Chapel Choir To Give Program On Erie TV

The Chapel Choir will travel to Erie to present two programs of sacred music on Sunday, March 5. The first will be its sixth annual appearance on WICU-TV's "Your Church" program; the second will be a concert at Kingsley Methodist Church.

A varied repertoire of sacred music will be offered, including high spirited compositions and songs of a more deep and quiet mood. Styles ranging from plainsong to the contemporary will be represented through compositions by Josquin des Pres, Tallis, Victoria, Brahms, Tschernschoff, Gustav Holst, and Luvaas.

Besides their director, Professor W. S. Wright North, the Choir will also be accompanied by the Rev. Charles B. Ketcham and Mrs. Margaret W. Freeman, organist. Dr. Ketcham will be participating in the evening program.

Pettigrew To Speak On Segregation Issue

In an attempt to answer a number of demands from both students and professors to learn more about the segregation situation in the United States, the College Union and International Relations Club, in a joint effort, have invited an authority to visit and talk on the subject. Dr. Thomas F. Pettigrew, Assistant Professor of Social Psychology at Harvard, will give a formal address—**Desegregation: the Social Science Perspective**—Monday, March 16, at 8:30 p.m. in Ford Chapel.

Dr. Pettigrew, a native of Richmond, Virginia, spent some time as a research assistant at the Institute for Social Research of the University of Natal, Union of South Africa. He has made an extensive study of the problem of racial discrimination in both the U.S. and Africa.

In addition to the formal address on Monday evening, Dr. Pettigrew will be available for questions during a 4:00 Coffee Hour in the North Lounge of the CU on the same day.

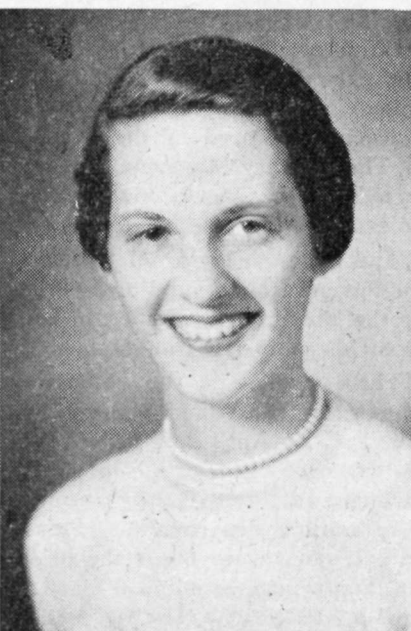
Children's Theater To Present 'Rapunzel'

Carnival time is synonymous with fun. But, it also means fun with a purpose, raising money for the Fund Drive.

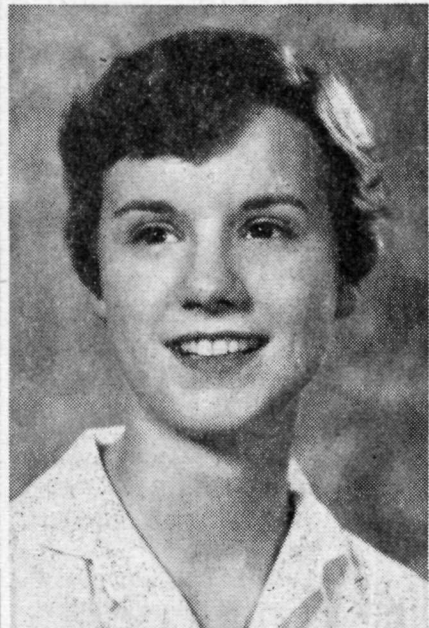

To the Editor:

This letter has three purposes. The first is to compliment the author of "Hardened . . . Spoon-Fed . . . Belonger" for his urbane, pungent, and accurate comment on the epistolary efforts of Messrs. Hemphill and Ross.

The second is to point out to Messrs. Hemphill and Ross, the caliber of whose letters suggests that they are probably too unintellectual to understand the poem, that apparently a very desirable "Thing to Do" for them would be to become acquainted with what they criticize before doing so. For instance, casual study of last semester's Dean's List will reveal 149 names; minute examination of it will not reveal theirs. Moreover, such study will reveal that, discounting freshmen who were not eligible for fraternity or sorority membership last semester, nearly three-quarters (76 out of 110) of the students listed are members of such "apathy-sponsoring" groups. Study of the Registrar's Report of group averages for last semester will further reveal that eight out of twelve such "sloth organizations" registered cumulative averages for their total memberships which were above the All College Average. But where were Messrs. Hemphill and Ross? It is an ancient and accepted adage that only those who are without sin are entitled to throw stones.

