Executive Assistant To UN Secretary General Speaks In Ford Chapel Tonight

Andrew W. Cordier, executive assistant to United Nations Secretary General Trygve Lie, will speak in Ford Memorial Chapel tonight at 8:15 p.m.

The lecture is sponsored jointly by Phi Beta Kappa and the Sturtevant Lectureship Foundation, a foundation which was established by Mr. Paul Sturtevant, a former Alleghenian, for the purpose of bringing annually to the campus lecturers on political and governmental subjects.

Mr. Cordier, who has been active in the United Nations since its organization, will speak on the "Evolution of International Organization."

As executive assistant to the secretary general since 1946, Mr. Cordier has been responsible for coordinating all U.N. activities and programs. His duties involve organization and direction of the general assembly and headquarters direction of all political missions, such as Palestine, Korea, and the Balkans. He also co-ordinates the activities of 3,200 staff members.

Born near Canton, Ohio, Mr. Cordier is a graduate of Manchester College, Indiana, where he received his bachelor of arts degree. He became a teaching fellow at the University of Chicago, where he re-

Dr. Swartley Returns; Miss Barco Named To Faculty This Semester

Dr. Stanley S. Swartley, professor emeritus of English, will return to the classroom this semester to teach two classes of Introduction to Literature; while Miss Yolanda Barco, a graduate of Allegheny, will instruct in Business Law according to Dr. Julian L. Ross, dean of instruction, who announced the additions to the faculty for the current semester.

Dr. Swartley, who retired as head of the English department in 1949, has been serving as curator of the Tarbell collection in Reis Library. He will continue to hold that post, and will teach the classes originally assigned to B. Frank Hammet, who returned to active duty with the

Dr. Louis J. Long, College Treasurer, Named 11th President Of Wells College

Dr. Louis Jefferson Long, treasurer of Allegheny College since 1941, and a member of the economics faculty since 1935, has been named president of Wells College in Aurora, New York.

The announcement was made on January 31 by Henry H. Stebbins, Jr., of Rochester, New York, chairman of the board of trustees of Wells. Dr. Long will succeed President Jerome H. Bentley, who has held that office, in addition to his duties as college treasurer, since the resignation of Dr. Richard L. Greene for reasons of health, July 1, 1950. Mr. Bentley will continue as treasurer.

Dr. Long, who will assume his post on August 1, will be the 11th president of Wells. He is 42 years old.

In acknowledging his election last week, Dr. Long said:

"I feel greatly honored to be elected to the presidency of Wells College. The challenge it presents will require the best I have to offer. While I know that I shall be very happy in

the new job, my pleasure and enthusiasm are mingled with regret at leaving Allegheny College and Meadville. It will be particularly hard to leave the many friends who have made our stay here such a happy one. We shall keep with us always a pleasant memory of Allegheny and the Meadville community."

Born in Belle Fourche, South Dakota, Dr. Long attended public schools there as well as Cleburne Military Academy, Cleburne, Texas. He was graduated from the Univer-

"Medea" Opens Tonight At The Playshop; Promises To Be Outstanding Production

One of the more respected Playshop mentors was heard to remark the other day that the Robinson Jeffers adaption of Euripides' *Medea*, which mounts the boards in Arter's basement tonight at 8:15, will undoubtedly be the Playshop's most successful production in several years.

He went on to back up this prediction by pointing out the excellence of writing and construction which marks this modernized Greek tragedy. He also explained that Mrs. Graham Bird, who is directing the play, and Mr. McMillen, who is coaching the actors, were able to take almost unprecedented advantage of last week's school recess to whip all facets of the production into super-satisfactory shape.

Mrs. Bird, in addition to staging and blocking *Medea*, has designed the costumes for the play.

"Contrary to popular opinion," says Mrs. Bird, "Greek tragedies of this historical period (1200 B.C.) are not supposed to be played against a background of shining white marble columns and glittering temples. And

PRESIDENT PRAISES DR. LONG'S RECORD

President Benezet praised Dr. Long's contribution to Allegheny in a statement issued last week:

"In 1935 a young Ph.D. from the University of Illinois joined the Allegheny staff to teach economics. In the next six years this young man progressed through the academic ranks to full professor. During the next ten years his services were given more and more exclusively to the task of helping keep the college ship financially afloat. Only those who worked closely with him during those ten years can appreciate how complete and thorough was his devotion to each aspect of Allegheny's economic picture. He handled his job with precision and efficiency. Four college presidents in turn came to rely on him for his sense of responsibility and his intelligent enterprise.

