ALLEGHENY WON FIRST GAME.

Defeated Kiskiminetas in a Clean Contest.

ALLEGHENY 12 "KISKI" 6.

Mitinger Pitched Good Ball—New Men Showed Up Well—Comfort's Home Run and Wynne's Work at Second Were Features.

Allegheny opened the collegiate base ball season on Thursday afternoon by defeating Kiskiminetas. The score at the close of the ninth inning was 12 to 6.

Allegheny went into the game with little hope of winning. The poor showing made against the Taylor Hose team and the reputation that preceded the visiting team dispelled all hope of opening the season with a victory.

To further dampen the order of the rosters, many of the men did not show up very favorably in the preliminary practice. On account of the poor grounds and bad weather which interfered with the practice, several of the players had not rounded into their best form. Notwithstanding these unfortunate conditions Allegheny put up a nice article of base ball. They made a few costly errors but the lead which they maintained over the visitors throughout the game made these less conspicuous. The fielding at times was clean and snappy, all that could be asked of the team at its best.

In batting the locals had some trouble in connecting with McCreight's curves. With the exception of Comfort's long drive for a home run, only two hits were scored against him during the seven innings that he pitched. McCreight was removed on account of illness. In the eighth Allegheny struck a batting streak and with the aid of a base on balls piled up three runs. While McCreight kept the locals from hitting his delivery, he gave Allegheny a great lead through his wildness. No fewer than eight men reached first by being hit by pitched balls. This wildness during the first and second innings lost the game for the visitors.

Although a trifle wild Mitinger pitched a very pretty game. Four of the visitors reached first on hits and only two of these were bunched.

Y. W. C. A. SUMMER CONFERENCE RALLY.

A Number of Talks to Arouse Interest in the Conference.

The Y. W. C. A. held its annual Summer Conference Rally on Sunday afternoon at 3:30. Besides the special speakers, Miss Bushnell and Miss Stolzenbach sang solos.

Miss Foster, president of the Y. W. C. A., spoke of the purpose of the rally; purpose, power, principal and personality being the watch words. She said the rallies bring the girls in contact and sympathy with the conference work, and that those who do not have the privilege of going can gain inspiration from those who have been to the conference.

Miss Rowley gave her experience as a delegate to a Summer Conference. She said there is inspiration and stimulus derived from so many young people meeting together under the best teachers of the country. Our own Y. W. C. A. has shown the result of suggestions put forth at these conventions.

Miss Cozins, one of the delegates to Silver Bay, read a paper, a description of the beauties of the scenery, sunrise, and bird songs in the Adirondacks in June. The scenery was an inspiration to the conference and the motto was, "Worship the Lord without distraction."

Miss Thomas gave a description of Lake George and said that the surroundings at Silver Bay had much to do with the spiritual benefits derived from the conference. In more than one sense we were on the mountain top—it was almost a mount of transfiguration. We were a body of six hundred twenty-five girls assembled apart from the world and our motto for the convention was, "To know Christ." We had the benefits of talks with the leaders and with the other girls. The conference aimed to make or help make the lives of the girls and those they come in contact with strong and true. Each girl left the others with a high resolve to make life better and her life work more earnest.

As the coming Summer Conference is to be held at Lakeside, Mr. Morrison, being a Y. M. C. A. delegate to Lakeside last year, was asked to tell of his experience there. After a brief description of the places of interest in and about Lakeside, he said, the question often arises, "Do the returns from the summer conference justify the expenditure?" In answer to this, he said, "Even to the busiest person the value is too great to be estimated in time or in dollars and cents. In some of the meetings the different fields for work were pointed out and the opportunities given to young men. The need of workers in the slums of

MR. CARNEGIE'S LATEST BENEVOLENCE

Announced by Prest. Crawford in Ford Chapel Friday.

PROVIDES FOR WORTHY MEN

Mr. Carnegie Honored Our College By Naming President Crawford as One of the Trustees of This Vast Fund.

On Friday morning at the regular chapel service Dr. Crawford announced that all the morning papers of the country were publishing the conditions of Mr. Carnegie's latest and most unique benevolence—that of establishing a fund of ten millions to retire teachers in colleges and universities. This gift which was announced offi-

cially by Frank A. Vanderlip, of New York, is to provide annuities for college professors who are not able to continue in active service. It is Mr. Carnegie's belief that this fund will not only provide a dignified pension system for a body of most worthy, self sacrificing and poorly paid men, but that it will be of distinct value to the cause of education in offering an opportunity to the trustees of a college to retire members of the faculty who have faithfully served the institution for many years, and to replace such men with young, vigorous and efficient professors.

