Trustees Appoint Dr. Allen B. Edwards College Treasurer, Business Manager; Five Faculty Promotions Also Listed

Dr. Allen B. Edwards, a member of the Allegheny College economics faculty since 1944, has been named Treasurer and Business Manager of the college and promoted to full professor of economics by action of the Board of Trustees, President Louis T. Benezet announced Sunday.

Dr. Edwards will assume the post vacated by the resignation of Dr. Louis J. Long, Allegheny treasurer since 1941, who will become president of Wells College, Aurora, New York, July 1.

May Day Festivities Coronation Ceremony Scheduled May 11, 13

The annual May Day Coronation ceremony and the conjunctive May Day Week-End program, sponsored by the Women's Athletic Association, will be held this year May 11 through May 13, according to general chairman Phyllis Moat.

Elected earlier in the year and reigning over the week-ends' activities are May Queen Virgie Lou Oehmler, her Maid of Honor, Patricia Griffiths, and the May Court, composed of Jo Anderson, Ellie Miller, Julie Phythyon and Jean Vines, and Charm Queens Dee Cunningham, Suzie Reid, and Gerry MacGregor. Virginia Kraft and Patricia Patton will be flower girls and Joel Benezet will be crownbearer.

The coronation ceremony will take place Saturday at 2:30 on Bentley Green and will be followed by the Parade of Class Floats to start from Brooks at 3:45. A formal banquet, beginning at 6:00 p.m., will be held in Brooks Dining Hall; the formal May Day Dance will be held from 9:00 to 12:00 in Brooks.

The Saturday session of the trustees in the annual spring meeting was also marked by the creation of the administrative post of Executive Secretary of the College which will be filled by John R. McFarland, Jr., alumni secretary since 1946. Assuming this position July 1, Mr. McFarland will be responsible for the coordination of the various public relations policies of the college with special regard to long-range college support. He will also direct the annual Living Endowment Fund.

Five faculty promotions, in addition to that of Dr. Edwards, were approved by the Board. Dr. Paul B. Cares, associate professor of history since 1946 and a member of the faculty since 1933, was named professor of history; Dr. Herbert Neurath, assistant professor of music was named associate professor; and Joseph F. Devlin, Dr. Lewis N. Pino, and Dr. Taffee T. Tanimoto, instructors in the history, chemistry, and mathematics departments re-

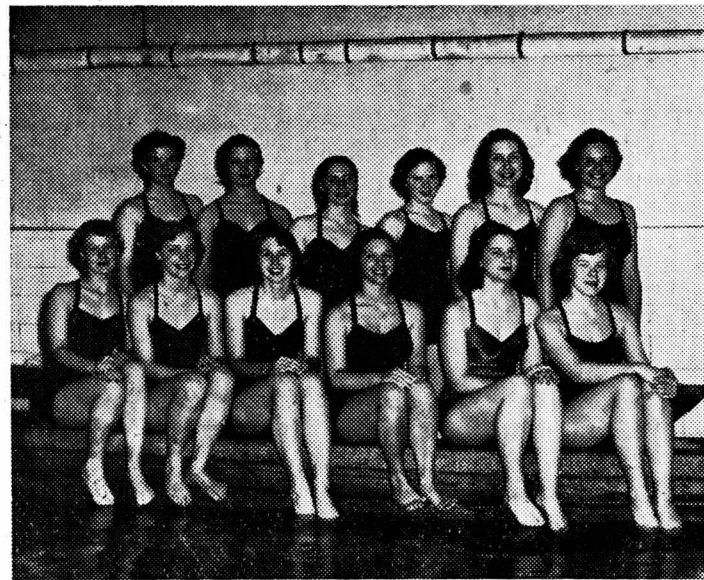

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And Then, Higher Standards

Students, faculty and alumni all admit readily that year by year **The Kaldron**, **The Literary Magazine**, and **The Campus** contribute to a tangible record of student achievement. Year by year all three student publications are carefully filed away in the stacks of Reis Library as a part of such a record.

