LOUIS BRAUN MAKES TWO TOUCHDOWNS

DRIZZLING RAIN AND HEAVY FIELD PREVENTS PLAY- ING GOOD FOOTBALL

Playing in a sea of mud that completely swamped the elevens, the Methodists and the Covenanters came together today on Montgomery Field for their annual clash.

Playing the best football witnessed here for some years, Herb McCracken's football team won from Geneva College this afternoon in a game that means the Class B championship of Western Pennsylvania. The same Geneva that held Pitt to a low score in the early part of the season and beat Grove City 14-0 was unable to stop the rush of the Allegheny gridders as they went for the sectional flag. A dazzling variety of plays coupled with an air tight defense tells the story of the Covenanters' fall. This is how Able Kramer and Company brought home the banner:

With cheers from a medium sized crowd of rooters, the Allegheny Band playing, Geneva's rooters yelling ferociously, the opponents ran on the field at 2:10. A rousing cheer went up from the stands when a group of Covenanter hikers marched through the gates.

Geneva wins the toss and kicks to Graham, who ran it back to the 15-yard line. Graham made a yard on the first play. Hoppy Miller made five yards through right tackle. Miller punts out of bounds on the 55-yard line. Geneva's ball. Geneva made 5 yards at right end.

Krotzer took the ball 5 yards through the line. Line out for cleaning up. Thomas loses a yard—wild cheers Geneva fumbled, but recovered.

Miller kicked out of bounds to the 35-yard line; Adams made 15 yards at left end; the ball is on the 20-yard line. First down. Geneva fumbled and Bromley recovered on Allegheny's 18-yard line. Miller loses one yard at left end. Geneva blocks Miller's punt and it rolled over the goal line, Harr falling on it for a touchdown. Score—Geneva 6, Allegheny 0.

Harr kicked goal. Score—Geneva 7, Allegheny 0.

Allegheny kicked off.

Murphy kicked off to Krotzer who was downed in his tracks. Hudson punted to Miller, who returns the ball 8 yards. Alex went through right guard for 5 yards. Allegheny takes time out, ball on the 40 yard line. Miller goes around right end for first down, ball on the 50-yard line. Alex Graham makes 8 yards at right tackle. Substitutions for Geneva—Gredo for Ashman.

Houser makes a yard through the line. Taking time out to wash their hands. Houser makes first down through right tackle, after going through the line for 11 yards. Houser fumbles and Geneva recovered. Hudson makes two yards at right tackle. Miller's kick was partly blocked. Geneva's ball on 50-yard line. Hudson punted to Miller who took the ball back 18 yards. Houser gains three yards at left end. Graham fails to gain in the line. Miller punts to Thomas. Thomas downed in his tracks on Geneva's 40-yard line. Houser fails to gain. Alex Graham goes through the line for 4 yards. Heavy rain and the field is in frightful condition. Miller punts out of bounds on Geneva's 40-yard line. Hudson kicks to Miller on 30-yard line. End of first quarter.

Score—7 to 0 in favor of Geneva.

Second Quarter.

Houser made a yard through center, but Allegheny was penalized 15 yards for holding. Alex Graham made two yards through center. Miller punt to Thomas, who returns the ball 5 yards. Adams is stopped at left end. Klee fumbled, but recovered for loss

of 6 yards. Hudson kicks out of bounds on Allegheny's 40-yard line. Miller makes 3 yards at left end. Miller makes 3 yards more at left tackle. Alex Graham makes a yard through the line. Last down and two to go. Miller kicks to Thomas, who returns the ball 3 yards. Geneva penalized 15 yards for clipping. Braun nailed Hudson for no gain. Hudson kicked out of bounds on Geneva's 30-yard line. Allegheny fumbles and recovers. Crowd getting wet; chances are good for getting wetter. Adams skirts left end for a yard. Klee hits center for 3 yards. Hudson's punt was blocked, but Geneva recovered. Ad-

ams goes around right end for three yards; still wet. Owing to mud spectators can hardly distinguish the players. Kramer tackles Klee for three yard loss. Hudson's forward pass was grounded. Hudson kicks out of bounds, on Allegheny's 35-yard line.

