McCartney Explains Student Affairs Committee Program For Coming Year

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles by members of The Allegheny Undergraduate Council to explain the activities of the council and its committees.

The Student Affairs Committee represents particularly one manner in which the Allegheny Undergraduate Council works effectively with the faculty in establishing policies and attempting to solve problems of a campus-wide nature.

The Student Affairs Committee is one of those regular standing committees of the faculty which include student members.

It derives its authority from the President, the faculty, and the Allegheny Undergraduate Council, and has jurisdiction over certain areas of college life, especially the co-ordination of all "co-curricular" activities which affect a major portion of the college community. (The term "co-curricular" is used instead of "extra-curricular" because of the college's expressed aim of educating the entire individual.)

The committee is composed of 12 members, four of whom are appointed from the faculty by its Committee on Committees. Five of the members are students appointed by the Allegheny Undergraduate Council, one of them being its vice president. The personnel deans and the president of AUC are ex officio non-voting members, one of the deans being regularly the chairman.

The purpose of the committee is to promote a well-coordinated program of co-curricular student activities and events on the campus. The committee further undertakes to promote balance and harmony among the organizations sponsoring these activities. Specifically, this is done by:

1. Establishing regulations and determining policies regarding the

The program for the musical event, the first appearance of a wind ensemble on the Allegheny campus, consists of works for wind quintet by Mozart, Persichetti, Fine, Reicha and Ibert. There will be no admission charged for the concert.

DeLellis Announces Honor Code Meeting

The Honor Code meeting, originally scheduled for next Friday, will be held tomorrow at 3:30 p.m. in the College Union because of the conflict with the arrival of the Bloodmobile on campus.

Abbie DeLellis, chairman of the Honor Code Committee, said that the meeting will include "questions about the honor code or any general questions the students might have." She also stated that they will discuss what can be done to promote the honor code in activities other than academic ones.

Benezet Presides At PACU, FIC Meetings At Bedford Springs

President Louis T. Benezet presided at the annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities, held at the Bedford Springs Hotel, Bedford, Pa., on October 27 and 28. Sixty colleges and universities were represented at the meeting.

The Reverend Father Francis X. N. McGuire, president of Villanova College, was elected new president of the association.

A luncheon meeting was held on October 28 for the formal inauguration of the Foundation for Independent Colleges of Pennsylvania, an organization of 38 private colleges within the membership of the PACU.

"The Foundation for Independent Colleges in Pennsylvania is one of twelve state organizations aimed at attracting industrial philanthropy to the private colleges, especially the liberal arts institutions," Dr. Benezet said. "On the philanthropic connection between free enterprise

Bloodmobile To Visit Campus November 14; 140 Students Sign Up

Sanford Reitman, chairman of the Blood Drive Committee, has announced that approximately 140 people have signed up for donation on November 14 when the Bloodmobile is scheduled to be on campus.

Since a large number of these students are under 21 and have not donated before, permission slips had to be sent to their parents.

"There is a possibility that many of these slips will not be returned, causing the above number to dwindle by the time the Bloodmobile arrives," Reitman said.

"By the end of the week a total of 200 students should be signed up. An amount in excess of 150 donors, the expected goal, is required, as a good many students will be rejected or may fail to keep their appointments," he added.

During the next few days, appointment cards will be distributed to the volunteers indicating the time at which they are to donate. At a later date class excuses and regulations regarding diet will be given out.

"I hope," stated Reitman, "that we will reach and surpass our goal, as did last year's drive. The Blood Drive Committee has had excellent cooperation and response from most groups on campus; however, the freshman men and women appear rather hesitant to donate."

Fraternities

A little over a year ago the administration announced a new policy towards fraternities. This policy recognized the need for healthy social groups within the Allegheny community, at the same time establishing a set of criteria designed to increase their effectiveness as social units. We should like to propose a reconsideration of these criteria in the light of the coming fraternity rush week. They are as follows.

- 1. Maintenance of good financial management, which means sound budgeting, requisitioning and auditing.
- 2. Placing the welfare of the community first. This would mean the active maintenance of a program of community service.
- 3. The development and promotion of a systematic scholarship program.
- 4. Providing equality of opportunity for all individuals to become members of social organizations."

