PRESIDENTS TWICE VICTORS IN WEEK

KERR AND KOFFORD STAR
FOR ALLEGHENY; W. & J.
PLAYS EXCELLENT GAME

W. & J. Wins by One Point in Fast
Game.

For the second time in one week the basketball team of Washington and Jefferson College defeated the Allegheny College team. The score was 24-23. Playing was fast and close. By a great last-minute rally, Allegheny almost overtook their rivals; but the time was too short and the whistle found them with one point lacking.

The whole forty minutes were replete with thrills. Carroll's great dribbling and shooting were the high points of the game. He sank some of the longest shots that were ever seen in Library Hall, and several times dribbled through or around the defence. Captain Henry played a fast game at guard for the visitors. He was all over the floor, stopping all sorts of shots, and kept his team working smoothly. Eielson at center was fast on the attack and proved to be a good defence man. Conn and Kaiser played good basketball.

For Allegheny, Kerr and Kofford starred. Kerr, playing the gigantic Henry, managed to elude his man for three baskets. Kofford was pitted against the hardest man of the W. & J. team and he certainly made good. He stopped Carroll's dribble time and time again when Carroll had passed the Allegheny line of defence. His passing was fine. Wise, who substituted for Stephens with about two minutes left, had a beautiful field goal from past center. He played very well the short time that he was in. Dependable Roge Baldwin held his man scoreless and gathered two field fields himself. Dunbar and Stephens played well at times.

W. & J. scored four points on fouls before Kofford got a chance. He made three but then Eielson rang in two field goals in succession and Carroll got a long one. "Rif" Kerr staged a little private show of his own and got away with three goals before the whistle blew. The first half ended with the Presidents leading 15 to 11.

In the second half Allegheny came back strong and at one time was in the lead with the score 19 to 18. A field goal by Carroll, and several fouls, put the Red and Black into the lead. Dunbar slipped one in in the last second of play, and the game ended with Allegheny one point in the rear. Allegheny outplayed the

Presidents and outscored them from the field. They were defeated only from the foul line as Carroll had seven more chances than did Kofford.

W. & J. VS. ALLEGHENY.

Monday evening, March 7, Coach Hammett's men played their last game on foreign floors when they lost to the fast W. & J. team at Little Washington, by the score of 36 to 28. The contest was witnessed by a large crowd for it was the last home game for the Presidents this season.

Though Allegheny fought stubbornly from the start of the game they were never in the lead and at no time were the Presidents in danger. After the first few minutes the W. & J. warriors were always in the lead by at least six points. The first half ended with the score 22 to 12 in favor of W. & J. In this half Allegheny scored but twice from the field on long shots by Captain Kerr and Mountsier. The floor work of Captain Henry was the feature for W. & J. Kofford did some excellent work from the foul line when he shot eight fouls without a miss.

The playing in the second half was of somewhat different nature. Allegheny outscored the Presidents in this half by two points, but the margin in the first half was too big to overcome and the game ended with

