My dear Judge Iglehart:-

I have recently been in Spencer County, Indiana, looking up material on the period when Lincoln lived in that country. I tried in Evansville to see you, but failed. I now have a letter from Mr. Honig, the Treasurer of the Historical Society, telling me that you have made a specialty of Lincoln History. This I had not understood, although I felt sure that you could give me the information if I could see you.
