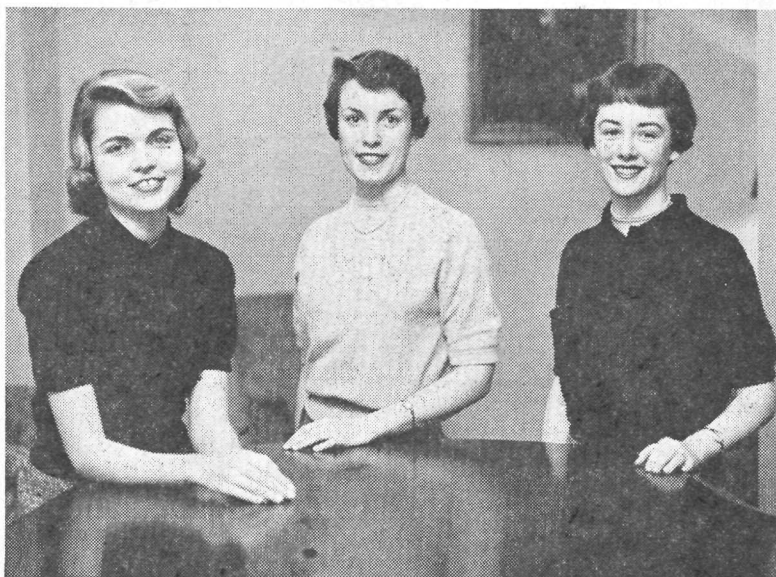
Perrine To Edit "Campus"

Commenting on the future, Ginny said, "I would like to see **The Campus** become a stronger means of communication between the student body, faculty and administration." Singers End Season With Spring Concert

The Allegheny Singers will climax their annual spring tour with a concert at Ford Memorial Chapel Sunday, May 11, at 4:00 p.m. During their tour under the direction of Morten J. Luvaas, professor of music, the choir has traveled nearly 1,000 miles and has presented 10 concerts.

Divided into three groups, the music spans five centuries of development and affords contrast in form and style. Highlights of the program include portions of the motet, "Sing Ye To The Lord," by J. S. Bach. This number is scored for two choirs and is one of the most triumphant and jubilant of the composer's works.

Publications Board Announces Discontinuation Of Magazine

The **Allegheny Magazine** will no longer be published after this semester, the Publications Board announced to ASG Tuesday night.

The announcement was made by Board Chairman Monte Levitt. Monte said that in view of the results of the recent student referendum, the Publications Board, with reluctance, has decided to discontinue the **Allegheny Magazine** and to use the funds for a **Kaldron** and a **Literary Magazine**. Speaking for the Board, Monte expressed regret that the students did not allow the **Allegheny Magazine** an opportunity to prove itself.

The Publications Board also recommended that the budget for **The Campus** be increased to provide for the publishing of **The Campus** every week of the academic year.

In other ASG business, appointments to the Religious Committee were made. Kathy O'Neil, Larry Cunningham and Irv Kerr are the new members. Ex-officio members are Nancy West, Harry Blaney, Barb Gartrell, Dave Ashwell and Meg Ackers.

An NSA Committee proposal that \$400 be allotted for travel expenses this summer was approved by ASG. Proposed by Linda Wilson, the money will be used for room, board and transportation expenses incurred at conferences to be attended by ASG officers. The conferences will all be held at Ohio Wesleyan in Delaware, Ohio. They are: 1) the National Student Congress, to be attended by the ASG president and the three vice-presidents, 2) the Student Body President's Conference, to be attended by Jim Kweder and 3) the Student Editorial Affairs Conference, which will be attended by Ginny Perrine.

Jim Kweder issued a memo to all treasurers or chairmen of organizations receiving funds from ASG. It reads, "If there will be any significant changes in the budget request you are submitting for our consideration next year, please inform us of these changes at once. Otherwise, in drawing up our tentative budget this spring, we will use the same request you submitted last year. Please include reasons you have for changing your request."

A letter appearing in a recent issue of the *Tribune* from a "Disturbed Citizen" can easily be applied to the College Community.

What was the citizen disturbed about?—It was the lack of support by Meadville residents when they were invited to attend the College's Chamber Music Festival.

