

Enrollment Gain High For State

Allegheny Tops State Colleges in Enrollment Gain

Allegheny college, with the largest enrollment in its history, tops the list of Pennsylvania colleges showing gains in a survey conducted recently by the Associated Press.

Other colleges showing increased registrations were Drexel, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania Military, Moravian, Albright, St. Josephs and Cheney State Teachers college (negro).

Attractive defense jobs and compulsory military training have reduced the number of students in a majority of the state's colleges from four to as much as 36 percent, according to the findings. The schools reporting the gains were the few exceptions to the rule.

With few exceptions, good-paying jobs in defense plants have taken far more young men from the classroom than has the draft. Too, there has been a decided increase in the number of women students in some schools and many are preparing to take over positions formerly held by men.

Sharpest reduction in enrollment occurred in schools located in communities with heavy defense activity and in the state teachers colleges, where the general age level of students is above that in other institutions of higher education.

Bloomsburg State Teachers College, for example, reported a 36 percent drop due chiefly to its proximity to the American Car and Foundry company plant at nearby Berwick where light army tanks are being constructed.

The state's three largest schools—the Universities of Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania State College—all have reported enrollments this year. Penn and Pitt each reported a five percent decrease and Penn State seven and a half percent. Penn has approximately 4,280 students, Pitt 8,400 and Penn State 6,720.

Showing no change were Juniata, Lehigh, Thiel and Edinboro State Teachers.

In making the announcement, Allegheny asserted that a considerable number of its men students are striving to complete their college training in three years. A spokesman said:

"These include boys nearing 21 who would normally be juniors but will graduate this year, thanks to summer study, heavier-than-usual study schedules and determination."

"Many of them want college degrees for a crack at army and navy flying. Others want to wind up their college work before entering military training."

Clark R. McClelland, dean of instruction at Kurtztown State Teachers, said the draft and defense program have increased the seriousness of a shortage of elementary teachers.

"Our supply of elementary teachers was exhausted six months ago," he reported. "The number of art teachers and supervisors which we placed exceeded the number of graduates. A sharp rise has occurred in the demand for graduates in library science."

At Edinboro State Teachers, President L. H. Van Houten said, there has been an unusual number of marriages of women students to soldiers.

Exchange Dinner For Freshmen On Way

A freshman exchange dinner, now being planned by a committee headed by Naomi Lutz, is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 5, it was announced by Catherine Cavelti, '43, Associated Women Student house chairman.

Half the freshman men will receive invitations to have dinner at Brooks and half the freshman girls will be invited to Cochran. On the invitations will be the number of the table at which each exchange student is to sit.

Speakers, including members and the athletic staff, will be on hand to lend an attractive air to the proceedings. It is also expected that representatives of the football team and Block A will speak briefly. The speakers will hold sway from the balcony in the rear of Arter hall.

Following the program, the bonfire, result of the efforts of the freshman class, will be lighted.

Through the program the cheerleaders, and possibly the college band, will be on hand to provide music and to lead the students in songs of the college.

Commented Ralph Marasco, president of the club: "We are firm in the belief that pep rallies of the past have failed to achieve their purpose. We are satisfied that part of this failure resulted from the student belief that a pep rally wasn't a success without a trip to the theatre. We are out to stop this and feel certain that the students will assist us in making tonight's rally a big success."

Virginia Kirk, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond E. Kirk of 9269 Shore Road, Brooklyn, New York, is a Sociology major. Her activities include membership in Kappa Alpha Theta, Outing club, German club and History and Political Science club.

Charlotte Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller of Saegertown, Pennsylvania, is an English major with membership in Kappa Kappa Gamma social fraternity and the chapel choir.

Marian Mumford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. Theodore Campbell of 370 N. Main Street, Meadville, has been active in debate work and the History and Political Science club.

Allegheny River Christening Is Recounted

It all began one day late in the winter of 1883 as a group of tired explorers from the Acme Exploration and Exploitation company were huddled about their camp-fire on the banks of a big river. They had spent the day in discovering and exploring the new-found waters and had, as was their custom, returned to their base for the informal selection of a name for their prize.

As usual, the selection was proving difficult. All were agreed that they wanted a name that carried the connotation of perpetual life, but no one could find the proper word. The silence was suddenly shattered by a big man who spoke up gleefully. "I've got it!" he said. "How about Allegheny?" Their gospel team keeps winning all the time." The rest of the group quickly seized upon the suggestion and

so it was adopted. Thus the Allegheny river was named, so the fable goes, for a small college in Western Pennsylvania whose chief claim to fame at the time was a strong gospel team that went on to win seventy-five straight matches before they were stopped by Garrett Bible in the big upset of '91.

So was established a precedent that remains to this day. Whenever a difficult bit of nomenclature comes up, it is always the name of this Meadville college that gets the nod.

The Allegheny mountains were so christened and it was therefore logical, as an itinerant logician, Himmelstoss Gundelfinger, pointed out that the accompanying valley be so named too. The Allegheny mountains and the Allegheny valley remain to this day, silent proof of the wisdom of Gundelfinger.

