Senator Leader And Other Candidates Describe State Democratic Platform

State Senator George M. Leader, Democratic candidate for the office of governor, and two other Democratic candidates for high offices in this state, spoke here last Friday. The three speakers in this partisan program, outlined this state's party platform for this year's election. President Benezet introduced the afternoon's speakers, in the first Falk Foundation program this year, "... a series of speakers on the topics concerned with our daily political, social and economic life ..."

"There is nothing static about society. There is nothing static about the state. There is nothing static about industry," stated the Democratic gubernatorial candidate. Senator Leader went on to present "... what I consider a constructive program." With the emphasis on the economic problems of the state, the speaker outlined the situation which exists in the state today and the solutions which the Democratic party is offering to the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania at this coming election. Presently there are 377 thousand unemployed in this state; coal cars are standing on the sidings; natural resources are not being tapped; Pennsylvania is losing many industries to the South due to this States large corporate taxes, and the inducements which the South is offering to developing industry. These problems and difficulties which lie in such areas as education, health, recreation, urban and rural development of roads, public utilities and transportation, the Senator attributed to the laxness of the Republican administration. He suggested the revamping of the governmental structure. In particular, he emphasized the insufficiency of the Governor's Planning Commission, the Milk Control Commission, the Public Utilities Development Committee and the State Mediation Board.

The problems of the state in the fields of labor management relations, economic prosperity, scientific and industrial development are not partisan problems. State Senator Leader stated, that if elected governor, he would "exert the leadership which is the right of the office of governor ... to make Pennsylvania a better place in which to live ... and to build a government and an economy for the people of the state of Pennsylvania."

Miss Genevieve Blatt, the Democratic candidate for the office of Secretary of Internal affairs also appeared on Friday afternoon's program. Miss Blatt stated, "Government is as good as we make it, or as bad as we permit it to be." She accused most of the people of making themselves aware of national and international problems and neglecting those affairs of the state and local areas. "State government all over the country has been deteriorating and degenerating due to public apathy." The first woman candidate for this office, went on to explain what are the functions of the office of Secretary of Internal Affairs. As custodian of the land records for the state, and coordinator of local governments, ex officio of the State Board of Parliaments, ex officio of the Highway and Bridge authorities and public building authority, the holder of the office is in fact, banker for the state's business. Miss Blatt stated, "The amount of money which this state government owes is more than that

of any other state government." She further went on to accuse the Republican administration of permitting the finances of the state to lapse into a condition which no private business would tolerate; and into a state under which no business could continue to operate.

Another guest speaker on the program, was Mr. Roy E. Furman, the candidate for the office of Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Furman, stated that, "This administration is the most expensive and most extravagant administration in the history of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania." The cost of government has increased nearly one billion dollars in twelve years. He recommended the repeal of the recently instituted state sales tax which comes up for consideration in September of next year. He stated that there was a necessity for a tax; however he felt that the findings of the Chesterman Committee which studied the economic problems of the state, were completely ignored by the present administration, when the sales tax was created. Mr. Furman also accused the Republican administration of neglecting its duty in the field of education. He cited the strides made by the State Congress of 1937 in this field—a congress which was Democratic. "It is the duty of the state to pay the bill for education costs." He stated that Pennsylvania now ranks 24 among the states with respect to educational facilities. And this he declared was a poor position for the Keystone state to hold in the national educational picture.

There was a short question and answer period held after the three guests had finished speaking. The program was concluded with an informal coffee hour in Brooks.

1954-55 Budget Announced By AUC; Appointments Made For Coming Year

This Sunday, October 10, marked the final approval of the 1954-55 budget. Two five hour meetings were spent discussing the issues involved in distributing funds to the nineteen organizations subsidized by the AUC.

This year AUC was allotted a budget of approximately \$18,460.00 from the Student Activity Fund. Last year's deficit now totals \$1,517.58, but outstanding income from the ads in **The Campus** and **Kaldron** last year, totaling \$1,767 would, if collected, net a possible \$249.42 for this year's fund.

