BLUE AND GOLD FIVE WINS SEASON'S FINAL FROM JUNIATA

Capt. Hoppy Miller and Verne Wise Play Last Game for Allegheny

Playing a brand of basketball, much improved over recent exhibitions, the Allegheny quintet vanquished the visiting Juniata five last Saturday night in an interesting game, 30 to 24. This victory marks then end of the floor season, and, more important, the last game in which Captain "Hoppy" Miller and "Verne" Wise will participate for the Gold and Blue of Old Allegheny. The freshmen gave a unique ceremony between halves reminding us that "Red" Hafer, the diminutive cheer leader, has also completed a worthy record in the services of his Alma Mater.

Accurate passing and clever shooting combined with a remarkable defensive accounted for a 20-8 score in Allegheny's favor at the end of the initial half. Leo Ross produced half of the ten counters dropped into their basket by the home five. The central state five could not fathom the airtight guarding game of Blue and Gold and the contest took on the appearance of a walk-away.

However, the second period contributed a fray that would be hard to duplicate. Wolfgang, the husky Juniata guard whose play featured the entire contest, rang up goals in an alarming manner, and Slaughter proved a menace to the Allegheny defense men. Only Ross's brilliant delivery from the foul line kept their team in the materially reduced lead.

Miller and Wise clearly demonstrated just what a loss Allegheny will suffer on the basketball floor by their graduation. The exceptional brilliance of Leo Ross, who proved himself the shining light of the game, and the clever playing of Brownell and Braun however, promises great things for the future. Wolfgang showed himself the most dangerous man on the Juniata

ALLEGHENY DEBATERS SCORE TWO MORE VICTORIES

Triumphs Over W. & J. and Wooster, Brings Total to Four Wins

By defeating Wooster College at Wooster and W. and J. on the local rostrum in a triangular contest between the three colleges on Friday evening, Allegheny added two more victories to her successful forensic career. The question for the debate was, "Resolved, that the power of the Federal Supreme Court to declare statutes unconstitutional should be restricted." The judges granted a 3-0 decision over W. and J., and a 2-1 decision over Wooster College.

Allegheny defended the affirmative side of the proposition in Ford Memorial Chapel being represented by Messrs. Bozic, Leeper, and Ross with Mr. Sutton as an alternate. They were opposed by Messrs. Beecher, Lovett, and Wayman of W. and J. The teams consisting of Messrs. Demmler, Hammett, and Larson with Mr. M. V. Wright as alternate upheld the negative at Wooster.

The affirmative based their arguments, for the most part, on the following contentions: (1) the power to veto statutes has been assumed by the Supreme Court; (2) this power has grown steadily to large proportions;

COURT QUESTION WILL BE TOPIC FOR FRESHMEN-SOPHOMORE CONTEST

In the annual Freshman-Sophomore Debate which is to be held at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening in Ford Memorial Chapel, the representatives of the two classes will discuss the proposition: Resolved, that the United States and the several states should establish courts analogous in principle to the Kansas Court of Industrial Relations.

The sophomore team consisting of C. L. Sutton, D. W. Steenkens, and M. A. Mook will uphold the affirmative side of the question while G. M. Fitzpatrick, A. H. Bartlett, J. A. Palmer, and J. B. Harrison, alternate, the freshman debaters, will argue for the negative. Both teams have been working hard for some time to develop their arguments, and all who attend are certain of hearing a well prepared discussion of this very important proposition.

Inasmuch as this annual debate will be the last contest of any kind in which the present lower class rivals will meet, considerable interest is being shown by the entire student body.

LIT MONTHLY CONTAINS INTERESTING ARTICLES

LACK OF MATERIAL DELAYS ISSUE OF MONTHLY MAGAZINE

Delayed by lack of material, the December number of the Literary Monthly appeared last week. The efforts of the few contributors are to be commended, but the magazine is obviously handicapped in having a limited variety of contributions.

"That D— Umbrella" by Miss Frances Goodnough is written in an easy-going and whimsical style and perhaps could be classed as a psychological study filled with chuckle-producing turns. Whether we anticipate the last paragraph or not, it still has a good effect. The action is somewhat impeded by description which has no real bearing on the development.

"The Oath of the Tennis Club" is a very realistic presentation by Miss Helen Bowman which deals with child life filled with characteristic juvenile emotions. There are exaggerated passages which reduce the action to an absurdity; these may be due in a large part to the nature of the subject.

"Chapel—November 11, 1922" is a poem written by Miss Katharine Norris on the occasion of the celebration of Armistice Day in Chapel. It is an attempt at descriptive verse. The dominant theme is in the presentation of sound but is often confused.

Miss Jean Kitchen gives us a romantic sketch in "Perspective" in which is developed an interesting but perhaps a much over-worked theme.