And so it went. In rapid succession came the City of Allegheny, the Allegheny Coal Company, Allegheny Metal, and many others through a long and varied list.

Then, too, there is the familiar story of the chagrin at Meadville when it was announced that a county to the south had stolen the name right from under the collective Crawford county noses. The epic court fight is too well known to be repeated, and Allegheny county still proudly carries her name.

All manner of things have been so christened, a frigate during the War of Tripoli, and last year even some nondescript racehorse who finished seventh in the third at Hialeah. So, in many unusual ways, will be perpetuated the name of a small Methodist school in Meadville, Allegheny college.

The convocation with its academic procession, impressive music and two feature addresses, served to set the stage for a jam-packed and eventful Saturday.

Tomorrow morning will see the dedication of the two new women's dormitory units, Walker and Anna Cloyde Brooks halls, the proceedings beginning at 10:15 in the gymnasium.

Once again the Allegheny Singers will take part, and will, with Edward Johe at the organ, provide appropriate music for the service. President Tolley will preside and representatives of the women students will speak as the modern quarters are put into service. All students are urged to attend. The dedication will be preceded by an academic procession at 10:00 a. m.

The morning will also see the meeting of the board of directors of the alumni association at 9:00 a. m. in Bentley hall. The board of trustees of the college met this morning.

Following the dedication will come the usual alumni luncheon in the spacious new dining room of Anna Cloyde Brooks hall. There will be a charge of fifty cents a person at the luncheon, set for noon.

The afternoon and evening are well-filled with entertainment designed to afford amusement for alumni visitors.

The kick-off in the annual Homecoming football clash between American university of Washington, D. C., and the local Gators, out after their first victory under their new coach, Alfred Werner, is set for 2:15 p. m. Werner's charges, in their first season under the new coach, will be conceded an even chance to win tomorrow afternoon against the rather uncertain Eagles.

Following the game, alumni will be entertained at a coffee hour in the new Anna Cloyde Brooks hall at 4:15 p. m. Senior women will be in charge of the entertainment.

Fraternity dinners, with planned entertainments, will be held at the various houses at 6:00 p. m., while the Independent dinner will take place at the Hotel Bartlett, Cambridge Springs, a half-hour later.

Visitors will have their choice, in the evening, between an all-college dance or the latest Playshop production, both beginning at 9:00 p. m.

The players will present the Kaufman-Hart comedy, "George Washington Slept Here," under the direction of John Hulburt. The dance will be held in the dining room of Brooks hall and will be sponsored by the Allegheny undergraduate council with Robert Welday, '42, in charge.

All day tomorrow, alumni will be taken on conducted tours of the new dormitory units by student guides.

As usual, the student grill will be open all day, serving sandwiches and fountain specialties for the visiting throng.

Special displays will be set up in the library, tying in with the convocation for President Tolley.

The Block A club, letterman's organization, will present a cup to the fraternity house having the best Homecoming decorations.

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A True Alleghenian

THIS year, only its second, the grill is taken for granted and some criticism is even making itself heard. In several years Eberhardt field will be an old story. The new driveway won't be news next fall. Even the new women's dormitory units will have lost part of their present lustre and will come in for their share of criticism. Yet we who have seen them become realities, we who have attended college without them will not be in a hurry to overlook their importance. And, more to the point, we will not soon forget the great part played by President William Pearson Tolley toward bringing them into being.

It is difficult for today's students, brought into contact with the president for three years at the most, to make an accurate appraisal of all his efforts. We won't try. All we can do is tell of our experience during three of ten years the president has been here at work.

We arrived in Meadville that fall of 1938 to find a campus vastly different from that of today. For girls there was Hulings hall, relic of the nineteenth century, with its outmoded quarters. There was crowded Montgomery field, the only place for athletic contests, excepting a small strip of land behind Arter hall. There was an ununified campus with a narrow driveway, rutted and pitted. And there was no recreation hall save the interior of dingy Hulings. No pleasant place for dances, no place for students to spend leisure moments.

We lived through that for almost two years as other students before us had. Then came the 125th Anniversary drive. Our wants might possibly be realized, we said to ourselves; but, with the customary and well-founded scepticism by now well built-up, we scoffed. We didn't give as much as we would have, had we realized how much we ourselves would benefit. We saw our wishes materialize as the dormitory began to rise, the driveway was put through, the new athletic field opened. Even the student grill, long a joke though constantly discussed, was brought to completion. We realized then there had been intelligent planning, sympathetic planning, and that it had taken perseverance to see the dream through. Then we thought of President Tolley. We hadn't known much about him except that he was a "swell fellow" until then. It then came to us that he was more than a capable educator, a good administrator. We realized he was working primarily for us.

From a hodge-podge with several attractive buildings had come a unified campus with a pleasing compactness and beauty that had been allowed to falter after the building of Bentley hall. We found the sort of Allegheny we wanted.

