Students to Sing With Seeger

Pete Seeger will sing at the Allegheny College Union on Sunday, October 12, at 8:00 p.m. His recent appearances in New York's Carnegie Hall have played to houses so full that the audience has been forced to overflow onto the stage.

Pete Seeger has in his lifetime done a great deal to assimilate and to spread the popularity of American folk music of other peoples of the world. A master of the five string banjo, as well as of the guitar, Seeger captures his audience with his remarkable voice range and seemingly unlimited repertoire. He has spent time searching the archives of American folk music in the Library of Congress and interviewing original folk singers in discover-

ing and mastering songs of the Negro, South, the pioneering West, the armies and the militant unions. His most recent project is a study with Mrs. Seeger to discover the proper instrumental accompaniment of folk music, for he feels that "to revive folk music to be played exactly as it was meant to be will carry along the genuine feeling of the song and help the audience share it more fully."

Mr. Seeger's national fame has spread a great deal in recent years, with his Carnegie Hall concerts being enthusiastically attended events for a growing New York audience. He has cut over twenty records for Folkway Records and is the author and editor of several books on folk-singing and folksongs.

"Oklahoma", "Gay Nineties" Highlight Homecoming

Production of Oklahoma Involves Much Preparation

The Allegheny College and town production of Oklahoma will be presented in the new Meadville High School Auditorium both tonight and tomorrow night at 8:30 p.m.

Oklahoma was written by Rodgers and Hammerstein in 1943, and has had a continuous run on Broadway for five years, with 2,248 performances. This year marks the fifteenth anniversary of the play opening in New York.

The Meadville production has several difficulties to overcome which were not encountered on Broadway. Since the flats to be used in the four different settings of the play belong to the Park Theater, their height made it impossible for work to be done on them in the set room of the Playshop. Therefore, they had to be painted outdoors and brought in again for storage. Also, the cast involved made the rental of costumes impractical so backstage workers, dancers, and singers contributed their time and talents to manufacturing the 96 costumes needed. Every spare moment during and between rehearsals had to be utilized for this task. Mrs. Graham Bird, drama instructor, supervised both the production of costumes and of scenery.

In charge of other phases of the show are: Frank Benham, choreographer, and Marietta Richards, musical director.

The cast includes both students from the college and town people. The leads are: Curley, George Lang; Will Parker, Rod Anderson; Ado Annie, Rose Ann Tongo; Ali Hoken, David Ottey; Jud Fay, Larry Stainbrook; and Laurey, Lillian Wharton.

McKean To Name Danforth Nominees

Dean J. R. O. McKean has been named the Liaison Officer by President Pelletier to nominate to the Danforth Foundation two or not to exceed three candidates for the 1959 fellowships. An educational foundation located in St. Louis, Missouri, the Danforth Foundation invites applications for the eighth class of Danforth Graduate Fellows from college senior men and recent graduates who are preparing themselves for a career of college teaching, and are planning to enter graduate school in September, 1959, for their first year of graduate study. The foundation welcomes applicants from the areas of Natural and Biological Sciences, Social Sciences, Humanities and all fields of specialization to be found in the undergraduate college.

The appointments are fundamentally "a relationship of encouragement" throughout the years of graduate study, carrying a promise of financial aid within prescribed conditions as there may be need. The maximum annual grant for single Fellows is \$1,400 plus tuition and fees charged to all graduate students; for married Fellows, \$1,900 plus tuition and fees charged to all graduate students with an additional stipend of \$350 for each child. Students with or without financial aid are invited to apply.

The qualifications of the candidates as listed in the announcement from the foundation are: Men of outstanding academic ability, personality congenial to the classroom, integrity and character, including serious inquiry within the Christian tradition.

Two Alleghenians, Jack G. Goelner, '52, and Robert B. Pierce, '56, have held Danforth Fellowships.

All applications, including the recommendations, must be completed by January 31, 1959. Any student wishing further information should get in touch with Liaison Officer, Dean McKean.

Art Contest Opens To Talented Women

Mademoiselle's fifth annual Art Contest is now under way.

The two winners will interpret the two winning stories in the magazine's 1959 College Fiction Contest and will receive \$500 each for publication of their work. The closest runners-up will receive honorable mention and their entries will be kept on file for possible future commissions by Mademoiselle. Winners and honorable mentions will be announced in the August 1959 College issue.