An appropriate editorial calls our attention to the narrow and superficial judgments we are apt to pass on our fellow-students. Intrinsic and not extrinsic values should be the basis of our measure of character, the writer emphasizes.

Several new books are reviewed in "Book Reviews." "Gentle Julia" by Booth Tarkington is given very favorable criticism as is also "My Discovery of England" by Stephen Leacock. "A Legend of the Thousand Islands" by Miss Ruth Elliott is a fascinating

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DR. F. G. HENKE TALKS ON INTELLIGENCE TESTS

Citing some very significant statistics obtained from the results of Army intelligence tests, Dr. F. G. Henke, at the Chapel service last Saturday morning, gave a very relevant and valuable talk on the responsibility of the college man.

During the late war the educational records of some 80,000 white, native-born men were examined. Of every one thousand at these men only 230 entered high school; of these 95 were graduated; 50 of that number entered college, 40 finished the sophomore year, 20 finished the junior year, and only 10 were graduated.

Thus only one per cent of the 80,000 representative men ever graduated from college. By processes of selection, natural and otherwise, the others had been sifted out. "These facts illustrate," Dr. Henke said, the large responsibility that a college education imposes on a man, for presumably the more intelligent and capable are the ones to receive the higher education. In the future it is quite likely that intelligence tests will be used more widely in determining a man's fitness for his vocation.

ALLEGHENY ALUMNUS DIES IN OREGON

President Hixson has just received through Mr. Benjamin R. Williams, attorney, at Butler, notification of the death of Dr. Homer Brown Halle at Madras, Oregon. Dr. Halle's death occurred December 16, 1922. His funeral was held at his old home in Homer, New York. He was one of the most popular men of the College twenty-five years ago and was an upper classman at the time of leaving Allegheny for service in the Spanish-American War. Mr. Williams and Dr. Halle were the only upper classmen who entered the volunteer service in the Spanish-American War.

The fans may look forward to some of the best exhibitions of the indoor game that have been seen here this year. Those who witnessed the tournament of last year were loud in their praise of the high standard of team play and are enthusiastically awaiting the opening round on Friday evening.

French Play Wins Applause Of Large Audience

Clever Acting Features Presentation of "Les Femmes Fortes"

Superiority and finesse of interpretation were features of the clever acting in the presentation of Sardou's three act comedy, "Les Femmes Fortes," by Le Petit Salen at Ford Memorial Chapel last Thursday evening.

The salient success of this production, attested by the cordial spirit of the large audience present, makes it a very notable achievement for the French Club. Few colleges attempt to produce anything so difficult as a three act play in French. That Allegheny has achieved such notable success in this endeavor is a fact to be proud of. The adroit acting and facile pronunciation and clarity of expression which made the play so pronounced a success were the result of many months of practice under the skilled direction of Prof. J. L. Russo. In spite of a number of changes in the cast—some of them made very late—every part was played with an adeptness that made manifest Prof. Russo's ability as a coach and the histrionic talent of the actors.

The parts were so admirably cast that it is difficult to choose any cue or

two actors as the best; however, on account of their positions as leading lady and leading man, Margaret Daugherty as Claire and Alexander Hill as Jonathan may be mentioned as the outstanding characters.

The acting of both was natural and unreserved. Claire with her subtle femininity and unfeigned sweetness was probably the most sensible and true to life character of the play. Mr. Hill as Jonathan displayed the blustering and frank bravado of an American youth with acute wit and dexterity.

"The imperious, queerly-dressed, quacious, and strident voiced old Mr. Toupart was portrayed with spirit by Miss Helen Bowman. Miss Gertrude Curry and Elinor Van Scoten in the parts of Deborah and Mme. Lahor played very well the absurdly overdrawn characters of "femmes fortes."

Theodore Lorz as Toupart, the obnoxious house-wifely husband who dabbles in his wife's bidding and his servant's work, with his little beard and fitting clothes, depicted well the little negligent, hen-pecked Frenchman.

Allegheny's 1923 basketball season closed with the Juniata contest last Saturday evening. The record stands for the season at nine games won and nine games lost. This record is not a poor one and shows that the team had an even break for the season. During the past season many hard teams were met and the schedule as a whole was a difficult one. Each man on the team gave his very best to the team and to his Alma Mater—this is all that can ever be expected from our representatives in athletics. The fact that the season was not a huge success does not in the least detract from the fine and splendid spirit shown by the 1923 basketball squad. The team fought for every game and great credit is due each member of the squad. To the Coach, C. D. Baker, we pay tribute for the excellent manner in which he handled the squad and for the splendid team turned out from the material available.

Many criticisms have been heard from all sides that the past season was unsuccessful. True, many of the important games were lost, but on the other hand the Allegheny team was forced to face stellar opposition in these contests with a comparatively new team.