To say that finding his replacement will be a difficult job is understatement.

I hail President-elect Long of Wells College, and extend to him every help I can offer in his own administration, as he so greatly helped me."

sity of Colorado in 1930, with the degree of bachelor of business administration, and received a master of arts degree there the following year. He was a teaching fellow at the University of Illinois from 1931 to 1935, and was awarded the doctor of philosophy degree there in 1935, having been elected to Phi Beta Kappa in 1934.

During his years at Allegheny, Dr. Long was instrumental in extending the activities of the college. He organized the first evening division program of adult education in 1939, and assisted in reinstituting it last year after it had been discontinued during the war. During the celebration of the 125th anniversary of the founding of Allegheny College in 1940, Dr. Long and J. L. Fisher co-edited and published "Allegheny College Business Lectures" as the contribution of the economics department to the occasion.

A member of Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary scholastic fraternity while at the University of Illinois, Dr. Long is now a member of the American Economics Association. From 1940 to 1945 he was lecturer for the Oil City Chapter of the American Institute of Banking.

A trustee of the Erie Diocese of the Episcopal Church and a member of its board of missions and board of education, he has served as a member of the vestry of Christ Church, Meadville.

Dr. and Mrs. Long, the former Margaret Railsback of Weldon, Illinois, have lived at 418 Byllesby Avenue for the past 14 years. They have one son, Barry Jefferson, II.

The election of Dr. Long to the presidency of Wells was reported unanimous after the consideration of more than 200 candidates by a special trustee committee headed by Edward M. Cameron, Jr., a New York attorney.

Wells College, founded in 1868 as Wells Seminary, was established by one of America's leading business men of the 19th Century, Henry Wells, who also began the Wells Fargo and American Express companies.

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Religion-In-Life Week Begins Sunday; James Farmer To Address Opening Session

Sunday, February 11, will mark the beginning of Religion-In-Life Week for 1951, when Mr. James Farmer speaker on the program, will address ACA Sunday evening on the week's topic, "Am I too big for religion?"

The remainder of the week will be devoted to seminars conducted by Dr. Ethel Tilley, Rabbi Isidor B. Hoffman, Charles Walker, and Robert James.

Dr. Ethel Tilley is at present a professor of Philosophy and Religion at Brenau College, Gainesville, Georgia. A member of Phi Beta Kappa, she received her B.A. from Ohio Wesleyan and her A.M. and Ph.D. degrees from Boston University. Dr. Tilley has had a varied career, serving as Dean of Students for six years at Hastings College, Nebraska, and having done social, religious, educational and musical work in Pittsburgh previous to the deanship. She also served as Dean of Students at Greensboro College, North Carolina from 1946-48. Dr. Tilley has traveled widely. The summer of 1949 found her attending the East-West Philosophers' Conference at Honolulu and later spending four weeks in Japan. She spent the summer of 1950 in Europe.

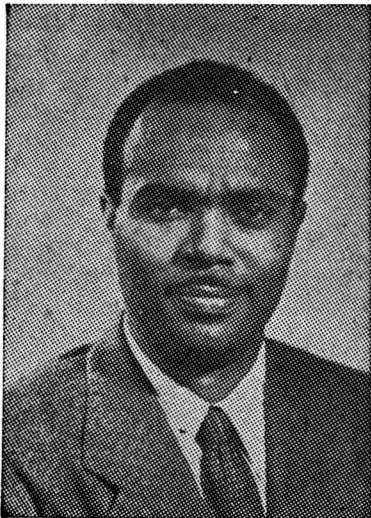
Rabbi Isidor B. Hoffman, from New York, has been Counselor to Jewish Students at Columbia University for the past 15 years. In 1920 he received his B.A. from that school. He obtained his Rabbi and M.H.L. at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York in 1924, and did postgraduate work at Cornell University, the American School for Oriental Research in Jerusalem, and the Hebrew University.

