Wilfred Laurier Husband Presents Illustrated Lecture Here

Wilfred Laurier Husband, noted New York photographer-lecturer, will depict postwar living in his popular film, "How America Lives Today and Tomorrow," tonight at 8 o'clock in the Ford Memorial chapel.

Dr. John E. Cavelti, program chairman, announced that the speaker has already presented this attraction on such programs as The Town hall, New York city; The Lorado Taft Series at the University of Illinois; The Town hall, St. Louis; and at Columbia university.

This timely cine-talk shows not only how America lives at present, including the problem of adequately housing war workers, but gives a glimpse of the postwar homes which are already being blueprinted by public and private enterprise in the great postwar home-building program.

The program is fully illustrated with the speaker's own color motion pictures which he took in many parts of the United States, and shows the work of Frank Lloyd Wright, Norman Bel Geddes, Gropius, Saarinen, and other famous architects and designers.

Wilfred L. Husband has a varied background of business, lecturing, and worldwide travel. Resigning as advertising manager of the original Scribner's Magazine in 1930 to go on a globe-circling assignment, he filmed Gandhi's first civil disobedience campaign in India. Husband has been lecturing since, interspersing this work with extensive visits to the Far East and Europe. His interest in homes and architecture dates from his trips to Sweden and Finland before the war, and since 1937 he has made an intensive study of the housing problem and conditions in the United States.

Stamps required for admission must be obtained at the entrance of the hall. Purchasers will have their choice of turning their stamps in for the scholarship fund to help students called to war who need financial assistance in order to complete their college courses after the war or those buying stamps may keep them.

In charge of decorations is a committee composed of George Cramer, chairman; Warren Ash, Carl Roemer, and Bill Cramer.

A special Block A-sponsored Tag day will be held at this Saturday's game with Oberlin. Proceeds will go to Jim Oram.

Pomeroy Called For WAVE Duty

Allegheny will miss the presence of Miss Anne Pomeroy, who left yesterday for the United States Midshipmen's Reserve Training school at Northampton, Massachusetts. At the completion of a month's training, she will assume her responsibilities as a commissioned ensign in the WAVES.

For the past three years Miss Pomeroy has held the position of reference and circulation librarian in Reis library. In addition to her duties in the library, she has also been a proctor in Hulings hall, Beebe house, and more recently, Cochran hall.

Stamp quota set . . .

Sale of war bonds and stamps to students, faculty, and college organizations was the opening gun of the new War Activities committee, with a goal of \$25,000 set for the year.

A scholarship fund, for Allegheny men leaving school for the armed services and wishing to return at the completion of the war, will be set up from donations of war stamps and bonds sold in the drive. Awarding of the scholarships raised will be in the hands of a faculty committee.

First leg on the quota, will be started Saturday night with the sale of 25c admittance tickets to the Block A dance. Next week these tickets may be exchanged for stamps or donated to the scholarship fund, it was announced by William S. Robertson and Catherine E. Cavelti, co-chairmen of the drive.

All campus organizations, including fraternities and sororities and the faculty, will be contacted at the end of the semester, when their purchases will be counted in the total sold.

Purchase of 25c stamps will be required for admittance to all-college dances, and booths will probably be set up at all athletic contests for the sale of stamps.

Everyone is urged to participate wholeheartedly in the drives, said Robertson and Cavelti. In addition to the sale of stamps at dances and athletic contests, they will be on sale at the bookstore.

Blood bank here soon

All students who wish to contribute blood to the banks now being built up for use by the armed forces will have opportunity to do so when a portable unit arrives in Meadville for this purpose around the middle of this month.

Those students under the age of 21 who wish to donate blood must first obtain their parents' permission on a special slip. These slips may be obtained at Dr. Albert Ogilvie's office on the second floor of Alden hall. Students over 21 do not need their parents' consent but should register at Dr. Ogilvie's office anyhow.

Already, nearly one hundred students have registered as willing to donate a pint of blood and it is hoped that many more will sign up. The blood is for use of the armed forces and in case of air-raid attacks.

For each man a star . .

A service flag, bearing a star for each Allegheny man in the service, will be purchased soon and placed in Ford chapel. The purchase was approved at last Sunday's meeting of the Allegheny Undergraduate council.

A picture of Bentley hall will be sent to former president William P. Tolley, now chancellor of Syracuse university, in token of his ten years' service as president of Allegheny.