The season can not be classed as a successful one, merely because many of the important games with rival institutions were lost, and although the record for the season stands as an even break, none of the important contests are placed on the win column, thus making the season even worse than figures show. However, the team gave its best—some good material was brought out for next year's team—and the season was concluded with an even break.

Another double victory for our debating representatives. This time Allegheny's forensic representatives defeated Washington and Jefferson on the home platform and Wooster at Wooster. It is no small task to defeat Wooster College on their home platform as this institution has stood at the top in the realm of college oratory for many years. This double victory makes the total for the year of four favorable decisions for the Allegheny teams and no defeats. It is a highly creditable record and reflects favorably upon the ability of the personnel of the two teams which have been representing the Gold and Blue during the past month in the debating activity. The past results also infer that the teams have had excellent coaching from the members of the faculty who have given their best to this work. Great credit is due the faculty members who have coached these teams to victory.

It is indeed encouraging and gratifying to note that the varsity debates held in the Chapel recently have had a good representative hearing. As compared with those of the last few years, the audiences have been much larger, and more interest in general has been demonstrated in these forensic contests. Debates have an unusual value in sharpening the mind and have a tendency to stimulate clear and analytical thinking: such thinking as every student should seek to develop and foster.

On Friday evening Allegheny's annual Tri-State Inter-City Basketball tournament will open in the college gymnasium. High School teams from Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Buffalo and Erie will compete for the championship. This tournament is one of the big events of the college year and from which Allegheny receives much publicity and a boost in the realm of athletics. The visiting basketball squads will be here for three days and it falls upon the students of the college to leave with them a lasting impression of the college which will be carried back to their respective high schools. This tournament cannot be successful without the support of the student body—we must turn out to these contests as we attend the collegiate contests.

SEVERAL HARD MEETS ARE ON SCHEDULE

Coach Hammett is determined to make as impressive a showing on the cinder path as the football team has made on the gridiron and the basketball men on the floor. The Allegheny track and field squad has responded to the first call for candidates. The annual indoor meet is scheduled for Saturday. Handsome gold, silver, or bronze medals will be offered to event.

Several weeks ago preparations were started for the outdoor track season. Until weather conditions permit outdoor practice candidates for the team will report at the gymnasium every Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoon at 4:30. The hour from 2:00 to 3:00 every Wednesday is reserved for the shot putters and pole-vaulters. The time from 3:00 to 4:00 on the same day is allotted to the high jumpers and hurdlers. Good hurdlers are scarce, there being but one varsity hurdler remaining from last year's team. Every man with any ability at all in hurdling is urged to come out every Wednesday.

The schedule is the best and hardest ever undertaken by the Blue and Gold. A dual meet with Alfred at home on May 5 opens the season. Geneva with one of the strongest teams in its history will appear here on May 19, and on the following Saturday, May 26, one of the best trips ever taken by the Allegheny track squad will be taken when the team goes to Rochester, N. Dartmouth Students Feel Faculty Discipline

Sixty-six Dismissed and Eighty-six Put on Probation for Failures in Examinations

Hanover, N. H., March 6.—As a result of scholastic deficiency during the first semester of the present college year, 181 students at Dartmouth have been subjected to faculty discipline, sixty-six being separated from college and 115 men placed upon probation for the remainder of the year. Last year fifty-two men were separated and eighty-six placed on probation. For the present year the record of the seniors is unusually good with only four men subject to discipline in a class larger by 100 men any previous senior class in the history of the college. The record of the sophomore class on the other hand, is unusually poor.

Much interest has been shown in the work of the freshman class, the first to enter under the selective process. Of these men thirty were separated, two less than last year's figure which was the lowest record in many years. Exactly as many freshmen as last year, forty-eight, were placed on probation.—New York Post.

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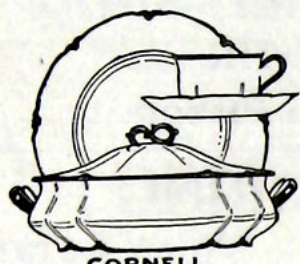

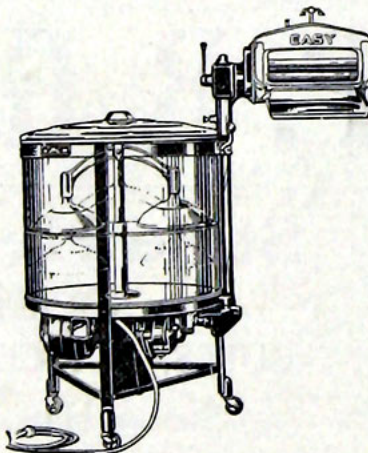

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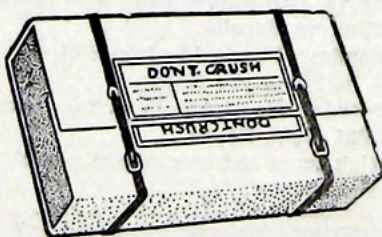