The fund consists of \$10,000,000 in 5 per cent. first mortgage bonds of the United States Steel Corporation, and is entrusted to the hands of a board of trustees consisting, in the main, of the presidents of the most important colleges in the United States and Canada.

These trustees, having full power to manage the trust in every respect, are elected to hold office for five years. Mr. Carnegie in closing his letter to

the trustees says: I hope this fund may do much for the cause of higher education and to remove a source of deep and constant anxiety to the poorest paid and yet one of the highest of all professions.

Political Mixup Settled.

Base Ball Managership Decided by Special Election—Rose M. Stuntz Declared Elected to Managership of Basket Ball by the Athletic Board.

Allegheny's political chaos has finally given way to peace and order. The managership and assistant managership of base ball were thrown open to a student election, in accordance with the petition of the fraternity party. The election was held Wednesday and A. W. Comfort, the fraternity candidate, and N. C. Phillips, the non-fraternity candidate, were elected.

The mixup over basket ball manager was settled by the athletic board declaring three votes illegal, which resulted in the election of Mr. Stuntz as manager, W. R. Gill as assistant and R. F. McKinney as secretary and treasurer of the athletic association.

Now that the weather is warm enough, why shouldn't the college sing be revived in the form of student mass-meetings on the Campus? Such meetings, held in the open air, with the added inspiration of our beautiful campus, would certainly be enjoyable affairs. Those who remember the sings of last fall will surely welcome their revival, and we need them to keep up our college enthusiasm and to encourage rooting at the base ball games.

Another distinguished honor has come to our college through its president. In choosing Dr. Crawford to act as one of the trustees of the fund to be used in pensioning old and deserving professors, Mr. Carnegie has set his stamp of approval upon President Crawford and upon the way in which he is administering the affairs of Allegheny College.

The Campus in a previous issue gave some account of the careful and searching inquiry which Mr. Carnegie made into the affairs of the college. President Crawford was weighed in the balance and not found wanting, and now Mr. Carnegie has chosen him to be one of the body of distinguished educators and men of affairs who are to have almost unlimited control of this vast sum of money.

Defeat is honorable; discouragement is fatal. Unexpected and unwarranted misfortune proves at times inevitable, but the fickle faint-hearted who bows suppliant to this misfortune shows pitiable unmanliness. These dogmas hold true in college athletics.

Some few days ago we sent out from our campus a team of athletes to represent us in an inter-collegiate meet. These athletes were experienced, well-trained, and well-conditioned. We were confident of their success. But, contrary to all expectation, a complexity of ill-fortune proved too much for

them. In technical terms, they were outclassed. Recently another team of athletes, representing us on another field of sport, crossed weapons with old-time rivals. And again the blue and gold fell victims to defeat.

But to the wise and far-seeing men of the college these twin defeats will come, not as food for despicable criticism, but as stimuli to redoubled effort. As the giant Atlanta, every time he was downed, sprang up ten times stronger than before, so should we, multiplying our energies, enter with fresh vigor into the contests still before us.

Discouragement, we say, is fatal.

Statement of President Crawford Concerning Mr. Carnegie's Gift.

I consider Mr. Carnegie's gift the most notable and important benefaction for higher education in modern times. In originality and uniqueness it equals the great bequest of Cecil Rhodes, and in disinterested generosity surpasses it. It gives a new dignity to the teaching professors in the United States. There is not a college or university professor in the land who will not enter upon his work with new enthusiasm and devotion because of the announcement of what Mr. Carnegie has done. It is not too much to say that this gift will set a new standard for the world.

"Honor Test" to be Applied.

An "honor test" is being applied at the University of Chicago. Professor Tufts, dean of the Senior College, recently submitted a series of questions to his class in ethics to assist him in forming an idea of the moral standards of the student-body of the University. The answers will be used by the faculty in determining whether the "Honor System" shall be adopted at the Midway institution.

The questions submitted by Professor Tufts are as follows:

Is it wrong to tell a credulous girl harmless but untrue stories? Why?

Would you purposely avoid, in class or in examination, a girl who you thought would cheat, in order not to have to report her?

If the conductor neglected to take your fare would you keep the money?

Would you tell your teacher beforehand that your lesson was not prepared or run the risk of being called on? If only partly prepared would you "bluff" if called on?

Would you take another's plot in developing a supposedly original story?

Would you exaggerate to add interest to conversation or tell "white lies" to save people's feelings?