Virginia Chester has been named acting secretary of the council, replacing Dorothy Ketcham, who will not return to school until next semester due to illness.

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Rumors

Many and varied are some of the rumors which have been floating around the campus for the past week.

We ran some of them down and found out, as usual, that the great majority of them are unfounded.

Some of the rumors that we heard and that we hunted down are as follows:

1. The rumor that Allegheny will be forced to close in a few months.

It seems that this rumor originated from the meeting of the Association of American colleges in Philadelphia last week, which was attended by Dr. Horace T. Lavelly. Discussion at the meeting, as can be seen by the article located elsewhere in this issue, centered on the subject of establishing enlisted training corps of the Army and Navy in certain selected American colleges and universities. Selection of these colleges has not yet been made.

Chances are good, according to the best authority, that Allegheny, even if not approved for such training, will be able to carry on for several years because one-half of the student body is made up of women, the Navy plan will continue, and many seniors are deferred for occupational reasons.

2. The rumor that all men in enlisted reserve corps of all branches will be called out of school for active duty before the end of the semester.

This is another rumor that has no basis in fact. The fact of the matter is that no decision has been reached by high Army and Navy officials—at least no decision that has been made known to the general public or to school officials, who would be the first to be notified if such were the case.

It can be fairly safe to say, according to present indications, that all men in reserves will be able to finish out this semester at least, and probably will be able to remain until June. Nothing is known about what will happen after June. An announcement can be expected after the passage of the 18-19 age draft bill.

3. The rumor that all students who cut too many classes will be dropped without warning.

This is another rumor, which comes from a distortion of fact, instead of being basically unsound.

The situation is that any student who takes too many cuts will be called in to the dean's office and warned and a warning will be sent to his parents. If the student continues to cut excessively, he will be dropped with a failing grade in the course.

The number of cuts which shall be considered excessive depends entirely on the individual instructor. Students who intend to cut frequently should see their instructors and find out how many cuts are allowed.

4. The rumor that all instructors are cracking down on students to an extreme in order to keep their noses to the grindstone.

This rumor is true in a few instances, as in one case where an instructor has given five quizzes in as many classes, but a survey of the situation reveals that this is the exception and not the rule.

We hope that this brief recital of unfounded rumors will cause Alleghenians to pause and think before they pass on other such rumors which continue to appear constantly on the campus.

If anything concerning the Army or Navy reserves comes up, Dr. Schultz and Dr. Lavelly have promised that the students shall be the first to know of it.

FROM ENGLAND

October 22, 1942

Dear Hank: Received your wonderful letter today and thought I would take advantage of some leisure moments to answer it immediately. . . .

It is news like this that makes me want to be back there at the house. What I wouldn't give to have the half year that I have coming to me. . . .

I was certainly sorry to hear that Dr. Tolley had resigned. You didn't tell me why but my guess is that he's gone into the service. I will always admire that man because I think he did a wonderful job while at Allegheny.

I certainly enjoy my new position. It involves so darn much that it is actually interesting. I am doing everything from censoring to intelligence work. Actually the job covers anything connected with operations. Being the junior officer in charge of S-2 and S-3, I think that you can see that I have to really step to keep up to my two senior officers, one of whom is a West Point man. I have actually done more studying in the last four months than I did in my three years at Allegheny. I sure will be glad when we get into some real action so I can find out if I am any good.

I don't think that I will have to go into any lengthy discussion about the beauty of England. It is really everything that any literature ever said about it. Since being here, I have managed to cover a major portion of the isle. It is truly one of the most beautiful and interesting places that I have ever been in. I sure hope that you get a chance to come over here before this mess is over, Hank. . . .

Each course consists of eight weeks of instruction which is designed to give these men the background for the knowledge that they will need under actual fighting conditions.

Campus Training Advised

Action Taken By Representatives Of Colleges

Foundation of many ugly rumors on the Allegheny campus this week was the meeting of the Association of American colleges in Philadelphia last week, at which the association voted the establishment of an Enlisted Training corps in colleges and universities to utilize the institutions of higher education after the passage of the 18-19 draft age bill.

500 college presidents and deans, representing every section of the country, discussed means of cooperating to the best advantage with the Army and Navy. Dr. Horace Lavelly represented Allegheny at the meeting.

Substance of the plan is the formation of training corps in the Army, Navy, Marine corps, and Coast Guard, to be located at approved institutions. The corps will be open to high school graduates and others of equivalent education, 17 years of age or over, who meet competitive standards, based on quotas established by the armed forces.