Social groups such as fraternities and sororities perform some very essential functions on a college campus. In addition to their social and recreational functions they offer an opportunity for more intimate relationships than can be attained by the entire college. Such relationships are necessary for the development of a wholesome personality.

However, the need for such organizations does not necessitate the continuation of the acknowledged evils which exists in the present system. Whether or not a student becomes a member, he must recognize the necessity for improvement. If fraternities are to become a truly constructive force at Allegheny, they must strive to adhere to the criteria presented.

We recognize that progress has been made toward achieving these goals. But to the extent that fraternities do not conform to these criteria they are prevented from being a positive force in the college community.

Insofar as they fail to place the interests of the community foremost, they create a disharmony which distorts values and interferes with communication. Where discrimination still exists we fall short of being a democratic community. Where fraternities have not achieved sound financial management, they cause unnecessary hardships for some of their members. Anxieties thus produced reduce scholarship proficiency. To the extent that scholarship programs are ineffective or are given secondary emphasis a conflict arises which undermines morale and causes a loss of "integrity."

The freshman men about to enter into rushing within the next 10 days can help fraternities realize this necessity by evaluating groups in the light of the standards. Especially in the years ahead the fraternity which strives the hardest to live up to such ideals will be on top; when all fraternities uphold them, Allegheny College will be on top!

For those who remain independent we point out that there will be a new dormitory next year and that there is a cooperative eating plan in operation on campus. There is, as yet, little in the way of an organization of independents to perform the functions of fraternities, but the co-op and the new dorm can provide the nucleus for such organization if initiative is present.

We do not wish to recommend one course or another. We are attempting merely to present an objective view of fraternities which recognizes their virtues and faults. We want to work to eliminate the faults and to strengthen the good points. Whatever your choice, we urge that you base it on a mature evaluation.

Blood Drive

Friday, November 14, will mark the second visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to Allegheny College. We of The Campus staff whole-heartedly recommend that the student body support this campaign.

The possibility of complete success is lessened by the attitude of apathy which has greeted the appeal. The chairman of the Blood Drive Committee has expressed his disappointment in the laxity of students in signing up this year. In contrast to the excellent spontaneous turnout in last year's drive, members of this year's committee have had to resort to active solicitation.

With the exception of football players, who will not be permitted to donate, and persons with medical excuses, we feel that there is little reason for students not to give up such a small percentage of their time for this cause.

"A painless operation and a vitally important effort" paraphrases the Red Cross definition of the blood drive. In addition to the blood going to the armed forces and public welfare units, it should be noted that all members of the college community may receive transfusions from either of the Meadville hospitals without being charged for the blood, because of Allegheny's participation in the program.

Perhaps the best method by which we can express our feelings is by a comparison with the recent election. The battle-cry for the last few weeks has been, "Let's get out the vote." A suitable exclamation for our efforts would be, "Let's get out the blood."