Any woman in college or art school who submits her entries before her twenty-sixth birthday is eligible to compete. No work need be done especially for this contest. Any sample — at least five — that show ability in one or more media will do. Mademoiselle will accept photographs of originals, either color transparencies or black and white glossies. This is not a commercial art contest; Mademoiselle is not looking for fashion illustration or advertising layouts, but for imaginative, original work in whatever medium or style the student works best.

All entries for the contest must be submitted by March 15, 1959 to Art Contest, Mademoiselle, 575 Madison Avenue, New York 22, New York.

Crusade Scholarships Offered By Methodists

The Methodist Church will finance the study of 112 selected men and women from around the world in 39 colleges and universities in 18 states and the District of Columbia during the 1958-59 academic year.

Under the scholarship program, the denomination will pay for the educational expenses of 32 persons from the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and of 80 persons from 26 countries overseas.

In a sense, the Crusade Scholarship program is a training course for the future professional leaders of Methodism, since most of the scholars go into some phase of full time church work when they return to their homeland.

This year the fields of study are varied, including industrial relations, dental surgery, religious journalism, rehabilitation of the deaf and many specialties in the fields of education religion and social work. The Crusade Scholars receive grants for two years (in most cases), the grants

The students here cannot seem to find it within themselves to care about anything, except themselves and their own elite group whether it be a social organization or just close friends or independents. It is hard to believe that when people here speak of "the college community" they can do it with a clear conscious.

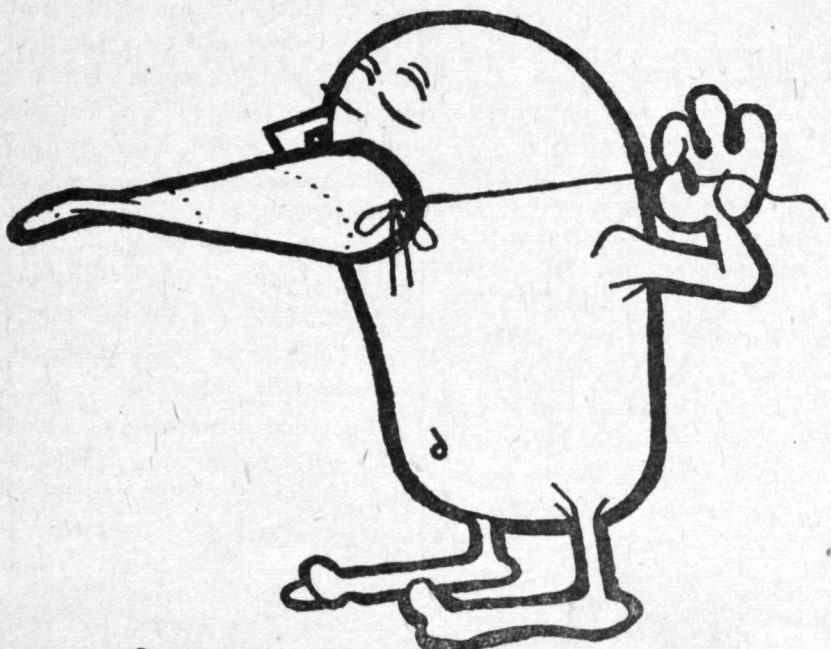

Between four and four-fifteen (the time of meeting being set for four), the honorable court members put in their appearances. Upon this arrival all adjourned to the second floor court room.

The honorable court members sat formally facing those summoned, who were placed at a semi-circle table. The violators then had to state their names and crimes. Next, all the freshmen were ushered into a separate waiting room to wait for their individual trials. While waiting, the criminals discussed the circumstances behind each of their crimes. Plans are in the making to organize further such get-togethers; the objective of any of these functions is to afford an opportunity not only for the men in the group to get to know each other, but for others to get to know them also.

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Student Leaders View Role Of The Campus Christian

What is the responsibility of the Christian on campus? . . . a panel of student leaders: Wilma Harmon, Jim Kweder, and Ted Linn with the assistance of moderator Jack Erickson, grappled with this question on Sunday evening before a group of approximately sixty students who were present at the Allegheny Christian Fellowship meeting.

Wilma Harmon choose the question of the Christian and the social structure on campus. She spoke both as a person who had been rejected by a sorority

group and as a person who now was a member of such a group. She outlined some of the advantages of a sorority . . . mentioning the ideal of love and friendship, development of leadership, and the promotion of personality growth. She stated that there are those who can be hurt and expressed the belief that if the individual has worth in the eyes of a Christian, then selecting is unChristian. But, she added, "no matter what you do, you are selecting." She pointed out that we have occasion to select people in a number of other ways on this campus.

