WHO'S WHO AND WHY

Thirteen new faces appear this year in Faculty Row in Chapel. Some replace the six old faces which for various reasons are not with us, while these are indicative of the phenomenal growth of Allegheny and the Allegheny Spirit.

Each fall when Allegheny folk assemble on the Hill to resume work in the College, there are new faces to be seen, and familiar ones to be missed.

Among the student body, readjustment is a matter of a few days only. Among the faculty, no one lags in greeting new members and breaking the ice of social recognitions.

We are a large family, here on the Hill, and it behooves us to become acquainted with each other as early in the year as practicable.

Similar trips are made by most technical schools, and without a doubt it will become an established custom for the Department of Chemistry at Allegheny.

Meadville's Ten Thousand For College Gymnasium

COMMITTEE GETS BUSY AND
FIRST DAY'S WORK IS VERY
ENCOURAGING.

Very encouraging reports were made at a meeting held in Cochran Hall Monday evening of the ten teams that are representing Meadville in the interests of the fund for the building improvements to be made on the Allegheny College campus this school year. Meadville is to supply \$10,000 of the fund of \$150,000 to be expended on the new gymnasium and the addition to Hulings Hall, and a committee of representative business men of the City have undertaken to meet the obligation, feeling sure that their action will meet with general approval in the community.

Although there has been some delay in getting started, the work showed a good start on Monday, when the full soliciting force was busy, and several very generous subscriptions were reported at the evening meeting, held for a review of the day's work.

The committee finds that, while there is quite general appreciation of the justness of the claim of the college for support in the notably extensive improvements it is just now making, representing an expenditure of \$150,000, and the fact that the sum agreed on as to the City's contribution, \$10,000, is very small, all things considered, there are many who do not fully realize the large part that Allegheny College plays in the life of the City and just why Meadville should be ready to respond to such calls as this one now claiming attention.

Allegheny has large investments in Meadville and a student roll of more than 500, in addition to the members of the faculty and their families. This means a large sum of money spent here every year, the increase growing with the growth of the City. It is a big item in the business of the City alone, to say nothing of the value as an advertisement.

Y. M. C. A.

The Y. M. C. A. meeting of last week was given over to Dr. Clement G. Clark, a specialist on Social Hygiene. He discussed the question from all angles and stated that it was one of the most important questions, if not the most important question, that we have to face today. Dr. Clark was in France during the war and was a very forcible speaker.

ALLEGHENY AND WESTMINSTER BATTLE TO SCORELESS TIE

Neither Eleven Able to Penetrate Opposing Defense Successfully on Soggy Field

SIX SENIORS PLAY LAST GAME FOR ALLEGHENY

Last Saturday afternoon at New Wilmington, Pa., the Allegheny and Westminster College football teams battled to a scoreless tie. The game was full of thrills from the very beginning of play, but neither team was able to follow up advantages on its opponents to the extent of forcing the ball across for a touchdown.

The field was soggy and thickly mudded as a result of recent rains. A slippery ball and unsteady footing were the only detriments to the marked success of the attempted open play by both teams. The Westminster aerial attack seemed to be more successful in the matter of completion of passes, but the score of the game is indicative of the failure of these completed passes to be of much consequence.

On the whole, the evenness of the strength of both teams was the most noticeable and remarkable fact of the contest. The statement cannot be made that Allegheny outplayed Westminster or that Westminster outplayed Allegheny, for, whenever one of the teams secured an advantage on the other aggregation, strenuous fighting in seeming desperation stemmed the tide of the oncoming opposing team. Allegheny was once forced to her nine yard line, with four downs to go for Westminster, but the Gold and Blue tightened in their defense, prevented the scoring of the Westminster team, and took the ball away from the home team on downs. The circumstance was almost exactly repeated close to the Westminster goal line. Examples of such formidable defense on the side of both teams were frequent throughout the contest. The game finally resolved itself to an exchange of the ball, either by punts, intercepted passes, or resulting from the inability to advance the ball through the line on plunges.