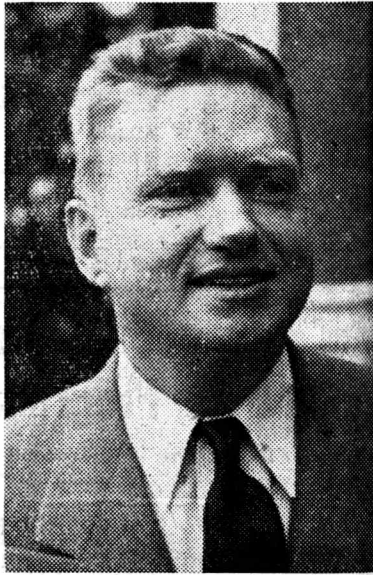
Faculty Profile

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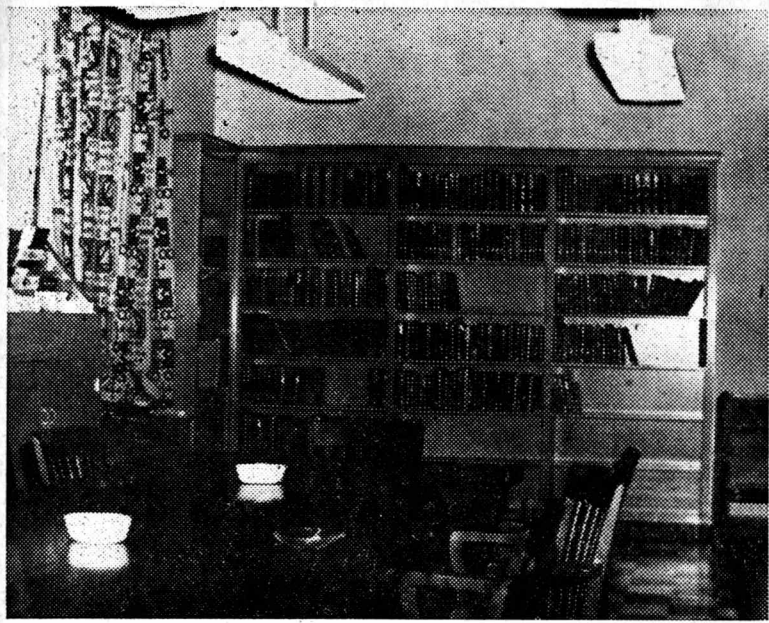

Quiet Reigns In New Chem Library; Renovation Of Carnegie Under Way

Quietest spot on Campus these days is the new Chemistry Library, up on the second floor of Carnegie Hall.

Complete with sound-absorbing ceiling, rubber-linoleum floor, and drapes adorned with chemical symbols designed by Mrs. Douglas Pickering, the library offers an ideal spot for boning up on whatever it is you're interested in boning up on these days—that is, if you can stand the ear-piercing silence of the place.

Just off the library are two smaller rooms. One is a cubicle for reading chemistry treatises on microfilm, and the other is the slickest little kitchen we've seen in a long while. This kitchen has a hot-plate, a small refrigerator, and a coffee-maker that resembles something which the federal agents might find in the backwoods of Tennessee. With a doctorate in the physical sciences as background, however, we understand that it's not too difficult to work, and makes awfully good coffee.

Taken together, though, these features make the Chem library unique as libraries go, and seem to make the place ideal for some serious work.

The library is only the first step in a general renovation of Carnegie. The first floor, where the former library was located, will undergo changes eventually leading to the installation of a laboratory for work on a master's degree, which the chemistry department expects to confer in the future.

The major portion of the financial backing for this chemistry development program comes from Dr. Gideon Sundback, who has quietly gone about providing us with as fine facilities as we or anybody else could wish for in a chemistry building, and, of course, Drs. Cavelti, State, Rhinesmith, and Pino can also take much of the credit for the progress down in Carnegie.

Our much-heralded Allegheny Development Program has produced impressive ground-breaking and energetic excavations. To date, however, the chem department seems to be leading the parade of progress.

Dickens' First Editions Loaned By Erie Man On Exhibit In Library

An exhibit of first editions of Charles Dickens will be on display in Reis Library during the month of November, according to librarian Philip M. Benjamin.

On display are: David Copperfield, The Pickwick Papers, A Tale of Two Cities, A Christmas Carol and 17 other first editions of collector's items, and in many instances, very rare first printings of other first editions. The *Mystery of Edwin Drood* is shown in its original monthly parts and in a bound copy.

The exhibit has been prepared and loaned to Reis Library by Mr. Clinton J. Bebell, 900 Arlington Road, Erie, Pennsylvania, who has a complete collection of the first editions in the original bindings of every book Charles Dickens wrote except *Great Expectations*, which he has not yet been able to secure. Mr. Bebell began his collecting of Dickens' items when stationed in England during World War II and completed it with purchases from London and American booksellers upon his return.

Mr. Bebell also has a large collection of first editions of modern authors, including Hawthorne, Whittier, Stevenson, Tennyson, Kipling, and Wells. Of many of these writers, he has more than 50 percent of their first editions.

He also has a collection of more than 500 pieces illustrating the history of military guns over the past 300 years.

Sherman Returns From 2-Week Trip To East

Mr. Robert T. Sherman, Director of Admissions, returned Sunday from a two-week stay in New York city during which time he held personal conferences and group discussions with high school students in the Westchester and Long Island areas. He was accompanied by Mr. Howell F. Nomer, Assistant Director of Admissions.