And all along there were other things—the sympathetic guidance plan, the student athletic program, a changing curriculum to meet the times. We were grateful. We knew then it was all for us. We are still grateful.

And thus, on the completion of his first ten years we salute William Pearson Tolley, a great president. Although not a graduate of Allegheny, he is a true Alleghenian.

Henderson Etchings Given To Library

Announcement has been made by Librarian Edith Rowley of the gift of seven fine framed etchings donated to the art department by Miss Grace Van Woert Henderson of Meadville. Miss Henderson, an alumnae of the college, is the niece of the late Judge John Henderson, '62. The etchings hung in his home on Chestnut Street.

These art pieces are the work of Giovanni Battista Piranesi, an Italian engraver, 1720-1788. Two of the etchings, Palazzo Dell'Accademia and Temple of Fortune, are originals done in Rome. The others were later re-edited in Paris by the son of the engraver. Piranesi is noted for his passion for ancient Roman buildings, old arches, and broken columns. In his work appears a skillful way of opposing deep blacks and strong effects of light.

Dr. Julian Miller is making plans for the permanent display of these etchings in the art department in Ruter hall.

Convocation Sees Tolley Honored

Hundreds Join in Tribute As President Ends First Ten Years Here; Gala Dinner Planned For This Evening

Allegheny students, faculty, alumni, trustees and friends join today in tribute to Dr. William Pearson Tolley on completion of ten years' service as president of the college—and on the beginning of a new decade, a new era, in the history of the Greater Allegheny under his leadership. Behind today's convocation are two dominant themes:

First, the convocation comes at a time when Allegheny's enrollment is at the highest point in its history, when two new dormitory units are ready for dedication, when the financial foundations of the college have been newly strengthened, and when the educational program has reached a plane of effectiveness far beyond the hopes of a few years ago.

Second, Allegheny has the distinction of paying honor to a president of ten years' standing who is still one of the youngest presidents of any college or university.

These keynotes give an especial significance to today's convocation in the Gymnasium and to the other events on the week-end Homecoming program.

Trustees, faculty, seniors and official delegates from colleges in Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio and New Jersey were to form the academic procession moving into the Gymnasium for the exercises before an audience of undergraduates, alumni and friends. Andrew Wells Robertson, chairman of the college board of trustees, was to preside.

An organ prelude by Edward H. Johe and a choral invocation by the Allegheny Singers under the direction of Professor Morten J. Luvaas was to open the program. The invocation was to be given by the Reverend Bruce S. Wright of Erie, a member of the board of trustees, followed by an anthem by the Singers.

President William Harold Cowley of Hamilton College, Clinton, N. Y., was to deliver the convocation address, with a response by President Tolley.

The Singers were to present two more selections, and the benediction was to be pronounced by The Reverend Charles T. Greer of Meadville, a member of the board of trustees.

Closing the day's colorful ceremonies with a flourish will be the Convocation Dinner tonight at 7:00 p. m., in Brooks hall. Visitors from neighboring colleges will join with faculty members, the A.U.C., the trustees, officers of the alumni association and friends of the college in saluting President William Pearson Tolley on the completion of his first ten years as president here.

William Preston Beazell, Class of '97, of New York City, one of the trustees who has taken a leading part in arranging the events honoring President Tolley, will serve as toastmaster.

The toast list includes the following:

President Arlo Ayers Brown of Drew University; Dr. Guy E. Snavely, former member of the Allegheny faculty and now executive director of the Association of American Colleges; President Edward V. Stanford of Villanova College, representing the Association of College Presidents of Pennsylvania; Dr. Earl J. McGrath, dean of administration at the University of Buffalo; Sally Emerson, president of Associated Women Students; Robert B. Miller, president of the Allegheny Undergraduate Council; Sumner E. Nichols of Erie, president of the Allegheny Alumni Association, and Dr. J. R. Schultz, dean of men and professor of English.

The dinner is by invitation only and dress will be formal.

Progressive from the first, the woman's college has taken individual differences into account in much the same fashion as has Allegheny. Sarah Lawrence, like this college, is admittedly experimental and pays particular attention to the different problems of its students.

Miss Warren, president and trustee of Sarah Lawrence since November, 1929, did her undergraduate work at Vassar and then went on to add several advanced degrees. She holds an A.M. from Columbia, a D. Ped. from New York State College for Teachers and an Ed.D. from Russell Sage. Before coming to Sarah Lawrence she was principal of Pine Manor junior college, Wellesley, Massachusetts.

With Miss Warren on the dedication program will be a number of other features.

The exercises will be preceded by an academic procession which will march to the gymnasium for the ceremony. Organ and vocal music will be furnished by Mr. Edward Johe and the Allegheny Singers.

Brief remarks will be made by Dean Laila Skinner and Sara Anne Emerson, president of the women students. President William P. Tolley will preside.

From the gymnasium the group will proceed to Anna Cloyde Brooks hall where, with a brief ceremony, the building will be delivered over formally to the women of the college.