Since AUC this year did not have the \$2,500 carry over as it did last year, nearly all organizations had to take a substantial cut in their amount.

The allotments with which they have to work this year were made on the basis of need, eliminating much former waste. As issues were discussed in the council, good financial management was found lacking in almost every area. Many committees spent over their AUC budget last year, but it is the policy of this year's council that expendi-

Plans Being Made For Name Change

In a meeting last week of the Block "A" Club, the use by Allegheny College of the nickname **The Gators** was questioned by a representative group of alumni and faculty.

Recently an alumni group had inquired into the derivation of the nickname, and at first account no one could explain the reason for its existence on the Allegheny campus. Further investigation and a consultation with Mr. Philip Benjamin brought about the following explanation.

In 1931 the sports editor of the Meadville Tribune-Republican announced in his column ... "tonight the Gators (that's us) will open ...". Since that time the sobriquet has hung on tenaciously and to this day, unknown to a good many, the college actually maintains a live Alligator in the basement of Alden Hall.

With the further instigation of the alumni group, and a number of prominent faculty members of long standing, the issue was presented to the Block "A" club.

The Block "A" feeling that the cause was an appropriate one, but really not within their province to make a decision for the school, checked with all the appropriate bodies concerned and thus the name "**Gators**" may be on its way out now.

The Block "A" will sponsor the contest, with award to be announced later, for changing the Allegheny College nickname to an appropriate one. The rules are as follows:

(1) The suggestion should have an historical base, preferably a name from the local Indian lore.

(2) Suggestion should be alliterative if possible.

(3) Suggestions should be simple and a good substitute for **Gators** in the present school cheers and yells.

A suggestion box will be placed in the Grill with pad and pencil and all entries should be in that box no later than 10:30 p.m. Friday, November 12. Please attach your reason for submitting suggested name.

Homecoming Here; Rally, Alumni Fete, Grid Contest, Dance Highlight Weekend

Homecoming week-end starts tomorrow, featuring a full schedule of campus activities.

Dr. John E. Cavelti, head of the Chemistry Department, will give the Homecoming Convocation tomorrow in Montgomery at 11:20 a.m. Dr. Cavelti, who has just returned to Allegheny, spent last year teaching at the University of Hawaii. This will be the first convocation address that Professor Cavelti has given since coming to Allegheny in 1936. The topic for this speech will be "Coming Home."

Bowden And Wells Win Debate With Mt. Mercy

Anne Bowden and Chuck Wells won a unanimous decision in the exhibition debate against Mt. Mercy last Friday, October 8.

Debating the affirmative on the collegiate topic, "Should the United States extend diplomatic recognition to the Communist government of China?", they defeated Mary Kay Zimmick and Carol Ertsman of Mt. Mercy, who last year were the second ranking team in the state contest. The debate was given before the Forensics Panel of the Pennsylvania Speech Association Convention, which was held on October 8 and 9 at the William Penn Hotel in Pittsburgh.

The Forensics Panel of which Mr. Herbert Hess is Chairman had a two-fold purpose. First, to explore the criteria for evaluating tournament debating and, second, to illustrate problems likely to be encountered in debating this particular question.

The judges were Professor Frank Merritt of Bucknell University, Professor J. F. O'Brien of Penn State University and Professor Samuel Pritchard of Lehigh University. Each judge independently presented a justifiable criteria, evaluated the debate against that criteria and then awarded the decision to the Allegheny team.

Ford Chapel Program To Feature "Sermon In Song" Presentation Sunday

Sunday morning a new program will be presented before the Homecoming congregation at the eleven o'clock worship service in Ford Chapel. Hobart Mitchell will present his "Sermon-in-Song," a synthesis of sacred music and the spoken word. Sacred songs, oratorio arias, and spirituals will be integrated in the sermon text, and a transition from speaking to singing will be accomplished without a break in the continuity.