Beatty, '19, who is pursuing a medical course at the University of Pittsburgh. The small bones or rather ossicles referred to in the letter are minute structures located in the inner part of the ear. The specimens sent to Dr. Henke were shown to the students of the Psychology classes. The letter reads:

My dear Doctor:
Our class in Osteology had the honor of discovering the fact that the incus, malleus, and stapes could be removed from the skull. We handed in to the head of the department all these bones, which had never been taken out of the whole collection of skulls here.

Those students who attend the "movies", given by the Y. M. C. A. every Saturday night in the Chapel do not

consider, many of them, the expense the Y. M. C. A. is put to in bringing these attractions to the College. The fact that no admission is charged seems to indicate to some that no expense is incurred. As a matter of fact, it costs considerably to put the "movies" on. Furthermore, it means that some one has to devote time and care in providing amusement for others. It is only right that appreciation be shown them.

That the "movies" are appreciated is shown by the large crowd that has been attending. Right of Appreciation but not the Not Shown right kind of appreciation has been shown by some students. Hooting and yelling and in other ways interfering with the orderliness of the performance offers a hindrance to those who are expending their efforts in showing the pictures, and it must appear to them that the efforts are not properly esteemed. If you enjoy the "movies," show it by gentlemanly conduct.

Not only did the conduct of some last Saturday night not show the proper attitude toward Discourtesy those in charge, but it to Guests was discourteous to the extreme. Many who are not students attended the showing of "The Crisis," and should have been considered as guests or the College. Every courtesy should have been extended to them but, instead, their enjoyment of the picture was hampered by various kinds of hoodlumism. We hope that those who have been guilty of these offenses were only Freshmen, who, either did not know any better, or acted thoughtlessly. Certainly, any upper classmen who indulges in such antics keep himself open to serious censure. In the future let us have a little more respect for the feelings of those in charge, of our fellow students, and most of all, for the guests who are present.

The game last Saturday with Westminster concluded the schedule for the 1919 season. On the basis of games won and lost the season was far from satisfactory. Those, however who are prone to be severe in their censure of the team, let them consider for a moment a few outstanding facts. Of the three games lost to Grove City, Geneva and Carnegie Tech, only in the game with Tech were we outplayed or beaten by a superior team. It was the consensus of opinion of those who witnessed the Grove City game that Allegheny outplayed the big Red team at all stages of the game; only the individual playing of one or two star players kept Allegheny from victory. Only in the first game of the season did Allegheny put a team on the field in first class physical condition.

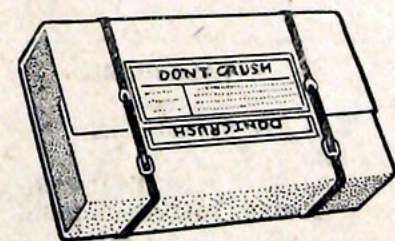

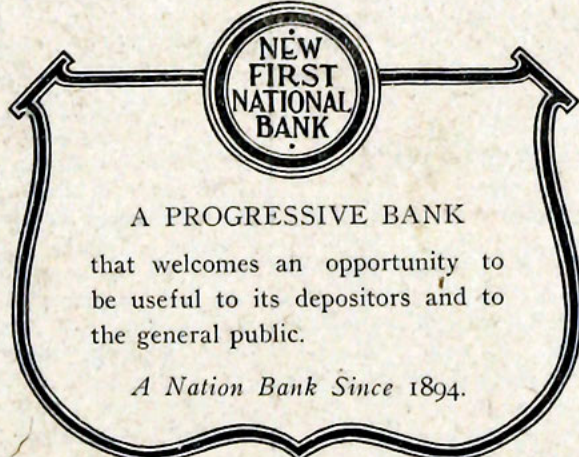

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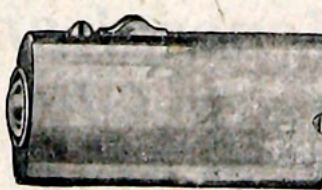
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