Ted Linn expressed the opinion that though student government may not be meeting the interests of all students, the Christian student has the responsibility to widen his interests. He also felt that the Christian student has an involvement commitment . . . he has the obligation to give what he has to others. He stressed personal worthwhileness and said that "Each one of you must feel that you have a worth which may be given to others." He expressed the belief that a leader need not be a politician but that he need have only two qualities: honesty and sincerity.

"Love thy neighbor as thyself". This was the commandment of Christ that Jim Kweder cited as the basis for action for the Christian student's action beyond the campus. He gave illustration of the ways in which we love ourselves and of the things we take for granted: freedoms of comfort, thought, political belief and to come and go as we please. He then pointed out places where our neighbors lack these freedoms: Africa, Cuba, Algeria, and even Meadville. "Love is not passive," stated Jim, "but it is meaningful only in action." He felt that we have a commitment to our neighbor. He expressed the belief that we must follow the teaching as recorded in Mark 8:34 and sacrifice our time and energy to help our neighbor.

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Chuckran Coaches Football

John R. Chuckran, former coach at Tyrone, Pennsylvania, High School, since 1954, was named football coach here at Allegheny this past June. Coach Chuckran will have full faculty status with the rank of assistant professor, which is the same as the other Allegheny coaches.

Mr. Chuckran was a Penn State half-back in 1944 and '47-49, and was coach at Tyrone High School from 1954-1958. Before that, he coached Lansford and Saxton High Schools, both in Pennsylvania. He is a 1950 graduate of Penn State University. While at Penn State, he made All-State and All-Eastern teams and won All-American Honorable Mention as a half-back. A member of Penn State's team that played a Cotton Bowl tie with Southern Methodist University, he also took part in the North-South Game.

Our coach's college career was interrupted for service in the Army where he had his first experience with coaching. While stationed in Japan and Korea in 1945 and 1946, he coached football, baseball, basketball and boxing.

Mrs. Chuckran is the former Joanne Helben, daughter of a Penn State professor of soil technology. The Chuckrans have two children, Virginia, 8, and Nancy, 5.

Chuckran succeeded William (Red) Moore, who left Allegheny to become line coach at Cornell University. In Red's four years at Allegheny, he succeeded in placing Allegheny football in a much higher plane than that in which he found it in the early '50's. Four of Red's players received national recognition on a number of All-Star teams. The 7-7-2 record of his last two years indicates that there might be hope for the Allegheny elevens of the future. Red was also responsible for introducing wrestling here at Allegheny as an intercollegiate sport. He started the grapplers off to a good two-year start with 7 wins and 1 tie out of the first 16 matches.