According to Dr. Picht, College Chaplain, "the idea of a sermon composed of singing and speaking is not a novelty. Even as the spoken text appeals to the mind, the song stirs the emotions, and the combination gives the sermon its deep inspirational quality. This brings a simple, sincere, and effective message of a thoroughly serious character. It is a unique and compelling experience."

"Sermon-in-Song" was originated in 1946 by Hobart Mitchell, a concert baritone and originator of "Poetry-in-Song." Mr. Mitchell began his singing career as a boy chorister in Grace Church Choir School, New York City. He has been close to sacred music most of his life. In addition to his musical background he holds a master's degree in American literature from Columbia and for six years taught at NYU. A Quaker in faith, Mr. Mitchell has developed "Sermon-in-Song" as a means of expressing his religious convictions through the talents of singing and writing.

Accompanied at the organ by Robert B. Lynn, college organist, the selections for the service will be prelude, Bach's "I Call to Thee, Lord, Jesus Christ;" offertory, Palestrina's "Pierceas;" and postlude, Bach's "Fantasie in G Minor."

A Challenge

"We have a great pride about this College and the manner in which individual and group activities are carried out. It is harmful to us to do things poorly, and especially to do them in conspicuous places. Furthermore it is not worth investing money and equipment into trying to keep going an organization which does not enjoy support.

"We therefore see no course but to discontinue the College Band, until such time when there is abundant evidence that enough people will and can stick with it long enough to make it an organization worthy to represent the College." The previous statements were taken from a letter written by President Benezet to the Allegheny Undergraduate Council. This letter was read at the AUC meeting last Sunday. Next Sunday recommendations on the situation shall be brought up before the AUC by a committee specifically designed for that purpose.

However it may be possible that these recommendations won't be needed, that with the help of you, the Student Body, the band will continue to exist in such a manner that we will be proud of it. Last year great improvements were made in our College Band and it was on its way up. This year, because of the lack of interest and participation on the part of the student body, the band was failing to such an extent that it has been challenged to prove its worthiness.

Last Monday, the band members, full of enthusiasm in an effort to keep their organization together, sparked such enthusiasm in those who had seen and heard it marching around the campus that afternoon. The Allegheny College Band is accepting the challenge that was given to them; however, because of a limited number of members they cannot answer this challenge alone. They need help. Your help. Rifling through the files in the Admissions Office we have found that there is an abundant variety of musical talent in this year's freshman class. We also know that many of you upperclassmen can play various types of musical instruments. The talent is there. You have it. Now let's utilize it in such a manner that you and your fellow members of the student body may be proud of it in our College Band.

Faculty Profile



Mr. David Shaber

"This is my first full time teaching job and, quite honestly, it's exciting," was what Mr. David Shaber had to say about his first month at Allegheny College.

Mr. Shaber, who is one of the new faces on the college faculty, is a member of the Speech and Drama Departments. At Western Reserve University he obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Master's degree in Public Address and General Speech. Going on to Yale University, he gained a second Master's degree in the Fine Arts. Mr. Shaber's face is not new to Meadville, as for the past two summers he has worked on Publicity and Promotion for Meadville's summer theater, Penn Playhouse.

An amount of fame has come to Mr. Shaber with the publication of

several plays and the production of one this fall. "The Youngest Shall Ask," a short one act play, was published in "The Best Short Plays of 1952-1953." A longer play, the title of which Mr. Shaber will not reveal, because "it is dreadful," has also been published. The Drama Department of Catawba College, Salisbury, North Carolina, will produce Mr. Shaber's "Natural Son" in March. "Natural Son" revolves around a ten-year-old boy who is badly injured while riding his new bike; his right leg must be amputated, and the effects of this event on the lives of the boy and his parents. Mr. Shaber says of writing, "The one important thing in writing is to get perspective."

This semester Mr. Shaber is teaching four sections of G-I, and next semester will teach a new course, Drama 16 — "The Theater Today." Of this course Mr. Shaber said, "It's what I hope will be a review of the evolving consideration in the theater of the human dilemma." In addition, he is an assistant debate coach, and coach of a special debate group working in cross-examination.

