FAMINE IS REPORTED TO EXIST IN LONDON

COCKROACHES LOSE OLD HOMES;
LIZARDS GO HUNGRY

Apartment dwellers in American cities will be interested to know at least one populous spot on the globe is afflicted with a dearth of cockroaches.

When the reptiles in the London Zoo were moved recently to new and sanitary quarters, the large, mouse-sized American cockroaches that had made their home in the warm, dark, dirty lurking places around the furnace pipes were out of luck. In the process of making the old reptile house over into a home for small birds, the dark places have been opened up, the warm pipes removed and the dirt cleared away with the consequent disappearance of suitable cockroach homes.

Their presence in their old abiding place was condoned by the keepers if not actually encouraged, not only because the insects furnished food for many of the lizards but because the keepers turned many an honest penny by selling them to biological laboratories for dissection. Now, however, there is a cockroach famine. Large juicy cockroaches of the American variety can be found in no other animal house in the Zoological Gardens, so the Zoo authorities have had recourse to breeding them in the insectarium where other insects and worms are bred to gratify the capricious appetites of the larger Zoo inhabitants.

ALLEGHENY FIGHTS GAMELY BUT LOSES TO GROVE CITY

Patched Lineup Is No Equal For the Crimson's Best—
Officiating Seems Questionable

Allegheny's fighting grid machine made a glorious stand against the Crimson warriors from Grove City in the annual clash between the two schools at Grove City last Saturday. After a whirlwind start so characteristic of the team's play this year, which netted a touchdown early in the first period the Allegheny defense wilted under the smashing attack of the Grovers. The final score was 21-6 in favor of Grove City.

Allegheny sent a fighting team into the game. But it was a team weakened by injuries and sickness. It was unable to stop the driving offense of the Grovers after the first period. No Allegheny team ever staged a gamier fight against such overwhelming odds. Not until the final whistle blew was Allegheny beaten. Even when the score was 21-6 the Blue and Gold rallied and completed several forward passes and it looked as though the Merrittmen were on the way to another touchdown. However one of the passes fell into the eager arms of a Grove City back and soon the final whistle spelled defeat for Allegheny.

Forward passes were the chief ground gainers for Allegheny while Grove City used both forward and lateral passes to gain. Grove City flashed a spectacular running attack which at times completely foiled Allegheny. Only under the shadow of their own goal posts did the Allegheny players brace and hurl back the Crimson tide.

Grove City was penalized several times for holding and offside but there is a feeling among Alleghenians

FORTUNE GOES UP IN SMOKE ON PRE-CHAPEL CIGARETTES

As I stood at the chapel door the other day I watched the men go in, almost every one depositing a defunct cigarette on the ground at the side of the door. As the last man deposited his on the pile, my curiosity overcame me, and I counted the "butts." There were exactly eighty-seven, all of which had seen better days.

At this point the longing for compiling statistics overcame me. Try as I would the temptation could not be shaken off. To satisfy myself I must go through the actions of an habitual smoker, timing each action.

Smoking the cigarette to within an inch from one end necessitated twenty-three average "drags." Each drag takes ten seconds—five for inhaling and five for exhaling. Between each puff is a lapse of five seconds. The result is a sum of one hundred ten seconds for twenty-two such lapses. And, of course it takes about five seconds to light up, which adds five seconds. For each cigarette then, the total result is three hundred forty-five seconds or five and three-quarters minutes.

For 87 such smokes this totals 500.27 minutes or 8.337 hours spent in smoking before chapel to say nothing of cigars and pipes.

Counting 20 cigarettes to the package makes 4.3 packages at a total

Mrs. I. R. Beiler Seeks Local Office Of School Director

Alleghenians were agreeably surprised to hear of the announcement of Mrs. Beiler, wife of Dr. I. R. Beiler, as a candidate for school director. She is running on the Independent ticket and is conducting an aggressive campaign for election to the Meadville school board. In an interview with a Campus reporter Mrs. Beiler stated that it was the purpose of her candidacy to eliminate from control of the public schools Miss Euphemia Haxton and the alleged political clique which she represents.

Miss Haxton was for many years a teacher and principal, and is at present a school director seeking reelection. Miss Haxton it is alleged is opposed to Meadville's progressive and capable superintendent of schools, and she is unwilling to introduce modern educational methods.

Mrs. Beiler has been endorsed by many business, social and political leaders of the town who realize the inadequacy of local public school instruction. She is well qualified to serve as school director, for she knows Meadville's needs, and with four children in school, she has a personal interest in raising the educational standards.