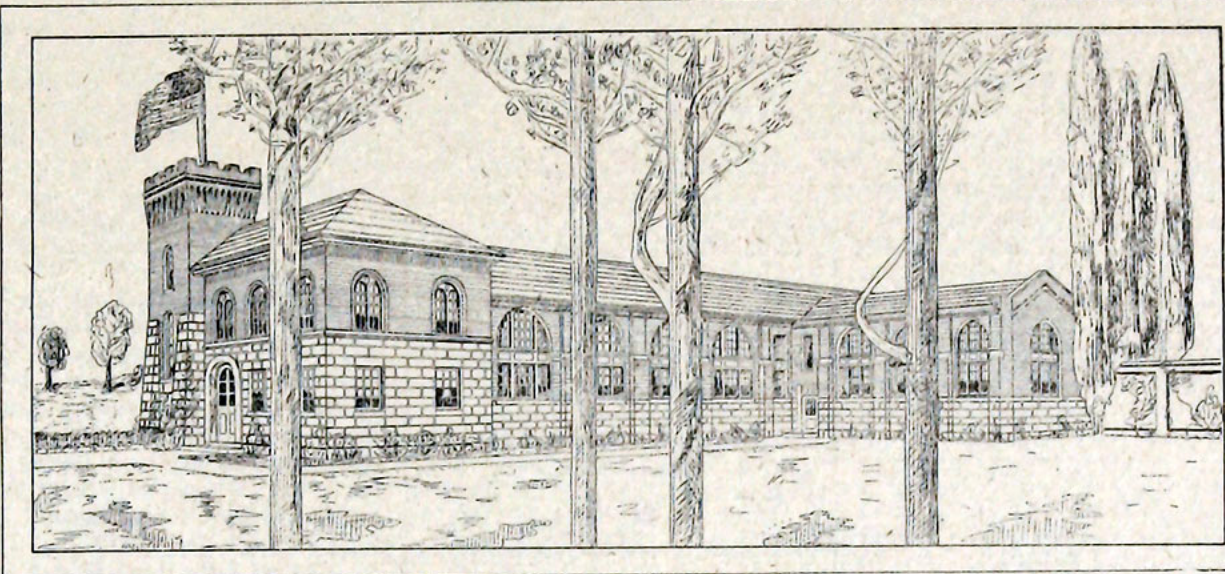

Gymnasium Campaign Takes Hopeful Aspect

With the coming of mild weather and the presumption of a full working schedule, the new gymnasium has taken an almost startling jump towards completion. Within two weeks the walls will be up, and within eight weeks, the building will be in use.

Looking at the left end of the cut may be seen the tower, offices, and

trophy rooms. The main body of the gym—the basketball floor and pool underneath is shown in the central part of the cut, while dressing rooms, drying rooms and store rooms are seen on the right end. Dressing rooms open directly onto the athletic field.

The arrival of March 1, and the realization that the pledged funds for

the new gymnasium were only partially raised have stimulated the student body and the student senate to a new and vigorous attack on the proposition in hand.

Several thousand dollars have been raised since the last announcement, and there is every indication that the campaign will wind up with that final spurt for the goal which is characteristic of Allegheny.

SUNDAY SERVICE

POWERFUL SERMON BY THE REV.
T. R. COURTICE.

On Sunday, March 14, the Rev. T. R. Courtice, of Jamestown, N. Y., gave the morning address in Chapel.

In developing his theme from the text "He that Wineth Souls is Wise," Rev. Courtice said in part: "Superlative wisdom is an expression of Drummond's 'greatest thing in the world.' The writer of Proverbs was a man of superlative wisdom. This is borne in upon us more fully after reading the book of Proverbs we attempt to compose a proverb. Few Americans can say so much by saying so little; with most of us wisdom is predigested. Even Lincoln borrowed phrases, he who has come nearest of all Americans to Solomon's felicity of expression. The name Lincoln always recalls certain outstanding utterances such as 'government of the people, for the people and by the people.' Yet Solomon far surpassed Lincoln with his golden thought nuggets which are on the lips of all Christendom every day.

"You can't measure God with a foot rule. In the same way you can not measure the lives of men like Moses, Gladstone, and Lincoln because there is so much of God in them. This is the superlative wisdom—that a man shall pour out his life seeking to save a soul."

TOURNAMENT COMING

FORECAST AND CLASSIFICATION
OF FIRST GREAT EVENT.

The sports of boxing and wrestling are about to reach their climax in the big inter-class tournament to be held in Library Hall Saturday evening March 27. Whether this event pans out or peters out rests almost entirely with the student body, i. e. with their attitude toward the preliminaries and the necessary training for the finals. Mr. Parks, a local boxer whose professional and personal reputation is of the best, has been obtained to referee the finals, bringing with him as judges two experts in the game; and Mr. Krotzer has kindly consented to referee the preliminaries. Mr. Dixon, a local wrestler of some note, will probably handle the wrestling. Let us show these men, and other outsiders who may be present, that the men of Allegheny, altho they do not know all the inside tricks of boxing and wrestling, can at least furnish a skilful and spirited exhibition of these sports.