From 1929 to 1933 he acted as director of the Hillel Foundation, Cornell University. He has served as president of the Jewish Peace Fellowship, as chairman of the executive committee of the World Student Service Fund, and was formerly chairman of the Social Justice Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly of America.

Mr. Charles Walker, from Philadelphia, is regional secretary of the Fellowship of Reconciliation. He is a graduate of Elizabethtown College and did graduate work at N.Y.U. Formerly he served as college sec-

retary for the American Friends Service Committee.

Mr. Robert James, originally from Pittsburgh, received his B.A. from Dartmouth, where he was active in sports and religious activities. He received his B.D. at the Yale Divinity School, and also did field work with the Y.M.C.A. At present he and his family live in a cooperative interracial housing project near Philadelphia. Mr. James has had much religious and social service experience, having served as Acting Congregational Student Pastor at Cornell University and as director of Quaker Summer Work Camps in New Hampshire and California. He was president of the Council of Civic Unity during the relocation of Japanese-Americans.

Debate Squad Ties For First Place In Tourney; Scores Also Before Exams

Allegheny and Mt. Mercy College of Pittsburgh tied for first place in the first annual Slippery Rock State Teachers College Debate Tournament held last Saturday, February 3.

Allegheny, competing with twelve other colleges and universities, won five out of six rounds of debating, carried on in the cross-examination style.

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Finmen Meet Grove City; Quintet Opposes Oberlin

Gator Swimmers Eke Out 41-34 Win Over Slippery Rock; Meet Grove City Friday

It was an overconfident Gator team that met an inspired Slippery Rock aggregate last January 17. These factors almost resulted in an upset, but fortunately, Allegheny possessed enough superior ability to eke out a 41-34 victory.

The outstanding performance of the meet was turned in by the sparkling freshman swimmer, "Chet" Hearn. "Chet" won the 220 yard, 100 yard, and 440 yard freestyle events to amass a total of 15 points for the meet. Captain Bob Zuberbuhler splashed to a new pool record in the 200 yard backstroke, in a time of 2:32, eight seconds below the old pool record at Slippery Rock. John Muir and Ward Schenk took seconds in the 100 and 60 yard dashes respectively. Don Case placed second in the diving. Others who played their part in the victory were Enselberg, McAlvey, Wilson, Al Case, Sayer and Ertle.

The inspired swimming of the Slippery Rock team was most evident in the 300 yard relay, 200 yard backstroke, and 200 yard breaststroke.

The meet was close all the way. Slippery Rock won the initial event, the 300 yard medley relay, and led up until the 100 yard dash. At this point Allegheny took the lead, 21-20. By the time the 440 yard race rolled around Allegheny was behind again, 31-28. Coach Hanson, realizing that we had to get a first to win, put Hearn in the 440. His strategy worked and the score going into the final event was knotted at 34-34. Allegheny won the final relay and chalked up its third win of the season against one loss.

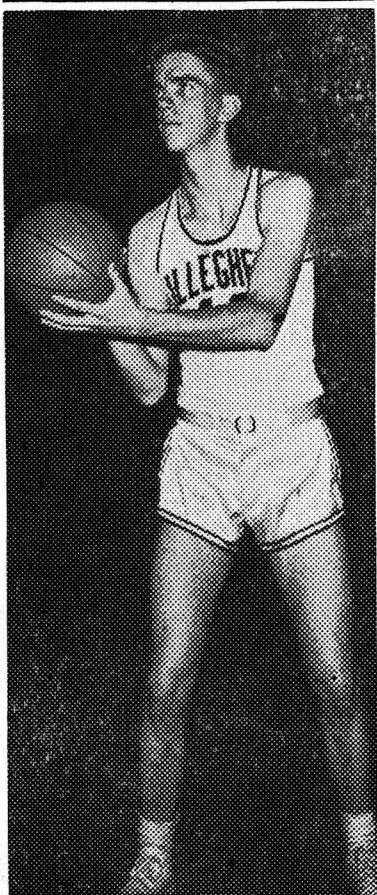
The time of participation and the type of activity will be arranged according to the student's desires and the available facilities.

However, in Bill Sterling, Coach Hanson may have a suitable replacement for Case.

