who have so zealously watched the activities of the team.

Perhaps never before in the history of athletics in this institution has such a peculiar combination of factors presented itself for consideration. No other season has ever been marked with a greater variety of conditions. On the one hand success seemed assured from the very beginning. On the other almost everything that could disrupt and disorganize a team had to be dealt with. The benefits of the ten days' practice at Conneaut Lake, the large squad of promising men, the enthusiastic and hustling coach, the unprecedented foot ball enthusiasm, all pointed to a successful season. To offset these advantages there arose conditions which no effort on the part of coach or players could have avoided. Several of the old men whose presence was depended on to give spirit and confidence to the team, either did not return to college or were obliged, through injury or other restrictions, to be absent from the game. This lack of confidence and the attending state of disorganization, was strikingly demonstrated in the games played away from home early in the season. The withdrawal of men from the game also made it necessary for the coach to shift the players from one position to another, thus placing them at a disadvantage for a while. At the opening of the season the unanimous opinion of foot ball experts was that the changes in the rules demanded the presence of heavy men behind the line. Although a comparatively heavy and effective back field was developed later in the season, the first few games found Allegheny rather weak in that department.

During the season that has just closed Allegheny has not been free from an imperative necessity that has been a great drawback to her success in the past—that of developing a large number of new men both for the varsity and the scrub team. Although the number reporting for practice was larger than ever before, many of the players had had little experience.

Notwithstanding these disadvantages Allegheny won five of the ten games played and made a creditable showing against teams from whom it was not expected to win. The total

crowd, his presence on the line was felt by every player and had a most encouraging effect. "Bill's" second season in foot ball was a great improvement over the first.

Ballantyne has very ably sustained the record he made at tackle during the two previous years. His additional weight and experience served him well in some of the contests against the heavy teams played this year. His showing against Harwood, the Syracuse tackle, won for him the admiration of even the Syracuse players.

Allegheny has been unusually fortunate in securing men to take care of the "wings." The ends have never been cared for by better all around men, Aiken has handled himself like a general in his position. The end run has been one of Allegheny's most successful plays. His speed and aggressiveness have been a prominent factor in the game throughout the season.

Evans came to Allegheny with a year's experience on one of the teams included in the Big Six of Ohio, the Ohio Wesleyan team. The work of Evans has been the most sensational of the season. He has been the most effective ground-gainer in the back field and has made a number of long spectacular runs. He has done nearly all of the kicking and is credited with the only field goal ever kicked at Athletic Park.

Giles is one of the products of 1903. In the preliminary practice at Conneaut Lake he showed such fine form that he was immediately given

a place on the 'varsity. What he lacks in weight he makes up for in pluck and aggressiveness.

Lytle's first experience on the gridiron was with the Steele High School team, of Dayton, O., where he filled the position of end for three years. He began the season in Allegheny at that position but was later transferred to full back. His work behind the line during the latter part of the season was of the highest order. His offensive work was one of the features of the game with Westminster on Thanksgiving day.

Jelbert came to Allegheny with three years' experience on the High School team, of Johnsonburg, Pa. He also played on other local teams and made a reputation as a speedy player. Although he did not get into the game early in the season, and has been out of practice on account of injuries, he has proved his ability to command a position on the line.

Captain Davenport is one of the oldest players on the squad. He has played his position for three years, two on the 'varsity and one year on the scrub team. "Davy" was not in the best of form during the early part of the season but at the close was playing a brilliant game. At quarter he plays a strong, steady game, and has shown himself a general in directing the play.

Robinson began his foot ball career with the McKeesport High School team. During the season he has shown the benefits of his early training by winning for himself a place on the 'varsity team. He is a strong, consistent player and will likely be a regular 'varsity man next year.

Fish was one of the most promising men of 1903. Great things were expected of him this year but an unfortunate accident put him out of the game during the early part of the season. Fish has weight speed and nerve and is one of the steadiest men behind the line.

One of the season's experiments most gratifying in its results was the trial of Sherwin at center. Sherwin has weight, nerve and all that is necessary to make a good center. A little more experience should make him a valuable man to the team.

"Tommy" Smith before coming to Allegheny played quarter on one of the teams at State College. Although Smith is perhaps the lightest man on the squad, he demonstrated beyond a doubt his ability to fill the position behind the line. Not only is he very speedy but he is a sure tackler.

King is one of the products of the present season. During the latter part of the year he developed an aggressiveness that merited the place he occupied in the last two games. King's weight and his fierceness in charging should make him a valuable addition to the team of 1905.