When asked what he thought about Allegheny, Mr. Shaber said, "Allegheny women are very attractive, the fellows are good looking, and all my classes are very good without exception. I am tremendously pleased with the interest and attention."

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Magazine Post Open To Women Applicants

The Mademoiselle magazine is once again sponsoring its annual College Board Contest.

Any woman under-graduate under 26 years and enrolled in an accredited college or junior college is eligible providing she can be available during the month of June 1955 for work in New York.

Membership on the College Board is the first step in the competition for twenty Mademoiselle Guest Editorships. The twenty College Guest Editors, winners of the contest, will be brought to New York next June to help write, edit and illustrate the magazine's 1955 August college issue. They will be paid a salary for their month's work and roundtrip transportation to New York City.

To enter this contest a 1,500 word criticism of the Mademoiselle's August 1954 edition must be submitted. (The September, October, or November 1954 issues may be substituted). In addition to this criticism of the issue as a whole, a detailed criticism of a select field may be included (fiction, art, features, fashion, promotion, etc.) A sample of the contestant's own work may be included if desired. On a separate page must be listed the entrant's name, class year, college and home addresses, major and minor, extracurricular activities and summer jobs. Entries must be type-written and postmarked no later than November 30, 1954 and sent to College Editor, Mademoiselle, 575 Madison Avenue, New York 22, N.Y.

As part of this program Malinda Edgington, a representative of Mademoiselle magazine visited with Allegheny women, Monday, October 11, at an informal meeting in the Pine Room. She spoke for a short time explaining the contest and then answering questions. Punch and cookies were served afterwards by AWS.

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On Campus

Male Students Hold Variety Of Positions

Close to one fourth of Allegheny's male student body is working for the college or private business this year. According to figures released by Dean McCracken this week, seventeen percent of the men are working while here at school. Official breakdown shows 99 men working out of the 507 enrolled this semester.

Half of those working this semester are employed by the college. These 49 job holders range from the waiters, 32 strong, and laboratory assistants numbering 8, to the students working for campus publicity office.

Remainder of Allegheny's working force is found in a kaleidoscope-like range of positions. Sunday is not a day of rest for the four fellow students who this fall are heading nearby church congregations.

Meadville's industrial side is being represented by a student employed at the Talon plant here in town.

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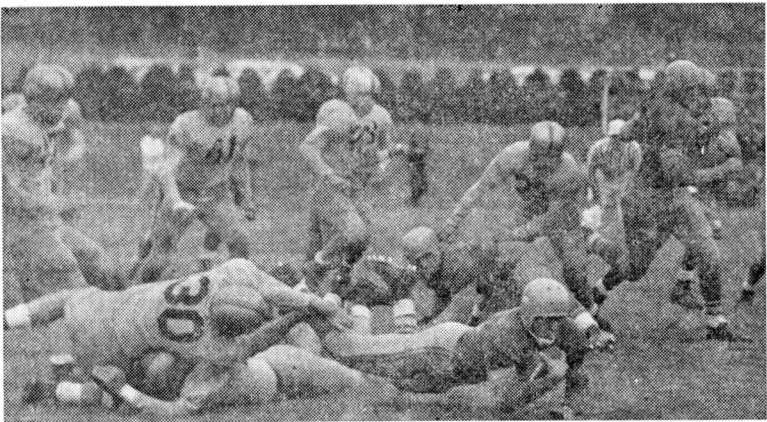
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Fritz Reed stops Thiel ball carrier in last Saturday's game.

Thiel Tomcats Claw Gators 19-6; Oberlin Here For Homecoming Game

Last Saturday afternoon at College Field the Allegheny Gators lost their fourteenth straight football game, this time to the Thiel Tomcats, 19-6. It has been the general practice in the last few years to minimize the loss with some statement to the effect that the team will do better next week. Most of this has been wishful thinking. However, it is the general consensus on campus that at last this might be true. Last Saturday the Gators lost, it is true, but they lost to a good, well-manned, and well-organized football aggregation. It was this same Thiel that beat us by 46 points last year; this year it was 13.

