Parties corresponding with prisoners must observe the following rules, viz: Write plainly. Confine yourselves strictly to business and in directing letters, put the prisoner's name plainly on envelope, care of Box 7, Deer Lodge, Montana. Nothing sent to prisoners will be returned, except money and photographs. Money sent to prisoners will be placed to their credit, and such articles as are allowed will be bought for them. Prisoners are allowed to write one letter a month, and can see their friends not oftener than once a week.

TO THE PRISONER:—Do not interline.

Put one line on each ruled line. Letters addressed to "General Delivery" in large cities will not be mailed.

A few lines to let you know that I received your letter this morning and was very glad to hear from you and I am also very glad to hear the good news I hope that I can get out of here soon I think that this party can do something for me I always thought that they could. Well Ma I was about ready to write to you and ask you to come out here as I never thought that I would have to stay here as long as I have been here. but now I have good hopes again. I was outside working for a few days, but could not stand it as I did not feel well, so I came back inside. You know I had a touch of the Flu and it made me

a little weak, but I am feeling O.K.
now. I was very sorry to hear that
you were sick. I hope that you are
well and strong again. I am also
sorry to hear about May and the baby.
I also hope that she is well and the
baby by this time I guess everyone has
been sick this year. I think that you
will like it in the Public Market, and
I suppose that Annie likes it. It is
better than being in a factory. Well
Ma you don't know how glad I
will be to get back home, maybe that
I can get back in the public market
also, until I get my fitney again, then
will be the happy days. I am going to
be waiting every day now for the
good news, just as soon as you hear
any write and let me know. Well
I will close now hoping that your
next letter will be full of good