Yet each year one or two, and too often all three publications, are expected to eke out their copy on hampering, insufficient budgets. The chief difficulty is not that the necessary publication costs are never provided. For eventually they are. But only eventually! The trouble is that the initial budget allotments from the A.U.C. are frequently just too tiny. The Editors find themselves forced to plan their particular publications along the lines of budgets that are not final. They must plan scrimpingly, always hoping that close to year's end the additional cost allotments will come, and without knowing just how large those allotments will be. Last minute preparation of copy to fill out new space made possible by the allotment seldom provides the best reading. **The Literary Magazine** found itself hardest hit by this difficulty this year.

Now, when the College is eager to make a fine showing of itself, it is plausible to say that **The Kaldron**, **The Literary Magazine**, and **The Campus**, student publications going out into the hands of alumni and friends of Allegheny, should be kept up to the highest possible literary standards. For their readers they do help indicate the level of student accomplishment at Allegheny.

We believe that with the appearance of **The Kaldron** and **The Literary Magazine** later this spring, the three sister publications will have reached their highest standards since the war years. Already **The Campus** has gained a First Class rating from the Associated Collegiate Press.

The standards are high. We insist that they be kept high.

There is another, perhaps more democratic argument for adequate publication budgets. It is that students are showing markedly increased interest in writing. For example, whereas this semester there are only 14 members enrolled in one of the writing classes, English 3, the Registrar's Office reports that next semester's enrollment in that course will jump to 56. A fourfold increase! It is reasonable to assume higher standards in the three sister publications will attract an increasing number of students towards creative and expository writing. And as more and more student talents uncover themselves, the standards are likely to go higher yet. A pleasant spiral!

This year **The Campus** was given an initial budget of \$2,688. Quite a figure it may seem to some readers. Yet consider that this sum met only approximately one half of publication costs, the remaining portion coming in from advertisers. Consider too that this initial budget was exhausted by March 15th. Without an additional \$450 allotment from the A.U.C. publication of the newspaper would have been suspended at that date. Next year **The Campus** will ask for \$3,200.

This year, due to a new photographic arrangement, **The Kaldron** was able to stay within its budget. **The Literary Magazine** was not so fortunate. Granted a budget of \$1,000 last fall, Editor Brook Taylor found herself at her printing deadline with a lot of good copy and a budget too small to allow printing much of it. It was only this week that A.U.C. hinted it might give her an additional allotment. Brook has asked that next year's budget be set at \$1,200.

The argument against adequate budgets is a weak one. It says in the main there is little point in assigning to each publication a budget that may prove too large. The problem then is supposed to be one of apportioning the extra funds.

But there seldom are "extra" funds. Publication costs are just too high, and the budgets are seldom that large. If the initial budgets should happen to be overadequate, the problem is actually no more than the familiar one of pooling the excess in the A.U.C. treasury, and using it to help out other campus organizations unable to meet their budgets.

If the Editors of **The Kaldron**, **The Literary Magazine** and **The Campus** can know from the start what they will have to work with, their planning may well be sounder, and the standards of their publications higher.

spectively, were promoted to assistant professors.

In proposing the appointment of Dr. Edwards to the treasurer's position, Dr. Benezet told the trustees, "We have combed the field for promising candidates and fortunately found many who seemed well qualified. After we had brought two of the best-qualified candidates to the campus there was common agreement that we could not do better than to choose our own Professor of Economics, Dr. Allen B. Edwards."

Dr. Benezet went on to cite the qualifications of Dr. Edwards, saying, "He came to Allegheny from a successful tour of duty in several southern institutions where, in addition to teaching economics, he had practical experience in business management. His A.B. is from Centre College; A.M., Duke; and Ph.D., The University of Virginia. As our students will attest, he has been an eminently successful teacher of economics. His community activities have included membership on the Rent Control Board; frequent work on arbitration committees; contribution to campus Institutes including the National Association of Foremen's Institutes; and numerous other town educational activities. On our staff he has served on the Committee on Instruction, the Student Aid Committee, the Dean's Committee and others. I am completely satisfied as to his intelligence, initiative, practical judgment, and character. I am, moreover, greatly pleased that one of our own faculty so well qualifies for the position."

The Board of Trustees, after viewing plans and elevations for the new classroom building, authorized the architect to make working drawings in preparation for contractors' bids. The hope was expressed that actual construction of the building could begin in the late fall.