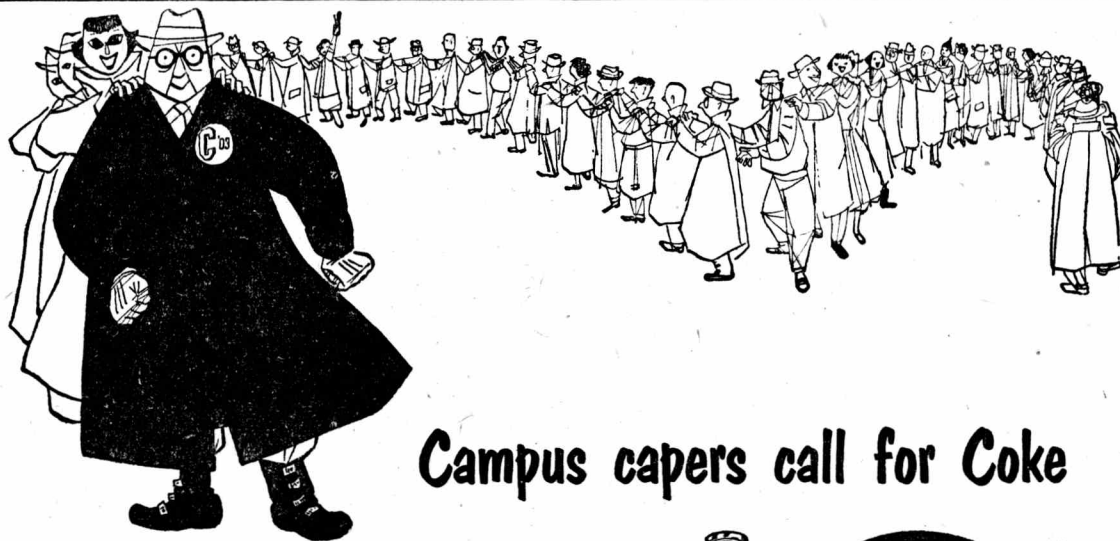

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Gridders Meet Westminster In Season's Home Final

Fast Wooster Team Runs Wild 52-13; Titans Victors In Five Out Of Six

The Golden Gators, who were soundly trounced by a fast, tricky Wooster eleven 52-13 last Saturday, take on once-beaten Westminster at College Field this Saturday. The rivalry between the two schools dates back to 1899. Last year the Gators came through against a favored Titan squad, upsetting them for our only win of the season, 19-6. Westminster hasn't beaten Allegheny since 1946, and will be really out to win this one. Last week, after defeating five straight opponents, the Titans went down under a strong Waynesburg team in a free scoring thriller, 35-27.

Westminster has 16 returning lettermen this year, including Quarterback Dick Benick who threw 13 scoring passes last year. Their backs average 170 pounds, while they sport a rugged line which tips the scales at about 200.

The Hilltoppers will be trying to salvage what is left of the season with a team riddled by injuries. Coach Henderson is still trying to find men to replace the first-stringers he lost in the Grove City game. Dave Reed's passing has improved greatly in the past few games and with a little luck he should be able to develop the passing attack into a formidable weapon.

Last Saturday was a sad day for Gator followers, who found themselves watching their team going down, to defeat at Wooster. The Hilltoppers were never really in the ball game except in the early minutes of the first quarter, when they were behind by six points, 13-7. By halftime, the deficit had mounted to 26 points, and those of us who watched the "track meet" began to wonder just how high the score could run. We found out in the second half, as the Scots got 19 more. It was the highest score against an Allegheny grid team since the early 1940's, when the Gators were beaten by 62 points.

Wooster Team Fast

The Wooster team was very fast. Allegheny men would take a Scot out of the play only to find him in on the tackle a few seconds later. Their powers of quick recovery were something we haven't seen in another Gator opponent this year. Offensively the Scots' backs were gone after they left the line of scrimmage. There wasn't an Allegheny back fast enough to catch them once they got going. John Siskowic, who went into the game with nine touchdowns, came out of it with four more to retain his lead in the Ohio Conference.