The dedication of the two new dormitory units will, with the convocation and other special events, set off this Homecoming weekend as unusual.

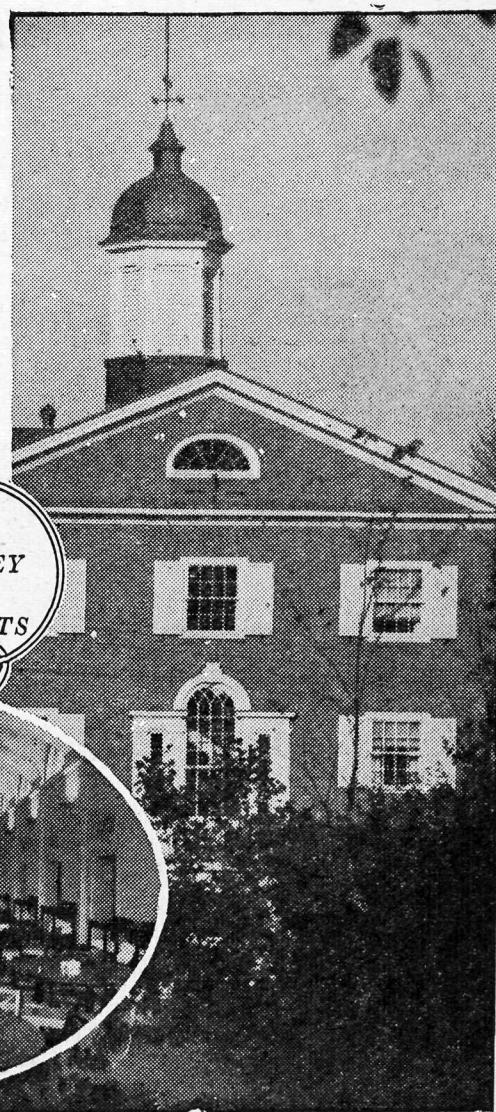
Both units will take their names from those of prominent friends of the college.

Hulings Hall Was First Dormitory

Ida Tarbell, Then a Student, Spoke At Cornerstone Laying in 1879; Annex Added in 1905; Other Units Later

Miss Ida M. Tarbell, '80, spoke for the student body at the cornerstone laying of the present Hulings hall, during the commencement week activities, June 25, 1879. This was the initial step taken by the college for the housing of a rapidly growing women student group. Such an addition to the facilities of the college, this "home for young ladies," as it was commonly referred to, placed coeducation at Allegheny beyond the experimental stage and assured its future.

The idea for a woman's dormitory originated with President Lucius H. Bugbee who found a favorable attitude among the citizens of Meadville and the students. As donor of the majority of the funds, Mr. Marcus Hulings, an Oil City man, made possible the erection of the hall. The original building was three stories high with accommodations for 80 students. It was completed for occupancy by the fall of 1880.

Commenting on the progress of the recognition of women's place at Allegheny, Student Tarbell said: "The movement for the Ladies' hall shows much of pure pluck.

"The girls have appreciated its necessity and made the best of their surroundings in the past. They said, 'we were allowed to come to Allegheny college and shall remain, then by and by they will have to prepare a place for us.' When we see our hopes now about to be realized, each one has a heart-felt gratitude that this hall has been begun. For those who come after us a way is furnished to hundreds of young women of all this region, who will be induced by this college home on the campus to seek a higher education.

"As we lay the cornerstone of this structure today, firm and solid, so will a great procession of girls in coming years lay the cornerstone of their lives. They will obtain something here that whatever life may be to them, they will have a foundation so firm that their womanhood will not yield. They will become so strong and self-reliant that they will be able to benefit and not hinder the world.

"We are deeply thankful to many friends who have helped on this work by words and deeds. Above all, we express our gratitude to faculty and students. As to our classmates, never were women in college halls treated more royally than we are, never was truer chivalry manifested than in the respect and kindness with which Allegheny women are received by Allegheny men. We are deeply debtors to very many for the new surroundings to come in our college life and we purpose by improving these means for better culture, to show you the gratitude of true women."

It was not until November 28, 1905 that the annex of Hulings hall was formally opened. The liberality of Mrs. Sarah B. Cochran, of Dawson, Pennsylvania, made this possible. This remodeling included the gymnasium for women, an additional floor for use as an assembly room for the Young Women's Christian association, and six sorority suites. Provisions were made, also, for the accommodation of a score more students.

With the total enrollment soaring to 300 in the early part of 1900, the housing of freshmen presented an acute problem. Cochran hall came into being at this time, with the presentation of the building on April 23, 1908. From the gift of Mrs. Sarah B. Cochran freshman men were given living quarters and a commons. The basement was given over to the Young Men's Christian association and bowling alleys. In succeeding years, however, this hall became a women's dormitory, housing 35 students.

The period from 1928 to 1940 occasioned ve more names to be listed under women's quarters: Hammett, Beebe, Tarbell, Lee and Ross houses.