Geneva is off side and Allegheny gets 5 yards. Houser makes three yards through left of line. Miller gains four yards at left end. Miller kicks to Geneva's 40-yard line. Alex Graham intercepts Geneva's short forward pass. Crowd getting wetter Allegheny loses 3 yards. Geneva cheers. Allegheny's pass was incomplete.

Houser fails to gain in the line. Another of Allegheny's passes incomplete. Miller kicks to Thomas on Geneva's 10-yard line. Braun makes a nice tackle. Krotzer ran through the line, but fumbles and Wright recovers the ball for Allegheny. Crowd cheers wildly for touchdown with 12

COACH MCCrackEN HELD IN HIGH ESTEEM

Coach McCracken, the man who led our football squad through the 'past season, comes to Allegheny from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was one of the team, under the direction of the famous Pop Warner for three years.

From the beginning of training season, two weeks before college opened, Coach McCracken has endeavored to teach the squad the kind of football played in the large universities and colleges. The plays he taught the

men were the ones calculated to be most effective against the teams of this section. To the men who were back from last year it was necessary to teach a style of play entirely different from the western style used last year.

That the coach had to rely upon material in the Freshman class was shown by the number who found berths on the squad. Ten men from this class were given places on the squad, a greater number than from any other class. Early in the season a series of accidents began that lasted throughout the entire season. At times as many as five or six of the best men on the first team have been out of the game because of injuries. This was one of the worst conditions with which Coach McCracken had to contend.

Too much credit cannot be given to the coach for the team he turned out under the circumstances. While he's offering no excuses or alibis for the showing made by the team, it is only fair to state that different results could probably not have been achieved by anyone else. When the calibre of the teams with which Allegheny played is taken into consideration the results obtained have not been wholly disappointing.

At the end of Coach McCracken's first year in Allegheny, it is the unanimous will of the football squad and the entire student body that the coach come back to lead the team through the next football season. Wherever the coach has had dealing with members of the college, he has made friends. And it is their sincere wish that he be secured for the next season.

COACH MCCrackEN GIVES HIS VIEWS ON THE SEASON

Football Mentor Summarizes Each Game in Open Letter to Students

To the Students of Allegheny:

In winning today's game, Allegheny displayed the most brilliant form of the season. The team was up against stiff opposition and the fighting qualities of the men was clearly demonstrated. After today's game I would consider the season a success. In this article I am giving a brief resume of the season with comments upon it.

The season taken as a whole shows that the team could not master together and maintain a fighting spirit for more than one out of every three games. And as this spirit is what wins most football games, it is virtually essential to a team that meets teams week after week that have superior physical strength than their own.

COLGATE: This game, our first of the season, and Colgate's second, seemed to point to the great possibilities which lay in the Allegheny team. Colgate got the jump on us because they were seasoned and our men were anxious and nervous. After the first five minutes, in which Colgate scored all her 14 points, Allegheny settled down and played good

game, outplaying their opponents. The hard football, at many points of the final score of 14-0 against a bigger and older team speaks for the fighting quality of the Allegheny team that day.

ALFRED: After every great battle there is always a lull. This was the case with the Allegheny team following the Colgate game. In the Alfred game the men played erratic, listless football, gaining ground at will until within the 15-yard zone. The playing spirit of the Alfred team on the defense was their main asset, as they could not gain a single first down by straight football. This game demonstrated clearly that Allegheny lacked the punch that character-

a winning football team.

GROVE CITY: This game found the men at the height of their playing ability. The team played like veterans throughout the game, making Grove City fight for every inch of ground gained. Twice during the first half, Grove City was in a position to score, being held for downs on one occasion, while an unsuccessful try for field goal ruined the other. With 30 seconds of the first half yet to be played, Miller gave the opponents, as well as the fans, a thrill, by breaking away for a 40-yard gain, following a trick play. But for the inability of two men to clip the last man, Miller would have gone for a touchdown.