Classes are being held every afternoon from 3:00-5:00 p. m. and Monday and Friday mornings at 11:00 a. m. Among the promising wrestlers are: heavyweights—Anderson, Potter, Coulson and Pond; light-heavy—Miller, Bacon and Hecker-nell; middleweight—Cunningham, Bacon, Brevoort, Agnew, Secore and Collins; welterweight—Cunningham, Beattie, Bittner, Venman and Tiffany; lightweight—Tate, Chabut and Cooley; featherweight—Russell and Murphy; bantamweight—Thoburn and Prather. In boxing circles, the promising candidates are: heavy-weight—Pond, Coulson and Anderson; light-heavy—Miller and Klein-stiver; middleweight—Leffingwell, Secore, Kirkpatrick and Summ; welterweight, Painter, Megahan, Laffer, Hitchens, Eastman, Russell, Beattie and Limber; lightweight—Chabut, Barcus, Nichol, Gordon and Hitchens; featherweight—Kirkpatrick, Parent, Russell, Mitchell and Murphy; bantamweight—Jubeliner and Fix. It is evident from the above list that any man weighing under 115 pounds has comparatively little opposition between him and the finals.

The preliminaries will be held the latter part of this week; boxing at 2:30, March 19, and wrestling at 2:30, March 20. The boxing will consist of three two-minute rounds, and the wrestling bouts will last a maximum of five minutes. All contestants should hand their names to Mr. Barnes before Wednesday evening, March 17. All candidates should begin training immediately, and attend as many of the daily classes as possible.

MANAGERS ON NEW BASIS

ATHLETIC BOARD TO INAUG-
URATE EFFICIENT SYSTEM

For a number of years it has been the contention of many students that athletic managers have not been chosen of a fair basis. Realizing that there might be some truth to this belief the Allegheny College Athletic Association has framed a system for competitive selection of managers of all athletic teams.

The proposed amendments were framed by a Committee of the Athletic Board, consisting of F. M. Parrish, Chairman, W. B. Gordon and N. W. Kerr. A careful study was made of the systems in use in other schools, and their efficiency in promoting good athletics. It is our profound conviction that the proposed plan will do away with all politics, and every man will be given an opportunity to compete for Manager in any major sport. The old adage—"Competition is the life of trade," can well be applied to athletics, and will foster a new and modern spirit that will mean bigger and better athletics. The system of four Assistant Managers for each sport will provide better facilities for the teams, and put an enthusiasm into athletics heretofore lacking. The competitive system will insure able and efficient men as Managers, and many innovations that will result in the ultimate well-being of athletics in Old Allegheny.

The Athletic Board has approved of the proposed amendments, and earnestly recommend their adoption by the Athletic Association. A mass meeting will be held in a few days for the purpose of ratifying the amendments. At this meeting the members of the Committee will attempt to answer all questions relative to the merits and practical working of the proposed system.

Proposed Amendments.

Article III, Sections 2, 3, 4, and 7; Article V, Section 6, are hereby amended in so far as they violate any provision of the following amendments.

Articles

In addition to, and amendment of The Constitution of the Allegheny College Athletic Association.

Article I.

Sec. 1. The Managers and Assistant Managers for all athletic teams shall be selected on a competitive basis, as hereinafter provided, with the exception of the Tennis Manager.

Sec. 2. A board is hereby created, to be known as the Board for the Selection of Managers. It shall be composed of the following members: 1. Chairman of the Athletic Board. 2. Treasurer of the Athletic Board. 3. Director of Athletics. 4. President of the Athletic Association. 5. Manager of the sport for which Manager and Assistant Managers are to be selected. 6. Captain of the sport for which the Manager and Assistant Managers are to be selected. 7. Secretary of the Athletic Association. The Chairman of the Athletic Board shall be ex-officio Chairman, and the Secretary of the Athletic Association shall be Secretary of this Board.

Sec. 3. Each member of the Board shall have one vote. In case one

EDITORIAL

Allegheny has college spirit—lots of it. Perhaps there is not as much as might be, but we have more than during the war. Nothing is more constantly repeated and in the minds of many students, no term is more vague.