McCALL'S HAS ARTICLE ON STUDENTS' MORALS

HELEN TAFT MANNING ASKS, "IS
YOUTH REBELLIOUS?"
—ANSWER IS HERE

We have become so accustomed to talk about Youth Movements and wild Young People that it may seem superfluous to ask whether the members of our younger generation really are as much inclined to shake off the leadership of their elders as is commonly supposed. But middle-aged critics might well consider the convention for the fourteen college newspapers recently held at Amherst College.

These young men, who we may assume are representative of undergraduate thought at the present moment, deplored certain tendencies in modern collegiate life including the drinking and the overemphasis on athletic prowess. But they went on to assert their belief that these evils did not originate on the college campus but were brought there from without. It is from the older members of the family or community that the boys (and often the girls) learn to drink and it is from the alumni rather than from the undergraduates that the demand comes for a totally exaggerated attention to athletics.

I cannot believe that these college boys at Amherst were merely "passing the buck." I feel convinced that they were looking deeper into the causes of things than many of their glib critics. We are constantly hearing criticism of the present day undergraduate from the alumnae of the women's college. She is accused of being utterly irresponsible, lacking in public spirit, and guilty in individual cases of all sorts of misconduct presumably unknown in happier, purer days.

Now it is true that college girls smoke more cigarettes, wear less clothing and go on more late parties in automobiles than their predecessors in 1910. But for the most part college girls have been very little discouraged in these practices at home. The increase in divorce, the disregard of law, the high tension under which we all live is not the work of this famous "Younger Generation" but of the generation which graduated between 1900 and 1910, and it is they who are refusing to recognize their responsibility in the matter. My own impression is that the boys and girls now in college are, for the most part, bewildered and troubled over the lack of definite standards of right and wrong which they find on every side, and that the more conscientious are asking for more guidance and more restrictions rather than for more freedom.

The young men and women are quite as docile and as simple in their mental processes today as they ever were, and they take the world very much as they find it. They are not trying to work out a new philosophy of life nor to upset old creeds. They find themselves in a restless, changing world with most of the old creeds questioned and many of the old moral

Society For Piano Study Advancement Formed In Country

Because they believe that piano study is, and always will be, an important factor in the development of every child, a group of internationally known educators and musicians have banded themselves together for the purpose of furthering interest in piano study among the children of the world. This group of leading thinkers in child education and music have called themselves the Committee For Advancement of Piano Study. Some thirty-five men and women, among whom are such famous people as Dr. J. A. C. Chandler, president of the College of William and Mary, Walter Damrosch, Ernestine Schumann-Heink, Dean Harold L. Butler of Syracuse University, Mrs. Edgar Stillman-Kelley, and Dr. James Francis Cooke, have pledged themselves to a united drive, with the slogan, "Piano study for every child."

The committee is ready to lend every effort in behalf of this education program, realizing that the piano is the basic instrument of all music, embodying all the elements of the art, namely; melody, rhythm, and harmony.

The committee does not intend to have every child a piano virtuoso. Its ambition is merely to enable children to learn enough about the piano and its literature so that they can perform the masterpieces for themselves, and in this manner comprehend the beauty of music.

AIR ATTACKS ARE MADE DIFFICULT BY DEVICE

IMPROVED FIRE CONTROL
FORCES ENEMY PLANES
OUT OF RANGE

Defense from the ground against attack from the air, recognized ever since the World War as one of the most difficult of all military problems, has made great strides during recent months.

New weapons and fire control instruments developed by the Ordnance Corps of the Army and now undergoing tests at the proving grounds at Aberdeen, Md., go far toward taking the soldier on foot out of the class of a mere helpless target for bombs and "strafing" machine gun fire from planes, to which he has been assigned by popular conceptions.

The most striking of the new means of defense is not in itself a new weapon, but a means of making more effective use of already existing weapons. This is the new electrical fire-control instrument for anti-aircraft guns, which enables the commander of a battery to sight all four of his guns simultaneously, and also to set the fuses for all the shells. These important details have hitherto been attended to separately, for each gun, with the result that errors both in direction of fire and in position of the shell at the moment of burst have crept in, seriously lowering the effectiveness of the fire.

The new system makes it possible for a battery of four 3-inch guns to deliver a horizontal range of 15,000 yards. The same control system has been applied to the new 105-millimeter, or 4.1-inch guns, which fire only half as fast, but throw a shell more than twice as heavy to a height of 2,000 yards and an extreme horizontal range of 19,000 yards.