With the same spirit that produced the incentive to complete casioned five more names to be listed-gheny of 1941 has joined the traditional and the modern to make the best in living conditions for its women students.

Alumni Luncheon Tomorrow Noon

Visiting alumni will have their first meal in the new dining room of Brooks hall at the annual alumni luncheon tomorrow, immediately following the dedication ceremonies.

The luncheon will follow the formal presentation of the keys to the dormitory to Andrew Wells Robertson, chairman of the board of trustees.

Walker hall, comprising the wing crowned by the white cupola, will be named in honor of the late Colonel Lewis Walker of Meadville, founder and first president of Talon, Inc. Walker was graduated from Allegheny in 1877 and remained a friend and trustee of the college until his death in 1938.

The other section, composed of the new dining hall and central portion of the building, will be named in honor of Anna Cloyde Brooks, wife of Colonel Charles A. Brooks of Pittsburgh. Colonel Brooks is a member of the college board of trustees.

One section of the new dormitory remains to be built. This section will be named Pfeiffer hall, in honor of Mrs. Annie Merner Pfeiffer of New York City.

Additional changes will also be made in the older section of the dormitory in connection with the later phases of the building program. it has been announced.

All but minor details of the present building are now complete, including the driveway across the central campus on an east-west axis. Work is expected to be begun this fall on the construction of a new gateway on North Main street, the gift of Hugh Lord of Erie.

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New Units 'Last Word' In Design

Brooks and Walker Sections Have All Modern Equipment

With the opening of the two new dormitory units this fall Allegheny women have been given the best in modern dormitory quarters to partially replace their former inadequate and antiquated housing.

From top to bottom the new sections are complete with the latest conveniences, with no pains being spared to make the units livable and pleasant.

Catching the visitor's eye in the interior are the two new lounges on either side of a commons room which overlooks the spacious new dining room. The south lounge is informally decorated and is equipped with a radio-phonograph for dancing. The north or formal lounge has more subdued and boasts an attractive fireplace.

The dining room itself is a new departure with a separate cafeteria section from which breakfast and luncheon meals are served. The evening dinner is served to the women at small tables accommodating six.

Above this first floor are many features proving popular with the women.

From the east or rear of the Brooks hall section extends a spacious sun deck, while from the front of the building a covered balcony overlooks the central campus. Both balcony and sundeck emanate from a large lounge on the second floor.

Additional informal lounges are found on each floor of Walker hall which also has compact kitchenettes for the preparation of snacks between meals. Laundries are also to be found in the new units.

Faculty member Mildred Ludwig now occupies the new proctor's apartment on the second floor of the Walker section.

The floors are covered with rubber tile, and the telephone booths are equipped with soundproofing which makes the use of doors unnecessary. The closets have been specially designed and provide a maximum of room.

The new buzzer system, by which women will be summoned from their rooms, will be put into operation in the near future. It will be operated from a master switchboard in the lobby of Brooks hall.

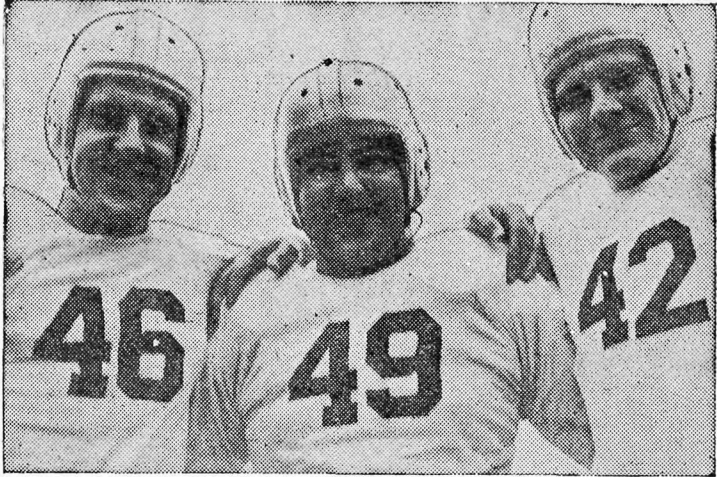
A cloak room and lavatory for men have been provided on the ground floor inside the entrance.

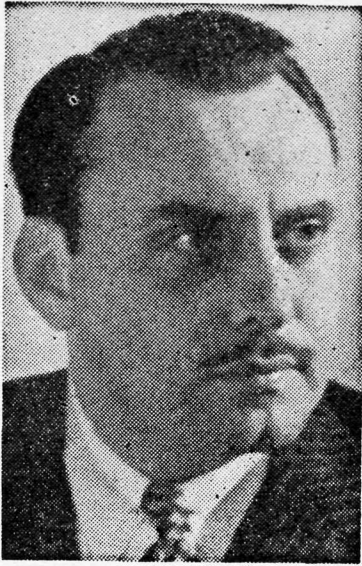

Tolley Elected Ten Years Ago

Named President On Friday the 13th;
At Time Was One Of Youngest College
Heads; Record is Brilliant One

Friday the 13th is notorious as a day of ill-omen and generations of superstitious folk have been wary of their actions on that day lest some evil circumstance befall them. Apparently the trustees of Allegheny College were not superstitious, however, for on Friday, the 13th day of March, 1931, they proceeded to elect William Pearson Tolley president of Allegheny College.

