## WAR VIA EMOTIONS

Faculty members, college newspapers and even individual collegians are being bombarded with propaganda again this year—some subtle, some obvious; some constructive, some destructive. This mass of information takes the form of chapel speeches, news releases and cleverly illustrated magazines.

Most of the written matter on politics "The Campus" relates to the wastebasket, knowing our Allegheny campaign managers will keep our Bentley mail box well supplied.

Out of this orgy of material, however, certain publications are worthy of note. Perhaps the most readable of propaganda organs which Alleghenians receive is "Facts in Review" published by the German Library of Information in New York city. Each week a well written, attractively made up magazine is issued. The front page usually contains the keynote for the entire edition. This week, for instance, shows some husky workers rebuilding a bridge in Poland. Says the caption, "Rebuilding bridges, roads and cities as well as improving health conditions and restoring law and order in the Government General are parts of the tremendous job being undertaken by Dr. Hans Frank and his German and Polish assistants."

Another front piece shows a group of tow headed youngsters grouped around a wholesome-looking social worker. Under the picture—"Throughout Germany, members of the B.D.M. (German girls' association) take part in kindergarten activities. The children, while mothers work, play in the open air whenever possible. This is only one of the many aspects of "Women's Place in the Reich"—

Excerpts: "Part two of the Anglo-French plan was to follow the illegal mining and torpedoing with the occupation of all Scandinavia."

"Contrary to the sincere desire of the German people to live in peace and friendship with the English and French peoples, and despite any reasonable grounds for conflict, those in control in London and Paris declared war on the German people."

"Serious crises . . . India . . . reason to mistrust the pledges of Great Britain . . . India has made all the sacrifices . . ."

"Providing photographs with falsified captions is a time-honored trick of allied propaganda."

\* \* \* \* \*

But—on the other side of the fence we note a news letter from the American Friends of Czecho-Slovakia which tells "During the wave of arrests, 5000 persons were taken . . . professors and teachers were brought up for mass trial . . . the Gestapo building and others were overflowing with prisoners in spite of large shipments to Nazi concentration camps . . . fines are for unknown offenses . . . absolutely reliable sources say Rumania is next" . . .

And so it goes . . . French, English, and Italian, all blasting away with a war of words.

What do these powers expect to gain?

Just this these propaganda instruments are written in such a lurid manner as to arouse the emotions of the readers. With due respect to Senator Nye's theory of business interests as the cause of our entrance into the Great Conflict, can we cast aside the role emotions played? Obviously, NO.

If we are to steer away from the present European clash, we must exercise sane judgment and not let emotions lead us down the same path that once led to World War days.

Certainly poor judgment was used in bringing last Friday's chapel speaker. She obviously was speaking from a biased viewpoint. Her address was as much anti-Nazi propaganda as ever emanated from a British propaganda writer.

The trouble was, most Alleghenians thought that was a fine speech. Of course, it was—if you believe in persons running around the country telling how her husband's stomach could not stand a meal with a German officer.

Military tacticians would have laughed at her speech—whereas we sat there and took it all in.

We give the Nazis credit with more sense than to allow an American woman to stand and watch every tenth student being shot down. (She failed to clarify this point). If she was not actually there, then she is relating hearsay.

A person with the obvious intelligence and sincerity of the speaker would be a valuable addition to any college program if she confines herself to accounts of her work, divest of all emotionalism and pure hearsay and above all—sensationalism.

## Guidance Clinic Plans Shaping

July 1, 2, 3 will mark further Allegheny progress when the college for the second year offers to prospective students an educational guidance clinic.

This diagnosis-prescription process concerns itself with the problem of planning the student's future. An analysis of each individual will be made in terms of his capacities, needs, interests and other factors pertaining to his educational plans. Tests will measure the student's capacity for learning and will determine what he has already learned. Inventories of personality, high school records, reading comprehension and vocational aptitudes will be considered at the clinic.

Committee in charge of this clinic includes Allegheny faculty members as well as other experienced guidance counselors.

A clinic fee of \$10.00 will be charged each student. This fee includes the cost of testing, the cost of meals and overnight accommodations. At registration this fee will apply to the usual \$10.00 requirement.

Explanatory pamphlets concerning this educational feature may be secured at Miss Cotton's office.