My third purpose is to suggest that if the confusion which Messrs. Hemphill and Ross admit is so monumental that they cannot comprehend the significance of these comparisons, their second alternative would be to withdraw quietly from this intellectual atmosphere which they obviously find so uncongenial. If they decide to remain it is to be hoped that they may develop sufficient manly courtesy to spare this working community any more of their ill-begotten gibberish — at least until each has fed at the spoon with sufficient industry to achieve a 90 average.

Music Of Four Foreign Countries To Be Offered In CU Next Week

An opportunity to hear music from four foreign countries will be offered this week. Each afternoon, except Thursday, the Modern Language Department will sponsor a program or records, devoting an hour to the music of Spain, France, Germany and Russia. The program will take place in the North Lounge of the C.U., and will be heard from 4:00 to 5:00 p.m. The C.U. Board, working in connection with the language department, will serve coffee.

All of the afternoon programs have been planned by students with the faculty members of the department serving as co-ordinators. The wide range of these programs is to be limited only to native composers, with a great variety of music planned for each hour.

Monday, Patricia Stotler will introduce the music of Spain. She will speak briefly about the records and play the following selections: Rodrigo's "Homenaje a la Tempranica", "Seguidillas" by Iturbi, "Triana" and "El Albaicin" by Albeniz, "Danza del Fuego" from *El Amor Brujo* and selections from "Sombrero de Tres Picos" by De Falla. Two guitar solos played by Segovia will also be featured. They are "Lo Mestre" by Llobet and two studies by Villa Lobos.

Opening Tuesday's program with Mike Bavar will be the French National Anthem, "La Marseillaise". This will be followed by "Le Tombeau de Couperin", an excerpt from Ravel's *Le Rigaudon*. Two selections from Debussy, "L'après-midi d'un faune" and the "Letter Scene" from *Pelleas* will be featured, as will "Gavotte" from *Manon* by

Massenet, "Bacchanale" from *Samson et Dalilah* by Saint-Saens, and selections from the music of Offenbach. There will be a recording of Lily Pons singing the "Bell Song" from the opera *Lakme* by Delibes and "Je Suis Tatana" by Thomas.

Wednesday's music will be devoted to Germany. Mrs. Dagmar North and Charlotte Rider have planned selections from Karl Orff's *Carmina Burana*, Bach's "Orchestral Suite" and "Kom Jesus Kom" with the Robert Shaw Chorale. The Robert Shaw group will also be heard in *Zum Schluss* by Brahms, and Kathleen Ferrier will sing his *Sapphishe Ode*. Selections from Handel will follow the Obernkirchen Children's Choir. The afternoon will be concluded with some of the famous German drinking songs.

Russian tea will be served from Miss Ludwig's authentic Russian samovar on Friday. Rita Kopanic has chosen the music which will consist of three Russian folk songs: "A Birch-tree in a field did stand", "Kalinka", and "Gypsies are Traveling". Others on the program will be: a Mazurka from Khatchaturian's *Masquerade Suite*; Tchaikovsky's *Piano Concerto No. 1* and Waltz from Act I of *Swan Lake*; and Mussorgsky's "Farwell, Prayer, and Death" from Boris Godunov and "The Great Gate at Kiev" from *Pictures at an Exhibition*.

This week of music is one of a series of activities sponsored by groups within the Modern Language Department. Others include the exhibits in the library which have been seen in the past and the foreign language films.

Mr. Omori compared Japanese dating customs before and after the war. Before the war, said Mr. Omori, "arranged marriages" were customary under the strict feudal system then in affect. A civil law provided that no one could get married without parental approval.

Under that system, parents screened qualification of eligible young men and women sent out by parents and relatives. The person for whom a future mate was being selected was able to pick from the photos of those who were eligible. Meetings between the couple were planned by the families if conditions were favorable.