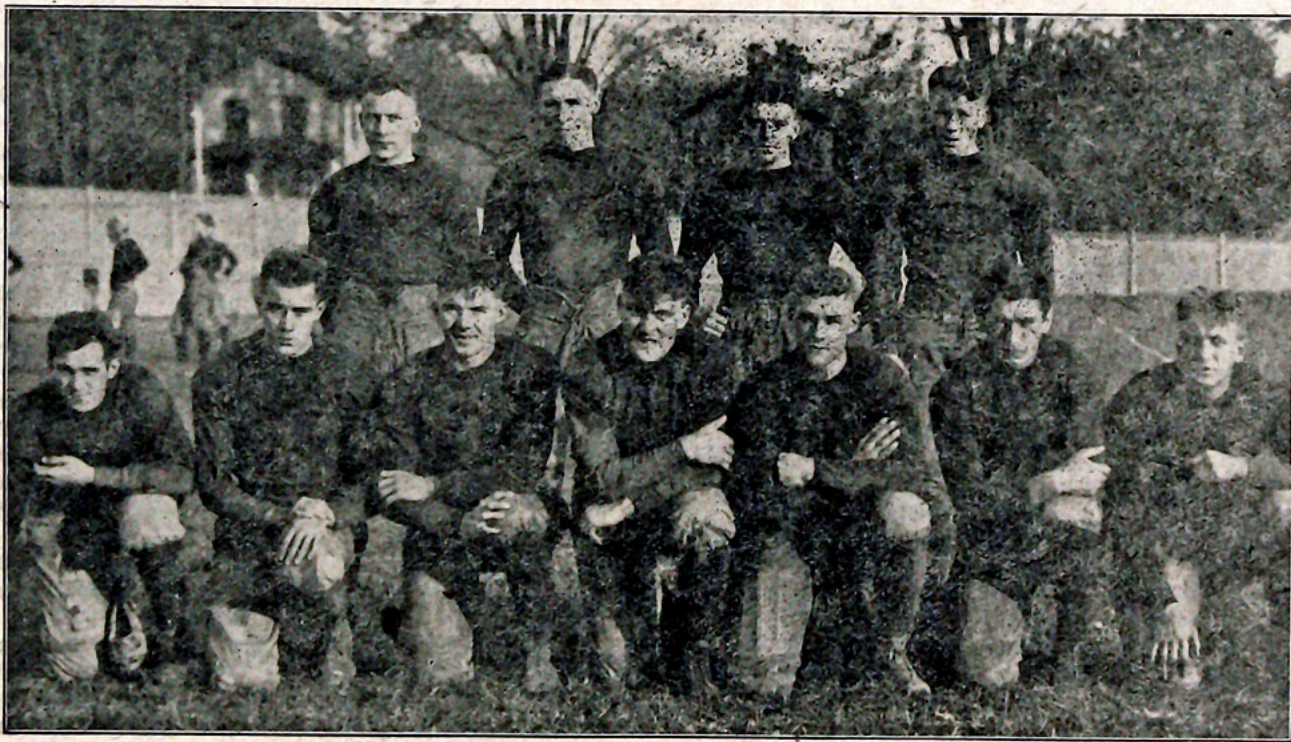
The two teams came back the second half with blood in their eyes, but before Allegheny could gather themselves together, Grove City pushed over a touchdown. The services of Fuller, Allegheny's center, were greatly missed during the period of Grove City's rush down the field, he being injured in the closing play of the first half.

The fighting spirit of the players did not die out after the Grove City score. Allegheny came back stronger than ever, but could not quite overcome the seven point advantage. With but two minutes to play and the ball on the 1-yard line, Allegheny held their opponents for downs. It is such fighting spirit that Allegheny needs in all her games, if she is to successfully meet and conquer heavier and more experienced foe. It is a physical impossibility to expect this fighting spirit in every game though.

WESTMINSTER: This game was possibly the most nerve-wrecking ever witnessed by the writer. Westminster took the ball twice during the first quarter to the 5-yard line, only to suffer a penalty for offside play and thereby lost their chance to score. Both teams scored during the second period, but Allegheny kicked goal following her touchdown, giving her a one point advantage. This one point advantage still held good when the first half ended.

At the rapid rate both offenses were going, everyone expected to see several more touchdowns scored by both sides before the game ended.

But Allegheny's offense weakened and her defense took over the surplus energy. Westminster gained at will until reaching our 5-yard line, where she would be held for downs. Allegheny's defense, when inside the 10-yard line, was nothing short of remarkable, although when in the middle of the field it cracked to such an extent that a high school team could

yards to go, but the whistle for the half breaks the play.

End of second quarter. Score—7 Estimated attendance at game, 500 Many standing in the rain. Lone voice from the grandstand says, "Good bye, now."