It need not be a vague, indefinite term.

College spirit is first of all based on an unselfish interest in college activities; not passive interest, but the kind of interest that calls for expression thru action. College spirit is directly proportional to the part the individual student takes in what is going on.

If a student (having done his durnest in the classroom) is a member of the college band, an athletic team or a departmental club, or is related to any activity, and does not support that activity, his claim to college spirit is unfounded.

If a student has, or thinks he has the ability to participate in a college activity, and does not participate, why should he kick if that activity falls a little below its normal standard?

If a student is actively participating, but does not attempt to influence his friend who is not, does that student show 100% college spirit?

There are kickers, both consistent and casual, who kick about everything by force of habit. Their college spirit is below the absolute zero—it has ceased to exist. But if they kick, having constructive ideas to back their kick, they are true Alleghenians.

The prescription, then, the "RX" for enfeebled or underdeveloped college spirit is activity for the fun of doing things—sport for sport's sake, interest for interest's sake, and everything for Allegheny's sake.

ATHLETIC BOARD ADOPT NEW SYSTEM.

(Continued from page 1.) person holds two offices, the incumbants of which are entitled to sit on this Board, he shall have two votes.

Sect. 4. This Board shall exercise the powers herinafter granted for the purpose of selecting Managers and Assistant Managers of all athletic teams, with the exception of the Tennis Team.

Article II.

Sect. 1. All men desiring to compete for the position of Assistant Manager shall hand their names to the Secretary of the Board for the Selection of Managers within two weeks after the fall registration, together with a statement of the position to which they aspire. A list of these men shall be transmitted by the Secretary to the Director of Athletics. He shall assign work to the men competing.

Sect. 2. The Director of Athletics, the Manager and the Captain of the sport in question shall each submit to the Board a rating of the competitors, on the basis of efficiency, ability, conduct, and spirit displayed. From these lists the Board shall elect four Assistant Managers for the sport in question, at the time hereinafter provided, who shall serve in that capacity for the succeeding year.

Sect. 3. The Director of Athletics, the Manager and the Captain of the sport in question, shall each submit a rating of the four Assistant Managers to the Board, at the time hereinafter specified for each sport, on the basis of efficiency, ability, conduct, and spirit displayed. From these lists the Board shall make a rating of the men on the same basis, as first, second, third, and fourth.

Sect. 4. No. 1 on the list shall be Manager of the sport in question for the succeeding year. If, for any reason the No. 1 man shall be unable to discharge the functions of Manager, the determination of which shall be at the discretion of the Board, No. 2 man shall automatically become Manager, and similarly down the list.

Article III.

Sect. 1. All men competing for the position of Assistant Manager shall be Sophomores.

Sect. 2. All men competing for the position of Manager shall be Juniors.

Article IV.

Sect. 1. The Board shall meet before the Christmas vacation for the purpose of selecting the Manager and the Assistant Managers for Football in the manner hereinbefore provided.

Sect. 2. The Board shall meet before the Annual Commencement for the purpose of selecting the Manager and Assistant Managers for

Track in the manner hereinbefore provided.

Sect. 3. The Board shall meet before the Easter vacation for the purpose of selecting the Manager and Assistant Managers for Basketball in the manner hereinbefore provided.

Article V.

Sect. 1. The Manager of the Tennis Team shall be elected by the members thereof at the end of the season, for the succeeding year, under the supervision of the Secretary of the Board.

Sect. 2. The Manager shall be automatically Captain of the team.

Sect. 3. The Manager shall be a Junior or Senior for the period of his tenure of office, if there be a Junior or Senior on the team.

Article VI.

Sect. 1. In all elections of the Board or the Tennis Team, a majority vote shall be sufficient to elect any candidate.

Sect. 2. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Article VII.

Sect. 1. All tie votes in any election under the jurisdiction of the Athletic Association shall be decided by the Athletic Board casting the additional vote.

Sect. 2. The voting in such case shall be by secret ballot.