Allegheny kicked off to Thiel to open the game. After four plays the Tomcats were forced to punt, and the Gators took the ball on the Thiel 40-yard line. On their first offensive play Fritz Reed completed a pass right over the middle to Dick Boyd. Don Smith carried on the next play for a first down. A holding penalty advanced the ball to the Thiel 14. There the Gator attack sputtered and the Tomcats took over on downs when a pass went incomplete in the end-zone. Thiel took the ball and marched 86 yards on 17 plays for the first touchdown of the game. Russ Hill drove over for the three for the tally. Shoemaker missed the extra point and the score stood at 6-0. Hill was the outstanding cog in this punch as he carried for four first downs with gains of 10, 7, 13, and 16 yards.

Barron Scores TD

Smith returned Thiel's kickoff to the Gator 34. He then picked up 14 yards and a first down on an end run. The Blue and Gold had moved the ball to the Thiel thirty before the quarter ended. In the first twelve plays of the second stanza the Gators drove to the Thiel three. With a first down on the four, Allegheny was unable to put the ball across as the Tomcats went into a nine man line which had strong resemblance to the well-known stone wall. However, Thiel fumbled three plays after they got the ball and John Carmen, starting in place of Lamar Light who will be out for the rest of the season with a neck injury, recovered on the 14-yard line. Don Barron then drove over from twelve yards out to knot the score at six apiece. The extra point try was wide.

Late in the half a Thiel rally was stopped on the Gator 15 by a fumble by Joe Scafuri which was recovered by the Gators. Ron Radcliffe got off another of his fine punts which traveled 50 yards in this period. The half ended on a pass interception by Don Kimmelman.

Kline's Catch Spectacular

The second half has been the Allegheny bugaboo in past weeks. Last Saturday this was true to a certain extent. However, the Gators definitely played better football than they have in the previous two games. If it were possible to rewrite just two plays of that half it is highly probable that we would have had a win. The first of these plays occurred midway through the third stanza. Thiel Quarterback Lucio Martin faded back and tossed a pass from the Allegheny 30 into the end zone. Kimmelman deflected the ball, but Kline scooped it up just before it hit the ground for a sensational catch. The extra point was good on a pass from Martin to Left End John Piai. Allegheny trailed 13-6.

The game rolled into the fourth

quarter without further action. Then, when the quarter was three minutes old, the second of the plays which broke the Gator's backs occurred. Reed tossed a pass to Barron on the Thiel three yard line. Don was all alone but he just couldn't hold on to the pigskin and it dropped to the ground. Thiel took over on downs and marched 65 yards for their third and final score of the day. The drive was capped by a twenty yard sprint by second team halfback Danzak. Shoemaker again missed the conversion attempt. Thiel 19, Allegheny 6. The game ended shortly afterward.

It is easy to see that the game was a good one. Next week the Gators go on the field against Oberlin in the Homecoming Game. The game promises to be close. Oberlin defeated Otterbein 14-7 in their opening game and tied De Pauw last Saturday 6-6. This is the game the Blue and Gold have been gunning for. The feeling is running high and with it there seems to be a great deal of optimism regarding the outcome. A victory would really highlight the Homecoming festivities. They are our team so let's go out and see them beat Oberlin.