The 10 years since that time have demonstrated that their lack of superstition was justified, for President Tolley has built Allegheny to a position equal to that of any liberal arts college in the country, expanding both the physical layout and educational values of the college.

At the time of his election, Dr. Tolley was the youngest college president in the United States. He was only 30 years old but had already received wide recognition for other achievements before assuming the presidency of Allegheny College. He already possessed the degrees of Bachelor of Arts from Syracuse University in 1922, Master of Arts from the same school in 1924, Bachelor of Divinity from Drew Theological Seminary in 1925, and Doctor of Philosophy at Columbia University in 1930.

Between 1925 and 1930, he served as assistant to the President of Drew University and when Brothers College was established at Drew in 1928 Dr. Tolley became first acting dean and later dean. Records from Drew College demonstrated his administrative capabilities, and his progressive ideas in education. He had become an ordained minister of the Methodist Episcopal church, but was never actively engaged as a pastor. In 1930, he wrote a book on "The Idea of God in the Philosophy of St. Augustine."

Dr. Tolley was married to Miss Ruth Canfield, also a graduate of Syracuse in 1925, and is the father of two children, Nelda Ruth and William Pearson.

The retirement of Dr. James A.

Beebe from the presidency of Allegheny College was the motivating force in the election of the new president. During the intervening period, Dr. C. F. Ross served as acting president, while Dr. J. R. Schultz took the post of dean of men, which he has retained since that time. Dr. Ross later became registrar of the college and resigned his post only last year, when he became dean emeritus of the college.

Dr. Tolley became the thirteenth president of Allegheny College since its founding in 1815. He assumed active duties on July 1, 1931, but was not formally inaugurated until the following fall.

One needs only to look about him in the college to see some of the advances Dr. Tolley has brought about during his administration. Most noticeable, of course, are the physical improvements, Walker and Brooks halls, the new driveway, the new athletic field on Park Avenue, and many other additions to the campus. One must not forget however, the innovations in the educational program, such as the inventory examinations and individualized education, which are of even greater value to the college. These were all dreams of Dr. Tolley's until he arrived on the Allegheny campus, but here he found opportunity to carry out his progressive plans and they have proved successful.

After his assumption of the duties of president of the college, Dr. Tolley continued garnering degrees. In 1931, he received the degree of Doctor of Divinity at Mt. Union College, and in 1938 received the degree of Doctor of Literature at Grove City College.

President Tolley is a member of many organizations and fraternal bodies. He is secretary of the College Presidents' Association of Pennsylvania, a member of the University Senate of the Methodist Episcopal Church, a director of the Meadville City hospital and the Public Charities Association of Pennsylvania. He is, in addition, a member of Delta Sigma Rho, Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Pi Delta Epsilon, Pi Kappa Alpha, and Omicron Delta Kappa. He is a Republican and a Rotarian.

Allegheny College students, faculty, and friends should pause and reflect on the courage and fortitude necessary to take such an important step as the election of a college president which were evident on the part of the Board of Trustees on that 13th day of March, 1931. Such actions are typical of the progressive spirit which has dominated Allegheny since President Tolley's inauguration.

Progressive, a scholar, an excellent administrator, a friend and advisor of every student, William Pearson Tolley has shown himself fully cognizant of the problems confronting the college and capable of solving them to the betterment of the college.

Tolley Had Busy College Career

While attending Syracuse University, from which he graduated in 1922, President William P. Tolley distinguished himself both in extra-curricular activities and in scholastic achievement.

Dr. Tolley was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholastic fraternity and chosen as a member of Phi Delta Epsilon, honorary journalistic fraternity. Included in Dr. Tolley's extra-curricular activities were the following: Editor of the Syracuse yearbook, president of the Y. M. C. A., captain of the varsity debating team, secretary of the senior council, president of the Boar's Head Dramatic society, a member of the Glee Club and a member of Tau Theta Upsilon, senior society. He was a member of Pi Kappa Alpha social fraternity.

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Ken Fox, who captains the blue and orange fighting men from Washington, D. C., in their first athletic appearance in Meadville. Fox, a senior, weighs 210 pounds and is a bulwark at tackle.

Three New Foes On Card

American university, Washington, D. C., whose football Eagles face the Gators tomorrow in the annual Homecoming fixture at Montgomery field, is but one of three new opponents appearing on this year's Allegheny grid schedule.

The other two, University of Rochester and Kenyon, are well-known rivals to other local varsity squads, but are making their initial gridiron challenges this year. Rochester will entertain the blue and gold at home while Kenyon will appear here.

The Eagles, who will perform before the alumni tomorrow, are somewhat of an uncertain quantity, though they will field a heavy team. Not handicapped by the freshman rule, they will show a strong number of first-year men.