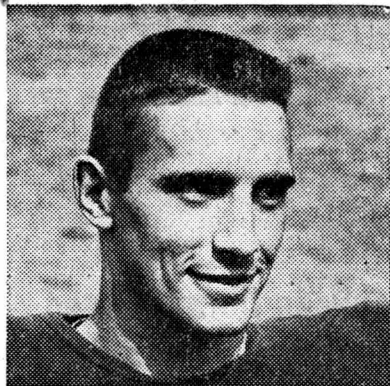

Our first TD came as a climax to a 60-yard drive featuring a nice pass from Reed to Roese, and an 11-yard scoring jaunt by Dave MacMahon, in the first quarter. The second tally put an end to the day's scoring activities, as Charley Rice took a nice pass from Reed and went over standing up. The outcome of this game gives Wooster a record of six wins and one tie, while the Gators suffered their fourth loss of the campaign.

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Book Exchange, Transportation Service Seen As Functions Of College Union

As stated in an announcement by the College Union Board of Directors, one of the many goals of the CU is to furnish "... a center for all forms of community services."

A great deal of progress has been made toward achieving this end. At the last meeting of the CU Board a committee established for the specific purpose of creating a workable service center, reported that "in the very near future our College Union will be able to provide all those services that well-established unions at other colleges and universities do."

One thing that we feel is needed on this campus is a lost-and-found department. At the present time there is no central place where lost articles can be reported or deposited. Students must resort to tacking notes on bulletin boards and doors. This obviously inefficient system is to be replaced by a lost and found office in the Union building. Here, a student will easily be able to recover lost articles.

A further service is the proposed book exchange. A record of books that students wish to buy, sell, and barter will be kept. This will include not only texts but other types of books, thus providing a rapid, inexpensive and simple method of obtaining reading material for both class work and leisure reading.

Another service feature is the transportation clearing house. Lists will be posted throughout the semester and at vacation times, containing the names of students desiring car rides. A similar list will contain the names of students who are offering car transportation, along with the time and date of departure, and expenses of the trip.

The CU Service Committee has made arrangements with the DePascale Travel Agency of Meadville, the Erie Railroad, and the Bus Terminal to provide an Allegheny College Traveling Agency for the students. This agency will maintain an office in the College Union building and will be staffed by college members. The agency will provide complete time schedules for all forms and combinations of transportation.

Besides listing exact fare rates, and making reservations, a special feature will be "direct routing", enabling a student to reach his destination in the most inexpensive way possible for any particular form of transportation. Another feature which is made possible only through the centralized nature of the agency is a charter service, whereby large groups of students having the same destination can contract special rates and exclusive flights.

Plans are now in process for arranging a direct line to the telegraph office, which would be in operation 24 hours a day, a theatre ticket agency for both the Meadville theatres (special engagements) and out of town theatres (Erie Playhouse, Cleveland Opera, etc.), and a florist service.

Allegheny Members Of Kappa Delta Epsilon To Attend Convention

The Allegheny College Chapter of Kappa Delta Epsilon, national honorary fraternity for education majors, will act as hostess chapter at the KDE biennial reunion on Saturday, November 16, at the Hotel New Yorker in New York City.

Alleghenians attending will include Daphne Wolfe, Allegheny chapter president; Eileen McDonnell, Allegheny treasurer; and June Stover, as official delegates. Other members attending will be Elizabeth Umbach, Martha Kennedy, and Carolyn Evans, as well as Miss Reba Garvey as an alumna.

At this convention KDE will install its twentieth chapter at New York University. Also planned is a reunion for all graduates who live in the New York area. Miss Vera Gerhart, the national president of the Professional Panhellenic Association, will be a guest of the convention.

Parking Fines Due At AUC Office Thursdays

Jack Olofson, chairman of the AUC Parking Committee, has announced that the AUC office will be open Thursdays from 2-15 to 4:30 p.m. for the payment of parking fines.

The committee has stressed that a continued effort is being made to keep the parking lot in front of Bentley only for those members of the faculty and administration who work in the building. Students and faculty are permitted one-half hour parking in Brooks Circle if keys are left in the car.