The Scrub Team.

The Men Who Have Fought the 'Varsity Into Shape and Who Will be the Make Up of Coming Teams.

Many people are of the opinion that the only thing necessary to have a good foot ball team is to have eleven good men. Although that number of men is all that is necessary to play a game, yet more are needed. Eleven men, although practicing daily and being under the care of an excellent coach would not be equal to the task of representing a college on the gridiron. They might study their plays and practice signals regularly and still be practically worthless as a foot ball team. They might understand the game perfectly from a theoretical standpoint and yet practically they would not be able to play a good game. What is needed is a scrub team, a team to line up against the varsity men at every practice and give them the opportunity they need to play the real game.

In having a good scrub lineup Alle-

gheny has been peculiarly fortunate this year. We have had a good set of faithful fellows who devoted themselves zealously to the best interests of our team. The scrub has just as hard a time of it as the 'varsity man, having to practice as regularly and faithfully in addition to training in the same manner as does a regular.

Our scrub list consists of men who are not only faithful but men who will also give us a team to be proud of in a year or less. With one or two exceptions our scouts are light but notwithstanding this fact they have the bull dog grit and the other qualifications necessary in foot ball players. The scouts generally put up a good game of foot ball and by the manner in which they played against the 'varsity, they showed that there are several "comers" in this year's lineup. Some of the men are new at the game but the majority come to us with good past records.

Nelson, before coming to Allegheny, played quarter on the Kane High School. He is light, weighing but 145 pounds, but he makes up in grit and determination. He is undoubtedly a "comer" as a drop kicker and punter.

Miner, one of the new men this year, had made a good record on both the Punxautawney and the Union City High School teams. He stands 5 feet, 8½ inches tall, and tips the scale at 163 pounds. He has given a good account of himself behind the line both on offensive and defensive work.

Bolard, weighing 145 pounds, has been kept off the 'varsity only by his lack of weight. He certainly has the grit and fierceness which does so much to make a good player. He has such a way of imparting his fighting spirits to the other players that his presence on the scout team generally did much to urge the fellows on to good playing.

V. R. Scott, who has done such good work at end for us, played half and captained the West Newton Academy team last year. He is 5 feet, 9 inches tall and weighs about 155 pounds. He is a very fast man and will, no doubt, in another year make a strong candidate for the 'varsity.

Ball's first experience in the game was at guard this season. He weighs 168 pounds and has the making of a good man on the line.

Thompson, who was put out of the game in the middle of the season by a bad ankle, played full back two years ago on the W. Va. Wesleyan University team. He weighs about 160 and is indeed a remarkably gritty back and a good man at hitting the line.

Hines, during the early part of the season, made a fine showing at end, handling himself like a veteran, but about the middle of the season was taken out of the game by an attack of pneumonia. Before coming to Allegheny he played right end on the Park Institute team, Allegheny, Pa. He is tall and weighs 165 pounds.

E. E. Shields, although by no means a large man, proved himself a foot ball player of no mean ability. He is 5 feet, 10 inches tall and tips the scales at 157 pounds. Before coming to Allegheny he played left half on the Miami Military Institute, of Miami, Ohio.

Herwig played two years ago on our own scrub team. Weighing 165 pounds he has done good work at guard, considering the fact that he had to play against such men as McKistron, Hotson and King.

Stockton is one of our new men who has shown up very well. He weighs 155 pounds and has been a good end for the scrubs.

Clark, although a new man at the game, handled himself in a first-class manner, always giving a good account of himself in a scrimmage. He stands 5 feet, 10½ inches, and weighs about 145 pounds.

Stidger, before coming to Allegheny, played on the Moundsville, W. Va., High School team and the All Star team of that place. He stands 5 feet, 11 inches, and weighs 165 pounds. He played guard on the scout team in a very acceptable manner.

Miller, who during the early part of the season put up such a fine game at end for the scrubs, is about 5 feet 8 inches, and weighs 160 pounds. He received his previous foot ball training on the Mount Pleasant Preparatory School and High School teams of Mount Pleasant, Pa., having played half on both of those teams.

EXTEMPORANEOUS ADDRESS.

DR. BUCKLEY'S LAST TWO LECTURES.

The Chapel Crowded to Hear the Closing Lectures of the Course Given by the Great New York Editor.