These two weapons commonly use shrapnel, which is timed to burst short of the target and throw toward it a shower of hardened lead alloy balls, shot-gun fashion. A smaller caliber gun, however, is designed to attack planes with high explosive shell that bursts on contact with even so slight an obstacle as the fabric of wing or fuselage. A third promising weapon is the new .50-caliber Browning machine gun, which throws a clear-shaped bullet half an inch in diameter and weighing about two ounces. Just as the coast defense artillery is usually able, by the mere threat of its presence, to keep an enemy fleet at a long distance, so the anti-aircraft weapons are expected to force enemy planes and dirigibles to fly at such heights that their bombing, observing, photographing and other activities will be relatively ineffective.

In the past few weeks several articles have appeared in this publication in regard to the manner and extent of the cheering at football games.

Why does Allegheny not have more pep? Why does she not have more to its cheering? Is it all the fault of the cheerleaders? No—emphatically—NO.

If three men go along all week, each in his own narrow way, without speaking to each other or in any way cooperating; can they be expected to sit at a football game and cheer together? They are expected to, but, who cares about that? The whole thing is this: there is too much independence around this school for the schools' own good. Why can't we go around the campus and see men and women—not foolish boys and girls, who, because of narrowmindedness in respect to social obligations which they have assumed, are too high hat to speak to a classmate.

Spirit of that calibre has never been an aid to any institution and especially is it detracting and unsavory in a small college like Allegheny.

What we need in this school is COOPERATION AMONG STUDENTS! We never can hope to attain this as long as certain individuals insist on thinking that they are too good for the rest of the college. If they are—why did they come here to school?

Allegheny needs MEN and WOMEN and the sooner it is realized the sooner the problem of school spirit and cooperation among students will be realized to the fullest degree.

CLEAN SPORTSMANSHIP

Allegheny followers can certainly be proud of the record for clean sportsmanship that the Blue and Gold squad has compiled so far this season. Not once has Allegheny been penalized for any infraction of the rules with the single exception of offside. And that is caused only by eagerness; not with intent to foul.

As a rule Allegheny has encountered the same kind of sportsmanship but several times during the past two seasons, teams of a different stamp have been met. Penalties for holding, and now and then one for slugging, have been increasingly frequent. Many times the officials have been unable to detect fouls because they were done in pileups or were cleverly executed. Although none of them have resulted seriously, no one knows when they will.

The dirty player is not tolerated at Allegheny. When an Allegheny man tries to break over the line he is invited to warm the bench. If all teams were similarly managed injuries would be reduced to a minimum. Alleghenians can be proud of the fact that their coach and team prefer to meet dirty football with clean, hard tactics.

HAIL, ALLEGHENY!

Again Westminster stands up to give a long yell to Allegheny. Good sportsmanship such as was exhibited at the football game Saturday will go a long way toward creating college relations. The influence upon non-partisan spectators is wholesome. The effect upon the rival student bodies is broadening. The reaction by members of the contesting teams is conducive to good will.

Both teams played hard and well. Neither really deserved to win. It was a fifty-fifty proposition. But, when the final whistle blew and the referee tossed the coin to ascertain the winner of the ball, Allegheny won the toss—and then gave the ball to Westminster. This "beau geste" came as a fitting climax to a game marked by splendid sportsmanship.—The Westminster Holcad.

shiftbooths undermined. Having more energy to expend than the rest of us, they do tend to become even more restless and perhaps more destructive than their middle-aged parents, but the initiative is not theirs. College teachers are often annoyed when undergraduates frankly criticize the courses and regulations prescribed for them. But none should know better than they that the students reflect rather than create the modern tendency to frank speech and franker criticism. No advice from a parent will impress a child of ten as much as the example of a child of fifteen; no faculty can mean as much to the undergraduate of 1927 as the graduates of ten and twenty years ago.

In many respects the college student of today, far from being rebellious, is the most hopeless conservative of individuals, and his teachers despair in their efforts to keep him from taking the precedent of his elders (which may be a precedent of callow criticism) for unquestionable truth. What the older critic resents but often fails to make clear is that these young people's conservatism is based not on his standards but on those of the generation between his and theirs.

agine the condition of the river which has hundreds of other ghats lining its banks, each giving its share of dirt and disease. The burning ghats are along the river and there, if the family has money, the dead one can be burned and his ashes scattered on the Holy Ganges. However if the family is poor, the body is thrown on the river and the vultures dispose of it. When you see the little child-women widows, outcastes and beggars, you wonder if the British government is so kind after all when they prevent the burning of wives on their husband's funeral pyres.