Art Exhibit In Reis Library Will Feature 47 Picasso Drawings

The third in the series of art exhibits sponsored by the art department in Reis Library will be a showing of 47 original drawings and paintings by Picasso for his mural, "Guernica". The display will be held from Sunday, November 9 to Sunday, November 30, according to Mr. Carl Heesch, director of exhibits. The show was organized by the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

Picasso began work on his painting just two days after the bombing of the Spanish town of Guernica by German planes. His mural shows a great variety of recurring themes; one unusual feature is the fact that it is painted entirely in blacks, whites, and grays. However, many of the sketches are in color; some in oil, others in wash and pen and ink. A photograph of the mural will also be on display.

"It is not often a school of our size gets an exhibit of this caliber," Mr. Heesch added. "Picasso is probably the most controversial and influential of contemporary painters; and his sketches depict the progress of a world-famous modern painting."

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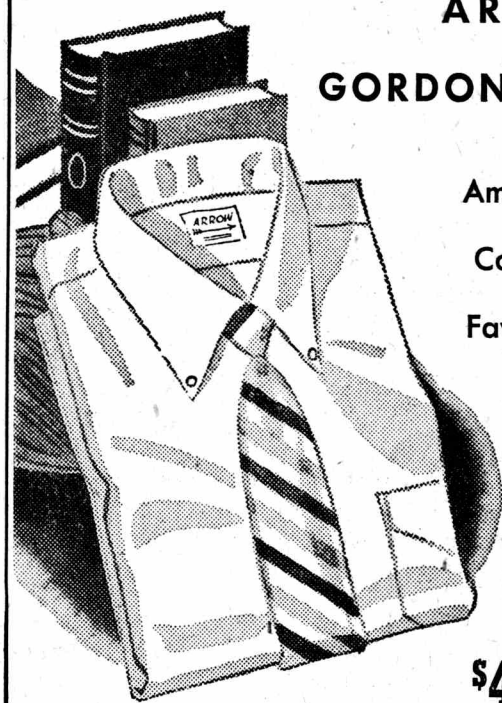

scheduling of any co-curricular activities or events. These include all lectures, concerts, social activities, and other functions which affect a major portion of the college community, whether that portion be composed of all students and faculty, or all faculty.

2. Drawing up each spring the complete activities calendar for the following year. Each organization is asked to submit to the committee a list of all its proposed campus activities, including the nature and date of each event requested. The committee then, in consultation with the organizations, endeavors to reconcile conflicts of date or place, and develop balance among the types of activities suggested.

3. Processing, during the year, any requests for additions or changes to the calendar. These may be submitted in writing to any member of the committee on blanks procurable in the Student Personnel Office. The committee meets each Thursday at 3:30 p.m., at which time it considers such requests.

4. Compiling information concerning the personnel and program of student organizations on campus, and serving as a clearing house for this information. Acting on the basis of this information, the committee occasionally makes recommendations for improvement in the functioning of such organizations.

5. Examining and continually re-appraising any and all aspects of student activities in order to arrange a program to meet the interests and desires of the campus community. In connection with this endeavor, the committee welcomes suggestions from both students and faculty.

It should be pointed out that the existence of a committee such as this, wherein both faculty and students may consider together the total program of activities of the college community, is a rare circumstance in college administration. It is a special privilege and responsibility we have here at Allegheny. It is particularly remarkable in that the students have the power effectively to outvote the faculty should sharp difference of opinion occur, but that no taking of sides as such has yet been manifest in the working of the committee. We feel that the Student Affairs Committee is really an outstanding example of student-faculty cooperation in action.

The group will meet at the College Union at 7:30 p.m. for the hayride and will return to the CU for a dance following the hayride.

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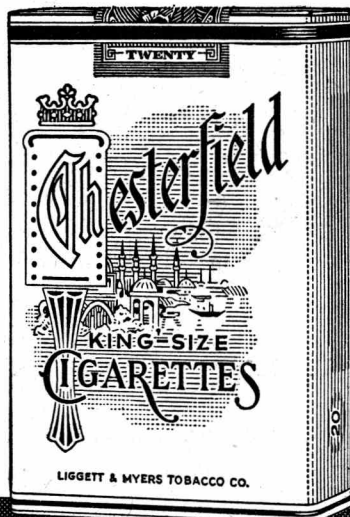
A group of people from various walks of life was organized to smoke only Chesterfields.