The teams are returning to the field while the crowd cheers, the dampness having no effect upon the enthusiasm Geneva changed their jerseys. The third quarter opened at 3:15, with Murphy kicking the ball back to the 30-yard line to Krotzer, and the ball went into play, Adams making 5 yards at left end. Adams failed to gain through the line. Time was called. Somebody yelled, "good-bye now." Geneva's ball with 5 yards to go. Hudson kicked, but the ball was practically blocked. Allegheny's ball on the 45-yard line. Hoppy Miller swam for 6 yards around left. Houser made two yards on a double pass, as mud flew in the air. No one drowned

Alex Graham made a first down. Miller makes 4 yards at left end and the crowd went wild once more. Forty klaxons resound, Alex Graham went through the line for 6 yards on the first down. Houser made one yard at the right of the line. A double pass lost four yards. Allegheny failed to gain through the line. Alex Graham took time out to get a new shoe on his left foot. Rain slackens a bit.

Allegheny's forward pass was incomplete; Geneva's ball. Krotzer kicked to Miller, who fumbled, but recovered the ball. Miller failed to gain. Thomas returns Miller's kick for 5 yards. Adams made 10 yards around left end. The Genevites went wild. Klee fumbled and Murphy recovered the ball. Alex Graham failed to gain through the line. Graham made a yard through the line. Substitutions—Lawrence for Klee. Miller punted to Geneva's 35-yard line, Reed

getting the ball. Lawrence made five yards through the line. Geneva drew a 15-yard penalty.

Geneva fumbled for 10-yard loss. Geneva's ball. Crowd went wild when Geneva's kick was blocked and Allegheny's men fell on the ball behind the line. Referees had a long argument over verification. Braun made the touchdown on a block punt. Score—Geneva, 7; Allegheny, 6 Crowd went wild with enthusiasm and the rain is forgotten. Hoppy Miller kicked goal and the score is 7 to 7. Substitutions—Mort Graham for Houser; Wills for Alex Graham. Stands simply went crazy.

Geneva kicked off to Wills, who returned the ball 15 yards from the 35-yard line. Miller made 2 yards through the line. Wills failed to gain through the line. Miller lost 4 yards. Miller punts to Adams, who fumbles and

Braun recovers on Geneva's 35-yard line. Mort Graham gains a yard on a double pass. Both teams take time out to wash off mud. Forward pass from Miller to Graham and gained 18 yards. Allegheny's ball on the first down, on Geneva's 14-yard line. End of third quarter.

Fourth Quarter.

Graham made a nice pass. Wills made a 4-yard gain through the line. The crowd cheers for a touchdown Allegheny on Geneva's 11-yard line Allegheny had a chance for goal, but lost on downs. Geneva's ball on the 18-yard.

Geneva worked the ball down the field on straight gains to their 55-yard line. Krotzer carried the ball on a right end play with full team interference. Reed breaks through, hitting Krotzer, who fumbled the ball but continued running. Braun coming through the line scoops the pig skin, running 45 yards for his second touchdown. EIGHTEEN GRIDDEES HAVE PLAYED WELL

CAPTAIN KRAMER.

Captain Kramer, who played his last game for the Blue and Gold today, is one of the most consistent and versatile members of the 1921 eleven. Starting the season at tackle he was soon shifted to guard as the need became more imperative. Then Red Dundon and Tarzan Fuller, the only available centers, sustained permanent injuries and Able was again moved over to fill this vacancy. It was at this position that the veteran closed his successful gridiron career at Allegheny.

HOPPY MILLER.

"Hoppy" Miller, the fleet halfback, has proved of inestimable value to the success of this year's eleven. Indeed his pretty end runs are a sight to behold, while his punting is all that could be desired. However, "Hoppy" is very susceptible to injuries, which kept him out of the Colgate and Dickinson games. His broken field running in the Buffalo game was as good as could be seen any place and he tore off a number of pretty runs against Carnegie Tech, but was unable to cross the line on any of them. Hoppy has another year on the team.

REED.

Reed, left end, is a newcomer, this being his first year on the squad. He was good enough, however, to star every game and was seldom removed. Quiet when off the field, he was full of the old spirit and fight when the whistle blew for the game. He is a dangerous man to have on the receiving end of a forward pass for he is a good runner with the ball. With the experience gained this year he will undoubtedly be one of the most valuable men next fall.

