0.

Although a defeat for Allegheny, the boys do not feel disheartened and lay the loss of the game entirely to the fact that they have played so few games that they were unable to develop a strong defense. It is safe to say that if Allegheny maintains her strong playing form that both Geneva and Westminster will be easily defeated when they play their return games.

Coach Heckle was well pleased with the game and said he had no fault to find with any player. Individual comment is unnecessary as the men all played good ball. Pentz, our new quarter, is without doubt the best that Allegheny has ever had and almost every scrimmage found him in the bottom of it. The new ends played a clever game and both more than made good the predic-

tions the coach made concerning them. The fact that but one gain was made around them speaks for itself.

Taylor at half played a good game on offensive work and made some clever tackles on defense. Campbell at center was unusually clever for a center man, and supported the line in excellent shape. Ourguards, though both outweighed, more than held their own, and the fact that but one yard was made through them, tells plainer than anything else how they played.

Young, although he has had but little practice, played his position well and will be able to fill the position to the satisfaction of all. Frazier, Douglass and Wolstoncroft need no comment upon their work, as each is without peer in the League at his own position. No complaint was made on the official work and it will pass without criticism.

INTERCOLLEGIATE LEAGUE.

Meeting at New Wilmington.

The representatives of the Intercollegiate League of Northwestern Pennsylvania met at New Wilmington on Saturday, October 27. Mr. Elliott, of Geneva College, J. M. Griffith, of Allegheny and Prof. Barnes, of Westminster, were present. Mr. Griffith took the chair and Prof. Barnes brought in a protest against the Geneva-Westminster game at Beaver Falls on the ground that the treatment of the home team would not permit them to finish the game. It was decided that this game should stand. Then he made protest against the Geneva-Westminster game at Stoneboro Fair because he said it was understood that this was an exhibition game only. After some discussion, the vote was taken and through some misunderstanding or something which can not be accounted for, the Westminster representative did not vote in favor of the protest, and of course the game was not thrown out. So, now, the situation is that Geneva has two victories over Westminster. Geneva has also defeated Allegheny in one game. Allegheny lost the game to Westminster last Saturday. As things look now, Geneva has the championship sure and Allegheny must defeat Geneva and also Westminster in the both second games which are to be played at Meadville, in order to take second place.

The three teams in the league this season are very evenly matched and the winner of the championship will be successful because they got into condition early with the aid of their coach. Allegheny and Westminster had the misfortune of getting their

Never before in the history of education have debating and literary societies been so popular and so well kept up. In the Eastern college, debating is the center of great interest and is engaged in by all leading students.

The special attention that was shown last year in inter-collegiate debating on important current questions, is the best evidence of the view taken on this factor of college work. Intense rivalry arose and therefore the work done was of the highest grade. Similar contests are seen in oratory, essay writing and the like.

The value of this kind of work is seen more clearly, when men get out into the world and are compelled to speak in public; then it is that they determine to incite the younger generations to more effective work of the literary societies. They lend their services in the most effectual way by offering prizes for the winners of contests. We have a recent example of this in the prize generously offered by John Farson of Chicago, for the winner of the preliminary oration contest in Allegheny College.

The societies in Allegheny are old and have well-established customs which have been followed throughout their careers. Their work has been kept up to a standard which may rightly be looked upon with pride. The men of these societies are the best of Allegheny's alumni and never come back to the old college without visiting the rooms where the many friendly contests took place.

Every student should join one of these societies and get the most out of the work expended. Of course time will be required to do the best work and that is what is expected of a member, but the benefit derived will more than compensate for all.

There are three such societies, Philo-Franklin, Allegheny and Ossoli. The former two are open to men and have rooms on the third floor of Bentley Hall, Philo-Frank-

lin on the east and Allegheny on the west side of the hall. Ossoli, the ladies' society, has a room in Hulings Hall. Allegheny and Ossoli meet on Monday evening and Philo on Friday evening.

These societies are anxious to build up larger memberships and will be glad to receive the new students to their meetings. Come and see the work that is being done.

There is a feeling in Allegheny which should be overcome. It is noticed in several branches of work but more particularly in Athletics. Reference is here made to the idea, which many have, that, if a person cannot get a place on the varsity team he will not stay in practice. How often the remark has been overheard "What's the use of practicing if I can't make the team."

