"Friends, Alleghenians, countrymen! Lend me thy voices!" That would be the plea of a modern Mark Anthony if he wandered into an Allegheny chapel service when the hymns were being sung. He would see our fine, upstanding American youths crouching in their seats in the back rows unobservant from the platform. He would see an embarrassed flush on the countenance of the conscientious soul who was singing a veritable solo in the sixth row when he suddenly heard his voice issuing alone and piercing in a terrible, humiliating, sour G. He would see Sally and Betty starting the weekly letter home. And then he would notice the boredom on the faces of those who respectfully stood, but who refrained from joining in the song.

This is not a subject to be treated by a pessimist. He would probably shrug his shoulders and add another black mark in his book of the "Demerits of College Students." Pessimists are like that. As an Allegheny professor has remarked, "An optimist is one who sees the doughnut. A pessimist merely sees the hole." This is a problem for those who see the doughnut.

In the first place, we must remember that the students do not fail to sing because they do not like music. Chapels led by Professor Luvaas have proved the contrary as have the popularity of the interfraternity sings. Students like music, and they respond quickly to that hearty unity which group singing creates.

One of the faults lies in the selection of hymns. It is not necessary to use familiar hymns, because groups soon find themselves in ruts after repeated singing of "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Rock of Ages". It is desirable, however, to select singable hymns with good voice ranges and the beautiful melodies which are not at all rare in hymns. It might be suggested that Professor Luvaas or his assistants, well acquainted with the qualities of the human voice, closely supervise the selection of songs.

The most glaring deficiency, however, is the lack of a leader. It does not seem desirable to further absorb the energies of our music department head by the direction of hymns thrice weekly. This problem might well be handled by the new student government body in the appointment of a student song leader.

So, Alleghenians, lend us thy voices—and let us hear your A's!

Trustees Grant

Leave Of Absence

To Four Professors

Of the business transacted by the Board of Trustees at the Spring meeting Monday, that of most interest to Allegheny students is that of granting four faculty members sabbatic leave of absence. Those granted leave include Dr. Chester A. Darling, Dr. Paul H. Giddens, Prof. Horace T. Lavelly and Prof. Henry F. Boettcher. All leaves were for the first semester with the exception of Mr. Boettcher's.

Dr. Darling will spend his time traveling in the West and working at the University of California and Scripps Institute of Oceanography on the identification of bacteria brought back by the Byrd Antarctic Expedition II. He also plans to do some writing.

Writing and research will be carried out by Dr. Giddens. He will do his work in connection with a History of Oil Creek being prepared under the direction of Miss Ida M. Tarbell, '80.

Prof. Lavelly expects to be in residence in the Graduate School of Boston University as a candidate for his doctor's degree.

Because a member of the faculty of the Yale School of Drama will be on sabbatic leave next year that school has requested the services of Prof. Boettcher for all of next year. Mr. Boettcher will return to Allegheny in the fall of 1937.

Other business of the meeting included the acknowledgment of gifts and bequests amounting to more than \$25,000. Included in this sum was a gift to improve Ruter Hall and to make possible the construction of the Outing Club cabin at Bousson Camp.

Sarah Homer Essay

Contest Deadline Friday

Students are again reminded that the contest for the Sarah Homer Prize Essay closes this Friday, April 3.

An award of \$25, made at Commencement, will be given to the undergraduate who writes the best essay on any subject of his own choice, whether formal or informal, and not less than one thousand words. "The essay shall not be merely a restatement of derivative materials upon a general subject in which the undergraduate is only mildly interested and generally informed."

Three typewritten manuscripts must be delivered at the Registrar's office on April 3. The essayist will use a pseudonym, placing his own name in a sealed envelope, upon which is written his pseudonym.

If there is no essay worthy of the award, the Department of English has the privilege of making no award.

Allegheny's men debaters started on their Eastern Trip yesterday, meeting the representatives of the University of Pittsburgh last night, University of West Virginia today, Saint Francis College Thursday, Juniata College Friday, and Gettysburg College on Saturday.

Robert Dennis, William Hyde, and Arthur Vangeli are making the trip, which will end with an Alumni Banquet in Washington, D. C., where they will speak on "Student Life at Allegheny".

Edward Carney, Mischel George, and Arthur Vangeli met the Rutgers University debaters last Monday. Their opponents were men very prominent on their own campus. John Keating is President of the Student Council; President of Cap and Scull, senior honorary society; and Major in ROTC; as well as being active in football, wrestling, and the crew. Paul Schmidtchen is equally well known with the titles of president of the honorary literary society, vice-president of the honorary dramatics society, secretary of the Interfraternity Council, as well as being active in the college newspaper, literary magazine, ROTC, football, and fencing. Debaters from Shippensburg Teachers College will meet George Thornton and Delbert Jolley tomorrow in the Lounge of Cochran Hall. The visitors are arriving here from Westminster College and will proceed to Geneva College on Friday.

