Dear Miss Tarbell:

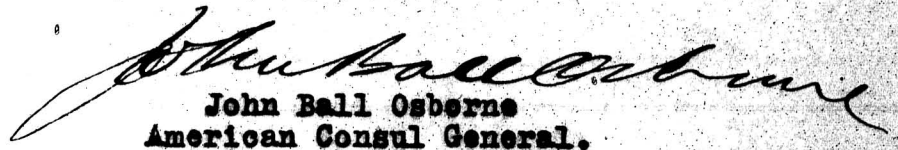
I am in receipt of your letter from Turin under date of the 5th instant, and hasten to inform you that the wage scale in the shipyards of Genoa and vicinity averages 50 lire per day of eight hours, with wages of 10 lire per hour for overtime. The wage scale in the Porto Franco is 45 lire per day. Since the personnel of the Caravana are entitled to a pension, their wages are slightly lower than outside.

It was a great pleasure to me and the members of my family to meet you, and we trust you will return to Genoa and that we will have the privilege of seeing you again.

If I can be of any possible assistance to you do not hesitate to command me.