Swim Notes: Chet Hearn scored the maximum number of points possible in one meet, 15. This is because each swimmer is allowed to participate **only** in three events during a single meet. First place gives a swimmer five points, second gives three, and third gives one point . . . Bob Zuberbuhler swam his best time of the year against Oberlin. The time, 2:29, is approximately six minutes better than Allegheny varsity record. However, since Zuby came in second in the race his time is not registered as a record. In order to gain possession of this record Zuby has to win the race he is swimming. This is the second time this has happened to Zuby. The other time was a year ago at the District Meet. He broke the district record for backstrokers but was just touched out for first place.

The 6'4" McIndoe has hit 41 field goals in 115 attempts for a respectable 35.6 average from the field. He has converted 21 out of 37 free throws. Varsity Cagers Face Strong Oberlin And Grove City Teams At Montgomery

A young Allegheny College basketball team, which has been gaining experience and confidence with each game, will attempt to improve its 1-6 record when it entertains Oberlin and Grove City in two successive home frays at Montgomery Gym on Saturday, February 10, and Tuesday, February 13.

The Oberlin Yeomen, at the time of this writing, have posted seven victories against three defeats. The high-flying Yeomen have taken Hiram, Fenn, Buffalo State, Peru (Nebraska), Mount Union, and Rochester, while dropping games to Wittenberg, Case, and Ashland. The Ohioans are led by co-captains Robbie Shults (6'2") and Dick Kuusela (6'). Shults has averaged 17.5 points per game, while Kuusela has posted a 12.8 average in the ten games. This game will be the twenty-seventh meeting between the two schools, with Allegheny having won sixteen of the last twenty-six contests. Oberlin won last year's game by a 69-57 count.

Tuesday night's opponent, Grove City, has defeated Allegheny previously this season, 64-40 at Grove City. The Crimson quintet has a record of four wins and five losses at this time. They are led by diminutive Danny Hill (5'8"), who has 133 points in nine games.

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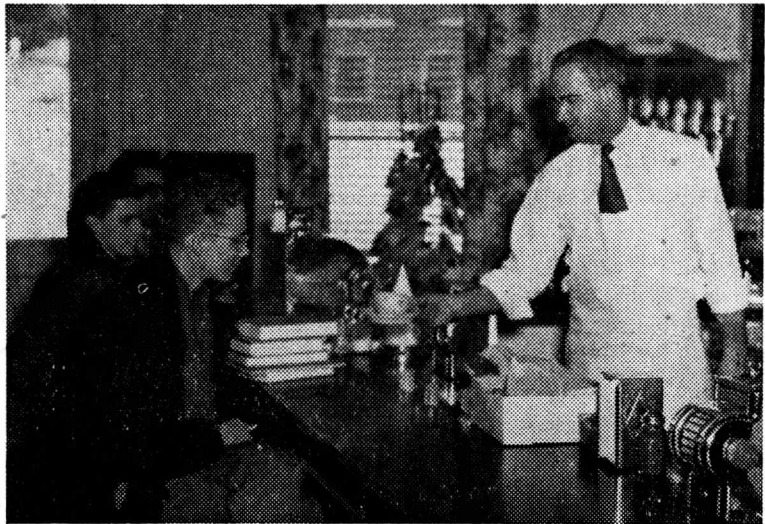

Benezet Accepts Check For 50 Grand; Benefits Of Brooks' Life Policies

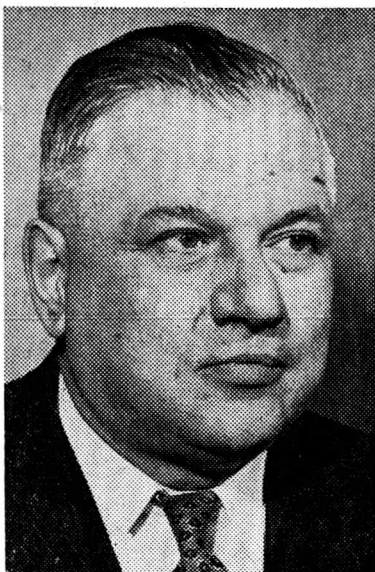

The late Colonel Brooks, chairman of the Central Division of the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, was the donor of Anna Cloyde Brooks Hall, in 1940. The insurance policies were a part of his contribution to the 125th Anniversary Campaign of Allegheny that year.