Why wasn't it supported?, the writer wanted to know. This is the very same question we frequently ask about Allegheny "residents", not only in regard to activities such as the Chamber music Festival, but to the various other College-sponsored events.

Fine opportunities are offered to hear competent professional people present their talents or authority on

subjects of importance to everyone. These events cover a variety of fields from music to politics. Just because they are not humorous or something of that nature does not mean they aren't worthwhile. Cultural activities, too, are an important part of college life and learning, but many times are neglected.

These events are for the benefit of students and other members of the college community. It is just unfortunate that this fact is seldom realized.

Think about it—then perhaps a realization of what values can be obtained from such events will become more obvious and, in turn, lead to more enthusiastic support on the part of more people.

To the Editor:

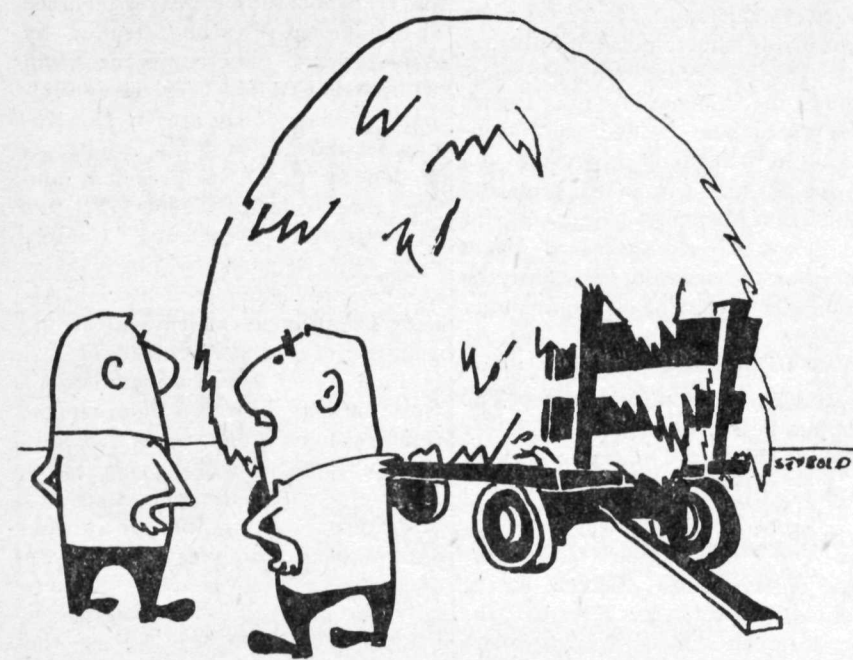
It seems that every time we invite a speaker to Allegheny College whose topic is timely and concerns all of us, we as listeners and audience fail to get the real benefit of such talks. I feel one real benefit that should come from such talks is the one that should come to us not as mere listeners, but rather as direct participants. Yet, time after time, we are deprived of this by being restricted a mere two or three or at best to a relatively few questions.

We all seem to realize how important Mr. Perkin's topic was, and how important past topics have been, but for some reason, we are not given an adequate opportunity to submit questions. Mr. Perkins came to speak, and so he did. The audience came to listen and ask questions, but the latter was severely neglected, for we were not given a decent opportunity to do so. When are we ever going to get the chance, as students and as citizens, to enter into topics with authorities in important fields, if not at such events

as this? What is the good of it all if we are subjected to restrictions on free and adequate inquiry which are essentially restrictions on our democratic way of life? When the opportunity for questions is narrowly restricted, we restrict, in a sense, our democratic heritage, our curiosity, our way of life. We only are citizens while we take an active interest in our country's affairs, and if we are deprived of the desire to find out, then we are deprived of something essential to citizenship.

Perhaps it has always been characteristic of people, that they go searching for "acres of diamonds" far and wide, while overlooking what it is in their back yard. In recent months, the Spartans have started leaders of education, including some at Allegheny, on an analysis of our educational system with view to improve it. It seems to me that the basic organization of the lecture system here stands in obvious need of fundamental reorganization.

Sandwich Man's Rounds Provided Welcome Sight For Hungry Students

A most welcome sight late in the evening during the school week is the sandwich man. For many, he provides that extra bit of nourishment to ward off the pangs of starvation, while for others he represents the temptation of forgetting the diet though it may mean gaining a couple of pounds in the wrong places.