Sect. 3. The Secretary of the Athletic Association shall make known to the proper body the result of this ballot, and see that the contest is decided.

Plan for carrying into effect the proposed Amendments for 1920-21, until the new system works automatically.

Article I.

Sect. 1. The competitors for Manager and Assistant Manager of Football shall hand their names to the Secretary as hereinbefore provided. The competitors shall be Juniors and Sophomores, and shall be assigned work as hereinbefore provided.

Sect. 2. At the time of election as hereinbefore provided, the Board shall select four Assistant Managers from the Sophomores competing, on the basis as hereinbefore provided, who shall serve in that capacity for the succeeding year.

Sect. 3. At the time of election as hereinbefore provided, the Board shall rate the Juniors competing for Manager on the basis as hereinbefore provided. No. 1 man shall be Manager for the succeeding year.

Article II.

Sect. 1. The competitors for Manager and Assistant Manager of Track shall hand their names to the Secretary before April 1, 1920. The competitors shall be Juniors and Sophomores, and shall be assigned work as hereinbefore provided.

It fails to take into account the other fellow—or society at large. There are things which a man can do with no apparent harm to himself, but which bring disaster to others.

Finally, this question is objectionable in that

It crowds out a greater question.

I am convinced that if we should substitute the question, "Will it do me any good to—," finer character, greater effectiveness, and tremendously better personal influence would result. The man who uses his time in doing the things he ought to do and the things of which there is no doubt, will have little occasion to ask the question under discussion. Try it for yourself, and give this little question a much needed rest.

THE CLASSROOM PHILOSOPHER

VII.

Hitherto I have only reported those talks of the Professor's which were of a serious nature. The reader is aware by this time that the Philosopher was a man who thought and felt deeply. Yet there was another side to his character, as I intimated in the first of these papers. In response his face wore a wearied almost dejected expression but it was often animated with a smile that was all the more expressive of humor for the contrast. A vein of wit ran through his lectures and sometimes he would step aside to develop a humorous idea that occurred to him. I remember one morning when he advanced a proposal for low salaried professors that is second only to Mr. Swift's excellent proposal concerning the children of Ireland.

"The industrial turmoil of the period we have been studying," the Professor was saying, "ended in greater freedom for the workers and higher wages generally. In many respects it was similar to the present time when all wages and salaries appear to be rising except those of the college professor. Yet it is impossible for professors to organize into unions. They are too individual. Even on a small faculty such as this school has—the college I was attending had only a few hundred students—it is often hard to reach an agreement over the simplest matter.

"College professors are becoming restless, though, and some effort may have to be made to make them satisfied with the lot. It might be advisable to rank them as amateurs and professionals just as athletes are ranked. If a professor received less than two thousand dollars a year he could be called an amateur and dignified with the name of scholar to show he was connected with the college for love of the work rather than for any sordid gain. Then if a man received two thousand a year or more he would be ranked as a professional and called a teacher. Such a man might be even excluded entirely by the strict ethical code of small colleges and be forced to teach in the large universities whose broader point of view enables them to give tuition to athletes and to pay their professors a 'living wage.'"

CECELIA CLUB.

Cecelia Club will soon be counted as one of the active organizations on the Hill. On March 27th a concert is to be given for the benefit of the Y. W. C. A. The program will consist of classic and popular songs, besides other musical numbers. This first Cecelia Club concert is only for the Faculty ladies and the young

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women of Allegheny College and will be held in the music rooms of Bentley.

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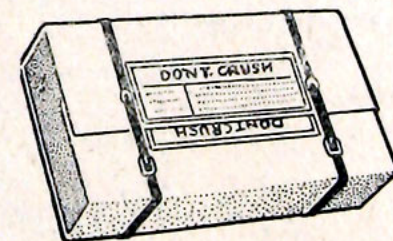
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20-23 GAME.

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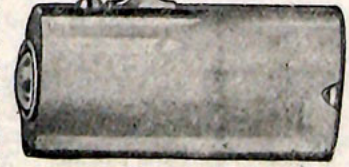
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