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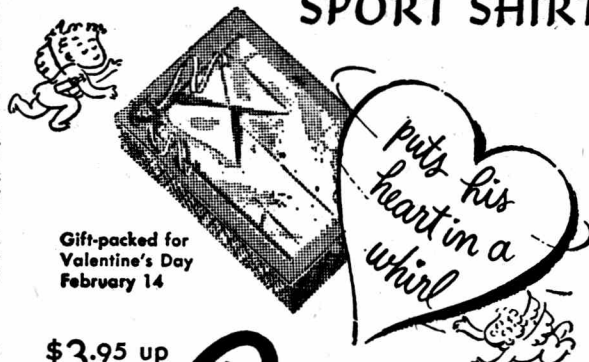

the Greeks didn't go around in long white robes either. In *Medea*, therefore, you will see the entrance and courtyard before a simple house built of brown field-stone. The soldiers and citizens will be in costumes bright with color.”

The part of *Medea*, the passionate, embittered heroine of the drama, is to be played here by Dorothea Carlson, a gifted actress from Erie. Miss Carlson was the first person in the United States to receive a Master's degree in the field of Acting. She is no newcomer to serious Greek drama, having played the roles of Hecuba in *The Trojan Women*, and Phaedra in the Thomas Wood Stevens production of *Hippolytus*. Her husband is Henderson For-

sythe, Associate Director of the Erie Playhouse.

In the past there has been some criticism of the Playshop's policy of “importing” people like Miss Carlson to fill leading roles. Speaking for herself and her fellow drama instructors, Mrs. Bird has emphatically stated her opinion on the subject.

“To begin with,” says Mrs. Bird, “there is not a girl at Allegheny, either in the Drama Department or outside it, who is capable of doing justice to the fantastically difficult role of *Medea*. It requires an actress with long experience and outstanding talent—someone who can approach the standards set by Judith Anderson, who made a success of this play on Broadway in 1948.

Playing opposite Miss Carlson in the role of Jason, the wayward husband, will be Stephen Wolfson, an Allegheny sophomore from Neponsit, Long Island. Two other major roles, those of Creon and Aegaeus, will be filled by Philip Wiseman and Edwin Bordo. The nurse for *Medea's* children will be played by Sally Schwab. The three women who serve as a chorus are to be acted by Nancy Shaw, Dorothy Buehler and Joan Mattiesson.

Medea will be performed again tomorrow and Saturday night, February 9 and 10, and for three nights beginning on Thursday of next week.

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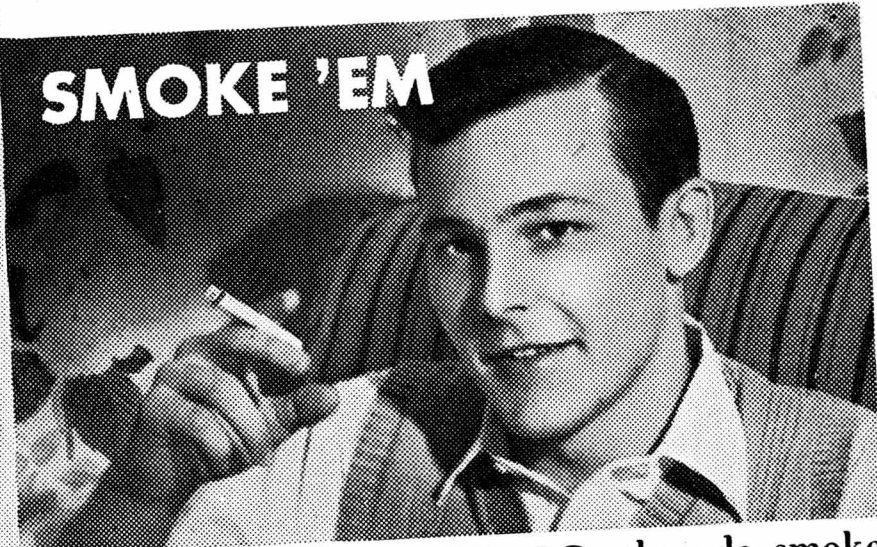
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
