

Whig Meeting at the Tremont Temple.

In consequence of the inclemency of the weather, yesterday forenoon, an announcement was made that the Whig meeting which had been called for last evening in Court Square, would assemble in the Tremont Temple. In accordance with this announcement that Hall was filled at an early hour.

The meeting was called to order by William Hayden, Esq., and Hon. George Sunt was chosen Chairman, and Ezra Lincoln, Jr. was appointed Secretary. After an appropriate opening address, Mr. Sunt introduced Gov. Seward of New York, who was warmly received, and made an excellent and convincing speech in support of Whig principles and Whig candidates. Gov. Seward was followed by Hon. Abram Lincoln of Illinois, who clearly and eloquently stated and maintained the Whig doctrine, that the Whigs

are opposed to the extension of slavery, and believe that the election of General Taylor will do more to prevent such extension, than will the election of any other candidate that it is possible to elect; and explained the hopelessness and impossibility of the election of Mr. Van Buren.

After the conclusion of his remarks, which were enthusiastically received, the meeting adjourned at about a quarter past 10 o'clock, with three cheers for Gen. Taylor, and three for the speaker of the evening.