"MORT" GRAHAM.

Playing his second year on the varsity, Graham was kept out of a number of games on account of injuries but got back in time to play in the Dickinson game, where he scored our only touchdown on a pretty run after momentarily fumbling a triple pass. His basketball ability made him adept at snatching passes out of the air, and the opposition found him continually backing up the line.

BUCK WOLZ.

Buck Wolz is another Freshman who can boast of a football letter as a result of his work this fall. Husky and active, while on the football field he made a fine guard when he got his chance. He has three years more to play for Allegheny.

DAN MURPHY.

Dan Murphy, four years letter man, is another who played his last game for the Blue and Gold this afternoon. He played at tackle. Besides being a strong man in the line, he is a punter of no mean ability. He has been playing most of the season with an injured wrist, but has been one of the most valuable men despite that.

ALEC GRAHAM.

Alec Graham has drawn the full-back assignment this year and has played a consistent game during the entire season. He is a Freshman and his experience is going to stand him in good stead in future years. He hits the line low and it usually gives. Although not very large, he is an extremely hard man to stop.

LOOMIS.

Loomis, playing his second year on the team, has been one of the bulwarks of the line at tackle and end. The lanky southerner is a mighty hard man to get past, around, or through, and next year looks extremely bright for him. Loomis is a Junior.

RABBIT MEYERS.

Rabbit Meyers is the smallest man on the team and by all odds the hardest one to catch. His running with the ball is almost uncanny. He is a sure tackler and has stopped many men after they had broken through the line. His stunt of overtaking the fleet Jimmy Robertson after that Carnegie flash had a good five yards start will long be remembered by those who saw the game. Rabbit is a Freshman and plays halfback.

HUD WILLS.

Hud Wills broke into the line-up late in the season, but once in there was no displacing him. He carried the ball across the scoring line three times in the Buffalo game. One of the prettiest plays of that game was when Wills took the ball over on a

straight line buck from the 12-yard line. He has another year in college and is one of the men around whom a fine team can be built.

MORLEY.

Playing the quarterback position Morley was in every game of the season and displaying his ability at every instance. His steadiness in running the team was always in evidence and his good headwork was a factor in the winning of the Buffalo and Westminster contests. On the defense "Babe" was always there with superb fighting qualities. Much is expected of him in his remaining years at Allegheny.

DAVID FRAZIER.

Another man who played his last game for Allegheny this afternoon is Frazier, who participated in enough games to win his letter. His work in the Buffalo game was especially good. He is large and powerful and his loss will be felt.

BRAUN.

Braun came out for football without the advantage of the pre-season training camp, but the coach couldn't keep him on the bench. He plays a guard and looks to be one of the finds of the season. He is large and fast, so is used to playing a roving center on the defense. That he is wide awake can be seen from the fact that he intercepted no fewer than five forward passes during the season. Braun is a Sophomore and bids fair to develop into one of the best linemen Allegheny has ever had.

VIC WRIGHT.

Wright, the other guard, has a specialty of opening holes in the other team's line. He is a tower of strength on the defense. He is big and powerful and knows the game. Wright is also a Sophomore and what was said about Braun developing into a bigger star than at present applies with equal force to Wright. At present these two guards are the best the Blue and Gold has had in many years, and with each back for two more years, prospects are bright indeed.

CLARK.

Clark played in several games at tackle and gave a good account of himself. He should be a valuable man in the two years he has left. Too much credit cannot be given him for his willingness and steady work.

LYNN DUNDON.

Dundon started his second year at center in the game at Colgate, and was expecting a better season than the one preceding, when he received an injury to his knee.

JUDD.

Judd, playing his first year on the squad, was good enough to break into a number of games and showed great promise in action. He is a Freshman and has three more years to play.

PARKER.

Parker, who last year was considered a star halfback, hurt his shoulder in the Alfred game and was out for the year. Signs pointed to a big season for this man and his loss was felt. Parker graduates in June.

ATHLETIC YEAR IS IN PROSPECT

An indoor track meet to be held just before the Easter recess will open the track season for Allegheny. The usual Quarter, Half, One and Two Mile races will be run. In addition to these, High Jump and Pole Vault will be featured 1st, 2d and 3d place medals to be awarded.