Is it honorable to use a "pony," that is, an interlinear translation, in preparing a lesson?

If you accidentally saw on your neighbor's examination paper one point which would enable you to solve a whole problem, would you use it?

Would you allow a person to have an ungrounded good opinion of you?

Which is less dishonorable, to cheat openly or secretly?—Ex.

Student Mass Meeting.

Tuesday morning President Crawford asked all the students to remain in chapel to hear of a subject in which they were all interested. Mr. Morrisson, president of the Oratorical Association, took charge of the meeting and called upon Prof. Ross to lay the subject before the students.

Prof. Ross, in a very happy manner, urged that every student lend his support to help win the debate with W. & J., saying in part: "We want to win this debate. The debaters, no matter how good they are, can't do it unless they have the sympathetic support of every member of the college community."

"When a team fights on its own ground it may expect sympathy and next Friday night the members of our team may expect to look into the face of every Allegheny student as his friend. No excuse for absence on that occasion can be accepted. The debaters are fighting not for their own glory but for the glory of Allegheny, and students who will take any of the glory of victory and who have not had common decency enough to help by their presence to win that victory, ought to be hounded out of college."

Mr. Morrisson brought the meeting to a close by giving every student an opportunity to subscribe for a ticket to the debate.

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ALLEGHENY WON FOURTH PLACE.

Relay Team Finished Within
Five Feet of Leader.

OUR BOYS RAN A GOOD RACE

Captain Clark Showed Up Splendidly in Face of Odds and Almost Won His Race—Trainer Lewis Satisfied With the Team's Showing.

Allegheny's relay team, accompanied by Physical Director C. B. Lewis, returned Monday from the inter-collegiate meet at Philadelphia. Both the members of the team and Coach Lewis were in high spirits and asserted that although they did not win first place, yet they are proud of their work. The race was an exciting one and the superb work of Allegheny's men, racing under disadvantages, won the applause of the thousands of spectators and elicited many compliments for both team and trainer. Allegheny's men were Paul Mitchell, Ginn, Giesey, and G. R. Clark. They were in the best of condition and made a fine showing. The trip was a pleasant one, the team having excellent care and were shown about Philadelphia by friends of Allegheny. Practice races were held in Corry and at the University of Pennsylvania.

At 4:35 Saturday afternoon eight colleges toed the mark for the first college relay race. It was a very careless start. At least three or four of the men were off their marks before the pistol was fired. In the start-off the third man from inside cut in ahead of Mitchell and took the pole. This was plainly a foul, as it interfered with Mitchell's stride. Then a second man ran just outside of Mitchell, which pocketed him; but on the last turn Mitchell reached and passed the second man and made a strong effort to win his relay, finishing about 12 yards behind first man and five yards ahead of third man. Ginn took up the race, holding the distance between himself and first man. On the home stretch the third man passed Ginn, who finished about 12 yards behind first man and five yards behind second man. Giesey, who had the third lap, made a desperate effort to overtake the two men ahead of him. He gained slowly up to the finish, leaving Clark on the start about seven yards behind first man and five yards behind second man. Clark made an excellent effort in the last heat. He ran nearly even with the first two men on the last turn, and when within about 50 yards of the finish the first two men pocketed him. He made an effort to pass outside the two men, when one of his opponents, in swinging his arms, struck Clark in the left chest. His energy gave out, although he made every effort to keep on his feet. The first and second man had crossed the line when Clark was within two yards of the finish. The third also pushed himself forward, passing the tape about one-half yard ahead of Clark, giving Allegheny fourth place.

The event was won by St. John's College, Fordham; second, Western Maryland College; third St. John's College, Annapolis; fourth, Allegheny College; fifth, Delaware College; sixth, Maryland Agricultural College; seventh, Franklin and Marshall College; eighth, Muhlenburg College. Time, three minutes and forty seconds. Allegheny's time, about 3:41. Clark finished about five yards behind first man.

Allegheny will enter a track meet at New Wilmington on May 14, with Westminster and Geneva.

Allegheny made enough runs to win almost any game, but through her misplays and inability to keep Westminster's runs. With the exception of the sixth and eighth innings Allegheny was rather weak at bat. Outside of these two innings there were but two hits made and ten men struck out.

While the work of the home team was not of the best, there were a number of noteworthy plays. Fink made a fine running catch of a foul fly back of the player's bench, getting the ball with one hand. Comfort raised the enthusiasm of the crowd by stealing home at a critical moment. He also made a neat catch of a foul fly, running into the crowd back of first for it.