So far this year the blue and orange have lost two encounters and won another, the win coming last Saturday with a 21-0 decision

against Johns Hopkins. They bowed before Susquehanna (6-0) and Swarthmore (20-0).

American university, a small co-educational school located in the nation's capital, has an enrollment of some 350 students. The footballers are coached by Stafford H. Cassell, director of athletics, who is assisted by George V. Mehke. The university is Methodist.

That Rochester, Gator opponent next Saturday, will be a difficult test, is corroborated by last Saturday's result, a strong Amherst eleven, winning by a slim 7-2 margin.

Little is known of Kenyon's strength yet.

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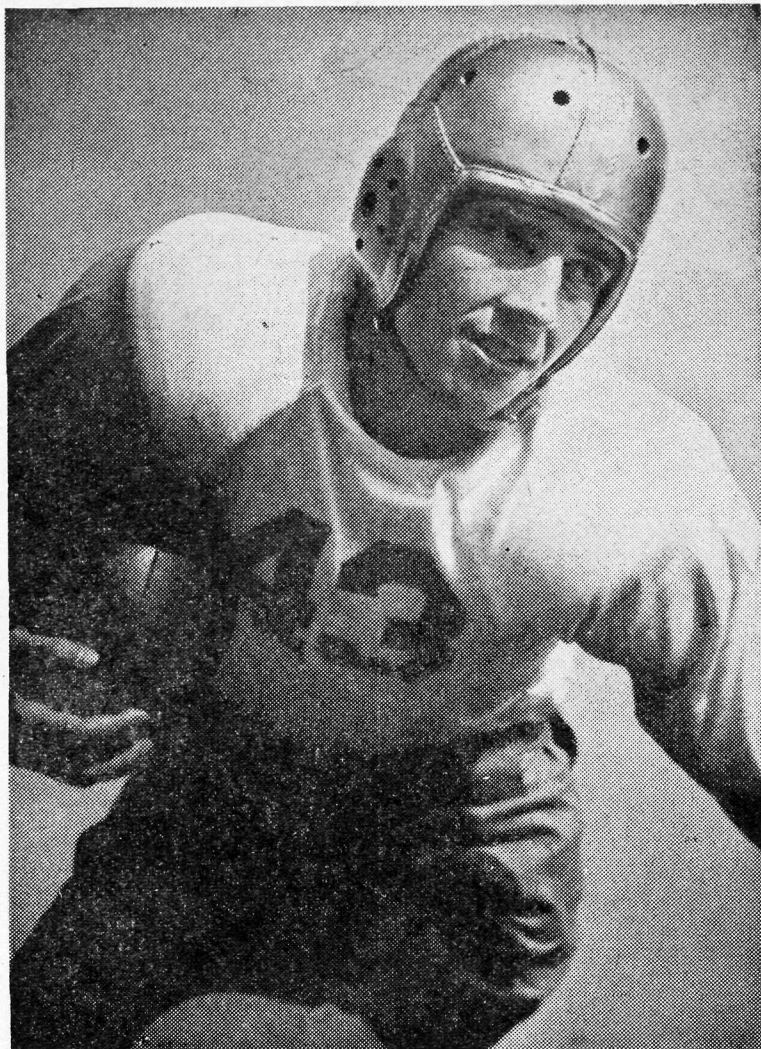

The development of this extensive tract of land was begun in 1939 and was completed in the late summer of 1941. The area provides ample playing space for three touch football games to be carried on simultaneously. All intramural contests are held there, as well as outdoor gym classes.

Varsity athletics also make use of the new area to the extent of conducting soccer practices and inter-collegiate contests there.

It is hoped that ultimately, new stands will be erected to accommodate football crowds, and that a stadium containing a quarter mile track will be constructed. With this in view, the field has been graded with a crowd to afford sufficient drainage for the future gridiron.

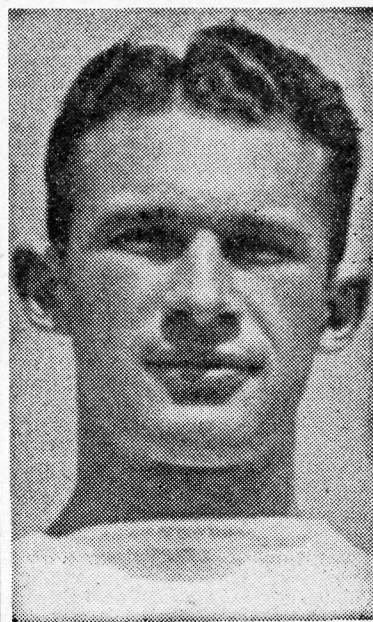
When these plans are completed, Allegheny College will possess one of the most modern athletic plants in the region. Facilities for inter-college, intramural, and educational athletics will be provided, and all college sports will center about Eberhardt field.

Way Drives Soccer Team

A determined Rochester soccer eleven, outplayed through most of the game, came back in the last quarter of the game with Allegheny last Friday to defeat the Gators, 2-1, at Rochester.