After the war, the system changed completely and parents had a smaller role in "hunting for mates" explained Mr. Omori. Now young men and women may choose whom they like. However, he added, "free marriage" is still not deeply rooted.

A compromise system was thought most appropriate by Mr. Omori. The first meeting is still arranged by parents after family background, education and other factors have been checked. With consent of both parties, the couple can keep on dating.

Law in Pakistan provides that two witnesses must make sure the couple is willing to get married. One witness goes to the girl and asks, "Are you willing to marry (whomever the person may be)?" then the boy is asked the same question. They both must answer yes three times; one "no" and two "yeses" don't count, said Mr. Alam. The marriage certificate includes their replies.

Concerning "blind marriages," Mr. Alam stated that most of them are happy marriages and a success sociologically. "The test is in the results, he said. "If the results aren't good, then you try something else."

American Economics Discussed By Lewis

Economics by Admonition was the topic of a lecture given by economist Ben William Lewis last Wednesday evening. Basically, his thesis was that the entire American economy is governed by the admonitions of governmental experts. "... When we study economics today we are studying political economy—the economic life of the nation and what we can do about it—collectively."

He defined political economy as a set of man-made devices to gain means by which we can enhance our economy. These devices, or controls, must be developed by society, for every economic system involves some sort of control by society over individuals. The goal of economy points the way for types and amounts of controls, but these must be exercised by the society. This control represents the application of socially-sanctioned power, and the individual cannot render his own economizing devices in the name of society as a whole.

Although our American way of thinking is based upon personal liberties and free trade forms the core of our economic policies, this core needs some modifications. These modifications are effected by our political machinery so that our complete economic picture is composed of the competitive individual limited by collectivism—which does exist in every society—supported by the people through politics.

Thus it follows, according to Mr. Lewis, that the individual should seek profit in his own way. The controls of society will be sufficient to prevent an imbalance, and the higher wages demanded by workers, for example, serve to raise the standard of living and balance the economic scales. Guides Needed At Moscow Exhibit

The U.S. National Student Association has been offered the opportunity to nominate guides for the American National Exhibition in Moscow this summer. This exhibition, which will be held in Solkolniki Park, Moscow, for six weeks during the summer, is the result of an agreement between the governments of the United States and the Soviet Union to exchange exhibits accenting culture, technology, and science. A Soviet fair will be held in the New York Coliseum.

Sixty to seventy-five guides will be required for the American Exhibit. Applicants for positions as guides may be at a graduate or under-graduate level and must have a fluent (able to discuss fairly abstract ideas freely) knowledge of the Russian language. It is important, also, that prospective guides be aware of current international affairs and that they be able to discuss American social, political, and economic issues.

Guides for the fair should be available from June 20 through September, 1959. Transportation will be provided by the Office of the American National Exhibition in Moscow. Payment will be \$16.00 per day, from which guides must pay for their own room, board, and expenses; these charges will be quite small.

Application forms may be acquired by writing to International Commission, USNSA, 142 Mount Auburn Street, Cambridge 38, Massachusetts. All applications must be received by March 20; any received after this date will not be considered.

Fellowships Available For Canadian Study

Five fellowships for study in Canada during the academic year 1959-1960 are being offered by the Canada Council for the encouragement of the arts, humanities, and social sciences.

Interested applicants may obtain the necessary forms from Fulbright Adviser, Dr. Wayne R. Merrick, Quigley 113. Applications must be submitted to Dr. Merrick by April 13, 1959.

These awards are offered to artists, scholars, musicians, and teachers of the arts who wish to work toward a master's degree or the equivalent standing in the arts, humanities, and social sciences. They will pay \$2000 plus round-trip travel to one of the Canadian universities. Awards may be renewable for a second year upon evidence of satisfactory work.

Preference will be given to those under 35 years of age. Students who wish to study at a French-speaking institution must have a good knowledge of French.

Final selections will be made by the Canada Council in Ottawa.

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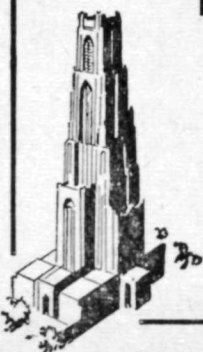

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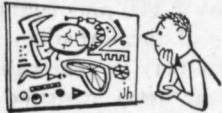