Phi Delts, Sigs Win "Sudden Death" Games

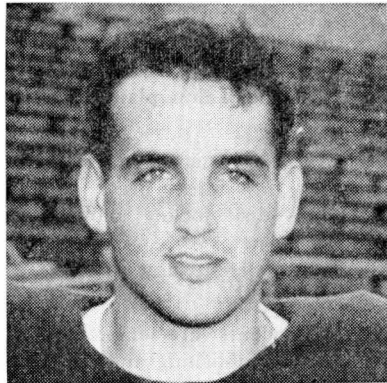
Know Your Gators

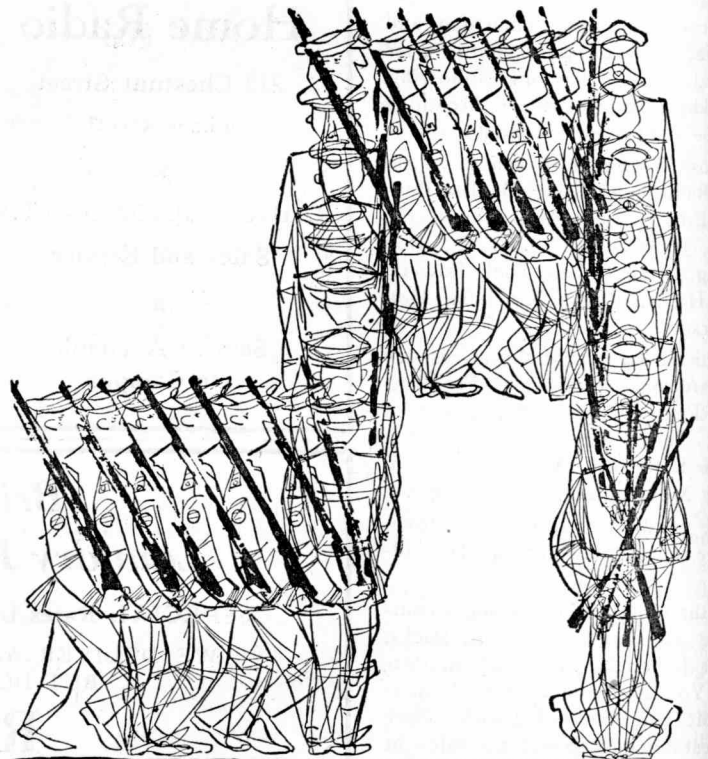

The soccer team inaugurated their season last Friday by giving Allegheny its first team victory of the 1954-55 season. The booters, who made the trip to Cleveland for their win against Western Reserve 2-1, proved themselves to be tough competitors again this season.

The booters showed a lot of hustle even though they played the game under poor field conditions. The contest at Cleveland was played on a field smaller than minimum regulation size with scarcely a blade of grass on it. This put the squad at a slight handicap, since the Gators are used to playing on their home field.

Lauffer, Dobson Score

The first quarter, played in a scoreless tie, showed the Gators' aggressiveness, since they continually were on the offense. The Gators scored the first goal of the season. Jim Lauffer, who received a pass from Al Monstrum, punched through the Reserve defense and scored the field goal. After that the Gators kept pounding the Reserve goal consistently. Half time ended with the Gators ahead 1-0.

The third quarter started with the Gators again taking the offense. The squad scored again in this quarter on a 30 yard boot by halfback John Dobson. The well-kicked boot went over the head of the Reserve goalie for the second tally of the afternoon.

Reserve's Lone Tally

The Reserve's only score came in the third quarter on a penalty kick. Pawloski, who played goalie for Reserve during the first half, came out to put a perfectly placed kick out of reach of Dave Williams, Allegheny's defending goalie, for the only Reserve score of the afternoon. From here after Western Reserve ceased to become a serious threat.

The fourth quarter also ended in a deadlock to give the booters a 2-1 opening game victory.

The fine play of halfbacks Bob Ozmun, John Dobson, and Marty Reichle, was a big factor in the Gator win. Their fine kicks kept Western Reserve on the defense most of the afternoon. There were only a few occasions when the Reserves broke through them, and then fullbacks Artie Hewitt and Bob Seimens were there to stop the attack.

Allegheny pounded the Reserve goal 38 times while Allegheny's Dave Williams was called upon to make only 8 saves.

Rochester Next Foe

Tomorrow the booters again take the road to face one of the toughest opponents the team will see this year. The University of Rochester will be the host team for the contest to be played at Rochester, N.Y. Last year Rochester, who beat the Gators in a 2-1 thriller, suffered only
