My dear Mr. Dunlap.

I will follow your example, and in writing tell you how much I appreciate your letter of the 23rd inst. It was a most kindly thing for you to do, to take the trouble to assure me that my introductory chapter and the Table of Contents, on which Miss Walter and I have been working, seemed to you a promising start for our undertaking.

It appeared to me that my first article ought to put the proposed work on a high and serious plane. I think by the time we get to the book, this introductory chapter will have mellowed and enlarged into a much better thing than it is now, but at the moment it is about as far as I see and I am gratified that you find it good.