The classroom building, to be known as Quigley Hall under the terms of the bequest by the late Mrs. Adelaide Gibson of Conneaut Lake, will be situated along the north line of the college property approximately two hundred feet up the hill from Arter Hall.

The trustees also authorized the making of architectural studies of the fieldhouse-auditorium. If funds from the campaign are sufficient and materials can be made available it is hoped that the fieldhouse may likewise be started this year.

Following the afternoon business session, the trustees and their wives were guests at a tea in the Green Room of Brooks Hall. Robert S. Bates, Mrs. Leo McKay and Mrs. Benezet were co-hostesses. Mrs. Sumner Nichols and Mrs. Paul W. Johnston poured.

Crawford County Portion Of College Fund Drive Opens Monday, April 30

Dr. Louis T. Benezet was keynote speaker at the kickoff dinner held in Kingsley Hall Monday night, launching the Crawford County portion of the Allegheny College Development Program.

Nearly one-third of the \$300,000 goal has been reached, it was announced at the dinner. Seventy-four subscribers have pledged \$81,669, and the 300 campaigners, most of whom are college alumni, are continuing their work.

Crawford County's share in the Drive will be used for the gaint field house to be added to Montgomery Gymnasium, which will provide seating capacity for 2,000 to 3,000 persons.

In answering the question "Why should I give to Allegheny?", Dr. Benezet said, "There just isn't anything more important to anybody in the city than to have this development program succeed. We are not the only industry in Meadville and we are not the most important industry. But we are the stablest industry this town ever had or ever will have. Tradition you cannot buy. Tradition you can only build. The tradition of 136 years you cannot buy at any cost."

Robert S. Bates, '31, general campaign chairman, presided at the dinner. "The college needs of eight new buildings costing three or four million dollars have been trimmed to the minnum needs of three buildings," he said. "The field house can be built only if our campaign succeeds," he added.

John R. McFarland, newly-appointed college executive secretary, gave instructions to workers, while Herb Richman, professional campaign organizer, operated instructional slides.

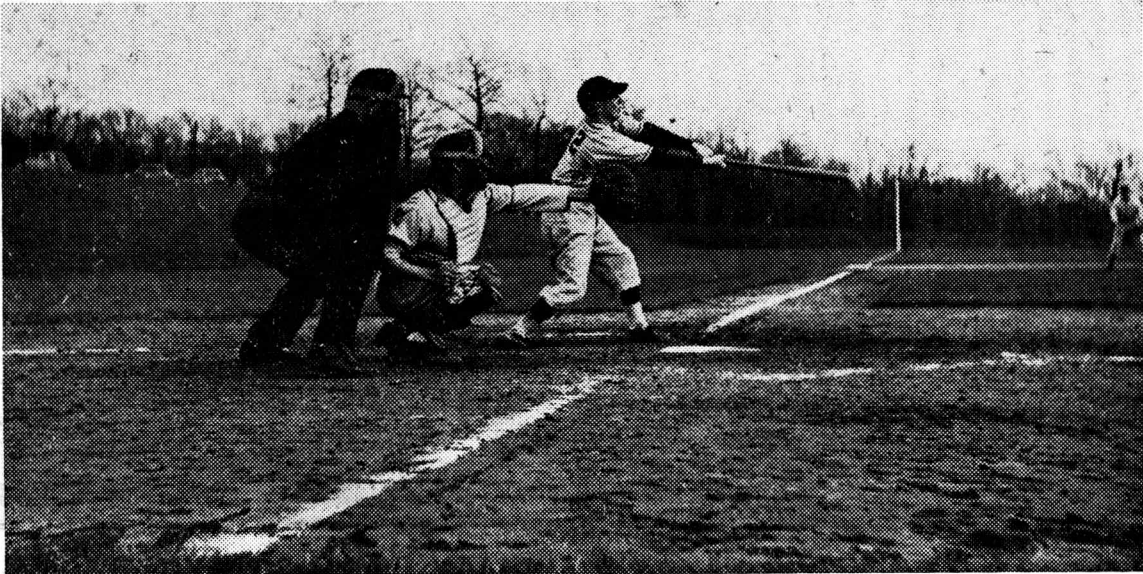