The plan recommends that inducted men from army camps and navy centers be given a 14-week course of basic training at selected colleges and universities.

It is further recommended that enlisted candidates pursue a year-round course of study, four semesters in length, agreed on by the proper military and institutional authorities. Enlisted men would receive base pay and subsistence while attending these approved colleges.

W.A.A. Sponsors Square Dance

The W. A. A. also announces that the gym will be open every night from 7:00 to 10:00 for dancing, bridge, and other recreational activities. A member of the association will be present every night to teach the rules of shuffleboard and ping pong. All students are urged to come.

M. U. C. Limits Summer Rushing

No organized freshman rushing during the summer was the decision of the Men's Undergraduate council at its weekly meeting Sunday night.

Freshman men will not be allowed in any fraternity house during that time, nor are they to be entertained by any fraternity members. Upperclassmen are not permitted in freshman dormitories during the summer months. Neither are they to talk to freshmen at any time during freshman week.

Any fraternity violating these rules will be subject to a \$100 fine payable to M. U. C. 10 days from the date of conviction, otherwise social privileges will be revoked for one year. At the end of that time, if the fine is not paid, the fraternity will lose its rushing privileges.

The M. U. C. also decided that when a freshman writes his name on a fraternity's acceptance card, he is considered a pledge of that fraternity. If he changes his mind, he must wait two months before he is once again eligible for pledge-ship.

Upperclass non-fraternity men are eligible for rushing any time. A quiet period at the end of rush week will be enforced from Saturday midnight till Monday at 3:00 p. m., at which time the acceptance cards will be distributed to fraternities. In the case of unpledged freshmen, the quiet period will extend to Monday midnight.

These suggestions were submitted to the M. U. C. by a committee composed of Robert Owen, Bill Price, and Warren Winkler.

Candidates Report For Basketball; Outlook Bright

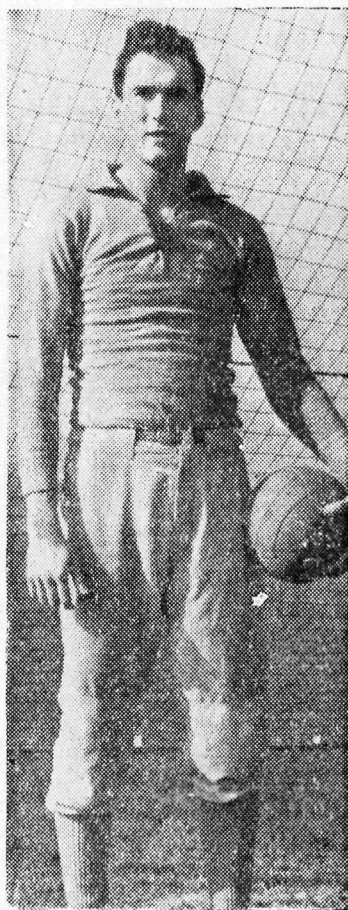

Plays Last Game

One sad note from the Gator camp concerns the fact that freshman Bob Ende will not be in action Saturday. The speedy half-back received a dislocated vertebrae and slight brain concussion in the Rochester engagement. Nate Edelblute and Bob Snyder, also injured last Saturday at Rochester, may not be able to get into action against the Oberlin invaders.

As expected, Rochester's juggernaut rolled over the Gators, 41-0, last Saturday. Held to 13 points in the first half by the sterling Allegheny line play, the Rivermen unleashed their power in the third and fourth quarters to coast to an easy win.

Jim Secrest, leading collegiate scorer in the East increased his season's total to 78 points by tallying four touchdowns. Besides Secrest, Coach Bud DeGroot threw a well-balanced team into the fray, aided by adequate reserve strength at all positions. The fighting Allegheny spirit was best symbolized by Doc August, Buck Newson, and Bob Leuthner on the line, while Weller, Ende, and Kapusta stood out in the backfield.

Allegheny took the first kickoff and moved to the Rochester 47 before Secrest intercepted a Gator pass. The clever halfback raced to the Allegheny 39 before being downed. Menegazzi passed to "Moose" Kramer for 12 yards, after which Secrest cut through tackle for 27 yards and the first score.

Late in the first quarter Menegazzi recovered a Gator fumble on the Allegheny 31. Kramer completed a pass to Secrest to the 10. Allegheny held for three downs, but on the final try, Secrest ploughed over for the final score of the first half.