In future the women of Chicago University who take first place in any athletic meet or make a place on any first team will be awarded pins having the letter "C" engraved thereon.—Ex.

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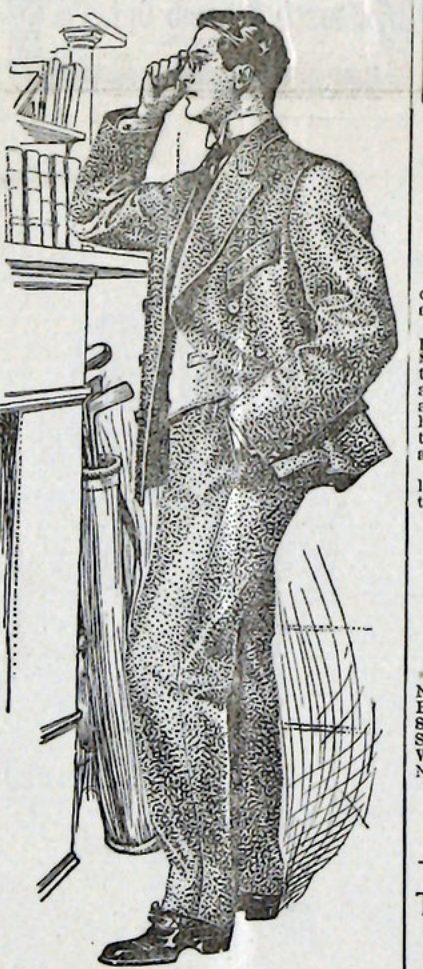

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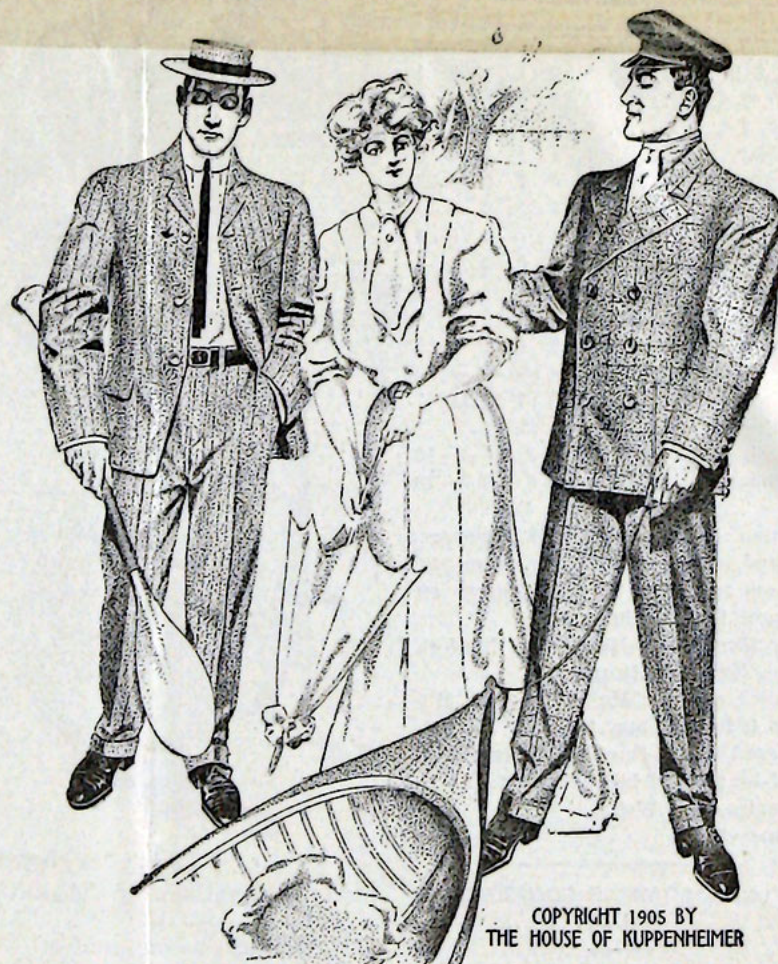
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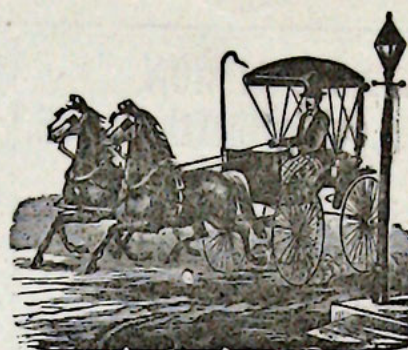
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
