

Link begins college term as first female president

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The beginning of every school year brings new faces to Allegheny College's campus — though it is rare that one of those new faces is the school's president.

Rome and 22nd president of Allegheny, began her tenure on July 1 after President James Mullen retired on June 30. She is the first female president in the history of the college.

"I feel really good about (being the first female president)," Link said. "Mostly because the reactions from students and alums, both male and female, have been really

positive. ... In some ways, selecting me signals an openness on the college's part for a new direction and approach."

Link said she is honored to be the first female president of Allegheny.

"I would like to believe I am a president, and not just a woman president," Link said. "I think it's a great opportunity to showcase Allegheny. I

think it's great for young people, including my own three kids, to show that a college can have a woman president and it's not that big of a deal. I also think it was time after 204 years."

Link's first experience with Allegheny happened when she was helping her twin nephews apply for college about 15 months before she began as Allegheny's presi-

dent. While reading through a book of colleges, Link saw Allegheny, she said.

"It talked a lot about the major and minor combinations, which resonated a lot with me because I have a great interest in interdisciplinarity and combining different interests," Link said.

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Start of school year brings administrative changes

Office of Student Leadership and Involvement hires Cole as student life coordinator

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Allegheny College saw a significant number of changes over the summer, ranging from major renovations to Crawford Hall to President Link beginning her tenure as the 22nd president of the college.

The Office of Student Leadership and Involvement also experienced change over the summer, with Brittany Martin, former assistant director of student leadership and involvement, accepting a position at Penn State DuBois.

Allegheny named Casey Cole the new coordinator of student life. Cole resumed many of Martin's previous responsibilities, such as being the advisor for sorority and fraternity life, and being involved with Gator Activities Programming and the Major Events Committee. Cole graduated from Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania in 2016 with a major in English and minor in political science. In addition to her schoolwork, Cole served as the recruitment chair for her sorority, Phi Sigma Sigma.

Immediately following her undergraduate career, Cole ended up working for a state representative.

"During that time, I didn't really know what I wanted to do with my life," Cole said. "Someone asked me once, 'When were you the happiest?' And I said, 'When I was the recruitment chair for my sorority when I was in college.'"

This conversation led Cole to pursue a master's degree in student affairs in higher education at Slippery Rock University.

Although Cole is new to the position, she is not new to Allegheny. Cole worked closely with Martin and served as the Student of Leadership and Involvement intern during the 2018-'19 academic year.

"Being an intern is a lot of watching and learning," Cole said. "My favorite thing about working in this office was that I got to learn so much. I got to go to (fraternity and sorority) Run-Out in January, and I got to see the recruitment process from the other side."

As an intern, Cole also worked with GAP and the MEC on events such as Winterfest and Springfest.

"I learned so much," Cole said. "It was a totally new experience for me."

As coordinator of student life, Cole has also helped oversee parts of orientation and welcome weekend.

"I had a little bit of experience with (orientation) at Slippery Rock, but that was new," Cole said. "I'm just really excited for school to start."

Cole encourages new students to get out of their comfort zones and try new things.

"That was my biggest issue as a freshman," Cole said.

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New beginnings, new leadership

“Strangely, I got an email about a month later asking if I would ever consider Allegheny — and I said, ‘in fact, I would.’”

After approximately one month into the job, people who have met and worked with Link have expressed the great first impressions they have had of her.

“She’s wonderful, she really hit the ground running when she got here,” said Pamela Higham, assistant to the president. “She’s been a delight to get to know. I think she has a fantastic vision for the college. I truly believe students will love her, and I can’t wait for students to get to know her.”

Mary Feeley, member of the board of trustees, described the excitement Link has already brought to the table.

“She has a completely new energy and perspective,” Feeley said. “She has a diverse ex-

perience base, and she’s very smart. She listens very well, along with asking very good questions.”

After seeing Link in her first few meetings with the board, Feeley said she is confident Link is ready to learn.

“You can tell she really wants to have a deeper understanding of how things work,” Feeley said. “She’s also a very nice person, someone you just really want to talk to. She really just seems to get us, and what the board is trying to do. I think she’s a great addition and the board is very excited to have (Link) at the helm.”

Link described her transition from Rome to Meadville, including the challenges and differences between the two places.

“I’m so excited about being in this role and this community,” Link said. “That has really helped me keep my energy up in what has been a non-

stop first month. What’s really interesting is the amount of data I’m asking my brain to process at all times. There are hundreds of new people and faces I’m getting to know, there are data and facts that I simply have to learn. It’s exhausting on your brain, but so energizing.”

Not only was her job transition interesting, Link said, but the physical move was as well. She said her family did not arrive until Aug. 9, and her belongings came a few days later.

“I’ve actually been living out of a suitcase for six weeks,” Link said.