On Tuesday evening at eight o'clock Dr. Buckley gave the second of his course of lectures on Extemporaneous Speaking. Any attempt to do justice to the lecturer's masterly discourse is vain. His thought in barest outline is given below, but from such an outline one cannot get the slightest idea of the wonderful skill the speaker evidenced in his treatment of the subject. Throughout the whole course he practiced the very theories that he was setting forth. And his statements were made clear and impressive by his great fund of illustration and anecdote.

The matter of tone was first taken up and discussed more extensively than in the previous lecture. Dr. Buckley stated that the training of the voice that resulted from singing was invaluable to the public speaker. The various pitches were considered in regard to their audibility and carrying force.

In dealing with thought the subject was divided into two divisions—facts and ideas. It was shown that it is impossible for any man to speak without a knowledge of history and biography; also a man must understand the various divisions of science in order to speak well and to cope with an opponent in debate. The special facts that belonged to the various professions and which must be stored up for use were forcibly expressed by many apt illustrations.

Then in regard to ideas or opinions, the lecturer in a similar manner set forth the necessity for an accurate knowledge of those especially of the present day. Also an outline was given of the method of authenticating the various statements that are always circulating.

Feeling was declared to be one of the vital elements of oratory. Without this the orator is nothing. But made to order expressions of emotion are to be condemned. As it was aptly put as nothing more than a "hydraulic process" when carried to the extreme. Vocal force or roaring is not to be mistaken for earnestness.

In consideration of the subject it was shown that all truths of the universe except the Almighty must answer to the following questions: Whence? When? Where? How? Why? What? Whither? With these questions one would be able to cover all phases of the subject, and to clearly conceive the root idea of the subject.

Three great dangers of extemporaneous speaking were set forth as: (1) The speaker having more words than he will have ideas for. (2) The speaker is apt to allow the subject to carry him away. It being very disastrous for a man to set his mouth working and go away and leave it. (3) The speaker's tendency to use slang. The great defects of this style of

speaking: (1) Poverty of language. (2) Poverty of thought. (3) Repetition. (4) The stereotyped style. (5) Ill judged emphasis. (6) Embarrassment.

The lecture was two hours in length and the eager attention with which the audience followed Dr. Buckley was a strong evidence of his mastery of the art.

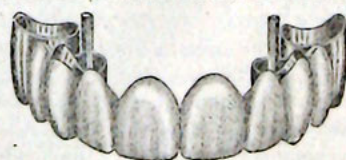

REASONS FOR READING ROBERT BROWNING.

FIRST LECTURE GIVEN BY DR.
KELLEY.

A Scholarly and Inspiring Lecture on
a Great Subject.

Dr. Kelley, who is a man of tall stature and dignified bearing, prefaced his address by saying it was not a literary criticism from the chair of a college English professor, but merely a few reasons, intellectual and spiritual, for the study of Browning, as given from the personal standpoint of a minister. It was the defence of a man who had been accused, before the court, of the heinous crime of loving Browning.

One of Browning's greatest values is in giving intellectual impulse when such impulse is needed. One of Emerson's precepts was, to see clearly and state lucidly. Few can do this, and fewer still can add to clearness of perception and lucidity of expression the electric power which stimulates in the reader a creative force. In this power, Browning's nearest of kin, in America, was Emerson, and his only brother among English poets was Shakespeare.

The study of Browning is of value, also, for the large number of mental exercises it gives. He is a mental gymnasium. Nowhere, in prose or poetry, is the reader's whole nature so aroused to the problem of life as in Browning. He is not easy reading and is very often accused of being needlessly obscure but he meant to be intelligible. He once said anyone who honestly tried, could understand his works and again, that if his critics had to put a big, bouncing thought into one little line, cut short by metrical necessities, they would understand some of his difficulties. Not a little of Browning's obscurity comes from the themes. All his subjects are spiritual and the sublimest, most inspiring spiritual truths do not admit of exact, concrete expression. This so-called obscurity, affords the best mental discipline, in the rapid supplying of the omissions. Reading him is like reading the heliographic messages in a military campaign.

To anyone who desires to learn the possible enormous force of a few words Browning is invaluable. His sentences are like bales of goods packed by a hydraulic press. His particular subjects, too, give his works importance. Browning was more of a preacher than a poet. He was a prophet of the higher world, a spiritual seer. His chief lovers come from the sober thinking masses. The people who have the problems of life to solve, study him because of his penetration and truth. He is a working factor in the redemption of the world because his interest is always in humanity rather than nature. Man to him is more than marble.

Browning is rugged because he is so earnest. He looks after the idea rather than the form but no poet is more musical than Browning is at his best. He deserves to be read on account of his rugged masculinity. He has the right arm of a blacksmith and the grip of a giant. He is tender, it is true, but it is the tenderness of a Sir Philip Sidney, a Cromwell or a Lincoln.