On the last Saturday in April, Allegheny's relay team will run in the Penn relays. Training for this meet will begin immediately after the holidays and it is evident that the college will have good material with which to build on.

The Tri-state, Intercity and Inter schoolastic basketball tournament promises to be the big basketball feature here this year. (Teams from Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Erie and Cleveland have been entered in the tournament and a fine brand of ball is anticipated. As usual, the interschoolastic meet will be held the second Saturday in May and from twelve to fifteen schools in this section will compete.

Boxing and wrestling training will begin immediately after Thanksgiving. Coach Crotzer will have his squad for training three afternoons a week from 4 to 6 and Coach Dickson will take charge of the wrestlers three afternoons a week at the same time. Wednesdays and Saturdays from 2 to 4 in the afternoons will be given over to the training of pole vaulters and high jumpers.

have gained through it. The game ended shortly after Allegheny had held Westminster for four downs on the 2-yard line. The final score was 7-6 in Allegheny's favor.

CARNEGIE TECH: This game found the team at the lowest she had been all year. The man were dead from their shoulders up, as well as down. Every trace of fight that the team had ever displayed in her previous games, had disappeared. Tackle after tackle was missed, the men seemingly fearing to injure either themselves or their opponents if they tackled below the ears. It was a disgraceful exhibition of college football on Allegheny's part before a large crowd of Allegheny alumni.

UNIVERSITY OF BUFFALO: The week following the Carnegie Tech game was spent in trying to instill new spirit into the team and a general overhauling of both team and plays. This seemed to bring results, as the team that faced Buffalo on Saturday was an entirely new edition. The men once more were in a fighting spirit and they clearly outplayed the Buffalo aggregation in every department of the game. Double and triple passes were used galore, and the stunned and dazed opponents didn't know whether they were on a track meet or a hare and hound chase. Miller, Graham, Wills and Morley worked like a varsity backfield should and gained ground at will. The entire line played hard, consistent foot

ball and few large gains were made through them while they remained in the game. Both Buffalo touchdowns came as results of poor playing at critical moments by the Allegheny team. A blocked punt and a fumble gave them both their chances for scores.

DICKINSON: After the great showing of the team at Erie on Saturday, the students were pulling for their favorites to win the Dickinson game. The team, however, was not equal to the task, as the short flash of success of the previous Saturday evidently made them feel that they could run through any team for victor. They met more than their match at Dickinson though, and lost by the decisive score of 28-6. Dickinson had been in the clutches of a disastrous slump, but came to life just in time to completely outplay Allegheny's prides. Dickinson displayed more aggressiveness and ability to seize every opportunity that afforded itself. Allegheny's play was anything but smooth, the men seemingly pulling apart rather than together.

The outlook for next year is very bright, as many of this year's regulars still remain in school and the incoming Freshmen class will probably produce several good men. Of this year's team, Captain Kramer, Dan Murphy, Mort Graham and Frazier will graduate, and all of these men will be missed. All have been reliable and faithful workers and players of their ability will be missed when the team gathers together next fall. But to overshadow the graduation of these men, there will be about thirteen letter men back, all of whom will be wiser for this year's experience. The system, as installed this year, is only now beginning to work as it should, and by next year it should work with greater precision and with greater results.

The first two weeks of the season found the so-called "great Freshmen material" giving last year's varsity and scrubs a good run for their money, but this lasted only a short time. It soon became evident that they could not stand the gaff and they fell by the wayside to be heard of no more. After that it settled down to a battle of last year's men with a small sprinkling of this year's Freshmen as to who would represent the school on the varsity.

The so-called wide-heralded "Allegheny Spirit" failed to materialize as far as the writer could ever see. Before Allegheny can have or ever will have winning teams, there must first be a co-operative feeling between faculty and students that athletics, as proven and demonstrated by schools of greater national reputation than Allegheny, hold an important place in university and college life. As it now is, Allegheny, with a nation-wide reputation as an A-1 school scholastically, is gradually losing this place in the eyes of the public through its losing athletic policy. Twenty-five years ago, athletics meant absolutely nothing to a school, but neither did the airplane mean anything to warfare. Today it is different in both cases. Why try to have a "good old-fashioned" school in these up-to-date days?