Link outlined some of the similarities and differences between Temple Rome and Allegheny. Temple is a large public institution with 38,000 students between all of its campuses, but only 600 to 700 students on the Rome campus at a time. She said the vast majority of students were only on the campus for one semester.

“Everything seemed to happen a bit on warp speed,” Link said. “It was almost like your four years of college condensed into one semester. You would arrive, there was homesickness, there was culture shock, there was adapting to being in a totally different place, and then 14 weeks later students would leave.”

Link said that she would

see a lot more of a transformation in one semester than there would normally be in a four-year college.

“That’s what I love about working with higher (education) institutions, is to get to know students when they come in and then see them evolve and transform and grow, and then see them as they move beyond,” Link said.

Because of these differences and because she is new to her position at Allegheny, Link said she wants to use the upcoming school year as a learning period and to see things as a prospective student might.

“Part of how I’m spending the next six to 12 months is just listening to people,” Link said. “I want to understand what their hopes and aspirations for Allegheny are.”

While she is the president of the college, Link said that she is moving in right along with the new students.

“I’ve been very honest with people in saying that I know less about the college than all of (the students), so I need to understand from all of (them) where the opportunities for the college to move forward are and might be,” Link said. “What I don’t want to do is come in and say, ‘OK total change of direction,’ because that’s not who I am, and that’s also not the right thing for the college.”

Link expressed that she wanted this year to be a dynamic learning year in which themes and small changes might emerge.

“Anytime you come into a new institution, you see things that the outgoing person hasn’t seen,” Link said. “And I’m watching that happen even in my former position. After awhile you’re so immersed in what you’re doing and the institution that you don’t see that.”

Before he retired, Mullen held meetings with Link, and he acted generously and warmly toward her, Link said.

“He was also very respectful of saying, ‘you know, I’ve had my own ways of doing things which were different from how my predecessor did them, and you will arrive at your own ways of being president and doing things as president and I don’t want to step on your toes,’” Link said.

Along with showing her kindness as she came into the position, Mullen was helpful in answering questions and giving advice, Link said.

“One piece of advice he gave me is, ‘look, you’re in this for the long term, you don’t have to do everything at once,’” Link said. “‘You need to educate yourself, but you also need to take care of yourself and your family, because that will allow you to better steward the college.’”

Link added that while she has big shoes to fill, she is really looking forward to meeting more of the students and finding her own ways of doing things.

“I’m looking forward to getting to know the students and for them to get to know me,” Link said. “One of the biggest challenges, I think, will be stepping into the big shoes left by President Mullen, because of how beloved he was by the students. That is remarkable because you don’t always hear that on a college campus.”

Link spoke on Mullen’s unique ways of doing things, and said she knew how all college presidents work differently.

“He really had his own unique ways, and I look forward to finding my own ways, which will inevitably be different in getting to know the students, and becoming a part of this campus community,” Link said. “I’m excited to get to know more of the students as they come, and to see how they change throughout.”

Students will have the opportunity to meet President Link at the student celebration, “Imagine the Possibilities,” which will be held in conjunction with the Involvement Fair from 5 to 7 p.m. Thursday.

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Bonnaure also believes he can make an impact on the student-athletes, since he was a student-athlete prior to accepting the coaching position at Allegheny.

“I hope my impact on campus for all student-athletes and other students can be an overall positive one,” Bonnaure said. “I hope that I am somebody they feel like they can turn to for advice.”

His main goal, Bonnaure said, is to help grow the athletic legacy of Allegheny’s student body while helping to bring in top-notch student-athletes.

“My primary focus will be on helping the Gators play winning basketball, while also recruiting and graduating tremendous student-athletes and overall people,” Bonnaure said. “I want the basketball program, and the entire athletic department, to be a point of pride for all Allegheny Students.”

Residence Life will be adding Stephanie Carson, ’16, as the student life coordinator. After graduating from Allegheny with a psychology major and Spanish minor, Carson taught

for three years before accepting the job from her alma mater.

“I wanted to return to my alma mater and work with the students here at Allegheny,” Carson said. “Previously, I have worked as a teacher for three years and I was ready to work with older (students). I’m excited to be able to work with people who are passionate about issues and able to take action to make changes in the world.”

For Carson, the students on Allegheny’s campus are the driving force behind her desire to work at the school. Her main goal is to make sure students are comfortable on campus, no matter who they are or what might be affecting them.

“I hope that by working with students, specifically with the (resident advisors), we can make sure everyone feels like they belong on the campus and that they are empowered and prepped to be successful in their lives,” Carson said. “I’m passionate about mental health, self-care and professional growth.”

The Allegheny Office of Admissions will be filling the position of Campus Visit and Building Coordinator. Rachel

Meerson will be filling the position just in time for the new semester.

Meerson earned her bachelor’s degree in behavioral sciences from the University of Chicago and worked in brand protection and e-commerce fraud prevention for close to 18 years. Before accepting the position at Allegheny College, Meerson worked as an ophthalmic assistant.