Russ Svec blocked a Rochester punt in the second period, Allegheny recovering on the Rivermen's 12. Here the Rochester class showed itself as they stopped the Gators cold.

The half time gun prevented an Allegheny score after Falck had intercepted a pass and lateraled to Pierce, who carried it to the 14. Time ran out with the ball on the Rochester 5, two plays later, ending Allegheny's most serious threat.

The second half found Allegheny battling futilely against the superior Rochester eleven. Two touchdowns were racked up in both the third and fourth quarters. In the final period both coaches cleared the benches, giving all the substitutes a chance to show their goods.

Well, well, well!!! Finally Allegheny is taking an interest in things. 200 students attended a meeting a week ago Tuesday to see what they could do about the war effort. 100 signed with Doc Ogilvie to donate a pint of blood to the Red Cross blood bank. Others are ready to knit, write, etc. It's a very heartening improvement—a step out of our hitherto lethargic status. We're beginning to realize there's a war being fought for us, by the people we used to associate with; we owe them our fullest support. More than just talk, which is what this is. But talk doesn't do any harm.

Incidentally, the latest dope on the future of colleges like Allegheny can be seen in the story on the meeting of the Association of American Colleges last week in this issue. Our course is quite obvious: stick at it while we can; get all we can out of Allegheny; then give all we've got to democracy or whatever it is we're fighting for. Whatever it is, we know it's right. We know it's a million times better than fascism, in spite of all the things we can see that are wrong in our government and our democratic system. Meanwhile our guns are right here at Allegheny: let's stick by them.

Now we present our regular weekly plug. Last week, the GAY GATOR. This week, the LOGOS, which is an organization to foster creative writing by Allegheny students. The organization has undertaken, as a means to further justify its existence, the publication of a pamphlet to be sent to Alleghenians in the service. It will contain original pieces of prose and poetry, jokes, satires, etc., all with a definite relationship to the college. Anyone willing to do creative writing along any lines is urged to attend the next meeting this Sunday at 2:30 in room 14 of Arter hall. Freshmen particularly invited.

In war-time, college life is abnormal. It's hard to find time to do things you know you ought to do. Often you can't even get time to do the things you really want to do, the things which are really important. Sororities and fraternities take too much time. Activities of limited value take endless hours of time—time which should be spent on studies, in the library, or time which should be spent in thinking. Allegheny's schedule should be slowed down. The idea of speeding up courses to keep up with the war is OK, probably essential. Teachers are cracking down: more quizzes, longer assignments, fewer cuts allowed. Maybe this is necessary too. But it's only logical then that other things must slow down proportionately. And they're not. Look at the social calendar, and the schedule of every activity on the campus. More rehearsals, more meetings—it looks like we're headed for a collective nervous breakdown. Not that I expect anything to be done about it.

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Library Exhibits Portrait Drawings

Allegheny's art department under the direction of Dr. Julius Miller has placed a group of 30 portrait drawings, which have been brought from the department of fine arts of the University of Pittsburgh, on display in the Reis Memorial library. This is the second in the series of art exhibits which will continue through the semester.

Among these charcoal, pastel, pen and ink drawings are reproductions of portraits from the folios of the Albertine and Uffizi museums. The exhibit shows the treatments of the portrait in France, Italy, Germany, England, and the Netherlands, from the 15th through the 19th centuries. Many famous portraits, including Ingres' drawing of the violinist Paganini, and also drawings by Renoir, Rubens, Da Vinci, Raphael, Degas, and Van Dyke are exhibited.

The art department plans to continue this display every two weeks during the semester.

Last Semester Fraternity Grades

Kappa Kappa Gamma and Theta Chi led the fraternities and sororities scholastically in the semester ending last May, with averages of 2.08 and 2.27 respectively.

The other fraternities ranged as follows: Phi Delta Theta, 2.37; Alpha Chi Rho, 2.49; Phi Gamma Delta, 2.57; Phi Kappa Psi, 2.58; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 2.72; and Delta Tau Delta, 2.80. The other sororities' ratings were: Theta Upsilon, 2.11; Alpha Gamma Delta, 2.20; Alpha Xi Delta, 2.25; Kappa Alpha Theta, 2.29; Alpha Chi Omega, 2.36.

The semester's average for non-fraternity men was 2.47, while that for fraternity men was 2.61. Sororities averaged 2.17 in comparison with non-sororities' 2.19. Average for freshmen women was 2.43. Standings for all women was 2.28 and for all men 2.54.