No man ever gained anything without work and this is no exception. It is the same with the team itself. Men are wanted to give the first team work. If a player shows by his work that he can hold a position, he will be considered and given a chance.

The team has been very materially changed since the Geneva game and changes will continue to be made as long as there is an opportunity for making it better. What makes the team better is practice and this must be given by a second team. But where is our second team? At the beginning of the season there were enough for three teams; Now, it is difficult to scrape together enough men to have a practice game. It is shameful that more direct and active interest is not taken. Men are giving up because they must play on the "scrub." Ambition is all right but perseverance must accompany it. Men, where is your nerve? Are you going to see our team defeated because you have not the backbone to stand your place, whether it be on first or second team? Undoubtedly the men, who are quitting, did not stop to think a second time; at least we hope so. The man who does his duty as a "scrub," will get his share of glory as well as the man who makes the touchdown. But look at those who lack that quality of perseverance and give up, they are the same in everything. Respect and glory always goes with the man who does his duty. Then see to it that you, yourself, be on the foot-ball field ready to buck through the "varsity."

The Glee Club.

The Glee Club, assisted by Miss Spaulding, will give two concerts within two or three weeks, at Cambridge Springs and Erie. It is unusual for a college club to attempt an important public appearance before Thanksgiving, but the fine nucleus left from the old club and the faithful work of candidates for full membership justify Manager Hatch in making these dates.

Not a little good musical material especially among the bass voices of the college, remains unutilized for glee club purposes; but it is thought best to make a well-balanced chorus of twelve voices only for the present. Hammon's sweet and powerful tenor is missed, although Culbertson still has good help. The three lower parts are finely made up and are probably better balanced than ever before. There can be no "new members" until after ten weeks of rehearsing, but several candidates for membership (starred in the list) are singing regularly with the club. The chorus is made up as follows:

First tenor, Culbertson (leader); *Lowthian, *Cutler; second tenor, May, Barkley, Burton; first bass, Harris, Walraven, *Craig; second bass, Howard, *Rickard, *Beveridge.

There are 54 women in college as against 70 last Fall. There are 117 men in college as against 114 last Fall.

It will be noted that the classical course is still chosen by the largest number, while the Latin and Modern Language has taken quite a fall. Civil engineers have more than doubled. The specials show the most marked increase. Another surprise is the decrease in the number of women in college.

With a few arrivals, still expected, the attendance will be almost identically the same as one year ago.

The University of Chicago has an endowment of \$11,000,000 since the \$4,000,000 recently secured by President Harper.

The Northwestern University Medical School will no longer be open to women. This is in accordance with a ruling of the faculty at a meeting held during the latter part of the last school year.

THE STORY OF LUTHER.

A Beautiful Entertainment at the Academy.

The "Story of the Reformation," an alternate living impersonation and stereopticon view of the most important incidents in the life of Martin Luther, was presented by home talent at the Academy of Music, Thursday and Friday evenings. The entertainment, which is of a deeply religious character and rich in instructive merit, was given under the auspices of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, with Mrs. H. E. Monroe, who arranged the entertainment, as the lecturer.

Over 100 persons, representatives of the different churches, among whom were a number of college students, took part in the production. The costumes were representative of the 16th century.

Some of the most important events in the life of the great reformer were shown in the living impersonations, notably the scene from the monastery at Erfurt and Luther's trial at the Diet of Worms. There were numerous other striking scenes, each serving to bring into more comprehensive and forceful view the stereopticon pictures, with the very intelligent lecture by Mrs. Monroe, make a complete and interesting story of the life work of that great religious reformer, Luther.

The solos and choruses were all sweet and musical. The dialogue was beyond criticism and in all its features the entertainment was of a very high order.

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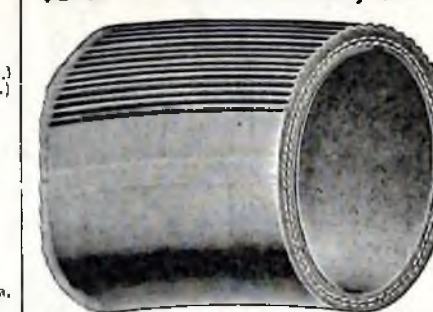