“I feel that my friendliness and acceptance of all people will be one of my contributions to the college community,” Meerson said. “I am excited to be part of the community here at Allegheny College. I love being in close contact with all the teaching and learning that happens here on a daily basis.”

Ben Helkowski III will also be joining the list of new employees, and will be working in the Allegheny Gateway. Helkowski graduated from The Ohio State University and is currently finishing his graduate studies at Mercyhurst University. He will graduate from Mercyhurst with a degree in organizational leadership in the spring of 2020.

Martin was set to become the advisor for ASG. However, Gretchen Beck, associate dean for wellness education, will be filling the position again this year.

Champions deserve compensation, USWNT continues to fight battle

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This summer in France, at the FIFA Women’s World Cup, the U.S. Women’s National Soccer Team held the world on notice as they brought home their fourth World Cup title in the heat of the Equal Pay for Equal Play movement. They took their stance, they have backed up their complaints with actions and now they are demanding equality in return — as they should.

Last spring, the USWNT filed an initial lawsuit against the United States Soccer Federation for discrimination in terms of compensation for their efforts. Twenty-eight members of the team claimed they are working toward class-action status over “institutionalized gender discrimination,” according to Bleacher Report.

Many players have been extremely vocal about their fight for equality — even before the World Cup began. Multiple statements were released, including one from the team’s co-captain Carli Lloyd.

“In light of our team’s unparalleled success on the field, it’s a shame that we still are fighting for treatment that reflects our achievements and contributions to the sport,” Lloyd said in March. “We have made progress in narrowing the gender pay gap, however progress does not mean that we will stop working to realize our legal rights and make equality a reality for our sport.”

It is important to keep in mind that even before the U.S. women’s team went to battle in France for the World Cup, it was already obvious there was a pay gap discrepancy between the U.S. men and women’s teams. Yes, maybe over a long period of time the men have brought in more revenue, but since the women’s World Cup victory in 2015, women have consistently brought in roughly \$23 million a game. The men bring in \$2 million. Despite this,

the men’s team makes an unbelievable amount more per player than the women’s team.

This topic isn’t new, and there certainly has been extreme backlash from critics stating the men make more because they draw a larger crowd, or because they generate more revenue, but that argument is obviously not true.

The USWNT put their grievances aside — grievances they should not have to deal with in the first place — to play in the World Cup this past summer, even though they knew that if they won, their winnings would be nowhere near as significant as the men’s World Cup winnings. Granted all of the women have worked their entire lives to make the 23-man roster for the World Cup, but their desires to make the team and play at the grandest stage should not be taken advantage of by the U.S. Soccer Federation, nor should they ever have to worry about a pay discrepancy in the first place.

The players knew going in that if they won, each team member would walk away with \$250,000 in prize money, while the prize for the men to win would be over \$1.1 million. They even knew that the World Cup final was going to be televised on the same exact day as Copa América, which is a men’s soccer world championship. They had all of these

pre-existent, unfair realities they battled, and yet they still came out as champions.

Now that the World Cup celebrations and ticker tape parades are over and interviews and the victory tour have ended, a four-game span of friendly matches across the United States has begun. The national team is no longer demanding equal pay — they are now looking for change.

There is no denying that the women’s national team is more successful than the men’s team, driving demand to watch them play and even the demand for their gear to sky rocket. Following the World Cup, Nike released the news that in their earnings report, the women’s 2019 stadium home jersey is now the No. 1-selling soccer jersey, men’s or women’s, ever sold on the company’s website in one season. According to Fanatics, this is the top-selling U.S. national soccer team, men’s or women’s, of all time, with sales up over 500% compared to 2015.

Not only have sales skyrocketed, but every single game during their victory tour have been sell-outs, including a game played at the Rose Bowl Stadium. They are drawing in crowds and generating revenue through team apparel, yet their team is unfairly compensated, even though they make the Feder-

ation more money than the men’s team.

Finally, this lawsuit is set for a May 2020 trial, and hopefully they will come out on top, because they definitely deserve it. They represent our country at the highest level, sacrificing their bodies to bring championships back to the United States. The least that could be done is proper compensation for true winners.

As for us fans: we need to stand alongside the USWNT in their fight for equality. Go out and watch the women’s national team and their respective professional teams. The more people that attend the games, the more likely it is their pay will increase. They can’t be alone in this battle. They fought to represent us, so we need to fight for them.

I miss you dearly every single day. Sometimes I catch myself daydreaming about what life would be like if you were still here. Would you still watch the Pittsburgh Pirates in disgust, claiming you would never watch them again every time they lost, even though you and I both knew you were watching the next game? I could go on for days.

I wish you could be at my college graduation. I wish you could be at my wedding. I wish you could have met your future great-grandchildren who would love you even more than I do.