Chemistry Instructor Gives Talk In Library Sunday

"What is a 'fine' book?" constituted the main theme of Mr. Martin Howe's discussion of contemporary fine books, delivered Sunday afternoon, March 29 in the Quill Club room of the Reis Library.

As Mr. Howe pointed out, fineness represents not a degree of excellence but a quality distinguishing certain books and pieces of printing. A fine book may be judged by three standards: dimensional (size and proportion), tectonic (plan and construction), and visual (appearance). In fine books, large and small, the thickness should bear an agreeable relation to its height and width.

In regard to the plan and construction of a book, Mr. Howe pointed out the qualities to be looked for in the binding, the texture of the paper, and the character of the impression of the type on the paper. In discussing the visual aspects, he emphasized the desirability of well portioned pages and illustrations.

After the talk the audience adjourned to the exhibit room where there were on display almost sixty volumes from Mr. Howe's library as well as examples of hand-made paper and samples of binding materials. Thirty-five of the books on display are from the "Fifty Books" shows of the past six years, which are chosen by the American Institute of Graphic Arts.

Among the outstanding books in the exhibit are The Voyage and Travail of Sir John Mandeville, a volume bound in oak and decorated with hand illuminated letters; Dante's Inferno, bound in brown leather and illustrated with reproductions of William Blake's copperplate engravings in their original size; Voltaire's Candide, illustrated by Rockwell Kent; a pair of companion books, Alice in Wonderland and Through the Looking Glass, both autographed by Alice Hargreaves, the original "Alice", one bound in red leather, the other in blue, and both tooled in gold.

The exhibit will be at the Library until April 6.

SIGS TAKE FOUR OF FIVE BOXING TITLES.

Taking four out of the five championships the Sigs walked off with the intramural boxing championship last Friday evening. The only championship they failed to take was the 118 pound class in which they had no one entered. The Phi Gams proved to be equally as strong in wrestling, taking three of the six championships.

Outstanding in the wrestling matches of the evening was the Strick-Settembrino match for the 126 pound title. It was one of the two matches to be won in an overtime period. After much pulling and hauling, in which first one man had the distinct advantage and then the other, Strick came away with the decision. However, the match was so even that the decision could have been called a draw without harming either contestant.

The most spectacular match was the Linn-Sterling match in which Sterling eked out a very close decision. From the start the boys seemed to have it in for each other and were insistent upon butting one another out of the ring.

In the boxing bouts the Shields-Ober bout was outstanding. Both boys fought well and displayed some clever boxing.

Crawford, who had boxed well throughout the eliminations showed his best form in winning over Gilmore for the 135 pound title; he was by far the most improved boxer of the tournament.

In the final summary including points won in the qualifying rounds, the Sigs amassed 34 points to take the boxing crown, against 15 for the Phi Psis, 11 for the Deltas, six for the Phi Gams, three for the Chi Rhos, and two each for the Independents and the Phi Deltas. In the wrestling tournament the Phi Gams took the championship with 39 points, followed by the Deltas with 16, the Phi Psis with 13, the Independents with 10, the Sigs with nine, the Phi Deltas with five, and the Chi Rhos with 0.

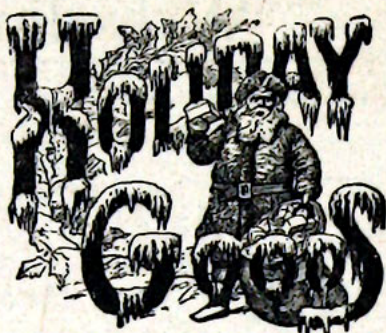

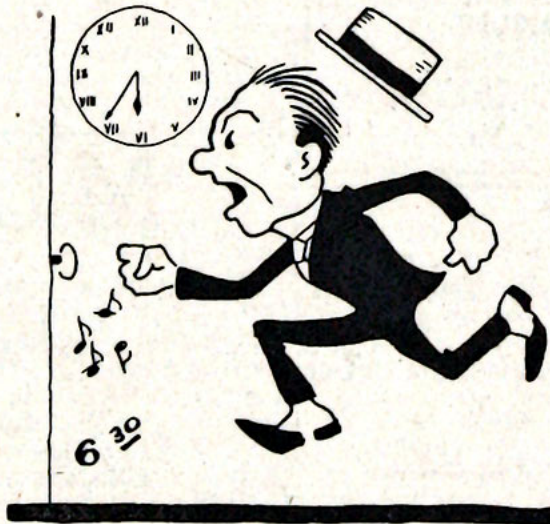