In Agra we found the beautiful things of our journey. You just long to have time to go about for days with a good guide, seeing the Fort from one gate to the other; great sandstone buildings with fine carvings much of which is still in good condition, the Zenanas, the marble mosques, the fountains and pools, the Audience Chambers, and the famous Jasmine Tower. This was the favorite room of Mumtazi-Mahal and the Emperor Shah Jahan. Here Shah Jahan died with his eyes on the Taj Mahal. The room is of marble inlaid with semi-precious stones—cornelian, lapis lazuli. The fountain was inlaid with gold and silver and used to spout rosewater. The fort must have been gorgeous in ancient times with velvet canopies embroidered in gold, rugs six inches thick, fountains and canals filled and spraying, and the niches in the walls filled with flowers. The Taj Mahal must be the most beautiful building in the world! It is beautiful in outward form and material but it is even more beautiful in its carvings and inlay work. The screen about the false vaults is of marble but so delicately carved and so highly polished that it looks like ivory or old lace. The real vaults, also of marble inlaid with these same kinds of stones, are below the false ones so that the Mohammedan custom of having no one walk over the dead may be observed. The Emperor did not expect to be buried with his wife; he began a black marble tomb for himself on the other side of the Jumna river. His son imprisoned him before he more than began it. For this reason his vault is a little to the left of hers and not in the centre. Once there was a canopy of pearls that was thrown over her tomb, and a gold screen surrounded her. These were carried away by invaders, with vast fortunes in jewels and gold and silver.

Darjeeling even out of season as it is now is well worth the trip. We saw the "eternal" snows twice and one of the peaks we saw was Kinchinjunga; 28,000 feet, the second highest in the world. The hills and valleys from Darjeeling (7,000 feet) lose their proper proportion. The trees look like tea bushes, and the river looks like foot wide stream. In this lovely town which seems to cling to the mountain side, you find the Tibetan people, happy, healthy, and hard-working folk, who can carry enormous loads in baskets held in place by a strap around their foreheads, and who keep all their wealth in gold and silver jewelry. We had a great time there that week, walking and shopping, eating and sleeping.

Yes, it's been a treat to see this much of India, but I'm the happiest person you know to be going back to Malaya. I wouldn't trade it for India in any respect. Isn't it nice that we folk out here love our own stations best?

POWERFUL PANTHER MACHINE ENGAGES ALLEGHENY SATURDAY

Pitt Team This Year Is Vastly Superior To Last Year's
When Score Was 9-7

Allegheny's football team will be called upon to meet one of the strongest football eleven in the country this Saturday when they stack up against Coach Sutherland's outfit at the Pitt Stadium. Of course Allegheny can not hope for a victory, but they undoubtedly will put forth every possible effort to keep the score as low as possible. Coach Merritt's team has the habit of playing some very fine football against teams far more powerful than themselves, and the game this Saturday should again be marked by the stalwart resistance of Allegheny against a superior foe.

The Pitt Panther has been running wild this fall and many critics seem to think that it will not be stopped all season. So far, Pitt has a clean slate of five victories. Thiel and Grove City were both taken over by large scores in the early games and then West Virginia was given one of the worst walloppings that they ever received at the hands of Pitt. The score was 40-0. Drake University proved almost as easy and they received a 32-0 plastering. Last Saturday, in the annual battle for the championship of the city of Pittsburgh, Pitt again proved its superiority by defeating a fighting Carnegie Tech eleven, 23-7. Tech was the first team this year to cross the Panther goal line, and it certainly would be a feather in Allegheny's cap if they too could score.

As to physical condition, the Allegheny team is in none too good shape. Thompson sustained a mean cut in the face against Grove City, and Hughes has been struggling along with a bad ankle. Charlie Slaven has been having quite a lot of trouble with a bad shoulder which refuses to get well. Billings was forced from the game for the first time this year last Saturday by a bad leg, but it is thought that he will be able to start

against Pitt. It is very doubtful whether Niles Kinnunen and Kip Behrhorst, who have been on the hospital list, will be able to participate.

Pitt's narrow escape at Allegheny's hands last year will probably serve to keep down any possible overconfidence on the part of Sutherland's crew. It took a long hard struggle before Pitt was able to score a 9-7 win, and so they will not be looking for anything easy again this year. A good many Allegheny students are planning to take the trip to Pittsburgh and to stay over for the dance at the University club, which has been arranged for that evening. The football team will be guests and many friends of the college will be present. Admission will be \$2.50 per couple.