It was an improved Gator squad over the one that had lost to Grove City the week before, and one that held Rochester in check for more than half the game, while scoring once itself—yet one that was unable to repulse the determined attack of the upstate New Yorkers in the concluding minutes of the contest.

This week has found Coach H. P. Way driving the squad through long practice sessions in which an attempt has been made to improve the offense, which at Rochester was as shaky too as it had been previously at Grove City. According to Mr. Way, the line, which does the scoring in soccer, "lacks drive and punch" badly, and it is toward the correction of that weakness that the team has been working this week.

The soccer men from Carnegie Tech appeared here yesterday for the Gators third tilt of the year. The contest took place on the new athletic field on Park avenue extension and was the first varsity game ever played there. The game afforded both teams an opportunity to try for their first wins of the season. The Gators have now dropped decisions to Grove City and Rochester by the identical scores of 2-1, while Tech has lost to Slippery Rock, 4-1, and Franklin and Marshall, 2-0.

Last year Allegheny defeated the Tartans, 4-3, in a thrilling overtime game at Tech bowl in Pittsburgh. This year, however, the Plaid squad was looking forward to avenging last year's defeat and chalking up their first victory of the season.

Soccer Frosh Bow In Opener By 6-1

The Gator freshman soccer team opened its season Tuesday and absorbed a 6-1 defeat at the hands of Alliance college.

The opening period saw the two teams playing evenly and in the final play of the quarter, Allegheny scored when Lammert drove in a goal. In the second period Alliance evened the count on a goal by Nowinski and in the third period piled on four more scores by Zeiminski. The final period saw Alliance close the scoring with another goal by Zeiminski. Two of Alliance's goals were scored on free kicks.

Bob Leech and Bill Strong played well for the Gator freshmen, as did Bob Greenbaum at the goal. Alliance was paced by their captain, Szymczak at outside left.

Though seriously hit with injuries to several key men this year, the American eleven has steadily improved and last week trounced Johns Hopkins, 21-0, after losing their first two games of the year to Susquehanna, 6-0, and to Swarthmore, 20-0.

The squad which the Washingtonians will be bringing to town is a surprisingly young one with 19 of the 33 squad members being freshmen. In spite of their youth and inexperience however, the Eagles will undoubtedly prove a formidable opponent for their line averages a cool 200 pounds and the backfield scales 180.

With the experience of three games added to their brawn, Coach Stafford H. Cassell's blue and orange squad should display a good brand of ball for the Homecoming Day crowd.

In the game last Saturday a large Grover Homecoming Day crowd that included approximately 100 Allegheny undergraduates, braved the elements to watch a fighting, heads-up Gator eleven, struggling almost continually to keep the hard running Grove City backs away from their goal, finally go down to a 13-0 defeat.

Allegheny's ancient and bitter rivals marched 80 yards over the soaked turf for their first score in the second quarter, and late in the third quarter they tallied again when Don Turk's attempted punt was blocked in the Gator end zone and recovered by the Crimson.

Grove City wasted little time after the outset before showing its offensive power as it forced the Gators back to their own 8 before halfback Bill Cramer broke through and followed a bad Grover center to the 25 where he fell on it. The Crimson continued to force the play but George Cramer intercepted a pass on the Gator 33 to stop another Grover thrust.

In the second period Grove City was not to be denied and finally crossed the stubbornly defended Allegheny goal to reach pay dirt. The big Grover line shook their powerful fullback Myron Nugent loose on a spinner midway in the second quarter and he fought his way 44 yards before being brought down from behind deep in Gator territory. Two plays later Major Olmes cut back on an end sweep to score from the eight and Nugent, who was the most outstanding runner on the slippery field, plunged for the seventh point. It was at this point in the struggle that Allegheny, fighting back, made their only offensive gesture of the afternoon. Taking the pigskin on their 32 the Blue and Gold began to move. A bullet pass from Bill Pierce, one of the Gator standouts, found Captain Ralph Marasco on the receiving end for a 22 yard gain to the Grove City 46 from where two smashing off-tackle runs by Pierce brought the ball to the Crimson 34 where the attack bogged down as three line plays failed.

In the third quarter Grove City's Red Smith, who did a beautiful job of keeping the Gators back on their heels with his long range booting, angled a high punt which went out on the Allegheny one foot line. At this opportune moment the big, fast charging Crimson line, which time and again almost blocked Turk's punts, overwhelmed the Gator kicker standing in the rear of his end zone and end Howard Boose fell on the blocked ball for the final Grover six points.

For Allegheny, Captain Ralph Marasco, who was knocked cold in the second quarter, was outstanding as he gave another exhibition of his courageous running, heady signal calling and deadly tackling. Fullback Pierce ran very well and was a sterling performer on the defense as was Don Turk, sophomore end from Cleveland.

Grove City's superiority was well shown by the game statistics which showed 9 first downs and 220 yards net gain for the Crimson to 5 first downs and 86 yards net rushing and passing for Allegheny.