This year's sandwich man is Vernon E. Toulon who succeeded Sam Petrillo, a graduate of last June. Among Toulon's choice of foods are sandwiches of a great variety, milk and different flavors of ice cream.

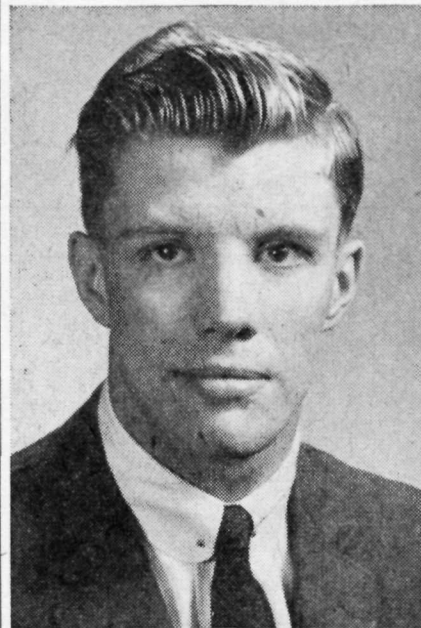
Toulon is a pre-med student at Allegheny who at one time played on the football team until an injury forced him to quit the pastime. The sandwich man, in case any students are thinking of snitching any of his sandwiches, is an ex-marine and a judo expert.

Much time and effort goes into the preparation for Toulon's rounds. Every night from Sunday to Thursday, 150 to 170 sandwiches must be made and wrapped. Mrs. Toulon performs this duty along with Mrs. Marilyn Villa, wife of the football team star. While the two women are spending up to 3 hours doing the preparations, Toulon studies.

At about 9:00 p.m. the sandwich man begins his rounds, with his first stop being Caffisch. Eventually he gets to the other dormitories and all the fraternity houses. By the time he is finished with the routine it is midnight. Toulon has estimated that the entire project requires close to 10 hours per day.

In order to secure the position of Sandwich Man, it was necessary for Toulon to gain approval by the student aid office. By operating as an individual entrepreneur, Toulon must take all the risks that go along with the concession, those mainly being poor buying, losses from spoilage and drop-offs in sales.

Applications For Freshman Seminar Discussion Leaders Due Soon

All students who are interested in becoming discussion leaders in the Freshman Seminar Program are urged to submit application blanks no later than Tuesday, May 13. Applications may be obtained at the C.U. desk or from AUC representative.

The Freshman Seminar Program instituted in the academic year 1956-1957, arose from the following observations about freshman education: Even by the end of their first year, many freshmen found it difficult to understand the learning process and thus were not able to study critically or to analyze facts intelligently; it was observed that freshmen did not see or develop relationships between their studies and their goals (even if the latter were clearly defined.)

As a result of these observations, answers to two vital questions are sought by participants in the program: (1) Why do I hold certain views?, and (2), What influences the formation of my concepts?

The seminar program was conceived by a student and employs upperclassmen as discussion leaders for freshman groups. Through it, student activities are brought into a closer, more constructive, and mutually beneficial relationship with the academic program. Because creative effort on the part of all participants is inherent in the seminar process, the nature of discussion which takes place in such small groups causes the student to take part actively and voluntarily.

The Freshman Seminar Program is, therefore, a program in which freshmen are able to express the ideas and opinions they hold and formulate views on still other subjects in a way that is vital to the creation of an intellectually stimulating atmosphere on a campus as well as beneficial to the participants as students and individuals.

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Allegheny Thinclads Lose To Case; Oppose Westminster Tomorrow

Tomorrow afternoon the Gator linemen will travel to New Wilmington, Pennsylvania, to compete against the "Titans" of Westminster College. The Allegheny track team will be in quest of their second victory of the 1958 season. Coach Harold Burry's "Titans" will prove to be a stiff test for Allegheny's thinclads.

Thus far this season, the team has one victory. The victory was over Thiel and Hiram in a triangular meet while the losses were incurred against Edinboro and Case in dual meets and Western Reserve and Youngstown University in a triangular meet. The dual meet scheduled last Saturday against the "Presidents" from Washington and Jefferson College, was postponed due to inclement weather.