From Browning we learn the lesson of doing justly and thinking kindly. In his best characters there always is something guilty and in his worst, something good. His pure and dignified treatment of that most powerful of human passions, love, is, in a measure, due to the influence of his wife, and his greatest praise is that he wrote nothing she could wish he had not.

Browning is for all periods and all ages. He should be read because he is a friend for a life-time and one that is never outgrown. Of him, as of Shakespeare, a complete knowledge is a liberal education. Above all Browning is to be loved as a poet of the strong courage of a Christian. Even to the last he showed the brave, buoyant spirit of his earliest writings.

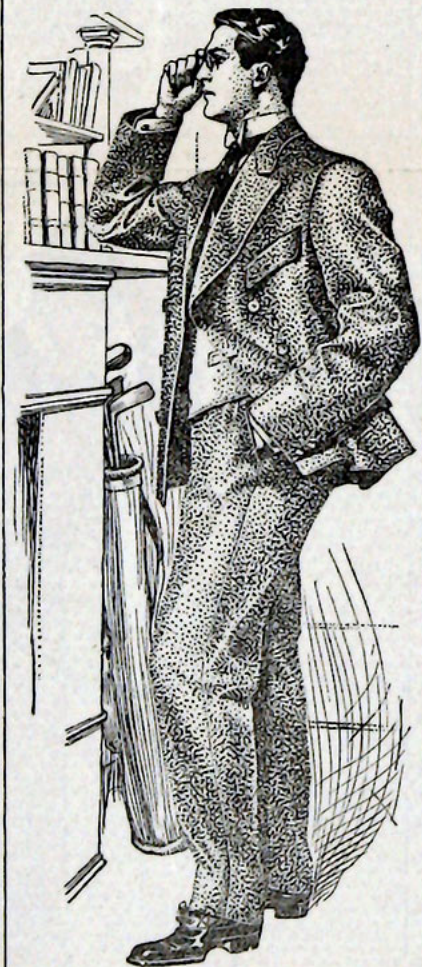

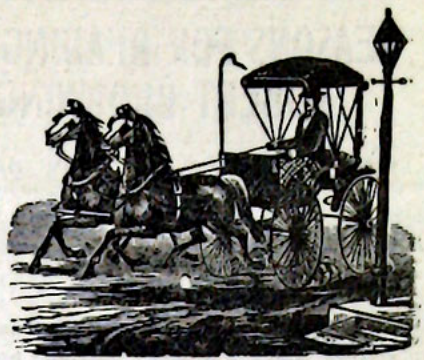

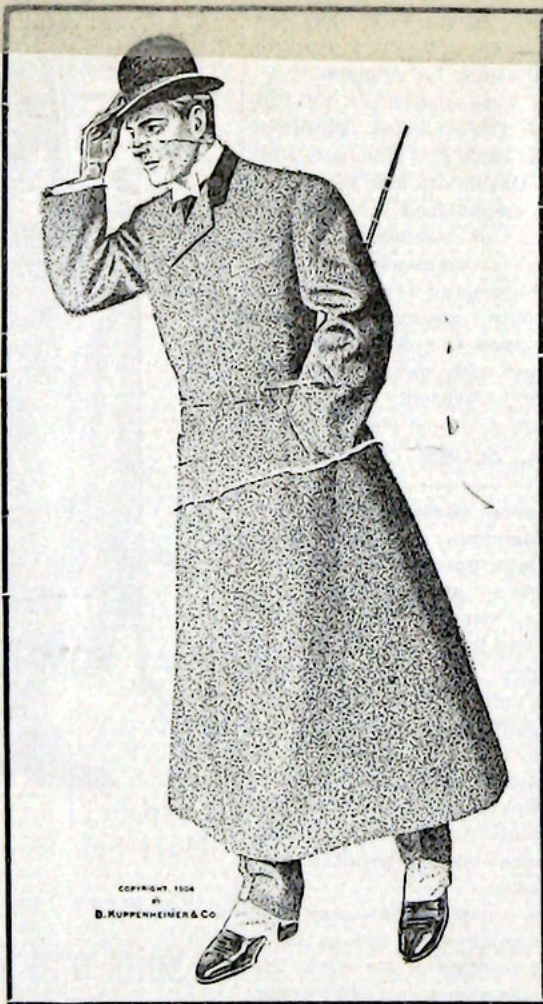