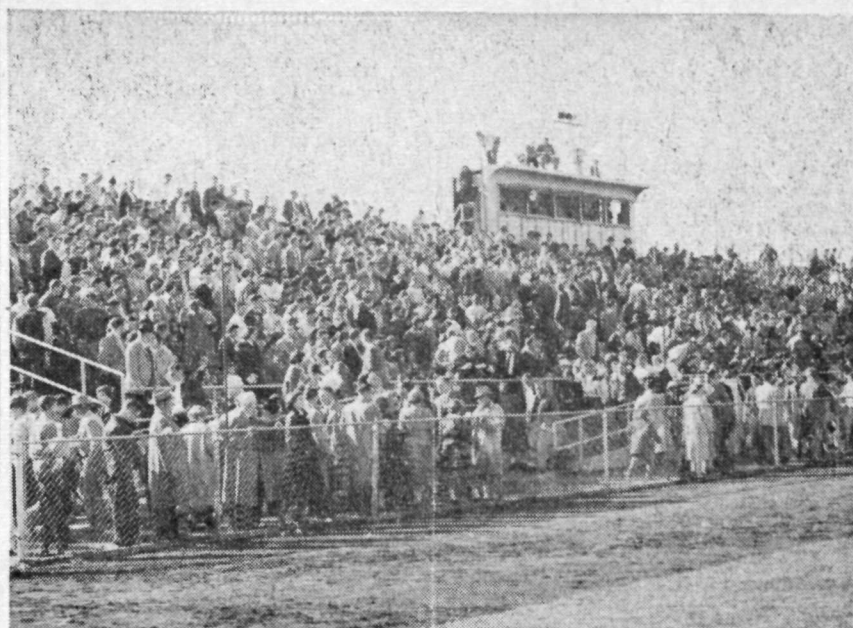

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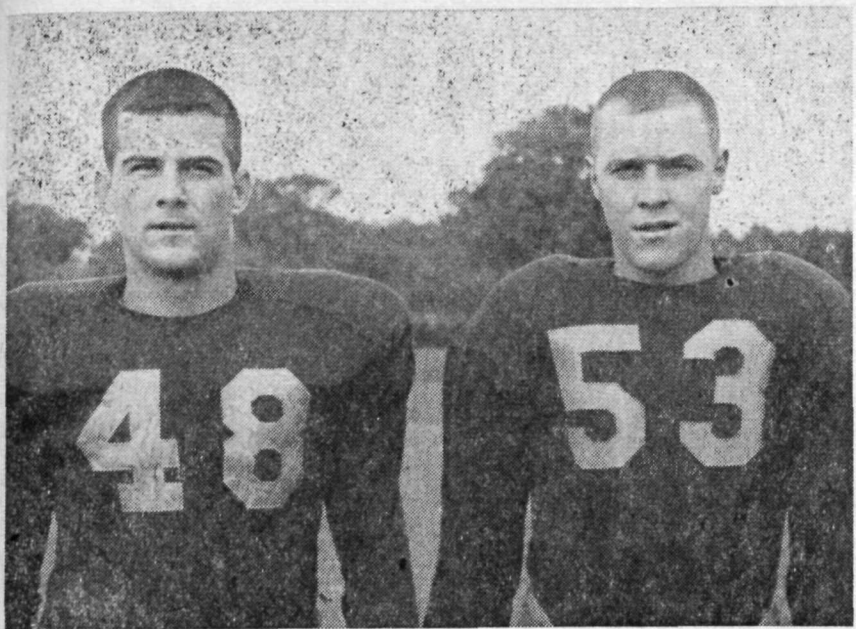

Loans To Students Cover Expenses

One per cent of the nation's colleges and universities account for fifty per cent of all the loans made to students by institutions of higher education. This fact was disclosed in a study made public today by The College Life Insurance Company of America.

Harvard led in the amount loaned in the school year with \$825,000. The University of Michigan, Massachusetts Institute of Technology

their top three men all shooting 46 or better, good for a total of 135 strokes, and 16 intramural points.

Led by a one-two punch featuring McCandless (41), and Hankins (38), the top medalist, the Phi Gams also recorded 135 strokes, and picked up 16 points.

The Independents led the other competitors with 138 strokes for 13 points. The Deltas carded 143, for 11; the Chi Rho, 147 points; the Phi Psi, 148, 7 points; the Theta Chi, 202, 5 points.

and University of Denver followed in that order.

The largest number of loans, 3,621, was made by Michigan State. The University of Texas and University of Florida were next high.

At California State Polytechnic College loans were made to 42% of the students and at the University of Oregon to 38%.

Highest average loan was \$612 at M.I.T. The four year maximum loan varies from \$200 at the University of Colorado to \$3,300 at M.I.T.

These loan activity figures are very significant, according to Mr. John Burkhart, President of College Life. They clearly indicate, he stated, the beginning of a trend away from scholarships, the traditional method of student help.

Scholarships, however, remain the present chief source of funds for students and the figures suggest that they will remain so for a long time to come.

At the University of Chicago, the number of scholarships awarded was equal to 45% of the undergraduate enrollment.

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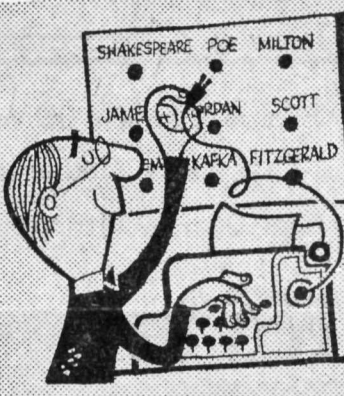

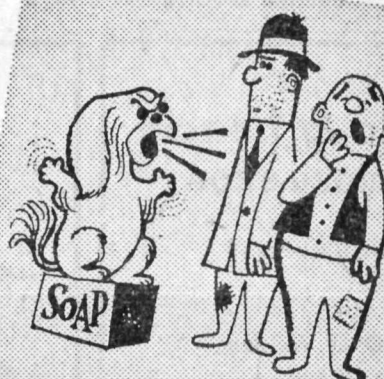