In a meet held last Wednesday at College Field the Gator tracksters bowed to a strong Case team by a score of 93½ to 37½.

In the discus field count a new record was set as Jekkals of Case recorded a distance of 142 feet, 7 inches. The old record, which was set in a tri-state meet, was 135 feet, 4 inches.

Sophomore John Hankins remained undefeated this season by capturing the 880 yard dash. Other Allegheny firsts were registered by Huston, Schneiman, and Greer in

the 2-mile javelin, and pole vault events, respectively.

Lessening Nuclear War Chances Discussed By Perkins In Lecture

This year's speaker for the Sturdevant Lecture, held in the Chapel last Friday evening, was Dexter Perkins, noted author, historian, expert on international affairs, and professor of American civilization at Cornell University. His topic was the lessening of the possibility of a nuclear war among the world powers. The introduction was made by President Pelletier.

According to Dr. Perkins, the maintenance of peace and cooperation in the world today, depends largely on the relationship between the United States and Russia. He listed several characteristics of each nation, such as government and religion, which have led to the disunity which now exists.

He went on to say that the United States is not responsible in most cases for this friction, for we have advanced plans many times since World War II which would have helped alleviate the situation. But in almost every case, the Russian government has either flatly rejected the proposals offered or suggested amendments which made them completely unacceptable to us.

Examples which he gave were the Geneva Summit Conference, demobilization of armies after World War II and the selling of arms to the Egyptian government by Russia.

Dr. Perkins next asked the universal question: "Is there a way out?" Can a solution be found that will be satisfactory to both nations and for the welfare of the whole world? The remainder of his speech dealt with suggested remedies for the problem.

The main possibility discussed was the ending of nuclear tests. In this case both the affirmative and negative points of view are strong. Those in favor of the banning say that there are both biological and physiological dangers involved for man from the radioactive fallout which is a result of these tests. They fear that if the tests are continued, the body will be affected in

such a way that monsters will be born through an increase in mutations and that there will be more cases of leukemia. They also say that with the banning we would save money and gain increased support from our Allies.

Of the people who hold a negative opinion toward the banning, many of them are experts on the subject. According to them, the danger from radioactive fallout is small and they feel that it would be unwise to slow up our technical advances. They also ask, if we do stop tests, will we be ahead or behind Russia's advances and what guarantee do we have that they will keep their word in ceasing the tests.

The other possibility presented, was air inspection among the world powers. Dr. Perkins expressed the feeling that this plan would be ineffective because there are too many ways in which the tests can

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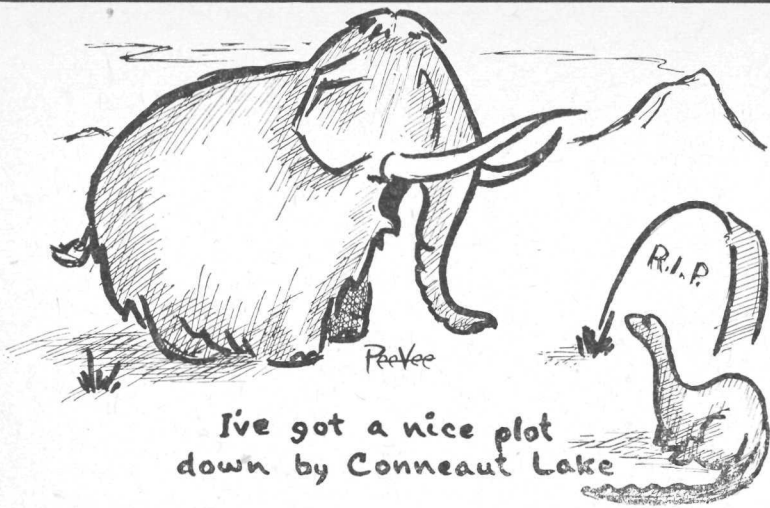

In conclusion, Dr. Perkins stated that the main thing which the United States can do is to recognize that we do have a security problem. He feels that most of the solution lies in Russia itself, because the situation in Russia will change. Even now many of the principles upheld by Lenin and Stalin are being denied and in the satellites, revolts are becoming more common.
